
Naming honour for former civic leader

The Guyra Community Hall will be renamed the 'Gilbert White Memorial Hall' recognising the contribution of the town's longest serving Shire President, D.R. Gilbert White OAM. The move follows an approach to Armidale Regional Council by his family who noted his extensive civic record, including service on Guyra Shire Council from 1960 to 1987 with 25 years as Shire President.

Some of the achievements noted during his time with council were the development of one of the best road systems in the in the State, the construction of water treatment and sewerage treatment works, the Truck Stop, new council chambers and council works depot. Mr White's time on council also saw the development of recreational and sporting facilities including playing fields and the swimming pool.

The opening of the Community Hall in October 1975 is considered a highlight of his years on council and it was requested that the hall be renamed in his honour. The hall is widely used by the Guyra community for sporting and social functions as well as being the centre of the annual Guyra Show.

Feedback on this proposal was sought from the public with just two emailed submissions being received

preference for utilising other facilities or Council infrastructure.

council meeting was that in view of the unique and extensive service of Mr White to the Guyra and New England community, and the low volume of response submissions, that Council support the request. A motion went before council and the proposal was carried unanimously.

Test drilling brings positive signs

Initial drilling in the Guyra district has identified seven sites with strong potential to provide adequate quantity and quality of water to supplement the region's water supply.

The seven test bores - at the Guyra water treatment plant, next to the Guyra sports fields, Izzard Park, at the intersection of Sole Street and Guyra Road and three on Llangothlin Road — appear likely to meet the benchmark of providing five litres of water per second per bore.

Council will liaise with landholders near each of those sites, with contractors set to return in coming weeks to undertake further drilling and potentially begin the installation of bore equipment.

Armidale Regional Council Mayor Simon Murray said that public liaison may include monitoring existing bores nearby to reaffirm the ground water reserves being targeting are not linked to aquifers already being accessed by landholders.

"As planned, the test bores drilled so far have been substantially deeper than any existing bores in the area," Cr Murray said.

"We're looking at reserves much more than 100m underground, while the bores already in place are typically 30 to 40 metres deep."

If drilling for the town supply bores does encounter more shallow water reserves, capping sleeves will be used to seal off that shallower supply.

Council will keep landholders informed about those measures, enabling them to ask questions and assist with monitoring of adjacent bores.

Test drilling will continue with a site at the Guyra Show-grounds this week.

A second crew will this week

begin test drilling at 16 sites in the Armidale town area, with work expected to take about three weeks.

Testing has been undertaken at 10 sites in rural areas surrounding Armidale, with five showing potential.

All 36 test sites in and around Guyra and Armidale are located close to existing infrastructure, so it may be relatively quick and cost effective to connect them to the water distribution network.

Cr Murray said there was some urgency to get ground water supplies on line in Guyra, before levels in Malpas Dam drop below 30%.

"Once they reach that level, different equipment will have to be used to pump water into the Malpas Dam to Guyra pipeline and flow rates will be affected," he said.

"The dam level is now around 36%. There were in-

significant increases in levels at the Malpas and Guyra dams as a result a last weekend's rain – just a fraction of a percentage – but at least it was the first week for quite some time that the level hasn't fallen."

He said while the successful bores that go into production will help extend the lives of the Malpas and Guyra dams, the most effective way to safeguard the town supplies is reducing water consumption.

"We all still need to continue the great work being done to maximise water savings," he said.

"We remain on Level 5 restrictions and with forecasts of a hot and dry summer, every effort is needed to save water and prolong remaining supplies until more substantial, drought-breaking rain hopefully arrives.

Cameras targeting illegal phone use

Mobile phone detection cameras are now targeting illegal phone use across NSW. From December 1st fixed and transportable trailer-mounted cameras will target illegal mobile phone use anywhere, anytime.

The detection system operates both day and night and in all weather conditions, using high-definition cameras to capture images of the front-row cabin space of all vehicles to detect illegal mobile phone use.

The system uses artificial intelligence to automatically review images and detect offending drivers, and to exclude images of non-offending drivers from further action. Images that the automated system considers likely to contain a driver illegally using a mobile phone are verified by authorised personnel.

As with other road safety camera programs in NSW, strict controls are in place to ensure images captured by the system are securely stored and managed.

Warning letters will be issued for the first three months. Following this period, the penalty for offending drivers is five demerit points and a \$344 fine (\$457 in a school zone). The penalty increases to 10 demerit points during double-demerit periods.

While mobile phone detection cameras will be switched on and issuing warning letters 1 December 1st, NSW Police continue to enforce illegal mobile phone use and issue infringements as part of regular operations.

Quicker payments to assist business

Armidale Regional Council will pay local suppliers more quickly to help ease the financial strain being experienced by business during the current drought.

Art last week's Council meeting it was resolved to pay suppliers in the Armidale Regional Council area within five business days of receiving invoices, to assist the region's small to medium-sized businesses. The resolution recognised the impact the prolonged drought was having on businesses in the region.

Armidale Regional Council Mayor Simon Murray said that trimming payment times will help to get money back into the pockets of business operators and circulating in the local economy.

The move coincides with a number of Council-led initiatives to boost business activity in the Armidale region.

Earlier this month, Council held the second in a series of business symposium to identify opportunities for local commerce and encourage great cooperation between business operators and supporting agencies. A business hub to help drive new ventures and enable existing operators to flourish and grow is among the initiatives to originate from the symposiums.

Council has also established a new Regional Growth & Place Activation Peak Advisory Committee, with Expressions of Interest recently closing for community delegates on the group.

Guyra Sheep & lamb Sale

November 27th - There was an increased penning at last week's Guyra sale with 1970 lambs and 3390 sheep yarded. The quality and condition was only fair through both the sheep and the lambs. With the continuing drought conditions there were limited supplies of well finished

stock to suit processors.

Merino lambs were well supplied. The usual processors were in attendance and there was good restocker activity. Market trends were dearer for the limited supplies of well finished lambs. There was a great deal of variation in the condition of the Merino lambs

with the plainest condition light weights selling to cheaper trends. The better quality lambs remained firm. Light weight

Merino sheep made up the bulk of the offering. That included a flock reduction. Restockers were active. Market trends varied with sheep to processors selling on a firm to dearer market trend, with some improvement in weight. Restockers were active to a price level with the market trend firm to cheaper. The better quality lines holding their value, while the plainest condition sheep were cheaper.

Armidale Cattle Sale

November 28th - There was a reduction in numbers with yearlings and cows making up the bulk of the offering. There was a fair supply of grown heifers and bulls, while calf numbers declined. The quality and condition of the offering was on the plainer side.

There were odd pens of well bred young cattle showing the effects of the drought. There were limited supplies of well finished cattle apart from cows and bulls to suit processors. There was reduced export processor competition.

Restockers were active and there was some feedlot competition. The best of the calves remained firm with the plainer calves much cheaper. There were increased supplies of vealers with the best of them selling strongly to restockers.

Quality and breed were major driv-

ers in price change through the yearlings. The better quality lots saw a firm to slightly dearer market trend. The secondary and very plain quality and condition light weight yearlings attracted weaker demand and competition to show cheaper trends. The plainer condition grown heifers to feedlotters sold to cheaper trends of around 7c/kg.

Restocker and feedlot competitior underpinned the plain condition cow market somewhat. The plainest of the cows were much cheaper however The more suitable cows only slightly cheaper. The reduced processor competition resulted in the well finishec cows selling to a cheaper trend of as much as 15c/kg. Heavy bulls were also impacted by the reduced competitior. with the best as much as 8c/kg cheaper.

Weekly Wool Sales

November 29th - The wool market gave up more ground this week with losses recorded over both selling days. An 18 cent fall on the first day of sales in Sydney was followed up with a further 11 cent reduction on the final day.

Price premiums for the finer microns continue to contract as the relative lack of supply in the medium and broader types is helping to underpin prices. The individual indicators for 19.5 to 22 micron types have converged and are all worth a similar amount in the current environment.

32,464 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 14.2%. Major

buyers included Fox & Lillie, Techwool and Kathaytex. The last fortnight is the first time since August that we have seen consecutive down weeks in the market.

Demand remains rather subdued with data indicating retail spending in some of the major wool consuming countries is well back on last year. Supply being at historical lows is certainly helping to underpin prices and even a small increase in demand could potentially turn prices around rapidly. In the meantime the forward market is predicting little change over the next four months with prices available in line with this week's close.
