The VRA are providing this free service for rural residents who may have no other option. Water for the machines will come from a well

which has recently been cleaned out by VRA members.

If you want to make use of this service, please phone Anne Thrift on 6779 1273 to book a spot. You will need to supply your own washing powder and the VRA will supply tea, coffee and scones while you wait.

Police target drink driving

"Drink driving – you will get caught" was the message delivered by police across the New England Police District over the weekend.

New England Police District Crime Manager, Detective Inspector Ann Joy said that drink and drug driving is a menace on our roads.

"Drink driving is the cause of a range of consequences including loss of licence, unemployment, huge fines and at worst injury and death to the driver, their passenger or innocent motorists," Detective Inspector Joy said. "There is no legitimate or acceptable reason for residents to drink and drive and absolutely no reason to be unaware of the consequences,"

Three drivers were charged with offences over the past weekend including a 49 year old driver who recorded a blood alcohol reading above the legal limit after his vehicle was stopped in Kentucky Street, Armidale. His licence was immediately suspended and he has been

charged with Drive with middle range PCA. A 24 year old male was charged with Drive with low range PCA and had his licence immediately suspended after being stopped in Froude St Inverell and a 21 year old male driver has been charged with Drive with middle range PCA after emergency services were called to a crash on Meredith Road Armidale.

A 33 year old male is expected to be charged after the vehicle he was driving was involved in a crash in Malpas Street Guyra in the early hours of Sunday morning. The male was conveyed to Armidale Hospital for treatment to his injuries.

Police are also investigating the circumstances surrounding a crash on Richardson Avenue Armidale where a single vehicle collided with a tree. The occupant/s of the vehicle fled the scene prior to police arrival.

During operations over the weekend more than eighty motorists were spoken to by police.

Guyra Sheep & lamb Sale

September 18th - There was an increased penning of 3660 sheep and 2470 lambs as seasonal conditions worsen. There were very few well finished crossbred lambs, while plain condition light weight Merino lambs were well supplied. A highlight was a run of very well

finished supplementary fed Merino lambs. The usual buyers were in attendance and there were a few restockers participating. Market trends through the few well finished crossbred lambs were cheaper, upwards of \$10/head. The couple of pens of new season lambs saw greater

declines. Light weight Merino lambs to restockers sold to cheaper trends, with the plainest lines attracting small interest. The well finished Merino lambs also sold to a cheaper trend. Plain condition light weight Merino sheep made up the bulk of the sheep offering.

The majority of those sheep had been recently shorn. There were very few sheep suitable to processors. There were a couple of confident restockers operating. Market trends were cheaper throughout, with the plain sheep market underpinned by those restocker orders

Armidale Cattle Sale

September 19th - There was a small decrease in numbers this week. Yearlings and cows made up the bulk of the offering. There was a fair supply of young calves, taken off cows due to the seasonal conditions. The quality of the offering showed great variation, as did the condition.

Despite the poor season there were some well finished cattle presented. There was increased buyer competition, both from restockers and processors. The better calves attracted strong competition when sold on a live weight basis.

The very light weight calves sold on a \$/head basis, made as little as \$16/head. Vealers to restockers saw a market trend that was firm on the previous sale. Light weight yearling steers to restockers sold to cheaper trends with most falling into the plain quality and condition category.

The limited supply of medium weights remained firm. Light weight yearling

heifers to restockers also sold to cheaper trends, despite the extra competition. Again, both quality and condition was generally plain. The few well finished medium and heavy weight heifers attracted strong processor demand.

There were insufficient grown steers or well finished grown heifers to quote. Plain quality and condition grown heifers attracted restocker interest. Breed and quality accounted for a large variation in price, with the younger and larger framed heifers attracting strong premiums over the smaller and older lots.

There was a good supply of light and medium weight cows at the lower end of condition scores. The plainest cows remained firm. Some of the better 2 score cows sold on a firm to dearer trend. Well finished cows remained firm. A very strong bull market saw heavy weights sell to a dearer trend with increased processor competition.

Weekly Wool Sales

September 20th - There was a sense of nervousness on the showfloor early this week after the record rise in the market last week. Would the size of that rise be too much and too quick to sustain? Would the Chinese enquiry filtering back into the market over the last 2 week's continue? Thankfully it did and the result was one that all participants had wanted to see. Last week's rise was sustained and was backed up by some new enquiry from Chinese mills. There was gains across all microns and types this week. It would be great to see the extremes in the market since the July recess be replaced with some stability and a steady rise in the market going forward. The concerns that drove the market down around tariffs, trade and the state of the Chinese and world economies still remain. The steady rise in enquiry over the last few weeks however is encouraging. As yet we have not seen much of the Passed in or Withdrawn wool from previous weeks filtering back into the market.

There continues to be very strong and growing demand for Non-Mulesed wool. Even during the considerable falls in the market over the last few months, lots declared as NM have consistently received prices considerably higher than the rest of the market. I encourage all growers to complete the NWD, but particularly those that have mobs of sheep that are non-mulesed.

1969 - A victory to remember

On September 28th it will be 50 years since the Guyra Rugby League team won the 1969 Group 5 grand-final against Warialda. It is a victory that remains in the minds of those who witnessed it as one of Guyra's greatest sporting moments.

It was the first time that Guyra had won an A Grade Group 5 premiership and it was also the first time that the grand final was played in the town. An estimated crowd of 4500 attended the game and the following week the Guyra Guardian dedicated both its front and back pages to the victory. Under the headline 'THEY WERE MUCH TOO GOOD' the report opened with the following words.

'Guyra had a magnificent triumph on Sunday in taking out the Group Five Major Premiership. Never in memory has a grand-final been won in such convincing manner."

The captain of that team Barry Wood says that he can remember the game like it was yesterday.

"Not only can I remember the grand final game from 1969, I can also remember the last game of the season on our ground when we had to beat Moree to become minor premiers," Barry said. "If we lost and Warialda won we would have finished second.

"There was a big crowd longing for us to win and with only about 10 minutes to go someone shouted 'Woods'y, Warialda lost' and even though we were lead-

ing 10 nil at the time it was a relief."

The following week, again in front of a big crowd, Guyra played Warialda at home to see which team would make it through to the grand final and to the delight of players and fans it was Guyra who made it through. Warialda beat Glen Innes in the final the following week setting up a decider between Guyra and Warialda.

"We knew it was Warialda's highly respected player coach Jim Payne's last game and his team would love to see him finish his playing days with another grand final victory," Barry said. "On the day of the grand final, it was very hot which favoured our opponents, but on a day that will always remain with everyone who played that day, we got the win."

"I cannot remember how many people watched the game, but as they say it was packed out," he said. "The fans were fantastic and the atmosphere that evening in both public houses and the Bowling Club was a night to remember for everyone involved." "I would like to add that I have great respect for the players and committee who gave me so much support, The players never complained about anything, be it training on very cold evenings or training three nights a week when I thought it necessary."

For the record Guyra won 20 to 7 with Gary Dowdell scoring three tries, and Barry Woods one try. Ron Starr kicked three goals and one field goal and was named the most outstanding player on the day.

Looking back - player's perspective on the season

No matter what the standard of football, the thrill of being in a winning Grand Final Team is something very special.

1969 was no exception. Right from the very first game of the season the anticipation of supporters created an excitement that was infectious, and as the season progressed with a winning team, more and more supporters came on board.

The players then felt a responsibility to perform well. Reg

Campbell's regular column in the "Guyra Guardian" was also another motivator.

The team of 69's success was due to both coincidence and timing. Our team was supported by an extremely strong and respected committee led by president Phil Starr and secretary George McCanna.

The team included a group of five or six older players who had played in losing teams with Guyra for a few years, another five or six outstanding young players who had come straight out of juniors into A Grade, and in the middle of all this were four paid players from the UK who had the ability and enthusiasm to blend us all together and create a winning team.

Barry Wood our English Coach was absolutely fanatical on physical training and we reached a level of fitness we had never experienced before. The UK connection spent hours on bar stools

over a few beers working out each player's individual talents to create a team that worked together, as well as following other newspaper reports on opposition teams.

As we look back on that great year we acknowledge all of the supporters and especially the committee that gave us the opportunities to play and memories to sayour.
