If you are a fan of ABC Radio's Sunday-morning Australia All Over program or if you simply love a good yarn, this Sunday you will get the chance to catch up with Ian 'Macca' McNamara in person. Each year the popular presenter does around five to ten outside broadcasts and so Guyra is extremely lucky to have been chosen.

Macca says he is coming to Guyra to help raise the spirits because like many towns around Australia he is aware that we have been doing it tough for the last six months. He said he is looking forward to doing his Australia Day broadcast from the Guyra Showground.

It is not his first visit, having previously broadcast from the Guyra Community Hall in September 1994. That visit saw the hall filled to capacity with an overflow outside and an estimated crowd of 2000.

Dave Bearup was instrumental in arranging that first visit and has kept in touch with Macca encouraging him to pay a return visit. His efforts have paid off and will hopefully give Guyra residents a chance to share some stories from what has been the worst drought on record and a period where bushfires have hit close to home.

"I think it will be good to have him back because what is happening in Guyra is a reflection of what is happening in many small towns right across Australia," Dave said. "It has been a very trying time and we have done it tough like lots of towns this year, but tough years make you stronger. This is our chance to put the focus on our town so come along, bring some friends and spread the word to give Macca a warm welcome."

"He has a way of getting people to talk as he roves around during these broadcasts so be pre-

pared to share your story," he said. "Bring a chair to sit on and we will have a BBQ breakfast ready so you can sit back and enjoy the experience."

Macca will broadcast from the Guyra Showground from 6am to 10am this Sunday January 26th. The visit coincides with the Lamb and Potato Festival and with a lot of visitors already in town, expect a big crowd and plan to be there early for the best seat.

Train passes the test



So far at this Lamb and Potato Festival, more than 800 passengers have enjoyed the ride on the Guyra Heritage Train. The train rides, which have been a popular attraction for many years, almost didn't happen.

The licence to run the train, which was previously held by the Antique Machinery Group, had lapsed and the Guyra Historical Society stepped in to ensure that the train was kept on track.

However, before they could go ahead the Historical Society had to complete paperwork to satisfy all WHS and regulatory requirements. Over the past 18 months they have completed the documentation and rewritten risk assessments which then had to be sent for approval.

The good news is that the Guyra Heritage Train has now officially become a part of the Guvra and District Historical Society and this is the first time it has run under the new arrangement. Over the weekend, repre-

sentatives from the John Holland Rail and the NSW Department of Transport carried out an inspection to see for themselves how the train operates.

Representatives Carina Francis (JHR) and Vicki Oszko (Dept of Transport) visited the Festival to see the ride in operation and they were suitably impressed with Ron Lockyer and his team.

On Wednesday January 22nd, two representatives from the Office of the National Rail Safety Regulator (ONRSR) will also be reviewing the operation to ensure it meets regulatory requirements.

The ride is currently only operating a short run however plans are now underway to have the train travelling the full 1.82km journey past the railway station.

Mayor's Message

Festival celebrations, welcome significant rain and gushing waterfalls – the past week brought a succession of good news for the region. Guyra's biggest

annual event, the Lamb & Potato Festival, kicked off on Thursday and has enjoyed healthy crowds despite the arrival of several days of highly anticipated rain at about the same time.

It's been fantastic to see the locals supporting many of the festival events and the high number of travellers stopping in to enjoy the produce and activities on offer, including Saturday's Drought Relief Concert held in the

main street and supported by Council.

There is still plenty to taste, see and experience before the 34th annual Lamb & Potato Festival winds up on 27 January and I encourage everyone to enjoy this wonderful community-driven event.

Some other major drawcards for the region sprang back to life last week, with water finally cascading over our iconic waterfalls. Dangars Gorge and the Wollomombi Falls were back to their vertiginous and thundering best after being dry for several months. Their return should also restore a flow of visitors to our region to enjoy the incredible natural landscapes of our New England High Country.

While days of steady rain have resurrected local creeks and replenished dams on many farms, they have brought only a slender reprieve so far for our town water supply. Levels in Malpas Dam and Guyra Dams have only increased very slightly - bringing only a few

weeks of extra water supply - and we all need to continue the great work to save water under the ongoing Level 5 restrictions. The fact we've seen run-off into the dams for the first time in many months indicates the rain did restore reasonable levels of moisture to surrounding land. With forecasts of thunderstorms this weekend, there is now great potential for follow-up rain to bring flows into the Malpas and Guyra dams.

A busy period of activity continues this weekend when Australia Day celebrations are held throughout our region. See the advertisement on this page for the times and locations of local Australia Day activities. High-profile journalist, author and football fan Liz Deep-Jones will be a wonderful Australia Day Ambassador for our region, and I look forward to travelling with her to each of the local events

Apply now for special disaster grants

Local farmers affected by the recent bush fires can now apply for a Special Disaster Grant of up to \$75,000 to help pay for recovery costs thanks to a joint initiative by the State and Federal Governments.

Northern Tablelands MP and Minister for Agriculture Adam Marshall said primary producers devastated by the fires needed support to get back on their feet as quickly as possible.

"Along the range our farmers have faced crippling drought and ferocious fires and this money is critical to keep them on the land and give them hope for the future," Mr Marshall said.

"Emergency services and volunteers, including many impacted primary producers, are outstanding in emergency situations and we need to make sure we are as vigilant in recovery as we are in the face of disaster.

"The last thing people need to worry about at the moment is filling in forms. That is why we have made this a streamlined process with minimal paper work so people who need money, get money with minimal fuss," Mr Marshall said.

"To receive the grant, farmers need only demonstrate they are primary producers, their property is within the fire zone and demonstrate their property was damaged, by submitting five photographs of the damage – that's it."

Mr Marshall said by simplifying the application process, affected primary producers would benefit from an immediate injection of recovery funding.

"Putting money back in people's pockets as soon as possible will allow affected communities to focus on rebuilding and repairing crucial infrastructure, like fences, treating, euthanising or burying livestock, as well as buying much-needed fodder or re-seeding pasture," he said.

"This also means that primary producers who may have already accessed up to \$15,000 under the scheme can now apply for additional funds, bringing the total available to \$75,000.

"The fires have caused significant damage to our region and affected everyone from beef and lamb producers to horticulturists and this support will bring some much needed relief and help put people on the path to recovery."

The Special Disaster Grant is administered through the NSW Rural Assistance Authority (RAA) and available to eligible, fire-affected primary producers within Category C declared Local Government Areas (LGAs) since 31 August 2019.

To apply for the Special Disaster Grant visit the website www.raa.nsw.gov.au or call 1800 678 593 to speak to the RAA. Service NSW Service Centres are able to assist producers with information.

This assistance is provided through a joint Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangement between states and territories and the Commonwealth Government.

Guyra Sheep & lamb Sale

January 15th - There was a very small yarding of 300 lambs and 500 sheep with rain forecasts and the previous large sell off impacting numbers. There will be a sale on January 22nd and then fortnightly from then on.

Despite the low numbers the regular processors were in attendance. There was increased restocker competition in the sheep market. There were small numbers in each lamb categories. Weight increases accounted for the price improvement in the young lambs.

Merino lambs sold on a firm to slightly cheaper market trend. Processors struggled for numbers in the sheep market. Market trends close to firm. The increased restocker competition saw the plain condition Merino ewes sell to dearer trends with strong improvement in the better quality lines.

Armidale Cattle Sale

January 16th - There was a slightly reduced penning brought about by forecasts of significant rainfall. Half of the offering was made up by cows, with bulls providing a further 10%. The condition was mostly plain with a few better pens throughout. The usual processors were in attendance.

Rural Market Reports

Restockers showing great resilience were extremely active. Light weight young cattle to restockers sold to dearer trends with calves and light weight vealer steers improving by in excess of 100c/kg. Yearling steers to restockers experienced significantly dearer trends with some improvement in quality. Those dearer trends also carried into the heifer yearlings. Lightly muscled grown heifers attracted strong demand from restockers with breed and age related price variation.

There were dearer trends through the cow market with restockers and a feedlot order competing strongly. The 1 and 2 score cows attracted strong gains. Increased demand from processors saw the limited supply of well finished cows sell to a dearer trend of 10c/kg. Heavy bulls saw price improvements of between 30c and 50c/kg with some quality improvement and a larger processor presence.

Weekly Wool Sales

January 17th - Wool sales resumed this week after Christmas recess, with a national offering of 52,261 bales. The market opened on Tuesday with Sydney and Melbourne selling in parallel.

From the opening bid it was evident that a large price rise was imminent. At the end of the first day all merino micron categories had risen between 90 to 140 cents. The EMI increased 79 cents the largest daily rise in the EMI since September last year.

On Wednesday, Fremantle joined Melbourne and Sydney and saw increases of a similar scale to those recorded on the Eastern seaboard. Wednesday also saw the market open in Sydney and Melbourne on a firm note, but midway through the sale some buyers were starting to reduce their limits as their orders filled, it was evident that a softer tone was starting to creep into the market.

On Thursday the downward trend continued in Melbourne and Fremantle with the EMI losing 34 cents. Despite the losses on the final day the EMI still recorded an overall positive movement for the week of 51 cents, closing at 1609 cents. It was interesting to note that most of the fall on the Thursday was in the first half hour of sales with the market holding firm after the initial drop.

Art Exhibition branches out

A fresh new approach has reinvigorated the Art Exhibition running in conjunction with the Lamb and Potato Festival. Previously the exhibition had run during the festival with collaborative works by local artists Kay Smith and Brian Irving. With Kay and Brian unable to commit to a full exhibition, the Guyra CWA Evening Branch took on the organisation of the exhibition and opened it up to outside artists, bringing in some sculpture as well.

Their efforts were rewarded with the exhibition attracting over fifty pieces of hanging art and close to thirty pieces of sculpture. There is still lots of local input and diversity with works by visiting artists from Boggabilla, Bonville, and Glen Innes.

An official opening held at the GALA Centre on Friday, January 17th attracted a larger than expected crowd with around 50 people in attendance. Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall declared the exhibition open for business and congratulated the organisers for hosting an incredibly successful exhibition.

"It was wonderful to see a good crowd turnout for opening night to admire the art and talk about our favourite topic at the moment – rain," Mr Marshall said. "For a small community, there is so much local artistic talent, and it is well worth a visit."

The Art Exhibition will remain open until Monday, January 27th and is open daily between 10am and 3pm. Mem-
