Martin, Murray and Widders gone

The refusal of a majority of councillors to take responsibility for their actions is the main reason that Simon Murray decided to step down from his role as Mayor of Armidale Regional Council.

Mr Murray announced his resignation last week joining fellow councillors Lib Martin and Brad Widders in standing down from their roles. Diane Gray announced her resignation last month.

The latest resignations come after months of infighting among councillors which resulted in the appointment of an administrator for a period of three months and the subsequent resignation of CEO Susan Law.

Serving his second term as Mayor, Mr Murray has been on the back foot since January after a vote of no confidence. Up until last week he resisted calls to step down, however said that following the resignations of councillors Gray, Martin and Widders his position became untenable.

The seeds for his resignation were sown in the lead up to the council being suspended.

"After the Minister issued the notice of motion to suspend, we held a workshop for councillors with a mediator to develop our response," Mr Murray said.

"That workshop led to a mayoral minute which the then Deputy Mayor Lib Martin and I put before the extraordinary meeting."

"We were prepared to accept some responsibility and drafted a response

along those lines, however an amendment saw the removal of a clause acknowledging that council had lost the respect of the community," he said.

"At the time I was disappointed that some councillors refused to accept that they had a part in what had happened, because unless you accept responsibility, you can't move forward.

"Recent comments from those council-

lors suggest that is still the case," he said.

"Realistically given that attitude and the other resignations I would have very little input when the suspension is listed, so felt that now was the time to move on."

He said that the pressure of the job was 'relentless' from both councillors and the community and was not doing his health any good. Without the responsibility of the mayoral position he said that he is more relaxed and able to enjoy life and get back to work on his farm.


Despite being comfortable with his decision to move on he has expressed concerns that there will be little or no community input into the selection of a new General Manager.

"The decision of who will be appointed to this position should be a decision of the community and not one made by an administrator," he said.

"I also worry about what will happen with the remaining councillors being city focussed and fear that rural areas will suffer without adequate representation.

"The numbers are in Armidale and unfortunately there has been infighting going on there for forty years," he said.

"Recent experience suggest this has not changed. We still need a rural and regionally focussed voice and now is the time for anyone who wants to have a go and be that voice to stand up."





Coming home to Guyra

Growing up in Guyra, Peter Davis did not imagine he would one day be overseeing one of Australia's largest and most advanced glasshouse operations, with a workforce of up to 600 people.

Administrator Viv May said that Mr Rayner is an experienced and well respected leader in Local Government and comes with a wealth of experience in local government both in the city and regionally.

"He understands regional life and I am looking forward to him starting to rebuild the confidence of staff and working with me to restore community trust in Armidale Regional Council," Mr May said.

"The General Manager of a Council is an important position. It's the glue that holds everything together, between staff, councillors and the community."

Mr Rayner will not commence until late August, however Mr May said that he was prepared to wait in order to get the right person for the job. Any gap between the incumbent CEO departing and the commencement of the new Acting General Manager will be filled by internal appointments.

Wintry blast brings more snow

Snow fell across the Guyra district last night with temperatures dropping rapidly on Monday evening with the arrival of a cold front. It was the third fall of the season, and the biggest yet.

Snow began falling shortly after 5pm on Monday in the Black Mountain area and in Guyra shortly after. Guyra itself missed out on the heaviest of this snow event with the biggest falls further north around Llangothlin and Ben Lomond and also around Wandsworth.

There were reports of around 2 to 4cm of snow settling shortly after dark at Ben Lomond. Most of the snow fell between 6pm and 7pm and further falls predicted for Tuesday did not eventuate.

Most of the snow melted before sunrise, remaining for longer at the higher altitudes around Ben Lomond. Falls were also experienced in other elevated parts of Northern Tablelands from Walcha up to Glen Innes and on the Barrington Tops.

The icy conditions resulted in an alert for traffic to be careful when travelling between Guyra and Glen Innes on the New England Highway around Ben Lomond.

Footpath remediation

Work to remediate areas of footpaths in the Guyra CBD are being carried out this week. Armidale Regional Council has engaged Heritage Concrete to undertake the remediation with work expected to commence on Wednesday July 15th and be completed by Friday July 31st.

The work will cover the remediation of areas disturbed during the underground fuel tank investigations, as well as areas that have been temporarily disturbed during NBN installations.

There is expected to be some disruptions to pedestrian movements during this time and signs will be in place to guide pedestrian around the work areas.

Too many councillors still wrestle with the concept of regionalism and remain far too Armidale-centric to be able to meet their

Region set to light up

The New England will become the renewable energy powerhouse of NSW, with Northern Tablelands MP Adam Marshall and Energy and Environment Minister Matt Kean last week announcing an \$80 million State Government investment to establish the State's largest, Renewable Energy Zone (REZ) in the region.

Mr Marshall said the 8,000 MW REZ will deliver the jolt needed to recharge economies and communities right across northern NSW.

"The New England REZ is expected to attract \$12.7 billion in investment for new energy infrastructure that will lower household electricity bills and capitalise on established wind and solar projects on the Northern Tablelands.

"Importantly, at a time when

towns are looking for new ways to encourage employment opportunities, the REZ will generate 2,000 construction jobs and 1,300 ongoing jobs.

"Already, large scale wind and solar projects in the Northern Tablelands electorate are generating enough electricity to power 254,318 NSW homes.

"With approved projects like the New England Solar Farm at Uralla and Metz Solar Farm at Armidale expected to start construction in the next two years that output is set to explode to well over half a million regular homes.

"Further to that, an area stretching just from Walcha to Tenterfield, there is at least another 10 state-significant projects going through assessment with the NSW Department of Planning.

Mr Marshall said the REZ represented a golden opportunity to diversify economies and provide better infrastructure.

"For the first time in our region's history, we are on the cusp of being a net exporter of energy building wealth in our communities," he said.

"Through progressive new policy frameworks and the National Energy Guarantee (NEG), we are balancing the needs of community while government action is driving new investment in new power generation to deliver least cost energy to customers.

"The benefits of the New England REZ blow way beyond the renewable energy sector, offering the opportunity for mass investment in things like public roads, telecommunications infrastructure and health services.

"Quality infrastructure is not only vital for the efficient delivery of electricity to the network but will also play a role in encouraging people to relocate to our area to work on these ground-breaking proj-

"The official declaration of New England as an 8,000 MW REZ is a long-awaited milestone for the future of the region and I am determined to see community-wide benefits flow from this announcement."

REZs involve making strategic transmission upgrades to bring multiple new generators online in areas with strong renewables resources and community support. For more information, visit www.energy.nsw.gov.au/renewables/renewable-energy-zones.



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Guyra Sheep & lamb Sale

July 8th - There was a reduced penning with 2,100 lambs and only 400 sheep. The quality of the lamb offering was mostly good, with well finished medium and heavy weights making up the bulk of the offering. The usual processors were in attendance, however there was minimal restocker activity. Market trends through the lambs were cheaper, following recent trends through most areas. The heavier the lambs the greater the dollar/head fall. With quality and a lack of restocker activity, the light weight trade lambs saw a trend that was \$14 to \$20/head cheaper. Well finished

lambs suitable to the local trade market were least affected to show a cheaper trend of as much as \$11/head. The heavier weight classes, over 24kg experienced substantial price falls, exacerbated by the fortnight break in sales. The small number of sheep saw limited processor competition with market trends also significantly cheaper.

Armidale Cattle Sale

July 9th - There was a small increase in numbers with a yarding of 685 head. The quality of the offering was mostly good with well-bred and well finished cattle in good supply. There were some very good yearlings and cows penned. The usual processors were in attendance as were most of the regular restocker and feedlot orders.

Demand from restockers waned somewhat over the fortnight. This resulted in cheaper trends for both steers and heifers. There was some significant price reduction. Medium and heavy weight yearling steers were in good numbers with quality showing improvement. The market trend for medium weight was generally firm, while the improved nature of the heavy feeders contributed to some strong price gains.

Yearling heifers to restock and feed also saw a firm to dearer market

trend. There were insufficient heavy grown steers suitable to processors to quote. Feedlotters active through all weight classes. Well finished grown heifers struggled under weaker processor demand to see a market trend that was up to 20c/kg cheaper.

There was a large correction in the cow market over the fortnight with the market trend as much as 30c/kg cheaper, despite the offering showing a quality improvement. Heavy bulls experienced a similar trend.

Pollinating robot being tested in Guyra

An Israeli company that has created an autonomous pollinating robot has started its first trials in Australia and it is now being tested at Costa Group's multi-million-dollar greenhouse facility in Guyra.

Arugga AI Farming is hoping its technology can transform Australia's greenhouse farming sector, especially greenhouse tomatoes, which are currently pollinated by hand.

Chief executive Iddo Geltner said after successful trials in Israel, the company had targeted Australia because it did not have bumblebees.

"Around the world, pollination in greenhouses is typically performed using commercially produced bumblebee hives, but these bees don't pollinate well in certain conditions, and they're actually banned in Australia," he

The robot autonomously drives along the rows, finds flowers that are ready for pollination using artificial intelligence, and sends air pulses to vibrate the flowers in a very specific manner to imitate buzz pollination as performed by bumblebees.

Mr Geltner said the company would focus initially on pollinating tomatoes but was also looking at opportunities to improve yields for other greenhouse crops.

"The greenhouse sector is huge and growing around the world at a steady pace of more than 5 per cent a year," he said

"As far as we know, greenhouse farming is the fastest growing agricultural sector in Australia, so we've started with Costa in Guyra, but later on will look to work with other growers."

Why we need to pay more for water

Changes to water fees and charges in the draft 2020/21 Budget are a response to welcome changes in community water consumption levels and a greater appreciation of the value of this resource, Council's Director — Businesses, Scot MacDonald, said.

The draft Budget on public exhibition until Thursday July 16th includes increases to water access and usage charges to adjust for reduced consumption under ongoing water restrictions and its impact on financial reserve to maintain water infrastructure.

"Residents and businesses have done an incredible job responding to the water restrictions in place and reducing water consumption during the drought," Mr MacDonald said.

"While that has been extremely valuable in protecting our region's water supply, the reduced water sales have had a significant impact on Council's Water Reserve to operate, maintain and upgrade our water supply assets.

Council's actions to combat the drought also brought additional costs, including a range of water saving measures and the development of a ground water supply network at Guyra."

He said all these factors contributed to reducing the Water Reserve by around \$6 million in 2019-2020 and the impact is expected to continue in 2020/21.

At the same time, the drought has further demonstrated that Armidale and Guyra's water infrastructure is ageing and requires significant and urgent investment to avoid failures.

"Council cannot rely on State Government funding to fix its water assets. Water fees and charges are being adjusted to undertake asset renewal, be water secure for residents and businesses, and develop water infrastructure fit for future generations," Mr MacDonald said.

"In addition, increasing the charges applies a greater value to our water, reflecting a change in community perception and recognising water as a scarce resource.

"The increases are not aimed at generating more funds for the Water Reserve compared to previous years. They will restore the fund close to pre-drought levels, when average water consumption was much higher."

He said there were also proposed changes to water charges as a result of a harmonisation process to ensure fees and charges are consistent throughout the local government area, and to treat the water supply network as a single system for the whole region.

The documents currently on exhibition also include the draft 2020/21 Operational Plan, featuring several capital projects to update and upgrade the region's water infrastructure.

Those projects include an upgrade of the Puddledock Dam to Armidale pipeline and a stability upgrade of Dumaresq Dam - with both initiatives 50% funded by State Government contributions.

Further infrastructure work for a Ground Water Supply Network being developed in Guyra is also part of the draft Operational Plan, along with an assessment of options to upgrade Malpas Dam.

Other water projects in the draft Operational Plan:

- Regional Water Treatment Plant Master Plan
 - · Water mains replacement
- Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition Telemetry Systems

- Malpas raw water transfer pipe support repair and remediation – Stage 1
- Guyra Dam raw water pump station and switchboard

Council held a community webinar and pop-up stalls in Armidale and Guyra about the proposed water charges, upcoming water infrastructure projects and the impacts of drought on the Water Reserve.
