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'Wyldlife' Camp for Guyra Youth

The Young Life Club in Guyra has been meeting in the Anglican Church hall, weekly, on Monday evenings, for most of this year.

Young Life is a mission community of Christ-centred people committed to reaching adolescent youth with the gospel of Jesus Christ.

They work with churches, building relationships with young people by connecting with them in their world.

September start for main street

Two long awaited Guyra projects are set to get underway in the coming months. Work on the main street upgrade and the Mother of Ducks Lagoon will begin in September/October depending on the weather and the finalisation of plans.

Eleven local residents joined council staff last week for a look at plans for both projects. They then toured the main street to see how the plans will be put into action.

The main street upgrade, which was set to start in July 2018, has been on the backburner due to the discovery and subsequent extraction of underground fuel tanks.

Leah Cook (Service Leader Asset Planning and Design) said that work will now be carried out in three stages with the first stage involving the fuel tank remediation and a review of structural awnings now complete.

Ms Cook said that costs to date to undertake these works have been approximately \$600,000, with the majority of expenditure associated with the environmental remediation

Stage 2, which will see road rehabilitation and reshaping to address cross fall issues between Ollera and Nincoola

Streets, is expected to get underway once the weather warms up and will be completed prior to Christmas.

Ms Cook said that in conjunction with road construction activities, council is working closely with Essential Energy around the extraction of the electrical wiring which is currently in the awnings.

The final plan is due in September and funding for the electrical component will be in addition to council's \$2.7m budget. At this stage she said it is unlikely that the wiring will go underground as was

originally planned, due to the fuel tank contamination.

The contamination issue also means that the current footpaths will remain in place, and will instead be resurfaced rather than replaced.

Business owners in the main street will receive an allocation of paint and street beautification works including street furniture, community art and landscaping remain part of the plans.

Ongoing soil monitoring will still be required to continue for a period of time between Nincoola and MacKenzie Street, with work on this block being postponed until the 2020/21 financial year. This will be the third and final stage of the project.

Work on the Mother of Ducks Lagoon is also set to begin in September, with completion expected before Christmas. This will involve semi formalising the free camping area, associated roadworks and drainage, updated signage, new shelters, tables and BBQ's and replacement or refurbishment of the toilet block.

Guyra's Tony and Liz Looker completed the trek and would like to thank everyone who helped along the way. They raised \$12,494 through a lamb drive, raffles, auctions and individual donations.

Mayor's Message

If there's a positive to take from the ongoing drought and water crisis faced by our region, it could be the boost in public interest in Council facilities and operations.

A number of our facilities threw open their doors to the public last week, for guided tours to celebrate local government and its role in the community, and an encouraging number of residents seized the opportunity.

Around 150 people participated in at least one of the 17 tours on offer throughout the week, including visits to the Armidale Water Treatment Plant and the Malpas Dam to Guyra Pipeline.

Residents could also join a walk-through of the upcoming Guyra Main Street Upgrade, tour the Armidale Waste Water Treatment Plant and inspect the new regional landfill to witness the rigorous controls and features required for a modern waste facility.

Our total number of participants over the five days more than doubled attendances for tours held in previous years as part of Local Government Week.

The high level of interest shown by tour participants and the positive feedback were also extremely encouraging.

Our facilities and services are provided by skilled and dedicated staff and our tour guide showed off their workplaces with great pride and enthusiasm.

Council highly values close community involvement in the conversations and decision making that affects them. That engagement is most effective when community members are well informed and familiar with Council's roles and services.

These tours are an excellent chance for residents to get a first-hand appreciation of service that they often take for granted as part of their daily lives, but seldom witness behind the scenes.

Thank you to everyone who took the time to come along ... and to the Council tour guides who shared their knowledge and answered many questions.

We have received a considerable number of requests to hold further tours. While 12 months will pass before we know it, and Local Government Week will be here again, we will also look at future tours

for specific events on the calendar, such as National Recycling Week and National Water Week.

Our waste facilities at Armidale and Guyra were also focuses of activity last weekend when they provided free mulch to assist households during the ongoing drought. A total of 271 vehicles attended the Armidale Waste Management Facility and more than 540 square metres of free mulch was collected, to help conserve water and give gardens some reprieve during the extended dry spell.

Similarly, 45 vehicles took away 90 square metres of mulch from the Guyra Recycling & Transfer Station.

A number of residents also took the chance to swap their showerheads for water saving alternatives. Visit our website for more information about water savings and the water restrictions in place.

Inspiring ideas shine

The Northern Tablelands Local Land Services Schools Property Planning Competition gives high school agriculture students firsthand experience in investigating the real-life challenges faced by local farmers.

The Competition recognises students for their understanding of core issues like sustainable agricultural production, biosecurity and natural resource management. This year's winners were announced today at an awards presentation at AgQuip by Local Land Services Chair, Richard Bull.

This year, students were particularly tested by the drought conditions, providing a perfect example of the need to develop innovative solutions when facing complex challenges.

Johnelle Stevens, Farm Planner and Regional Agriculture Landcare Facilitator, Northern Tablelands Local Land Services, co-ordinated this year's competition and experienced the immediate benefits students gain through the practical application of their classroom-based knowledge to the paddock.

"The students are learning how to deal with tangible challenges that they may experience when managing sustainable enterprises in the future. This fosters the growth of practical, real-world skills and encourages the students to look at the entire farming system as a whole," said Johnelle.

"What's really valuable about the competition is that it gets students out of the classroom and offers them a unique opportunity to build on their understanding of land management issues, translating scientific theory into onfarm decisions," she said.

"The innovative ideas presented by the students included everything from advanced fodder storage, to technical solutions employing drones. Some of the concepts are ground-breaking and are truly inspirational," said Johnelle.

This year, students were set the challenge of developing a management plan for the property 'Bald Blair' located at Guyra. Owners Sam and Kirsty White were delighted to host a field day and support the initiative that involved students drawing up management plans to make their enterprise both economically and environmentally sustainable.

"We recognise the importance of providing opportunities for the next generation who will be shaping the agricultural sector in the future. It is terrific to see they have unfettered thoughts and are not constrained by anything in terms of potential ideas," noted Sam

"We were encouraged to see the amount of thought that the students put into their management plans. They came up with some fantastic ideas, some of which are novel, some of which are very useful, and we intend to utilise some of them in our business" he said.

The winners of the competition were selected from entries submitted by more than 230 agriculture students who attended the field day at Bald Blair.

Malpas pipeline in testing phase

Construction work on the Dam to Guyra Malpas pipeline is almost complete, with testing now being conducted. Early tests have uncovered a few teething problems which Armidale Regional Council Mayor Simon Murray said was to be expected.

"There is air getting into the system and we are trying to work out where it is getting in," Cr Murray said.

"There is also still some electrical work to be completed with the mains supply to both the pumping station and the carbon activated filters at the depot still not connected."

Generators are being used during the testing phase and a switch on date is still uncertain.

"We are pumping water on and off while we find out just

where the air's getting in," he said.

"The tankers are still running every day and will continue until everything is finalised and the mains power is installed."

Cr Murray also praised the Guyra community for their efforts to cut back on water usage.

"Guyra has responded really well and water use is down around 35%, compared to Armidale where we are having more trouble getting the message through," he said. "They have only cut back by around 10% so we have more work to do there."

When the pipeline switched on he expects water restrictions in Guyra to revert to level 4, however this will only be temporary if substantial rain is not received.

Scammers pretending to be from the NBN are back at it!

Australians are losing more money to NBN scams, with reported losses in 2019 already higher than the total of last year's losses.

Scammers are increasingly using trusted brands like 'NBN' to trick unsuspecting consumers into parting with their money or personal information.

Common types of NBN scams include:

* Someone pretending to be from NBN Co or an internet provider calls a victim and claims there is a problem with their phone or internet connection, which requires remote access to fix. The scammer can then install malware or steal valuable personal information, including banking details.

* Scammers pretending to be the NBN attempting to

sell NBN services, often at a discount, or equipment to you over the phone.

* Scammers may also call people to sign them up to the NBN, get them a better deal or test the speed of their connection. They may ask people to provide personal details such as their name, address, date of birth, and Medicare number or ask for payment through gift cards.

* Scammers calling you during a blackout offering you the ability to stay connected during a blackout for an extra fee.

It is important to remember NBN Co is a wholesaleonly company and does not sell services directly to consumers. If you get a call like the ones above, just hang

Guyra Sheep & lamb Sale

August 7th – There was a yarding of 2430 lambs and 2685 sheep at the Guyra sale. Well finished heavy weight lambs were well supplied, however there were none of the extra heavy weights this fortnight.

There were some very well finished medium and heavy weight Merino lambs, having been supplementary fed. Those lambs without access to crop or

supplementary feed were plainer in condition. The usual buyers participated, however there was little in the way of restocker competition.

Market trends through the lambs were generally cheaper. The quality of the Merino lambs, along with weight increases contributed to higher prices in those classes. The light and medium weight crossbred and Dorper lambs saw

the market trend firm to slightly cheaper. Well finished lambs estimated to weigh 20-26kg cwt experienced the greater of the price declines. Heavy weights sold to a cheaper trend.

The quality and condition of the sheep offering showed a vast difference. Skin values also saw a great range. Demand from processors was strong with all but the plainest condition light weight sheep. Market trends were firm to dearer through the weight ranges for sheep to processors, while weight increases contributed to some significant price improvement in the heavy weights. The plainest condition shorn sheep struggled to attract any interest. Skin values are supplied by industry and may not reflect wool values should the longer skins be harvested.

Armidale Cattle Sale

August 8th - With no sign of a break in the season, the numbers almost doubled for this sale. All categories were represented in a fair to good quality penning. There were limited supplies of well finished cattle. A feature however was a line of well finished heavy grown steers, not often seen here at this time of year. The usual buyers were in attendance.

Market trends varied through the young cattle, with both breed and quality contributing to some large price differences within some classes. Restocker vealers steers saw a firm to slightly dearer market trend than a fortnight ago. Conversely, the heifer portion were up to 9c/kg cheaper. Light weight yearling steers to restockers and feeders sold to a mostly cheaper trend, however improved quality lots experienced an increase in price. The quality of the

medium weight feeder steers improved, resulting in some strong sales. The plainer quality steers were slightly cheaper. Trends were also cheaper through the yearling heifers to restockers and feeders, with strong reductions for plain quality and least preferred breeds.

There was no market comparison for the well finished heavy grown steers, however they attracted strong competition from processors. Well finished grown heifers sold to a dearer trend, as processors struggled to secure sufficient well finished cattle. Market trends through the cows were cheaper, with the plainer condition lots most affected. Well finished heavy weights sold up to 6c/kg cheaper. There were large numbers of bulls, with heavy weights selling to a dearer trend.

Weekly Wool Sales

August 16th - Despite a large amount of wool withdrawn prior to sale plus a very large passed in rate and the cancellation of wool sales in South Africa the Australian wool market's retreat continued.

The Eastern market indicator recorded it largest single day loss in over a decade on the first day of sales and continued to slide on the final day albeit at a slower pace, resulting in almost a 10% fall for the week.

23,043 bales were sold nationally for the week with the passed in rate at 35.8% being it's highest in over 15 years. Major buyers included Tianyu,

PJ Morris and New England Wool. It was around this time last season that the Eastern market indicator peaked at its highest weekly close of 2116 cents, placing today's market at a 27% decline.

The last sharp decline in the market ran from June 2011 to September 2012 where the market lost 35%. It's interesting to note that even with the recent large falls the market remains ahead of that June 2011 peak (EMI chart attached).

One bright spot did emerge in the market this week for wool that was declared as Non Mulesed, with substantial premiums being paid.
