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Charity in action

The Freemasons and Lions have combined to provide much needed equipment for residents at Guyra's Aged Care Facility. Last week they handed over a cheque for \$4750 for an adjustable podiatrist chair which will allow easier treatment for residents.

The need for the chair was identified last year, when Jim Martin from Masonic Lodge Guyra No 325, was visiting a resident. He spoke with podiatrist, Susie Croaker who advised that while the newly constructed facility was excellent, it was difficult for her to attend resident's needs because of the lack of a suitable podiatrist chair. Investigations showed that a suitable chair, together with a chair for an operating podiatrist, would cost \$4,750.

Jim brought the matter before a regular meeting of the Lodge which agreed to make it a charitable project of the Lodge. They already had available \$1,000 as its share of funds raised by the Association of Freemasons of Armidale and District Incorporated, of which it is a member, and decided to approach the Grand Charity of the United Grand Lodge of New South Wales and the Australian Capital Territory, Masonicare, for further assistance.

Masonicare advised that if the Lodge could furnish \$2,375, being half of the funds needed, it would be able to provide the other half on a dollar for dollar basis once the project was approved.

Discussions were held with Geoff Reeves and Jim Betts of the Guyra Lions Club. who agreed to provide \$2,375. An application was then made to Masonicare

with the result that it has been approved and a cheque for \$4,750 was presented to Facility Manager Melissa Scott last week by the Worshipful Master of Lodge Guyra No. 325, Right Wor. Bill Hodder.

Due to the generosity of the Guyra Lions Club and Masonicare, Kolora will now be able to purchase the adjustable podiatry chair and an operator's chair. The \$1,000 already held by the Lodge will also be presented to Kolora as an additional grant which can be used to purchase any additional essential equipment that may

be needed.

OBITUARY Gilbert White 1925 ~2019

The longest serving President of Guyra Shire Council, Donald Richard Gilbert White passed away on October 7th, 2019 aged 93. Mr White was a councillor for 27 years and served as Shire President for 25 of those years.

Better known as Gilbert, he was born in December 1925 in Guyra, and married Mabel Elizabeth Vincent in 1948.

As a young man, Gilbert worked on his father's properties "Box Point" and "Highlands" and in 1948, he bought the property "Brentwood" and more adjoining country, selling out in 1952. Gilbert purchased "Sunnyside" at Black Mountain in 1953, later purchasing "Rose Valley" and "Nordern" and he successfully bred cattle and sheep.

In 1960, Gilbert was elected to the Guyra Shire Council, becoming President in 1962 and served in that capacity until 1987. He was

elected Delegate to North West Electricity Council in Inverell in 1968 and elected Chairman from 1973 to 1987, Gilbert was a Government appointee to Armidale College of Advanced Education (ACAE) from 1973 to 1989 and on retirement in 1989 was admitted as an Associate of the ACAE. Gilbert was awarded the Queen's medal in 1977, the Order of Australia Medal in 1980, was made an honorary Rotarian and received the Quota International Award for Service to the Shire in 1983 and Citizen of the Year in 1984.

When he retired in 1987, Gilbert received Certificates from the Local Government Electricity Association for 19 years service and from the Shires Association for 27 years service.

Gilbert passed away in Armidale on October 7th, 2019 and was privately cremated as per his wishes.

Visit looks at heritage rail proposal

Shadow Minister for Regional Transport, David Harris MP, spent time in the region last week meeting with advocates of Heritage rail.

Mr Harris was invited by Councillor Debra O'Brien to meet with advocate groups, including New England Train Action Group, Save the Great Northern Rail, Armidale Regional Rate Payers Association and Councillor Margaret O'Connor to discuss their investigations into the possibility of reopening the Great Northern Rail line for a heritage train project.

Mr Harris said that he is aware that there are several proposals in regards the future of the Great Northern Rail line and he was in the area at the invitation of a Heritage Rail bid. He also met with local Aboriginal groups about heritage and tourism opportunities.

"NSW Labor is interested in consulting local communities about the future of disused rail lines and how those lines might be used to promote economic activity in challenging drought conditions," Mr Harris said.

"Regional jobs are vital in keeping communities viable and tourism is one avenue that needs to be explored," he said. "These corridors can provide vital economic stimulus to Regional Communities through tourism and governments must properly consider all potential uses."

"As the Opposition spokesperson on Regional Transport it is important that I visit and listen to local communities in regards to

the future use of rail corridors."

Labor Councillor for Armidale, Debra O'Brien said a proposal by the New England Train Action Group links Armidale and Guyra with a heritage train bringing together the existing heritage tourism of the region.

Central to the concept is a bicycle carrying compartment to enable recreational and commuter cycling on the existing extensive network of cycle paths in Armidale and Guyra.

"A heritage train service, operating on a regular timetable, would also provide a commuter service for passengers wishing to travel between the two centres for work, shopping, services and recreation," Ms Obrien said. "There is a pressing need for public transport to connect Armidale with Guyra's two (soon three) greenhouse tomato farms."

Drought breaking Show planned for 2020

Water dispensing station opens

With the Malpas Dam pipeline now fully operational there is some good news for rural residents who are on a waiting list for water deliveries. An automated water station at the Mother of Ducks Lagoon is now operational, enabling residents not connected to the town water supplies to purchase water for \$3.90 per kilolitre.

"We know there are a significant number of rural households that have run out of tank water and other onsite supplies and needed an emergency supply for use around the home until they could get a water delivery," Armidale Regional Council Mayor Simon Murray said.

"Many rural households are running out of water for drinking and washing, despite their best efforts to conserve water, and the stations will enable them to tap into the town supplies.

"However, we urge people to limit their use of this water to essential domestic purposes only, as we need everyone to minimise their consumption at every opportunity."

The dispensing station, and one operating at the Arboretum in Armidale, are among Council's initiatives to make the region more drought resilient, using funds through the Federal Government's Drought Communities Program.

Each station has a 25mm threaded connection for normal garden hoses, while the Arboretum station has a 50mm male Cam Lock fitting for bulk collections and the Guyra unit has an 80mm male Cam Lock fitting. Users need to bring their own fittings and hose.

Purchases must be made by credit or debit card. The stations do not hold cash.

Home grown radio program

Armidale Community Radio (2ARM) FM 92.1 is a not for profit organisation, broadcasting throughout Armidale, Uralla, Guyra, Walcha, Hillgrove and surrounding areas. There are currently around 20 volunteers who present a range of programming with the focus on local content, news and events.

The newest presenters to join the team are mother/son duo Sharon and Adam Ritchie who are well known in Guyra through their association with Guyra's Church of Freedom. Their 'Home Grown' offering is now being broadcast on Sundays from 4pm to 5pm.

Co-Manager for 2ARM Michael Kean said that they are always on the lookout for new presenters, and offer free training for anyone who wants to join the team.

"We have fair reception in Guyra, covering a radius of around 70km from Armidale," he said.

"We are always open to ideas from anyone who wants to have a go at presenting a program and will provide support and training.

"Community radio offers a local presence with interviews and news from the community and you will find local

content from 9am through to 9pm," he said. "Everyone works in a volunteer capacity and brings their own ideas and experience with them."

As well as managing the station, Michael is also a presenter who fronts a weekly 'Life with Mike' segment from 6pm to 8pm each Thursday.

"Life with Mike mostly music and little bit of talk, I try to mix it up a bit and it seems to work," he said. "Once a month local musician Sean Plunkett joins me in the studio for something a bit different."

Community Radio is not allowed to "advertise" by law but are able to offer Community Announcements and Sponsorship messages for local companies and organisa-

tions as a means of raising much needed funds.

Proposed changes to Armidale radio frequencies

Listeners to Armidale based radio station 2AD could soon be enjoying clearer and better quality audio under a proposed move from the Australian Communications and Media Authority (ACMA). The proposal will see the station moved from its current AM radio frequency to a new FM transmission.

Deputy Chair of the ACMA Creina Chapman said the proposal was part of a nationwide project converting commercial radio stations in regional areas from AM to FM.

"There are a lot of benefits to FM radio, the sound quality is better than AM and it can be more cost effective for the station operators," Ms Chapman said.

"We have recently transitioned stations in a number of regional areas including places like Bathurst, Warnambool and Port Hedland which has resulted in better broadcasting environments."

Ms Chapman said AM and FM radio signals have differ-

ent characteristics, resulting in coverage differences.

"AM signals are spread by 'ground waves', which are more susceptible to interference from power lines, electric lighting and electric motors," she said.

"FM signals spread via a transmitter on a high location such as a hill, mountain, building or tower and are less susceptible to electrical interference."

The ACMA has released a consultation paper on the proposal and is currently

seeking feedback from the local community before going ahead.

"We want to hear from the people to get their views on the conversion proposal," Ms Chapman said.

If the proposal goes ahead, 2AD listeners will need to retune their radios to 94.3FM.

Submissions on the Armidale proposal are due by Friday 8 November, 2019. If the ACMA approves the conversion, the timing of the transition would be up to the broadcaster.

Free testing a boost in tough times

In a move to further assist producers across the region grappling with the drought, Northern Tablelands Local Land Services is offering free feed and water testing. Max Newsome, Livestock Officer, Northern Tablelands LLS, is encouraging landholders to take advantage of this free service.

Testing provides a clear indication of the digestibility and roughage content, as well as protein and energy levels, all of which have a significant impact on production. Once feed is tested, Northern Tablelands LLS Livestock Officers are able to assist in interpreting results and running calculations on what to feed and in what quantities.

"Always ask for a feed test when you are looking at and purchasing these commodities," Max said. "I understand that it is not always the case that these results are available and decisions about purchasing need to be made without them. So once you get the feed source on property take a sample and send it off."

"From the results of the testing, producers are in a much better position to make informed decisions around quantity and costs. This is imperative in guiding decisions regarding whether to retain or whether to sell stock," said Max.

"There are a number of existing programs on the market, such as the Drought Feed Calculator, which provide averages regarding quality," he said. "With the wide variations we are currently experiencing, it is more accurate to

enter the figures determined through a feed test. This provides a much more precise picture as to the exact makeup of the feed and helps in making decisions going forward."

The same service is also available for water testing. Feed and water samples should be delivered to a Local Land Services office. Sample bags and water testing kits are available at no charge and can be collected at the LLS offices.

Drilling underway in quest for water

Contractors have completed inspections at a number of test bore sites and have begun exploration drilling to find ground water sources to supplement the Armidale region's dwindling town water supplies.

Hydrogeology consultant Hydroilex shortlisted a total of 36 sites in the Guyra and Armidale areas that are likely to provide significant groundwater supplies with suitable water quality.

"If the test drilling identifies suitable ground water sources and we have a clear picture of locations for production bores, we will keep the community informed about those sites," Armidale Regional Council Mayor Simon Murray said.

"Each of the sites is located on public land, close to roads and power supplies, and the drilling and bore operations will be undertaken in a way that does not impact on adjacent landholders. However, Council will liaise with landholders near the production bores to outline the project and address any concerns.

"While Hydroilex's studies have identified sites with the right attributes for significant supplies of good-quality groundwater, we are still in the preliminary stages until we actually know if there is water in those locations," he said.

"For that reason, we have shortlisted 36 sites for exploration with the expectation that only a small proportion of them will be used to supply water."

The test drilling and subsequent production bores will be sunk several times deeper than existing nearby bores, to avoid tapping into on groundwater supplies already being utilised by adjacent landholders. While the existing bores are generally between 30 and 50 metres deep, the bores proposed by Council will be around 150 metres deep to access ground water supplies suitable to supplement the reexisting gion's water storages.

If the test drilling finds other ground water supplies above the targeted water sources, water-tight sleeves will be fitted for the test drilling and production bores to ensure the shallower supply is not affected.

Contractor FB Drilling has been engaged to undertake the test drilling in Guyra and Armidale, while a second contractor, Mac Drilling, will conduct the exploratory drilling in the rural locations around Armidale and is expected to begin in late October

Level 5 water restrictions remain in place for town water users in Guyra and Armidale, with remaining dam supplies on course to run out in around 420 days without significant rainfall.

"We're optimistic groundwater supplies could push back that Day Zero but even if these bores deliver the quantities of water we're hoping for, they will still be relatively small compared to our dam supplies. Careful water conservation households and business is essential to extend our remaining supplies until we get substantial rain," Cr Murray said.

Weekly Wool Sales

October 11th -The volatility continued this week and whilst not as dramatic the market managed to finish on the positive side of the ledger. Gains were made on both selling days resulting in a 29 cent rise in the Northern Region Indicator. The largest gains were made in the 19-21 micron categories. The Merino Carding Indicator was the only sector that lost ground after being the only Indicator to gain ground last week. The small national offering at just over 28,000 bales had a far better clearance rate this week with just 7.6% passed in however almost 15% of the offering was withdrawn prior to sale. Major buyers included Techwool, PJ Morris and Fox & Lillie. In a positive sign for next week's larger sale (40,000 bales) the Western region market finished strongly, as did the handful of trades executed on the forward market with November 21 micron contracts trading slightly above this week's physical close. 92,000 fewer bales have been offered nationally comto corresponding period last season however predicted weekly offerings for the rest of this month are slightly higher than last season.
