High speed chase ends in Guyra

A man has been charged following several pursuits from the Queensland Border to Guyra. About 5pm Sunday February 16th, officers from New England Highway Patrol noticed a suspected stolen Holden Vectra on the New England Highway, north of Deepwater.

Police attempted to stop the vehicle, however, the Queensland registered vehicle allegedly failed to stop, and a pursuit was initiated. The pursuit was terminated shortly after for safety reasons.

The driver stopped at a petrol station on Tenterfield street, Deepwater, where he fuelled the car, driving off and failing to pay. Officers again activated warning devices in an attempt to stop then vehicle, south of the New England Highway, where a pursuit was initiated. The pursuit was terminated shortly after for

safety reasons.

About 5.40pm, the vehicle was sighted again on the New England Highway, Guyra, where officers engaged in a pursuit. Road spikes were successfully deployed by Police on the New England Highway approximately 1km from Guyra, however the vehicle continued into the 70km area, where it crashed over a median strip and mounted the footpath at the intersection of New England Highway and Ollera Street, near the railway line.

The vehicle came to a stop and the man fled on foot towards the main street of Guyra, where he was apprehended a short time later. The 19-year-old man was arrested and taken to Armidale Hospital for mandatory testing.

He was then taken to Armidale Police Station where he was charged with three counts of police pursuit - not stop drive at speed, learner not accompanied by driver, exceed speed > 45 km/h, dishonestly obtain property by deception, receive property stolen outside NSW.

The man was refused bail to appear at Armidale Local Court on Wednesday February 19th.

Funding boost for Ben Lomond and Guyra projects

Projects in Ben Lomond and Guyra are among the latest to be funded under Round 5 of the Australian Government's Stronger Communities Programme (SCP).

Ben Lomond War Memorial Hall Land Management will receive \$7,500 to paint and restore the floor of the hall, as well as upgrade electrical wiring and lighting to enhance the display of about 80 photos of service personnel.

The Hub Guyra will receive \$4,000 to acquire office furniture, whitegoods and kitchen appliances for the Hub following building renovations.

Member for New England, Barnaby Joyce said that this funding will make a real difference in the lives of locals, especially during this time of drought when people are still doing tough despite recent rain.

"It is important we fund not only the big infrastructure projects but less prominent ones too because not-for-profit organisations like these are vital to the fabric of our local communities here in the New England."

The SCP provides grants of between \$2,500 and \$20,000 to community organisations and local governments for small capital projects that deliver social benefits for local communities.

Funding brings greater water security

Armidale Regional Council officials have signed an agreement that formalises funding for an \$11.5 million upgrade of the pump station and pipeline linking Puddledock Dam to the region's town water network.

The NSW Government has committed \$5.77 million to the project, following support from the Member for Northern Tablelands, Adam Marshall.

Armidale Regional Council Mayor Simon Murray said that a more robust connection to Puddledock Dam will help to supplement supplies during any future droughts and if there are interruptions to supply from Malpas Dam.

Puddledock Dam, constructed in 1928, is Armidale's secondary source of raw water, with a capacity of 700 megalitres. However, its pipeline has a top flow of 5.5 megalitres per day, while Armidale's average demand is 14 megalitres per day in summer and can peak at 20 megalitres per day.

Cr Murray said that the current capacity is barely sufficient to meet Armidale's demand in winter, if the

Malpas Dam supply was temporarily shut down because of equipment failure or algal blooms.

Council has also welcomed funding of \$500,000 from the NSW Government to assist with cost of exploratory groundwater drilling.

The testing of bores is to provide emergency water to supplement existing water supplies if and when it was ever required. A total of 29 test bores have been drilled across Armidale and Guvra

with limited success particularly in the Armidale area. Two sites in Guyra have yielded excellent supply and are considered appropriate to connect subject to health tests and meeting approval for a Water Access licence.

Armidale Regional Council Mayor Cr Simon Murray said further analysis is reguired to determine whether the lower yielding test bores in Armidale can be funded by Council at this time.

Weekly Wool Sale*i*

The wool market gave back a little of last week's gains falling a handful of cents over both selling days in the Northern region. The 8 cent drop in the indicator is rather modest compared to the wild fluctuations we have seen in recent times.

Larger movements were recorded in some of the individual micron indicators ranging from 40 cent losses to 30 cent gains at both ends of the spectrum. Better Merino types stvle with favourable strength and low mid breaks were reported as relatively unchanged for the week whilst less stylish high mid break types continued to come under pressure with some large discounts being applied. 31,326 bales were sold nationally for the week with the passed in rate rising again to 22%.

Major buyers included Techwool, Fox & Lillie and Modiano. In a possible pre-cursor to next week, Fremantle selling after the Eastern seaboard on Thursday closed with a softer tone especially for the mid micron Merino types. ABS data for the first six months of the 2019-20 season is showing a large drop in the volume of exports to nearly all of the major destinations.

Cricketers sit it out due to wet weather

After a dry first half of the year, wet weather has caused the cancellation of the last two weeks of games for senior cricketers.

The third grade T20 final which was set down for February 9th was called off due to rain, as was the full round of cricket last weekend. The T20 final will now be played this Sunday February 23rd (weather permitting).

Junior games went ahead on February 8th with the under 14s getting a win, the under 12s a loss and the under 10s a draw and a win. The under 14s are having a good season, winning seven out of nine games played so far. They continued with their winning form with an easy win over CSC Gold in their most recent outing.

In reply the Guyra side put up a good chase, falling short in the 22nd to finish the day on 8 for 91. Best with the bat were Emory Levy (15), Hugo Brazier (31) and Tynan Bull (18 ret).

In the under 10s Guyra Red were looking like a win, before the match had to be abandoned. They restricted Hillgrove Brumbies to 3/56 and were 1/40 when the game was abandoned. Guyra Black had better luck against Ex Services who batted first to finish their innings on 9/78 (CC). In reply Guyra hit out and managed a good total of 8/143 and a win.
