

Appeal for cohesion to achieve Council goals

Armidale Regional Council Mayor Simon Murray has stated his commitment to remain in the role, saying the need for cohesion and consistency to maintain Council's positive work outweighed a vote of no confidence at an extraordinary meeting last week.

The meeting passed a motion 'that the Council expresses no confidence in the Mayor and we urge him to resign'.

However, Councillor Murray said he had no intention of stepping down from the position, after councillors reelected him four months earlier. He remained committed to seeing out his term and the organisation's many goals for the next eight months.

"My responsibility and intention is to continue to perform my duties to the best of my abilities for the remaining term of Council, to ensure sta-

ble leadership and delivery on our programs for the benefit of the whole community," he said in a Mayor Minute delivered at the meeting.

"If our electorate believes that I, as member of this Council, have been derelict in my duties and have failed to deliver effective leadership then they, not a self-interested few, can give me my walking papers at the next election."

Labelling the motion of no confidence "divisive", "ego driven" and "spurious", Cr Murray used the Mayor Minute to highlight what Council had achieved by working together.

"It hasn't been an easy road to travel, yet we have delivered — as I foreshadowed in 2017 — a more financially-viable Council better positioned to meet our community's needs and by putting aside our factional differences we, as a united Council, have scored

numerous, impressive and tangible goals that have provided and continue to deliver, real benefits to our community," he said.

The meeting also passed two motions extracted from the Mayoral Minute:

- We acknowledge the programs and outcomes that have been successfully achieved as a result of economies of scale, unity of purpose, team work, good leadership and more effective use of pooled resources flowing from the creation of Armidale Regional Council.
- We as a Council are fully committed to working together, for the benefit of the whole region, to continue to deliver much needed projects to the community, even though the drought will have a major impact on our financial position this year.

Councillors concerns over Mayor's leadership

Seven Councillors who called on ARC Mayor Simon Murray to resign said that they asked for a vote of no confidence after exhausting every other avenue.

Speaking on behalf of the group at an extraordinary meeting held on Friday morning, Cr Margaret O'Connor said that since his winning the mayoral vote by one vote in September, two more councillors have lost confidence in his leadership.

They met with him on January 16th asking him to step down as a result. She said that his refusal to step down led to the extraordinary meeting being called asking for a vote of no confidence.

Cr O'Connor said that the last two years have seen an increasing number of councillors meeting with him to implore him to listen their concerns around his leadership and that at the January 16th meeting Cr Murray reiterated that he was unwilling to work at all with four councillors.

Cr O'Connor cited his failure to consult with colleagues and lost funding opportunities as some of the reasons behind their dissatisfaction. She also claimed that the Mayor failed to ask for input and provide feedback when representing council at regional, state and national level as well as the regional Joint Organisation.

Cr O'Connor alleged that councillors are being starved of information which would allow them to make good decisions informed by all the facts, claiming that questions asked by councillors are being ignored and documents withheld. She also said that two Councillors have been banned from speaking to staff and believes it is the Mayor's job to step in and resolve the problem which he has refused to do.

Other concerns were being blocked from engaging with the community and excluded from decision making over water policies.

"Losing confidence in Cr Murray as our leader is the one and only reason we need to ask the Mayor to step down," Cr O'Connor said.

"We owe a duty to the community to put in our best performance, if we think our Mayor is blocking us and damaging the public interest we must act regardless of criticism."

"Taking no action would be

even more damaging and neglecting our duty to the community. This is not a personal matter between the seven councillors and Cr Murray. It is a matter of the public interest.

"We must move forward as best we can to serve our community to the max. And we must have full disclosure of matters for which we are responsible. We want to deliver more to our community and to properly exercise our responsibilities.

"We have seven precious months left of this council. We can't waste any more time. We must face up to the big issues here - drought and bushfire recovery, climate change, economic growth, sustainable water supplies and infrastructure needs."

James Mepham was named as Citizen of the Year in Warrnambool for his volunteer involvement in RSL Active, a program that helps young defence force veterans after they have returned to civilian life. James was involved in the inaugural Great South Coast Veterans Retreat, is an active member of Rotary in Warrnambool and also gave his time as one of the subjects in the enormously successful Warrnambool Human Library project, part of Mental Health Week activities in 2019

Spending two crucial years of his life in Guyra where he completed his schooling in 1996 at Guyra Central School, he said that coming from a small connected community was a good starting point to the work he is doing in Warrnambool.

James said he was thrilled to receive the award, but also very surprised to have recog-

nition at this time in life. He also hopes that on some small level it inspires other to step up and get involved in their communities.

"Personally I feel there are other people in the community doing amazing things, but this award will help continue conversations about veterans and their families, who are impacted by the veterans' experiences," he said.

His own transition to civilian life after leaving the Army

was difficult. Photographing the emergency response to the Boxing Day Tsunami left him with post-traumatic stress and guilt that he couldn't turn such a powerful and important set of experiences into something meaningful.

It was while volunteering at the Shrine of Remembrance's education centre he met a young Rotarian who invited him to photograph a Rotary project in Cambodia and Vietnam which supported or

phans, hospitals, polio survivors and women.

James credits his father Steve Mepham and teacher Jo Burgess as being inspirational in his formative years.

"My father has a compassionate heart and is very community driven which set a good example to follow," James said. "Early on I saw the work he did as a volunteer, and later as Superintendent, with the RFS and also the countless hours he puts into the Lamb and Potato Festival behind the sceneshis actions speak louder than words so I am proud to be a chip off the old block."

"Jo Burgess also deserves credit for helping me when I arrived in Guyra at the beginning of Year 11," he said. "I had come from difficult circumstances, but she took me under her wing and I owe a lot of where I am now to the incredible influence and support she gave me."

LLS rates waived again

The State Government will once again waive all Local Land Services (LLS) rates for this year to provide relief for farmers going through devastating bushfires and crippling drought.

Northern Tablelands MP and Minister for Agriculture Adam Marshall said during these difficult times, every little bit of support counted and that waiving LLS rates would help reduce the cost and psychological burden on hard-working farmers.

Ratepayers will receive their rates notices over the coming days informing them that their rates have been waived again this calendar year."

Waiving LLS rates again is just one aspect of the Government's \$3.9 billion drought assistance package, which also includes cost of living pressure relief and subsidies for the transport of fodder.

Market Report -Weekly Wool Sales

The wool market is quickly becoming like Forrest Gump's "Box of Chocolates" — "You never know what you might get". After a relatively positive close to last week's market it was reasonable to think that this week would have a solid opening. External factors however played their part; China announced an extension of the Lunar New Year holiday period with travel and transport restric-

tions in place in an attempt to control the Coronavirus outbreak. The Eastern Market Indicator was cheaper from the opening on Wednesday and ended down 56 cents for the day. This resulted in large passed in and withdrawal rates leading to a greatly reduced Thursday offering. The smaller offering combined with the reduction in prices was enough of a catalyst to send the market into mini re-

covery mode with all categories gaining ground and the EMI gaining 28 cents for the day. 24,002 bales were sold nationally for the week with the combined passed in and withdrawal rate at 43.7%. Major buyers included Techwool, Modiano and Fox & Lillie. The current market remains slightly above its mid-point of the last six months.

Player interest high as Spuds prepare for trial against Old Bar


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40 years on the bowling greens
