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Ready to step into the spotlight

With her HSC behind her, Guyra Central School student Savannah Roberts this week joined other performers in a massed dance rehearsal for the 2019 Schools Spectacular.

Schools Spectacular has been hailed as the largest amateur variety act in the world and Savannah is one of this year's Featured Artists. Savannah is hoping to make a future in dance, having already received offers for full-time dance studies in Brisbane and Sydney next year.

The first 2019 Schools Spectacular rehearsal was held on Monday, with performers from across New England and North West now fully focussed on the countdown to show week.

Schools Spectacular brings together a galaxy of talent includes 40 Featured Performers, an incredible 100-piece symphony orchestra, stage band, 2,700-voice choir, 2,300 amazing dancers, the D'Arts Ensemble disability program, the Aboriginal Dance Company, puppets and an indispensable behind-the-scenes team.

For the first time in the show's 36-year history dozens of regional and rural schools took advantage of the opportunity to link in with more than a thousand performers who flocked to Qudos Bank Arena for the first massed dance rehearsal.

Together the online performers and the dancers on the arena stage went through the paces of the iconic finale widely recognised as the jewel in the crown of the Schools Spectacular.

Co-Executive Producer, Rosemary Davis was delighted by the how well the rehearsal came together.

"It was the best ever," Ms Davis said.

With the four Schools Spectacular shows locked in to Qudos Bank Arena at Sydney's Olympic Park on Friday, 22 (11am, 7.30pm) and Saturday, 23 (1pm, 7.30pm) November, the show-time adrenalin is starting to build.

"We found them very friendly and excited to meet us. Some were a little shy to start with but by the end of our visit beautiful connections had been made. They loved the outdoors, singing and dancing. All the children in the home were so grateful for what they had at St Christopher's," said Toby.

Together, the students and residents husked coconuts, swam in the Suva town pool learnt traditional Fijian dances and visited the New Zealand High Commissioner's house where they watched a dress re-

"It opened my eyes as to what other kids live like, and how little they have yet how happy they are," Samuel said.

"I came away realising how good it can be to not have so much technology in your life, and the satisfaction in serving your community – it was just a really great life experience."

New card system for water filling stations

A new verification and payment process is proposed for two water filling stations established to help rural households during the drought.

The altered system is designed to ensure the facilities are used responsibly and by the people they are intended to assist.

The decision to introduce the new system follows reported abuse of the system by people other than the rural residents they were implemented to assist. That included water carters who had been transporting the water outside the Armidale Region.

At last week's meeting of Armidale Regional Council, councillors endorsed the introduction of Water Access Cards (WACs) for the filling stations which are situated at the Armidale Arboretum in Armidale and McKie Parkway in Guyra.

The stations were estab-

lished in late September to provide emergency domestic supplies for Armidale region properties that are not connected to the town water supplies and have an approved and occupied house.

A report to the meeting said that the move to WACs was necessary to help regulate the amount of town water being removed at the filling stations. Despite action taken by Council to ensure more appropriate use of the service, it remained "vulnerable to abuse".

Under the proposed new system, the cards will be the only way to access water from the filling stations and will enable targeted residents to verify they meet the criteria. Once they complete an application form to register, the card will provide access to a monthly allocation.

The proposed fees, on public exhibition until November 22nd, include a \$100 one-off

access fee to obtain a card, and a pre-paid water charge fee of \$3.90 per kilolitre. The \$3.90 per kilolitre fee is already in place for people currently accessing the filling stations using credit card payments.

While the exhibition period is underway, and until the

proposed system is implemented, the operating hours for the filling stations will continue to be limited to 6am to 6pm Monday to Friday, to assist with monitoring to ensure the service is being used appropriately.

Q Fever vaccination program to run again

Guyra branch of NSW Farmers and the Guyra Medical Centre are joining forces for the second time to run a Q Fever vaccination program. The disease is a significant cause of illness and indeed death in the broader community however people working with animals are especially at risk.

Guyra is one of the hotspots in NSW for this illness with as much as 22 per cent of the population showing exposure to the disease.

The disease can present as an acute flu like condition that is quite debilitating in itself however some people contract a chronic form of it that can have a debilitating effect on the patient for months or even years.

The bacteria that causes the disease is found in most farm animals but is also present in cats, dogs and native animals such as kangaroos. The range of people at risk is growing with green keepers and gardeners having tested positive to the disease.

Farmers, shearers, vets, vet nurses, abattoir workers and anyone handling the clothing of these workers are at an extreme risk of

contracting Q fever.

The good news is that this disease can be prevented with a vaccination. The bad news is that each person has to be tested for possible exposure to the disease before you can be vaccinated. So it means a couple of visits to the surgery.

Students who work on farms in their holidays and over the age of 15 should be vaccinated.

The Guyra branch of NSW

farmers in conjunction with Dr Jeyakumar at the Guyra Medical Clinic are offering a vaccination program. The program requires a blood test and a skin test, followed by the vaccination.

Guyra branch of NSW Farmers will pay for the skin test, however the patient will be required to pay \$155.00 for the vaccination if it is deemed necessary.

It is not available on the Pharmaceutical Benefits

Scheme, but may be tax deductible. Previously, the ATO's advice stated that only those working with cattle as part of their employment could claim the cost of Q fever testing and vaccination as a tax deduction.

The advice has been updated to include those working with sheep and goats as part of their employment. The ATO also confirms that employers can make deductions for the cost of vaccinating employees operating as part of those businesses.

A clinic will be held on Friday 22nd November for Blood screening and Skin test. A vaccination clinic will be held on Friday 27th November where the Q fever vaccination will be given.

NSW Farmers is encouraging all people at risk of contracting this illness to take up this offer by Guyra Medical Centre and the Guyra Branch of NSW Farmers

You do not have to be a patient at the Guyra Medical Centre to partake in this program.

Early weaning: an important management option

Northern Tablelands Local Land Services is running a series of Early Weaning Workshops to provide practical tips and benefits of early weaning for cattle producers. In the current drought conditions, early weaning needs to be considered to help manage the fat score of cows to maintain productivity for next year or to ensure cows that are in low body condition can improve prior to sale.

A 500kg lactating cow requires 13kg (8.5MJ/kg/DM) of cereal hay or 11kg of good quality hay (like lucerne hay - 9.5 MJ/kg/DM) to maintain condition with no paddock

feed available. Once the calf is weaned off the cow and fed separately, the amount of feed required for maintenance drops (7kg of good quality hay for the 500kg cow and 3.5kg of good quality hay for a 200kg weaner). The health of both the cow and calf will also improve.

Be mindful that once these calves are weaned they either need to have access to good quality pasture/forage or continue to be fed a ration daily that includes roughage if limited or no paddock feed is available.

Early weaning workshops will be held at Glen Innes on Wednesday 20 November from 8am – 1pm, Uralla Bowling Club from 7.30am – 11am and Guyra Bowling Club 2pm – 5pm on Thursday 21 November and Tenterfield Golf Club 2pm – 5pm Friday 22 November

Heavy thinking needed on water

As we are approaching Day Zero in our water storage facilities, those in charge need to do some heavy thinking.

On social media this week, Mayor Simon Murray was quoted as saying "We have plan A, plan B and plan C. Let's hope that one of them is viable." He is also quoted as saying that we would need 100 truckloads per day to service the area.

Also in the Gazette (23/10) there is an article stating that the Rail Trail proposal is ready for submission to Glen Innes Council and Armidale Regional Council. If implemented this will mean that the railway line between Armidale and Glen Innes will no longer function.

It doesn't take much to work out that it would be logistically impossible to supply 100 truckloads of water per day to the area.

Why don't the ARC put some thought into getting train loads of water from the desalination plant in Sydney, which is under-utilised. This could be done in consultation with the State Govt. far cheaper than 100 trucks could possibly do the job. Besides, where is the water to be sourced. With some upgrades of the line this could be a Plan D all the way through to Stanthorpe and Warwick.

I think this would be a far better use for the line than ripping up tracks for ,what many believe, would be a retrograde step.

Weekly Wool

The diminishing volume of wool being offered restricted Sydney to a one day sale this week. Prices were dearer for all the Merino types in what was a somewhat calmer market compared to recent times. Sales continued in Melbourne and Fremantle on Thursday with the market pushing higher again. In a good sign for next week the Fremantle market closed higher than the Eastern seaboard levels for the 19 to 21 micron categories. 25,261 bales were sold nationally for the week with the passed in level falling to less than half of the current season's average at 6.7%. Major buyers included Techwool, PJ Morris & Aust Merino Exp. Next week's national offering is 10,000 bales larger than this week but signs of further gains in the market are evident. Forward market prices have risen and are currently trading very near to this week's physical close out as far as January. 100,000 fewer bales have been offered for the season to date compared to last season. The fall in production combined with rather high withdrawal rates prior to sale are contributing fairly equally to this figure.

Mayor's Message

Hundreds of community members took the opportunity to explore water-saving products, seek information and gain advice from local businesses, community organisations and Council at a National Water Week Expo held at Armidale Markets in the Mall on Sunday.

More than 400 visitors to the expo kept exhibitors busy as eager community members discussed topics including the current water restrictions, rebates schemes for water-saving products and tips to reduce consumption in and around the home.

We also had a fantastic response to our competition to win a waterefficient front-loading Electrolux washing machine, with hundreds of people filling out an entry form. The competition was drawn on the day and Scott Harrison was chuffed to hear he had won the prize.

Bing Lee, Reece Plumbing and Bushman Tanks were among the stallholders exhibiting water-efficient appliances and were thrilled with the level of interest shown by visitors, while Lindsay Snell Plumbing received a lot questions about simple greywater systems that can be implemented in the home.

Similarly, a steady stream of people took the opportunity to speak to Council representatives. We had a comprehensive display on the latest information on Council initiatives to supplement the town water supplies and minimise water use for infrastructure and community spaces.

We can expect to see more waterefficient gardening in the region, following a high level of interest in a number of displays about low water-use gardens.

Armidale Tree Group displayed a range of drought resistant plants and people absorbed tips on the best use of greywater for gardens.

Armidale Regional Libraries entertained with a demonstration on making small Japanese gardens known as kokedamas, using succulents, moss and minimal water. Enjo also showcased its water-efficient and chemical-free cleaning products.

Costa Group, Southern New England Landcare and Department of Primary Industries were also at the expo, answering many questions from residents.

It was a fantastic turn-out by the community. The positivity of residents, their stories of water saving and their enthusiasm to share their tips with others was inspiring.

It is great to know so many motivated people are working together to reduce water consumption and save our remaining water supplies.

Needs-based funding for schools up

There has been a 9 per cent increase, an additional \$2.14 million, in needsbased recurrent funding for Northern Tablelands public schools in 2020. In total, the 59 Northern Tablelands public schools will receive \$25.979 million in needsbased equity funding next year.

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall said this additional support was a result of the NSW Government being the first to sign up to and fully fund the Gonski education agreement, which will deliver \$6.4 billion in additional funding to NSW students over six years.

He said that since Gonski was introduced in NSW, the needs-based funding allocation model had seen annual recurrent funding for local public schools increase by \$16.6 million. Mr Marshall was confident school communities and principals would be delighted at the prospect of planning the use of their additional funds.

"The core of the state government's Local Schools, Local Decisions reforms is to put decision-making about students and school communities with the people who know them best — the principals, school staff and parents," he said. "The

distribution of funds on a needs basis under the RAM gives them exactly that opportunity.

"Many schools in the Northern Tablelands electorate will see additional benefits in areas such as literacy and numeracy support, teachers' professional development and community engagement.

Funding for Guyra district schools:

Bald Blair Public School will receive \$62,051 up \$5,015 on last year and an increase of \$43,964 since 2013.

Ben Lomond Public School will receive \$36,054 up \$6,140 on last year and an increase of \$11,652 since 2013.

Black Mountain Public School will receive \$102,845 up \$5,469 on last year and an increase of \$74,207since 2013.

Ebor Public School will receive \$80,912 up \$42,840 on last year and an increase of \$56,163 since 2013.

Guyra Central School will receive \$945,426 up \$124,184 on last year and an increase of \$769,654 since 2013

Tingha Public School will receive \$333,696 down \$64,259 on last year, an increase of \$80,795 since 2013

In Australia, domestic and family violence is the leading cause of homelessness for women and their children and most women leaving a violent relationship move out of their home.

The It's in the Bag campaign has a simple premise:

- Donate a handbag in good, used condition that you no longer use;
- Fill it with items that will make a difference to the daily life of a homeless woman;
- Be sure to include the essentials such as pads and tampons, deodorant, roll on deodorant, toothbrush, toothpaste, shampoo and conditioner and soap; and
 - · Add the little luxuries like

lip balm and new socks, a magazine, anything that would make a woman or teenage girl feel special.
