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Roadworks in full swing

The reconstruction of the Guyra main street has now begun, and is already causing a few headaches for local businesses who are feeling a sharp decline in trade.

Road crews moved in on Monday morning and began ripping up the road pavement in preparation for realignment and resurfacing of the road.

The Gazette spoke to a number of businesses who said that while they are hopeful that the final result will be an improvement, they were not fully prepared for the impact of the works.

Shane Beechey from Fourways Service Centre said that it has been absolute chaos with just one entry for customers.

"It is definitely going to have a big impact on us because it is hard for customers to get in and out and some will probably go somewhere else to fill up," he said.

"There is also a lot of dust being kicked from the roadworks which is causing a problem."

Kirks IGA are offering customers free home delivery while the work is being carried out. Manager Harry Kirk said that customers are finding it difficult to get in.

"We've already noticed a sharp decline, but we are offering some great deals to get people through the door," he said.

"We'll do free home deliveries if customers want to ring through their orders over \$10," he said.

"There is also parking behind the shop and for customers who do come in we can arrange for pick up at the back gate as well."

Guyra Pharmacist Vu Nguyen also wanted customers to know that they offer home delivery, and if they are finding it difficult to get into the pharmacy they just have to ring up and delivery will be arranged.

"This is a service we already offer but now is a good time to make sure people know they can just pick up the phone to get their medications," Vu said.

Anne Thrift from CT Electrics said that while it is inconvenient it is just something that they have to put up with.

"The work can't happen without some inconvenience so we will just go with the flow," she said.

"In the end I think it will be worth it and there are ways around the problems. We are able to get in and out via the back of the shop and if customers need something they just have to ring up and we will deliver."

Other businesses have also been impacted with the Guyra Bakery reporting trading was well down on Monday, and the Royal Hotel also reported slow trade. Hotel patrons will be able to access the premises from the rear from Thursday of this week. Rear access is also available for customers of the Guyra Café.

While it may be slightly inconvenient, the work is expected to be complete by the end of September.

"I will miss very much all my friends who called in nearly every day for a chat they kept me going when times became very hard and we solved the problems of the world - you all know who you are."

Riding for Camp Quality

Two charity bike rides passed through Guyra last Tuesday September 10th, both raising money to support kids with cancer.

The Ride for Sick Kids had a brief stopover in Guyra en route from Inverell to Armidale on the first day of a five-day ride raising money for Ronald McDonald House in Tamworth and Newcastle.

The second ride was 1000k's4kids, raising money for Camp Quality. Fifty-eight riders plus support crew took part in the ride which started in Helensvale, QLD on September 6th and finished at Rutherford NSW on September 15th. As well as raising funds the riders are raising awareness of the impact for children who are diagnosed with cancer.

Rebecca Collins from Camp Quality Newcastle said that this is not the first time the ride has passed through Guyra but it is the first time they have stopped overnight. The ride was originally

planned to come to Guyra via Dorrigo, but had to be diverted due to the bushfires and instead saw the riders come from Glen Innes in blustery conditions.

"It was pretty tough going with a strong head wind most of the way so the riders were definitely feeling it by the time we got into Guyra," Rebecca said. "They were all pretty glad to pull in to the car park at the Guyra Hotel and definitely needed a drink and massage."

"The riders were all in good spirits and it is just part of what they signed up for to help raise awareness and to give kids who have been impacted by cancer the chance to be kids again. Each rider has to do their own fundraising and training in preparation for the event which has raised around \$350,000 so far. Camp Quality supports kids and their families who have been impacted by cancer offering a lot of different programs.

"Kids can go away for a day or two or five days depending on their age and it lets them step out and be just a normal kid and have fun," Rebecca said.

"We also do family campsand deliver education programs in schools to help with understanding what cancer is all about."

The riders were in town from around mid-afternoon on Tuesday and departed the following morning, with 82 riders and support crew spread out around town. They enjoyed a BBQ dinner and Karaoke at the Guyra Hotel which was the centre for their stay. While they were not actively fundraising while here, Rebecca said that they had some generous donations from locals which were greatly appreciated.

Driest winter on record for Guyra

August 2019 was the driest since 1995 with a total of only 10.6 mm. So far this year Guyra has experienced its hottest January on record, the driest February in 96 years (8.6mm) and the driest April in 22 years (3.6mm).

During July we experienced our warmest daytime temperatures in 26 years and it was also the driest in 17 years (7.6mm). The April to July period (37.4mm) the driest consecutive four-month period on

record from 128 years of complete rainfall records.

Adding to the already gloomy statistics Guyra has just experienced its driest winter in 131 years. The total of 33.8 mm was the lowest June-July-August rainfall since 1888 (24.9 mm).

Road reconstruction a major step

The reconstruction of the Guyra main street which began on Monday, is a major step toward the upgrade the town's central business district.

The roadworks are designed to improve the road's profile – reducing the slope from the centre to the road edges, and its alignment with the footpaths, as well as upgrading the road surface.

Armidale Regional Council Mayor Simon Murray said this will significantly improve safety for motorists and pedestrians, while enhancing the appearance and feel of the CBD. The \$700,000 roadworks will restructure the section of Bradley Street between Nincoola Street and Ollera Street and contractors BMR are scheduled to complete the works by Friday September 27th.

"We've received EPA confirmation that soil contamination issues have been properly dealt with and we're moving to get the roadworks done before the October school holidays, to minimise the inconvenience to businesses and shoppers," Councillor Murray said.

"To further assist traders, the works will be done in stages to minimise the length of time each section of road is closed to traffic."

Council officers have been liaising with main street businesses this week to discuss the

works and plan arrangements to prevent disruptions.

Water for the roadworks will be sourced from one of Council's bores, rather than using the town water supply during the ongoing water restrictions.

The start of roadworks marks the start of Stage 2 for the Guvra main street upgrade.

The \$600,000 first stage included main street upgrade designs, identifying and remediating disused fuel tanks beneath the road and footpaths, dealing with soil contamination caused by the fuel tanks, inspecting infrastructure beneath

the road and assessing the structural integrity of shop awnings.

As part of Stage2, Council is liaising with property owners to address any structural and safety issues with the awnings. In additional, Essential Energy will this month begin planning and designs for electricity infrastructure along Bradley Street, to remove powerlines from the shop awnings.

"Once the road restructure and resurfacing is complete, we can then proceed with new traffic furniture and street scaping," Cr Murray said. "Public safety is a major emphasis of the main street upgrade, from improving the road profile and surface to getting powerlines away from the awnings and dealing with the long-standing issue of fuel-contaminated soil.

"Restructuring and resurfacing Bradley Street between Nincoola Street and Mackenzie Street is scheduled to be undertaken as Stage 3 in the 2020/21 financial year," he said.

"Most of the disused fuel tanks were located in this section and there is still further remediation required for this site."

Market Report Weekly Wool Sales

September 13th - Somewhat of a bounce back was expected for the wool market this week after last week's solid close but the magnitude of the bounce certainly was not foreseen.

Records tumbled as all regions recorded their largest daily gain on the first day of sales since AWEX commenced reporting the market.

The Eastern Market Indicator rising 170 cents for the week was also a record weekly gain. The

EMI had lost 389 cents in the previous five weeks since returning from the recess creating one of the most volatile periods we have seen.

Sydney was only a one day sale this week and with both the Melbourne and Fremantle markets dearer on the final day of sales it would be reasonable to expect a strong opening in the Northern region next week.

Whilst all individual micron indicators were dearer throughout

the week the largest rises occurred in the mid micron Merino types with the 20 micron indicator in Melbourne recording a staggering 300 plus cent jump. 20,488 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 6.2%.

Major buyers included Fox & Lillie, Techwool and PJ Morris. Estimated weekly offerings remain below the corresponding period last season for the next three weeks.

As many of you may be aware, the Bees Nest bushfire near Ebor ignited more than a week ago and has burnt through 90,000 hectares of bushland. Emergency services have been working to control the fire and much of the blaze in now under control. However, challenging weather conditions and inaccessible terrain mean the fire could continue to burn for weeks.



Residents affected by the fire are encouraged to apply for a disaster recovery allowance now available from the Department of Human Services and farmers can access fodder support from Local Land Services. For more information or to claim the allowance, call 180 22 66 or visit humanservices.gov.au/disaster.

Emergency hay for fire affected farmers

The provision of stock fodder and water to landholders devastated by the Bees Nest fire near Ebor will continue this week. More than 700 large bales of hay have already been distributed following the devastating fire had burnt out more than 92,000 hectares of private and public land and is one of the largest the region has seen.

NSW Rural Fire Service Building Impact Assessment teams have confirmed that seven homes were destroyed at the Bees Nest fire.

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall said that the fire has been absolutely devastating for Ebor's farmers who were already struggling to feed stock due to the drought.

"The Northern Tablelands Local Land Service (LLS) was quick on the scene and has provided 705 large bales of hay to fire stricken farmers so far, as well as multiple truckloads of water for stock," Mr Marshall said.

"What we know is currently 133 individual landholders have been directly impacted by the blaze and I expect that number to rise in coming days as people regain access to properties on the fire ground which were previously inaccessible.

"The LLS has confirmed it will remain stationed at the Ebor Recreation Reserve and continue to provide fodder to landholders throughout this week and I urge farmers who need help feeding livestock to call in and make themselves known."

The true financial loss from the Bees Nest fire won't be known for some weeks and assessors are currently on the ground undertaking the heartbreaking job of tallying livestock losses. So far 133 animals, mainly cattle, are confirmed deceased with the LLS working with farmers to locate other missing animals and support them with the decision to sell or continue to feed.

Farmers seeking assistance can contact the Agriculture and Animal Services Hotline on 1800 814 647 to register their request.

Producers are also encouraged to call the hotline to report damage and stock losses, as well as request assistance. Available help includes:

Deer Information Evening to explain changes

Major legislation changes by the NSW Government to remove the semi-protected status of deer will be the topic of discussion at GLENRAC's Deer Information Evening later this month.

Under changes to the Game and Federal Animal Control Act 2002, landholders will experience an ease in game restrictions to assist them in managing the surging populations of feral deer that are damaging properties across NSW.

Minister for Agriculture, Adam Marshall praised the changes, saying that removing game status will give landholders more flexibility to manage deer and will bring its classification into line with other feral animals such as wild dogs, foxes, rabbits and pigs.

A number of leading industry professionals will be on hand during the information evening to assist landholders in understanding what the changes are, and how these can be implemented effectively.

Professional Pest Controller, Ned Makim, will be discussing the simplest ways for farmers to manage deer populations, including what to look for in deer behaviour and quick and effective strategies to reduce deer numbers.

"What I hope to help landholders with is some simple strategies that they can immediately put into place to effectively reduce the impact of deer on drought affected land," said Mr Makim.

NSW DPI Compliance Officer, Andrew McCallister, will be discussing Biosecurity legislation as well as the changes to the licensing required for wild deer management and what this means for farmers.

The evening will also include a presentation by NSW Police Rural Crime Investigator, Sergeant Gavin Berry, who will discuss the rates of rural crime in the region. Representatives from Local Land Services and trail camera resellers, Get Trapped, will be available to speak with atten-

dees on the night.

This event is supported by The NSW Department of Industries and Landcare NSW Program: Managing Established Pest Animals and Weeds and the NSW Police Force.
