"Her ability to get things done and her knowledge of the local community makes my job a lot easier."

Treasurer Chris Sole reported that the result from this year's Show was very good having regard to the drought, bush fires and the COVID virus. The Show was well supported by the locals and membership continues to grow. Income from the bar, BBQ and canteen showed an increase over the 2019 Show.

Overall our 2020 Show was another success. The drought

that crippled the community and exhausted our volunteer base in the lead up would have been more than enough reason to simply put it off. Many other shows cancelled. The fact we had a show at all, and that it was a success, is a real credit to our community and for that I think we should be proud.

Financially our goal in recent years has been to balance the books at a minimum, and ideally turn a small profit and pleasingly we have delivered on this, booking a small profit of around \$3,000.

Membership numbers have grown 18% from 234 in 2019 to

#### 278 in 2020.

We have focused on bringing back families by targeting our entertainment spend in this direction and the feedback and support on this front has been positive. The Rooftop Express was well received however constructive feedback suggests we are due for something new next year.

Thanks to our group, projects and upgrades are being delivered at our showground.

The upgrade of the BBQ area that now incorporates a kitchen has been delivered on budget and user groups are very happy with it. - We have \$57,000 to upgrade the rest of the bar building later this year that the Bar team led by Jarod are handling. More on this in our general meeting following the AGM.

- Thanks to Dorothy's application we have a grant of \$66,270 toward painting the Secretary's office and canteen, repairs to grandstands, the perimeter fence, dsplay cases for the cake section and a concrete floor in the cattle section. These projects will be completed in coming months overseen by Dorothy and Rita.

In our general meeting we can expand on this and identify the priority projects going ahead once the current projects are completed.

We still have some opportunities to make the show even bigger and better. For me, the big one is to see more families, particularly those in town become involved in the show and I welcome your input to this end. I would also like to see more younger people become involved in our show committee in future years, and am continually working on this front.

Overall I feel we are heading in the right direction and there is much to look forward to in coming years. We have shown ourselves to be financially sustainable, membership has stabilised and is now growing, feedback is positive and the families are returning. In closing, I acknowledge and thank the many people who volunteer their time to make the show a great success.

## Bush fire danger period commences

The 20/21 Bush Fire Danger Period in Armidale Regional, Uralla and Walcha LGAs commences this Saturday 1st August 2020.

This means you will need to obtain a fire permit from your local Rural Fire Brigade before doing any burning in the open (excluding cooking fires).

You will also need to notify all adjoining neighbours (including those separated by a road or waterway) and the New England Fire Control Centre on 02 6771 2400 at least 24 hours before you light.

You need to monitor the RFS website for -information and ensure that on days of Very High Fire Danger OR a Total Fire Ban you are not burning with your permit.

You must take steps now to reduce your risk in the event of a bush fire. This includes clearing breaks along fence lines and around structures,

checking your firefighting equipment to make sure it works, identifying safe paddocks to move stock in the event of a fire.

Even though this weekend has been wet, the hot westerlies will be here in the coming weeks. Its everyone's responsibility to ensure that fire is used safely within our communities. Don't be the fire risk in vour community.

### How long have you been in business?

The Kirk Family has been operating businesses at 94 Bradley Street for over 60 years, however the transition was made to become an IGA and supermarket only in the early 2000s. This was a great decision as it allowed the supermarket to grow and the other businesses to expand into their own buildings around Guyra.

### How many staff do you employ?

Kirk's IGA usually has about 33 staff on the pay roll at any one time.

## What services do you offer?

Aside from our vast range of fresh and dry groceries, Kirk's IGA offers free home delivery within town boundaries with orders over \$20.

### What is the best/worst thing about owning your own business?

The most positive thing about owning an independent business is the freedom to range any products you wish. This allows us to order in ANYTHING on request for ANYONE.

The downside of owning a business like Kirk's IGA is the out of hours callouts, breakdowns and deliveries that can eat away into per-

### sonal and family time. How have things changed since you started?

The technological advancement in retail has seen great changes in the way tills and checkouts are operated. In the early days every item was keyed in on an old cash register and similarly ordered from suppliers by a check list or order sheet that was faxed or even posted away. Nowadays, everything is automated and electronically scanned, ordered, and even paid for. EFT makes up over 70% of payments in the current day.

### What effects have challenges such as drought, bushfires and coronavirus had for your business?

2020 has been a testing year for all members of our region. Specific to our business has been the struggle with supply of goods and keeping their cost down.

The drought saw the price of meat and grains continually rising to a peak when the rain finally arrived. Covid-19 and the panic buying that swept the nation saw supply of products like flour, hand soap and rice in a nation-wide shortage which has only eased in the past 3 weeks to a continual supply. All in all, it has been an on-going struggle in maintaining supply levels at competitive prices. However, our staff going over and beyond has ensured the Guyra community has had as much of the desired products as physically possible through the testing times.

### What is the most interesting job you have carried out?

Working closely with the VRA in the months of lockdown. Going to people's homes, meeting interesting people and hearing their interesting stories was certainly something out of the ordinary for this business. However, it was all worth it knowing those most at risk were able to get all the things they needed in the height of the pandemic.

### Do you get good feedback from your customers?

Like any business you always receive good and bad feedback. The good is always nice to hear and the bad ensures you work hard to ensure everyone has a good experience and you try your hardest to rectify anything that has not been so good.

### Any advice for people starting out in business? Understand all opera-

tions in your business and the people who undertake each of these. Your staff are the business.

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# Level 5 water restrictions will remain

The Armidale region will remain in Level 5 water restrictions until dam storage levels increase significantly or longterm weather forecasts indicate firm prospects for great water security. A report to last Wednesday's Council meeting outlined that the restrictions will be reviewed again when the Bureau of Meteorology releases its summer rainfall outlook, which is due in August, or if dam levels rise substantially.

Dam levels and climate conditions have improved since January but the region's main water storage, Malpas Dam, has only recovered to 55% of capacity, compared to 41% when Level 5 restrictions were implemented and 48% in July 2019.

Water restrictions were introduced in

Guyra in February 2019 and extended to Armidale the following month. They were progressively stepped up as levels in Malpas Dam and Guyra Dam continued to fall, with Level 5 implemented for the whole region in October.

Restrictions remain at Level 5 for all households and businesses and can be viewed on the Water Restrictions page of Council's website.

Armidale's rainfall total for 2019, just 306.6mm, was the lowest since instrumental rainfall recording began 130 years ago and was substantially less than the previous lowest total, 460mm in 1982.

"As we have stated before, this region is still officially in drought and we cannot consider ourselves to be out of the woods with our water security until there are much more positive predictions of considerable rain or until we actually see levels fully restored in the regional water storage," Council's Director – Business and Services, Scot MacDonald, said.

"We greatly appreciate and have acknowledged the wonderful job our households and businesses have done to reduce their consumption.

"Council's primary responsibility as the region's town water supplier is to ensure our customers continue to have a secure supply for essential needs. We are taking every viable step to achieve that goal, with Council's own activities and in working with the community to curb overall consumption."

# Malpas dam restocked with rainbow trout

105 mature Rainbow Trout were released into Malpas Dam last week as part of the State Government's annual fish restocking program.

Agriculture Minister and Northern Tablelands MP Adam Marshall said that the release would provide greater recreational fishing opportunities for the region's anglers.

"With Malpas Dam back over 50 per cent, now is the perfect time to introduce these fish, which were broodstock from the Dutton Trout Hatchery at Ebor, into their new home," Mr Marshall said.

"The State's fisheries experts have chosen to stock Malpas Dam because it offers the best environment for these fish to grow; they are already too big for predators like Redfin to prey on, so this is an ideal location, right in our own backyard.

"For keen anglers this release offers a golden opportunity to make a trophy catch, with a number of the fish around 70 centimetres in length.

"Throughout the year fishing groups like the Guyra Angler's Club hold competitions on the banks of Malpas

Dam, drawing visitors to the area and providing a financial boost to the Black Mountain and Guyra economies.

"This release will hopefully encourage more of those events and is a boost to anglers who have been unable to pursue their passion in recent times due to drought and dwindling water supplies.

The Dutton Trout Hatchery produces more than 1.6 million trout each year – around 1.3 million Rainbow Trout and 300,000 Brown Trout fry and fingerlings.

Recreational fishers are reminded that they are required to carry a NSW current recreational fishing fee receipt at all times while fishing.

Recreational fishers are encouraged to use the NSW Recreational Fishing Guide, available from DPI Fisheries Offices, most tackle shops. It is also available online at www.fisheries.nsw.gov.au

# Scammers targeting the region

Residents of New England are being warned not to fall for financial scams operating in the region.

New England Police District have received complaints in recent weeks of scams which have the potential to defraud residents of vast sums of money.

Residents should be wary of emails, faxes, SMS and phone calls purporting to be from local police and or the Australian Tax Office (ATO).

Inspector Matt Hemsworth said that recent calls have included persons claiming to be officers from Armidale Police Station and requesting personal details from potential victims due to tax issues.

'These scams are designed to scare you into thinking you are in trouble and must act quickly to avoid to fines, charges or loss of funds," Inspector Hemsworth said.

"Don't be fooled into paying money or providing personal information. Hang up and contact police, the ATO direct or via your tax agent."

Residents should be reminded that neither the local police or ATO will ever:

• threaten you with immediate arrest

• ask you to pay money to receive a refund or payment from us

• ask you to pay a debt via iTunes vouchers, or pre-paid credit card or store gift cards

• ask you to provide personal information, such as your tax file number (TFN) or credit card number, via email or SMS ask you to pay money into a personal bank account
direct you to download

files from the internet, or open attachments in unsolicited emails.

There are a number of ways to protect yourself from scams which residents should employ:

• NEVER send money, or give credit card or online account details to anyone you do not know and trust

• Do not give out your personal, credit card or online account details over the phone unless you made the call and the phone number came from a trusted source

• Do not open suspicious or unsolicited emails (spam): delete them

• Do not click on any links in a spam email, or open any

files attached to them

• Never call a telephone number that you see in a spam email or text message

• If you want to access an internet account website, use a bookmarked link or type the address in yourself: NEVER follow a link in an email

• Check the website address carefully - scammers often set up fake websites with very similar addresses

• Never enter your personal, credit card or online account information on a website that you are not certain is genuine

• Never send your personal, credit card or online account details through an email or text message

Tom Eggleston was born in Newcastle. For some years before coming to Guyra he was the accountant at the Imperial Hotel Inverell and later at Tattersall's Hotel Glen Innes. In 1906 Mr and Mrs Eggleston settled in Guyra they opened were ล newsagency in the premises then owned by Mr.T McGovern (about were Kirks Bottle shop is to day). A few years later the Eggleston's moved the newsagency across the road (to were Job's Australia is now located) while they built their new shop next door to Helyer's Bakers (Regional Australia Bank). Later they built their residence across the street from their newsagency

Tom Eggleston died in 1945. During his 40 years of residence in Guyra he took a keen interest in the affairs of the town and dis-

trict. Mr Eggleston was a member of the Masonic Lodge, the G.U.I.O.O.F, P&C Association and a member of Saint James'

Anglican Parochial Council.

After his death his wife and son Jack carried on the business. Jack sold the newsagency to a Warren Pynt. The business was then sold to Dave and Helen Bearup.

# Cattle stolen from Ben Lomond stock route

The Rural Crime Prevention Team at Inverell are currently investigating the disappearance of 10 mixed breed cows from a Stock Route on the New England Highway at Ben Lomond.

The cattle were counted and placed in the Nest Stock Route on the New England Highway, Ben Lomond in March 2020. On July 20th the stock were mustered and counted during drenching. At this time the loss was identified.

The cattle which are missing are described as 4 to 5-year-old cows heavy in calf. They are a mixture of breeds including Angus, Shorthorn and Charolais. The cattle are black -(Angus), cream – (Charolais), red and roan – (Shorthorn), in colour. The cattle have a hook shaped ear mark in the top middle of the offside ear and are all fitted with NLIS buttons commencing with the PIC number NA251602. Some have various coloured management tags in their ears.

Investigators from the Rural Crime Prevention Team at Inverell are keen to speak with any person who may be able to assist with any information in relation to the missing cattle or any person who has been

sighted acting suspiciously in or around the Nest Stock Route on the New England Highway at Ben Lomond.

Investigators encourage all persons to report stock theft promptly even small numbers of stock.

### Guyra Sheep & lamb Sale

July 22nd - A very good quality penning of 3,010 lambs along with an increased supply of sheep at 1,010.

Heavy and extra heavy weight lambs made up the bulk of the lamb offering in what was as good a quality offering this season.

All the regular processors were in attendance and in a reflection of the condition, there were very few suitable to restockers.

Market trends varied with strong processor demand for lightweights resulting in a firm to slightly dearer trend for those under 20kg dressed. With the exception of the heaviest weight class market trends were again cheaper, down \$6 to \$14/head.

The heaviest weight class recovered some of the losses from the previous sale, weight increases and quality contributing to the higher prices.

Strong demand for light weight sheep and a vast improvement in quality contributed to dearer trends in the sheep market. The increased supply helped with all processors able to compete.

### Armidale Cattle Sale

July 23rd - There was a reduced penning of 415 head as last season's production stocks wind down and producers look ahead to the upcoming change in season. Light weight yearlings transitioning from vealer status were well supplied.

Both quality and condition through all categories showed quite a bit of variation. There was a fair supply of well finished cattle. The regular processors were in attendance, however there was a reduced presence of feedlot orders.

Restockers were again active showing a preference for lighter weights. The high restocker demand for light weight young cattle resulted in dearer trends of up to 8c/kg on steers. There were premiums paid based on the colour of the coat. The heifer portion followed a similar trend. There were large price changes also based on the transitioning. The reduced competition for heavier feeder cattle saw medium and heavy weights sell to cheaper trends of as much as 20c/kg on both steers and heifers. Well finished trade heifer yearlings sold to cheaper trends also. Heavy grown steers sold to a slightly cheaper trend, as did the grown heifers to process. There were discounts applied to those heifers carrying 6 teeth. The cow market saw a firm to slightly cheaper trend. Bulls attracted strong competition to sell to a dearer trend.
