Red ribbon day for Gun Club

VISITING shooters will now have a room with a view when they compete at Guyra following the redevelopment of the Guyra Gun Club's camping facilities and amenities.

Northern Tablelands MP Adam Marshall has officially opened the new facilities which were funded by a \$100,141 from the State Government.

The grant allowed the Guyra Gun Club to install eight new powered camp sites on the grounds and construct a new publicly accessible amenities block.

Mr Marshall attended the club's recent two-day shoot with Armidale Regional Council Mayor Simon Murray and inspected the new campsites and amenities, which were already being put to good use by competitors and their families.

The project has taken the total number of powered camp sites from seven to 15, more than doubling the number of caravans, tents and pop-top campers, which can set up at the club during

competitions.

Club Handicapper Greg Brunsden said he was proud of what the club had been able to achieve with the funding provided by the State Government.

"Last weekend's two-day shoot was a really good test of the new facilities, in particular the amenities, and I'm happy to say they were right on target," Mr Brunsden said.

"We had competitors arrive at Guyra as early as the Wednesday and all of them raved about the cleanliness and accessibility of the new standalone amenities located right at the camp site.

"With this project complete I'm confident we are in the box seat to potentially host future regional shoots which will draw more visitors to Guyra and inject much needed funds into Guyra's economy."

Costa expansion on hold due to big dry

Concern over water security issues has led to a decision by the Costa Group to pause the 10ha glasshouse expansion at Guyra. The company is also facing challenges in other areas of production due to the prolonged dry and hot conditions.

In a trading update released last week, Costa said earnings before interest, tax, depreciation and amortisation for the 2019 calendar year is expected to be around \$98 million – a steep drop from its last stated guidance, which was anticipated to be in the "lower end" of \$140-\$153 million.

Its forecast net profit after tax was downgraded to \$28 million.

They also announced that they are aiming to raise \$176 million in equity at a price of \$2.20 per share.

It said all produce categories, with the exception of tomatoes, will deliver below expectations this year. Fruit size and yield due to extended extreme dry and hot conditions affected citrus, avocado and blueberry crops, while the company struggled to deal with a problem of raspberries crumbling and therefore could not be sold. The mush-

room sector is also suffering from low prices.

Meanwhile, the company reported a continued solid trading performance from tomatoes. Although, it noted the lengthy drought conditions have meant an increase in water demand and the need to source alternative water solutions.

The company expects the current strong performance from the existing tomato glasshouse production footprint to continue, with additional water security issues addressed through the use of bores and offtake agreements as well as the deci-

sion to pause the GH4 10hectare glasshouse expansion project due to water security concerns.

The company described 2019 as a "challenging and disappointing year, with performance below expectations, due to a combination of cyclical, one-off and structural issues."

However, Costa chief executive officer Harry Debney said the company is hoping to "return to a more balanced portfolio performance" from the 2020 calendar year – provided its operating regions receive adequate rainfall.

This is her first venture into the business world, but it was a perfect fit for Bettina who is a self-confessed lover of yarn crafts such as knitting and crochet

"I have been a keen knitter and crocheter for almost 10 years and have dreamt of owning my own shop almost from the start," Bettina said.

"Owning a yarn shop and selling yarns and the finished products has been something I wanted to do pretty much since I first picked up a crochet hook and needles."

Bettina says she plans to run the shop along the same lines as the previous owners, and her initial focus will be on building it back up to the level



it was previously.

"Because Margaret was looking to close the business stock levels are pretty low so I have been busy ordering stock and hope to have it back to previous levels soon," Bettina said.

"I will also be looking to build up the online business and give the website a new look."

Future plans include offering classes for people to learn

to knit and crochet, which she hopes to begin in the new year, and offering a range of finished product lines. She also wants to bring in some new yarns and extend the range on offer.

Bettina will run the shop with a little help from her Mum who is also an experienced knitter and between them they will be able to help you select your yarns and patterns and also offer advice where needed.

Bettina officially took over the shop this week and is still working on getting the essentials such as EFTPOS in place. At the moment purchase will need to be cash only, but she hopes to have EFTPOS up and running in a few weeks.

Opening hours will be 9am to 5pm Monday to Friday and 9am until 2pm Saturdays.



Rural Market Reports

2019 NSW All School Touch



Guyra Central School participated in the Boys and Girls Year 7/8 NSW All School Touch Carnival at Inverell on Tuesday 22nd October.

Guyra Sheep & lamb Sale

October 30th - There was a yarding of 735 lambs and 2418 sheep at the Guyra sale last week. Numbers inceased, particularly in the sheep penning, with larger numbers of plainer quality in the grown sheep section.

Lamb numbers reduced and

quality was back, with quality the overriding factor. Restockers competed on pens of 1st Cross ewes and light Merinos. All the regular buyers attended.

An increase in light lambs saw that category sell to cheaper trends of \$3/head. Trade lambs saw cheaper trend of \$30/head, with a reduction of quality and weight. An isolated pen of Dorpers saw a reduction of \$10/head.

Heavy lambs saw cheaper trends, while less weight was the reason for extra heavy lambs easing up to \$18/head. Grown sheep saw varying trends, with restockers pushing young 1st Cross ewes out to a dearer trend. Light trade ewes were \$12 back and the heavy cross bred ewes also reduced by \$12/head. Lack of weight and quality saw the grown wether market sell a cheaper trend.

Armidale Cattle Sale

October 31st - Numbers increased slightly to see cows in the majority, as well as an increase in early weaned calves, due of course to the deteriorating conditions in the marketing area.

The balance of the penning consisted predominately of plainer conditioned young cattle, with the exception of isolated, better presented pens of yearlings. All the regular buyers attended.

Early weaned steer and heifer calves sold to restockers in very good order. Light restocker steers saw a slight rise in trends, however, in the main draw, yearling types saw cheaper trends, according to a lack of condition of 28c/kg. Light heifers to the restockers saw a dearer trend for the most part, up 29c/kg, while heavy feeder heifers experienced a slightly dearer trend.

Grown heifers to feed sold to a slightly dearer trend of 4c/kg. Feeder demand was competitive on light and medium weight cows, while medium weight D2 and D3 cows eased 7 to 16c/kg. Heavy D2 cows sold to dearer trends of 8c/kg, with the heavy D3 cows experiencing a slight reduction.

Weekly Wool Sales

November 1st - Last week's strong close gave hope of a better market this week and from the opening it was apparent that prices were on the rise again.

The Northern region was playing catch up to the Southern and Western regions due to a one day sale last week with prices quickly surpassing and advancing past these levels on the first day of sales. A 62 cent rise in the Northern Indicator on the first day of sales was followed up by a 4 cent rise on the final day.

This week's closing level is only a few cents short of the highest that we have seen in the past three months. 33,008 bales were sold nationally for the week with the passed in rate of 6.7% falling well below the seasonal average due to the improved market conditions.

Major buyers included Techwool, Fox & Lillie and PJ Morris. AWTA test data released today is showing a 10.8% decline in the weight of wool tested nationally for the season to date with AWEX data showing an 18% decline in the volume of wool offered for sale. T

hese figures confirm a build up of wool being withheld from sale due to the uncertainty of the market in recent times.

Time for a review into NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service fire management

I recently used a speech in the NSW Parliament to call for an immediate and thorough review of fire management in the State's National Parks following the horrific

Bees Nest bushfire, near Ebor.

Since the fire, affected landholders have been contacting me expressing their concerns over National Parks' approach to bushfire management, in particular its efforts to reduce the fire load.

Given reports the fire started in Guy Fawkes National Park, I wrote to Minister for Energy and Environment Matt Keene requesting a full and immediate review of fire management in the State's National Parks in response to these concerns.

There needs to be a discussion between NSW National Parks, the NSW Rural Fire Service and the impacted private landholders to allow for better and more consistent hazard reduction burning practices in the future – an effort I wholeheartedly support.

To help landholders get back on their feet, I have also written to the Minister for Police and Emergency Services David Elliott demanding a full public debriefing take place in Ebor to support and answer questions of those affected by this disaster.
