Winter officially kicked off in Australia on Monday, with snow falling over the alps in NSW and Victoria. As the cold air spread further north, temperatures got low enough for snow to start falling on high ground in the Central Tablelands of NSW from Monday evening and arriving in the Northern Tablelands by Tuesday morning.

The arrival of the first cold front of winter saw snow begin falling in Guyra shortly after 8.30 am on Tuesday lasting for around 40 minutes. Further snow showers fell at around 10.45, but failed to settle.

Official temperature readings were not available, however the temperatures hovered around 4.0C with a wind chill factor of well below zero for most of the day.

Administration now a certainty

An administrator looks certain to be appointed for Armidale Regional Council after councillors voted not to fight a notice of motion to suspend from Local Government Minister Shelley Hancock.

At an extraordinary meeting of the council on Monday, councillors voted in favour of a motion welcoming the appointment of an administrator.

The motion welcomed the opportunity to respond to the Notice of Intention to Issue a Suspension Order from the Minister and also welcomed the appointment of an administrator for a period of three months to provide stability for our Council and community.

It also outlined that they would welcome the opportunity to resume representing our community in the future and that they are committed to working with the administrator and any other available support during the period of administration to address the issues raised by the Minister in her Notice.

The first draft of the motion included clauses that described the behaviour of councillors as "unacceptable", and acknowledged the community had "lost respect for their elected representatives".

However, those clauses were removed in an amendment proposed by councillor Dorothy Robinson.

Speaking against the amendment Deputy Mayor Libby Martin, said she was disheartened and that it was a grave injustice to remove two clauses which were areas of concern of the minister

"We need to humbly acknowledge that there are a number of problems within the governing body," she said. "We're not doing that by hiding some of them under the carpet." Mayor Simon Murray also said that he was saddened that to see two clauses removed.

"We need to accept and acknowledge our failures and we need to recognise that we have lost the support and respect of the community."

Speaking in support of the amendment Cr Ian Tiley said that the ammendment was put up to try to be conciliatory and the points were already covered saying that 'if we pass this motion we are showing the minister we are willing to move forward.'

Top performance from our Post Office

Business is booming at the Guyra Post Office despite the Coronavirus lockdown, and the doors have remained open while other businesses and services were closed.

Their commitment to the community is nothing new and has been recognised with an Australia Post Retail Award which has placed them first out of 57 offices when compared against key performance indicators and business growth.

Australia Post's Retail Rewards program is designed to recognise and reward top performing Post Office teams. They take into account a range of metrics including customer service and safety. Guyra Post Office finished first in the NSW Rural North Network with excellent results in customer service and safety and near perfect results in all other measures. Guyra were also among the top performing outlets for the whole of NSW in March.

During the COVID-19 crisis there have been some changes with licensee Kerry Gittoes taking the decision to review operating hours as well as introducing strict hygiene practices to ensure that both staff and customers were protected.

Kerry said that customers

have adapted well, which meant they were able to keep operating and business wise it has been busier than ever.

"We are always busy, but this period has been more like what we see around Christmas time and we have been flat out all the time," Kerry said.

"Over the last few years our parcel deliveries have increased and this has escalated since the restrictions were imposed with people moving to online orders," he said. "What we have also noticed is that there is renewed interest in letter writing."

"I think that this is something positive that has happened with people learning the art of writing a letter and also the delight of receiving a letter in the mail. People are also sending care packages to family members while they can't travel." "With a lot of other services shut down, we found that more people were coming in, particularly those who still prefer to pay in person and we also found they wanted to stay and chat more."

"The big challenge has been getting people to bring their own pen when they come in to avoid possible contamination."

Library reopens its doors

Armidale Regional Council is progressively easing COVID-19 restrictions on a range of services in-line with public health orders and guidance from the NSW Government.

The Guyra and Armidale libraries were reopened on Monday June 1, along with the Armidale Folk Museum and the Armidale Visitor Information. The Civic Administration buildings at both Guyra and Armidale will remain closed and will be reviewed at a later date.

There will also be limits on the number customers entering Council facilities, with social distancing signage and hand sanitiser available. Customers entering any of council's public spaces are reminded to continue social distancing practices and not come into a facility if they are unwell or have recently been in contact with a confirmed case of COVID-19.

To protect the more vulnerable members of our community, the decision has been made to initially delay the return of volunteers to council spaces.

As restrictions are eased and public spaces are reopened, Council is also implementing a staged return to work plan. All staff currently working from home will progressively move back to normal duties and work locations in line with recommendations from Government and health authorities.

Information supplied by Jeff Martin, Observer for Bureau of Meteorology With Winter now upon us, most of the Autumn leaves in our gardens are spent. They are ready to be raked up and popped onto garden beds or into the compost heap with the other bits amassed from pruning and preparing your garden for Winter hibernation.

Our beautiful old oak and the late Autumn foliage of Chanticleer Pears, are the only colour left, but what is outstanding in the garden is the brightly coloured branches of the Red Twig Dogwoods, the trunks of Sliver Birches and the bark on the Crepe Mrytle's.

Soon we'll see the delicate flowers of Hellebores, Daphne, Snow Drops, and Bergenia's. If you are looking for Winter interest, I would strongly suggest that if you don't already have the hardy Hellebore in your garden to go and buy a few or ask a gardening friend, they are sure to have some. They will flower profusely through Winter and well into Spring, their deep green leaves provide foliage interest all year round and they just love our climate. They also tolerant hot summers, like the one we've just had, as long as they are protected from the hot sun. They will also happily multiply, so before you know it you will have an abundance of hellebores to give away.

But what really comes into its own at this time of year are the structural elements of your garden, such as hedges, decorative tree trunks, as de-

scribed earlier and the shape and placement of your trees also plays a really important role in your garden.

Sculptures, outdoor settings, ornamental pots and things such as fire pits, which are often not only beautiful pieces of art, but practical and a really fun element in your garden, also become important. I know people who have welded their own fire pits in beautiful shapes, or used discarded drums or old soap making dishes as fire pits. In the last few years they have become very popular, but for good reason. Is there anything better than enjoying a glass of red around an open fire with family and friends?

I found this photo of a 'wood pile wall' created by Genevieve McLean, a gardener I follow on Instagram @thelazybadger. What an incredibly creative use of a natural resource. It highlights what can be done with the 'ordinary' and that you really don't need fancy pergolas or expensive rock walls built, just your imagination. A gravelled area, with a few logs as individual seats, set in a circle around the fire is a classic design, not expensive, provides hours of entertainment and brings an area of your garden to life. Not to mention less mowing in Summer!

There is always something to admire in a well thought out garden, so do your research, be creative and try something new in your garden space this Winter.

Wild dog baiting program takes off

The largest aerial wild dog baiting program anywhere in the Southern Hemisphere is underway over the skies of northern NSW. Wild dogs pose one of the biggest threats to the region's farmers and to combat this, more than 200,000 baits would be distributed from the sky over the next few weeks, as part of the State Government's 2020 autumn campaign.

Over the next few weeks Northern Tablelands Local Lands Services (LLS), with the aid of local wild dog control associations, will take the fight directly to these pests with 143,580 1080 poison baits being dropped by helicopter over 430 properties

NSW Minister for Agriculture Adam Marshall said that the annual economic impact caused by wild dog attacks in NSW is

around \$22 million in lost production for farmers.

"Aerial and ground baiting programs are the most effective management tool we have to combat wild dogs and campaigns like this are crucial to ensuring continued productivity for farmers," Mr Marshall said.

"In 2015/16, there were more than 3,000 head of livestock reported mauled or killed in the Northern Tablelands region,

however by 2018/19 that figure was back to 1,350, so this really does work."

Mr Marshall said the overall 2020 autumn baiting campaign also took in the Hunter, North West and North Coast LLS areas. Planning for the program started with landholders, LLS, State Forests and NSW National Parks & Wildlife Service six months ago.

"Wild dogs are known to travel 15 kilometres a day, which is why unless we conduct wide-spread and co-ordinated baiting programs we will never get on top of their numbers," he said. "I'm pleased the current program will see a total of 201,743 baits deployed, which is 10,000 more than last year's campaign."

Sewing up new jobs

However, she has kept herself busy with new challenges that have included making personal protective equipment such as face masks and removable covers for shopping trolley handles.

Left over fabric was utilised for sock protectors which were needed to fill a growing demand.


She also showed ingenuity in designing headwear for dogs to prevent seeds getting into their ear. It took a few trials however she now reports some happy customers sporting this stylish new look.





\$400,000 expansion of 'The Hub' at Guyra set to start A very important project for the Guyra community is very close to getting underway, with Armidale-based modular builder, Uniplan announced as the successful tenderer to deliver Stage 1

of the expanded 'The Hub at Guyra'. Two years ago, I announced a \$400,000 State Government grant for Armidale Regional Council to triple the size of the neighbourhood centre, helping to expand its reach to people in need of critical support and advocacy in the Guyra district.

Stage 1 of the project will see three modules added behind the existing building to provide new office space, community meeting rooms, computer area and storeroom. Additional public amenities with disabled access will also be included, with two male and two female toilets and showers.

Importantly, for the first time, the facility will have a kitchen which will allow instructors to teach life skills programs, like cooking for youth and hospitality courses. It will also make it more attractive as a community meeting space.

Demolition works at the rear of the building will take place from this month, with the new modules expected to be delivered to the site and installed in August.

While construction is taking place The Hub will remain open and operational from the front half of the building and clients are encouraged to still call in.

I want to acknowledge the outstanding work of The Hub Co-ordinator, Chris Hietbrink and her team, in helping drought and bushfire affected community members navigate the paperwork and access support.

I also want to thank the community for its patience in waiting for this project to be delivered and I look forward to an official opening in October.

More time to apply for COVID-19 small business grants Small businesses in Guyra that have been highly impacted by COVID-19 have more time to submit applications for up to \$10,000 in Small Business Support Fund grants.

The grants were designed to help small businesses pay for unavoidable expenses including utilities, rates and supplier costs, and so far there has been nearly 250 applications for the Northern Tablelands electorate.

Applications for the Small Business Support Fund grants have now been extended until the end of June, meaning small businesses that perhaps haven't had a chance to apply, still have time.

Applications must be received by 11.59pm on 30th June, with more information, including eligibility criteria available on the Service NSW website.

May 28th - There was a small reduction in numbers. The offering featured quite a few well finished medium and heavy weight cows, along with some high quality vealers. The quality of the offering was fair to very good, while the condition showed improvement on recent weeks. Processors were well catered for. There was a full field of processors operating and restocker activity was strong through all categories.

Rural Market Reports

Varying trends through the young cattle. Light weight vealer steers to restockers sold to cheaper trends. The medium and heavy weights firm to dearer with the heavier weights showing the greatest improvement. Light weight heifer vealers also sold to cheaper trends. The medium weights were as much as 25c/kg dearer with increased competition. There was a

sulted in dearer trends. Restocker lambs improved by \$5 to \$6/head. There were good supply of well finished heavy weights suitable to the trade. Light and medium weight yearling steers were only slightly dearer. Heavy weight yearling steers attracted strong competition from both feedlotters and restockers to experience strong gains. Yearling heifers also sold to dearer

> through all weight classes. Grown steers to restock and feed experienced significant improvement. The limited supply to process remained firm. Well finished grown heifers were much dearer to process with feedlotters also competing strongly. Medium weight cows sold to dearer trends, while the heavy weight cows remained firm. Strong competition saw the better quality heavy bulls sell to dearer trends.

strong gains for all classes of lambs to process, with the quality of the lambs contributing to price improvement. The limited supply of sheep attracted strong competition with an increased percentage of well finished sheep.

There was a great variation in skin values from freshly shorn Merino's through to some carrying almost a full skin. Trends were dearer throughout with the well finished medium and heavy weights showing strong gains.

Weekly Wool Sales

May 29th - It was another small national offering with the Northern region only requiring one day of selling. Half of last week's losses were regained rapidly with the market dearer from the outset with the gains spread evenly across the board. These gains were held onto during the final day of selling in both the Southern and Western regions.

One could be forgiven for thinking that the market has been erratic but the Eastern Market indicator has actually traded in a tight 24 cent band throughout the month of May. The Stronger market resulted in a passed in rate of 7.9% (much lower than the seasonal average of 17.4%) however over 11% of this week's offering was withdrawn prior to sale.

Major buyers included Techwool, PJ Morris and Endeavour Wool. With the Western region not selling next week just over 17,000 bales are expected to be on offer nationally in what will be one of the smallest weekly offerings for the current season. As we head into June it is traditionally the low point for weekly rostered national volumes being offered. It's also the month that has registered some significant high points in the market over the past 10 years.
