Getting back to normal for pubs and club

The transition back to a more normal way of life will take a further step next week with the reopening of pubs and clubs from Monday, June 1. For Guyra this means that the doors will reopen at three local establishments who were forced to close their doors or limit trading in late March when restrictions were imposed due to COVID-19.

The Guyra Bowling Club will put out the welcome mat from 12pm on Monday with all services operating. Secretary/Manager Betty Bourke said that the sudden shutdown affected the business every which way and will have a big impact financially. Only the Bistro was able to stay open on a takeaway only basis and was well supported.

They will be operating under new guidelines which will see

only 50 people allowed, and they have to be seated. Betty said that while she is pleased to be reopening, it will mean they have to operate in a different way to what they are used to.

Accessing the jobkeeper allowance has meant that four employees were able to be paid and kept on, Sporting wise the club also welcomed back golfers to competition on the weekend and expect that bowlers will be back on the greens next week.

Guyra Hotel Licensee Mick Shiner is also looking forward to reopening next week and despite the restrictions that are in place he believes it will basically be business as usual.

He said he is looking forward to throwing open the doors and welcoming people in for a meal or just to catch up over a drink. The Jobkeeper scheme means they have been able to look after all employees and they have been kept busy painting and cleaning during the lockdown so patrons can expect to see the premises looking fresh and new when the doors open.

He also said that he is aware that everyone still needs to be sensible and do the right thing and hopes that everyone enjoys the opportunity to get together and appreciate their mates and friends.

The Royal Hotel continued to operate a takeaway service during the shutdown, but will reopen the premises from Monday for those who have been missing the opportunity to catch up over a beer or two.

Owner Naomi Davidson said that they will be welcoming

back their regulars and visitors, while adhering to the new guidelines. She thinks customers will find it hard to sit rather than stand, but they will try to make things as normal as possible for everyone.

At this stage they plan to open the kitchen seven nights a week and for lunch from Wednesday to Sunday. They were able to keep the kitchen trading for takeaway thanks to the Jobkeeper payments and while it was a totally different sort of trade, they have appreciated the support during this time.

There have been some changes taking place and renovations have been undertaken with the front bar refurbished and the front wall stripped back to expose the original brick work.

Two new energy projects for district

A proposal to build a 5MW solar farm near Guyra is currently being assessed by the Joint Regional Planning Panel (JRPP) and a new wind farm in the Ben Lomond area is in the early stages of development.

Providence Asset Group (Providence) is seeking development consent from Armidale Regional Council to develop a solar farm at 175 Glen Ross Road, Guyra. Plans for the development were submitted in April for the solar photovoltaic (PV) farm project which includes approximately 5MW grid-connected solar PV installation.

Once established, the solar farm will be connected to the Essential Energy grid at Guyra Substation. The proposed development is valued at around \$7m and will see an estimated 14,280 solar PV panels erected.

Other electrical generation infrastructure is proposed on the site including 2 x 2.5MW inverter system supported by a Medium Voltage Power Station transformer and switch gear.

The PV arrangement will consist of 170 ground-mounted single-axis trackers. During the construction period there is estimated to be up to 30 personnel on-site for up to 6 months.

New Zealand-owned renewables developer Meridian Energy Australia has raised plans to build a two-part 130MW wind plus battery storage project between Guyra and Glen Innes.

The proposed project, dubbed the Rangoon Energy Park, is being put to communities in the nearby villages of Ben Lomond and Glencoe, with a scoping report due to be lodged with the NSW Department of Planning, Industry, and Environment in June.

Meridian, whose parent company is the largest electricity generator in New Zealand, says the proposed Energy Park meets the NSW government's criteria as State Significant Development (SSD) and will follow the SSD planning pathway.

According to details on the company website, the project

would comprise two separate wind farms, Rangoon North and South, positioned alongside the New England Highway.

The wind farms would have a proposed combined total of around 23-26+ turbines, and would connect to the National Electricity Market via two substations to be built on-site.

Meridian says the proposed project's Battery Energy Storage System – no size or capacity yet indicated – would be located at one or both of the two project substations.

The project is at the very early stages, with an Environmental Assessment not expected to be lodged with the state government until March next year.

Arrests over Guyra break and enter

Police have charged three people for an alleged break and enter in Guyra last week. About 9.40am on Sunday May 17th, two men and a woman allegedly forced entry into a business on Bradley Street, Guyra. The trio left empty-handed after the alarm was activated.

Officers attached to New England Police District attended and commenced an investigation. Following inquiries, officers arrested a 32-year-old man at a home on Malpas Street, Guyra about 12.40pm on Wednesday May 20th.

He was taken to Guyra Police Station and charged with aggravated break and enter dwelling in company, intend steal and was refused bail to appear at Armidale Local Court on Monday June 15th.

Following further inquiries, officers arrested a second man at a home in Ebor Road and an 18-year-old woman at a home on Malpas Street, Guyra on Friday May 22nd. The pair were taken to Guyra Police Station and charged with aggravated break and enter dwelling in company intend steal.

They were both given conditional bail to appear at Armidale Local Court on Monday 10 August 2020.

Community survey for playground equipment

A survey launched this week is asking community members in the Armidale region to indicate their preferences for additional play equipment at the new Curtis Park Playground.

Concept designs for the playground have gone on display in Council's Your Say Armidale website, along with the survey asking people to rank equipment in a shortlist of possible additions.

"While the playground design is being finalised, we're looking at any additional play equipment that could be included within the available budget," Armidale Regional Council Deputy Mayor Lib Martin said.

"If we have a clear ranking in place from the community, we can then work from the top of the list with any money remaining in the budget."

Council is developing the new playground in Armidale's Curtis Park, after receiving a \$999,700 State Government grant for the project.

Visitors to the Your Say Armidale page can see the information selected so far for the playground.

"They can also see the overall concept design but it's important to note the layout is only a concept at this stage

and could be adjusted," Councillor Martin said.

Curtis Park was chosen from a shortlist of five potential locations - based on accessibility, public safety and complementing the city's Central Business District. The site was also assessed in line with the Armidale Regional Plan 2040 currently under development to provide an overarching 20year vision and strategy for the region. The 2040 plan will bring together each of the strategies, precinct and master plans developed for the Armidale region in recent years.

To meet deadlines for the playground's funding criteria, construction of toilet and shade facilities at the site is already well underway and concept plans for the play equipment and associated infrastructure were developed.

The concept layout allows provision for additional stages in the playground precinct as future funding becomes available.

"The survey also asks people to rank a list of possible future priorities or to suggest other options as opportunities for expansion arise," she said.

Wind Farm Propaganda

In the mail this week was a double sided, glossy propaganda leaflet which detailed high level information on the proposed "Rangoon Wind Farm". I initially thought that this Wind Turbine Factory eyesore would be built in Burma but not so. They advise that it is proposed to be built in the Local Government areas of Glen Innes and Armidale Regional Council and in particular also at Ben Lomond south of Moredon Road. In total they propose this factory in both local govt. areas will "host" 23 -26+ turbines.

If we ignore the fact that according to Politic Fact - The Poynter Institution, as of 2018/19 it is possible that up to 1160 coal fired power stations are being built or planned in the world with 22 of these now being proposed and built in Japan. So here we are in Australia trying to save the world by decarbonising our part of it forgetting that any gas like C02 is free to "roam the world". It doesn't stop at our borders and visa versa.

With all this in mind I ask the following questions of Meridian Energy Australia who are the proposed developers of the "Rangoon Wind Farm":

• Where will the wind turbine towers be built bearing in mind that they will be made out of steel which requires mining of coal and iron ore to make the steel

• What material will the blades be manufactured from and where will they be built

• How high will the overall tower and blades reach into the skyline

• How much concrete and steel reinforcement will be used to build the tower foundations

•What is the estimated annual loss of eagles and other birds from striking the turbine blades

• What is the expected life span of the towers and what plans have Meridian got to dispose of them when obsolete or broken

• Which country will be building the battery storage plant

• What will be the effective life of this battery storage plant in years

• How will this plant be recycled or disposed of after it reaches its effective life and who will be responsible for disposal of the contaminates

• The generating capacity is quoted as "Up" to 130MW. What is the estimated average energy generated from this proposal

• Where and from whom is the funding coming from to pay for this "Rangoon Wind Farm". In fact what is the total cost of this proposal

• How will this proposal reduce our energy costs in the Northern Tablelands in particular

• How many property owners will "benefit " from receiving annual rental payments for the towers being located on their land

• What will be the possible health impacts from this development for nearby residents

• What local employment will this provide during and after the construction phase has been completed.

This list is not exhaustive but it appears to me that there are many issues with this proposal and others around Australia. My gut feeling is that the towers, the turbine blades and the battery storage will not be built in Australia but overseas most likely in China but possibly in Europe.

If this is the case, we will have overseas countries in the main that continue to build coal fired power stations, emitting the so called dreaded C02 or plant food into the atmosphere whilst we good people in Australia have moved to having the highest power prices in the world so that we can say that we are saving the planet.

Am I upset about this, you bet. Do I want this built here in the beautiful Northern Tablelands, no. But wait there is more, have you heard about the proposed solar "farm" to be built in Llangothlin? That's for another day.

Infrastructure at risk

Just as Nero fiddled as Rome burnt so are the Armidale Regional Council. Firstly, most of the councillors seem to want to waste ratepayers money on a Rail Trail that only a few people want.

However, they seem that they are willing to let existing infrastructure be destroyed. This refers to the Old Armidale Rd. The section from the Guyra Rd for 4.2 km that was sealed within the last ten years.

It took the former Guyra Shire Council forty years to do after they first said that it was planned. The length of this section of road has trees growing on both sides of the road right on the shoulders. Some of these trees are now at least three feet high.

I first brought this to the attention of Councillor Murray at the Guyra Show in 2019. A few months after he informed me that he had referred the matter to the relevant council employee. After noticing no action had been taken, in September 2019 I was told by Councillor Widders to take some photos and to email him these with an explanation of the problem. This I did but nothing has been done to these trees.

I feel that unless something is not done soon these trees will be growing roots under the bitumen and uprooting the road. Surely an ounce of prevention will be much better than an expensive repair of this valuable infrastructure. I can only hope that council can see the trees before they are the forest.

\$11.8 million immediate investment for local Councils

Councils in the New England will receive more than \$11 million in Australian Government funding to build new road and community projects throughout the electorate.

Federal Member for New England, Barnaby Joyce, said the direct investment to local governments will support local jobs and businesses and boost local economies struggling under the effects of COVID-19.

The package included the establishment of a new \$500 mil-Local Road lion and Community Infrastructure Program and the bringing forward of \$1.3 billion of the 2020-21 Financial Assistance Grant payment.

Mr Joyce said accelerating local infrastructure projects was important for supporting jobs and the local economy in the New England.

"Every single job we support makes a huge difference in our local communities, now and as we navigate out of the coronavirus pandemic," Mr Joyce said.

"Not only will this package support jobs, construction businesses and the economy across our New England electorate, it will improve our local roads and provide for new and upgraded amenities to help communities stay connected.

"I will be working closely with councils to make sure projects get under way to support jobs and businesses as soon as possible."

The new Program is based on the successful Roads to Recovery program and will enable local councils to deliver priority projects with a focus on upgrades and maintenance to local roads and community infrastructure.

Local road projects to be delivered under the Program include but are not limited to constructing or improving bridges and tunnels, street lighting, and heavy vehicle facilities such as rest areas.

A broad range of community infrastructure projects will be eligible including new or upgraded bicycle and walking paths, community facilities, and picnic shelters and barbeque facilities at parks. Guidelines for the Program will be provided directly to local governments by the Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Communications.







FROM THE ARCHIVES Crown Land Sale

Guyra Argus 5th October 1911

80 blocks being offered, 40 of them being situated on the site of the old showground and 40 within the village of Guyra, about 1-mile south of the Railway Station on the eastern side.

The sale was looked forward to with interest. Particularly in regard to the blocks at North Guyra as they are suited for business purposes, owing to their central position. The upset price was fixed at a very high figure and the result of the sale showed it was not considered unreasonable by bidders, one block brining at a rate of over £1,300 per acre. The first lots, all ¹/₂ acre at South Guyra being purely residential, realized only a shade above the upset price. Of the showground sites (ranging from 30 perches to 1 rood 31 perches) all those fronting Bradley Street were disposed of at prices considerably in excess of the upset, in one being over 100%


