Hub expansion taking shape

An expansion of The Hub at Guyra took shape last week, with the arrival and installation of the modular additions. Armidale Regional Council is tripling the size of The Hub building and upgrading its facilities, after receiving a \$400,000 grant through the State Government's Stronger Country Communities Fund.

Interim Administrator, Viv May, last Friday inspected progress at the Council-owned facility, with the Member for Northern Tablelands, Adam Marshall, representatives of The Hub and Armidale-based modular building company Uniplan Group, which has been contracted to construct the upgrade.

"Seeing the extension physically coming together on site, all in a matter of days, certainly adds to the excitement of having a larger and more purpose-built facility for the neighbourhood centre," Mr May said.

"The additional office space, consulting rooms and improved amenities will improve locals' access to a variety of im-

portant community services.

"It will significantly enhance conditions for staff and volunteers and make it a much more welcoming building for the many people the service assists."

The rear section of the original building was recently de-

molished to make way for the new addition, which was transported by trucks in three prefabricated sections last week.

Uniplan connected the modules last week and will be onsite for another fortnight to complete installation.

Subcontractors will connect

water, electricity and sewerage services and a separate contractor will construct a new entry foyer and access ramp. The whole project is scheduled to be completed next month, with an official opening expected to be held in October.



"You are no doubt aware of the abject failure of the Armidale Regional Council, which is now in the hands of Administrator, Mr. Viv May appointed by the Minister for Local Government, Shelley Hancock. This eventuality is in direct contrast to the fairytale scenario purported in the lead up to, and immediately prior to, the forced amalgamation of Guyra Shire Council into the Armidale Council. That merger was promised to achieve greater efficiencies, better services and even more benefits

We feel, the act of amalgamation, has led to a disastrous situation for Guyra people.

This is a scenario which we never asked for, never wanted, and which we knew would never work (and hasn't!). We believe enough is enough!!!

To deal with the consequences of our claim of reduced services, higher costs, lower efficiencies, and lower employment for locals, our Committee is presently refining several proposals for the full separation of Guyra and District from the failed experiment that is Armidale Regional Council. Our process is ongoing, professional, informed and vigorous. Our vision is to create a Rural Council on the front foot and this will be achieved by insisting on a full reparation package including:

1. A complete complement of plant and machinery required to operate our Council.

- 2. The return of or funds to replace all assets stripped by Armidale Regional Council from Guyra Shire Council over the course of the amalgamation since 2016.
- 3. The credit of all former Guyra Shire Council funds which disappeared into the Armidale Regional Council honeypot during this dark time.
- 4. Shire boundaries two broad proposals are being examined:
- a) The first being the return of the former Guyra Shire Council lands (less the Tingha section excised to Inverell Shire Council), and that area would be atoned for, by a readjustment of the boundary whereby commonsense alterations are made with the former Dumaresq Shire lands to create a workable, sustainable Shire area of at least the same population equivalents and an area of 4381 square km.

OR

b) Secondly the full return of all of the former Guyra Shire Council lands being 4300 square km. including the Tingha section which was excised and attached to Inverell Shire Council.

We strongly feel that either way, the new Rural Council must be a viable, efficient and an effective Shire Council of great strength, which will resist any future threats either by fair or foul means.

Meeting backs new Rural Council

Interested rural residents filled the room at the Ebor Showground on Monday August 10th to hear and discuss plans to progress a vision to create a new rural council separate from the area of Armidale Regional Council.

Organisers say that the meeting, which was conducted in a COVID safe way, gave full support to proceeding with the formation of a Rural Council.

The push to establish the new council area comes from a group of rural residents who are disillusioned with the outcome of the forced amalgamation.

Previously operating as Guyra Anti Council Amalgamation - ANTY" and "SAVE and GROW Guyra" they are no longer calling for deamalgamation and are instead pushing ahead with plans for the formation of a completely new council.

The group is made up of rural people who are working through the appropriate steps to realise the concept of a return to a rural based council.

They say that the legislative process is clear and that they are now assessing in principle support for the concept, which will in turn lead to a fully costed submission being prepared. The submission must be presented to the Minister for Local Government for referral to the Boundaries Commission.

They have outlined their intentions in an open letter


addressed to 'Guyra Residents'. (see page 2).

Community survey for learning centre design

Community members are being invited to provide their input to the designs of a new Guyra Early Childhood Learning Centre, with a public survey launched today.

The survey, open until Sunday 30 August, enables community members to give feedback on various aspects of the proposed building design, the outdoor play area and other landscaping at the Bradley Street site.

The new Early Childhood Learning Centre, supported by funding from the Federal Government, will enhance the Guyra Preschool and Long Day Care Centre's services to the community, by providing a purpose-built, modern and safe building and playground.

Council's Director — Businesses & Services, Scot Mac-Donald, said while the concepts for the building and surrounds have been designed in line with best-practice building and education industry standards, there are some opportunities for public input to the finalised designs.

"We are inviting input on details such as the building's internal fit-out, the playground layout, educational elements,

sustainability, colour schemes and cultural aspects," Mr Mac-Donald said.

Visit Council's Your Say Armidale website to complete the survey. Printed copies will be available to collect from the Guyra and Armidale libraries and Council's Civic Administration Buildings in Guyra and Armidale.

A community information session will be held in Bradley Street, outside Kirks IGA, on Monday 17 August to coincide with the survey.

Community members will be able to visit the information stall any time between 2.30pm and 4.30pm to find out more about the project and ask questions.

"It will be a good opportunity to get further information to help complete the survey," he said.

The new facility will increase the Guyra Preschool and Long Day Care Centre's capacity to 58 long day care and preschool places and 30 before and after school care

and vacation care places. The added capacity will increase the number of families that can benefit from the service and boost the service's financial viability.

Its location in the heart of Guyra will help activate the central business district, improve the Centre's connectivity with other resources and reinforce a cultural and community nucleus in Bradley Street, including the Guyra Library and The Hub neighbourhood centre.

NAB changes opening hours

From next week, customers will need to get in early if they want to access face to face banking at the local branch of the National Australia Bank. The bank is adapting the way it does banking in small regional branches, and under the new model will adjust opening hours across 114 smaller regional branches including Guyra.

From Monday August 17th opening hours at the Guyra branch will be from 9.30am to 12.30pm. The current opening days, which are Monday, Wednesday and Friday, will not change.

NAB Group Executive Personal Banking Rachel Slade said that outside of these hours the bankers would support customers by phone and

online chat, as well as application processing.

More than 90% of NAB's customer interactions are now taking place online or by phone, and more than half of their customers log onto NAB banking via the app or online each month.

Over-the-counter transactions are declining steadily and have reduced by a quarter in the past year.

"It is clear the face of banking is changing, especially in the way customers want to interact with us," Ms Slade said.

"Our branches continue to be a really important part of many local communities, especially for local businesses. On average a quarter of transactions take place between 9.30am and 10.30am in our regional branches."

"Through this new model we can continue to be there to serve our customers and have meaningful conversations while also adapting to the way our customers are now banking.

"We think this move will strike that balance, keeping the doors open at 114 branches around the country, providing the opportunity for around 300 bankers to learn skills while we continue to serve our customers well."

NAB will provide its bankers at these branches with the training and tools required to support customers across phone and online chat and support them through the changes.

The night will begin with ratification of the constitution and election of officers, then we will be showing a selection of unique Australian short films of various genres.





Rural Market Reports

Spark remains strong for Geoff Thrift

At 73-years-old Geoff Thrift isn't thinking about retiring anytime soon. Geoff began his career as an electrician 56 years ago and thanks to the variety of work is still 'learning very day'.

Geoff and his wife Anne own and operate CT Electric, which plays a key role in the day-to-day operations at the Costa Tomato Glasshouses in Guyra.

He first worked with Costa during the construction of the first stage of the glasshouses.

"It was our first major contract and at that stage the business was just myself and two employees," Geoff said. "At that time people didn't believe you could grow tomatoes in such a cold climate, but we were thinking of the backyard glasshouse. It was a really massive eye opener to see the Costa operation."

Since then, Geoff has won a further five contracts for the construction of the new glasshouses and ongoing servicing which has enabled him to grow his business and take on new employees.

"We are local and that is one of the reasons we were selected. We can guarantee 24 hour a day service. We now have five permanent employees including two apprentices, who are both local Guyra boys."

Geoff said one of the real benefits of working with a large company such as

Costa was the experience it provided for his staff.

"The training opportunities are unreal. The work is so much more advanced and the younger blokes are really benefiting from that experience. They would not normally have that opportunity in a rural electrical business.

"I have been in Guyra all my life and learnt my trade here, but I am also learning something new every day, not only electrical but what the growers are doing. I've got no plans yet to just sit down and read a book."

Guyra Sheep & lamb Sale

August 5th - Numbers reduced considerably to 1,100 lambs and 150 grown sheep. The offering presented a selection of well finished heavy and extra heavy lambs, as well as a good penning of trade types. All the

regular buyers attended to a subdued market for all classes.

There was one pen of new season lambs. Light lambs to the processor saw cheaper trends of \$23, with trade lambs selling to a cheaper trend of \$16 to

\$18/head. Heavy lambs sold to subdued trends of \$18/head. Extra heavy lambs saw cheaper trends, back \$20/head.

An isolated pen of heavy cross bred ewe lambs sold to restocker interest at \$182/head. Not a good number of sheep for a reliable quote, except to report that processors operated to cheaper trends. The ram category penned saw an increase in numbers.

Armidale Cattle Sale

August 6th - 300 mixed cattle were yarded down 115 on previous sale. There was very good selection of heavy, well finished cows, along with a variation in quality of the young cattle penned.

Restockers competed on these categories to see a cheaper trend emerge. Feeders saw a mostly dearer trend and there were a quite a few heavy grown heifers available. All the regular processors were present, with one exception.

Limited supplies of light young steers saw a cheaper trend except for the very light, plain drafts, up 14c/kg from two weeks ago. The medium weights to feed sold to dearer trends, up 30c/kg. An isolated sale of some good quality light

heifers to do a designated feeder job sold to a substantial rise. Other restocker drafts sold to a cheaper trend, back 22c/kg. The medium feeder heifers sold to a marginally cheaper trend. Trade heifers were dearer by 18 to 21c/kg. No numbers of grown steers to quote, however, grown heifers sold to dearer trends of 35c/kg.

A lift in both quality and weight through the cow sale saw dearer trends prevail. Store competition saw that category rise 33c/kg. Medium weight D3 cows rose 17c, with the heavy D3 and D4 types seeing dearer trends of 10c to 14c/kg. An improved bull penning saw a rise of 14c/kg.

Weekly Wool Sales

August 7th - Australian wool sales resumed this week after the annual three week recess. Historically the first sale back after this midyear recess results in a back log of wool waiting to be sold. This generally creates one of the larger offerings of the season.

The market opened nervously on Tuesday and by the day's close the Eastern Market Indicator had shed just over 100 cents. The decline continued on Wednesday but not at the rapid rate seen on the opening day. On average most Merino micron indicators fell 150 cents for the week. Cardings and Skirtings also

declined by around 10% for the week. The fall in the market pushed the passed in rate up over 30% resulting in fewer than 30,000 bales being sold from the 42,000 bale national offering.

Major buyers included Tianyu, Techwool & Endeavour Wool. Next week's national offering drops in size considerably, hopefully returning some sort of clam to the market. AWTA test data for July shows a 14.4% decline in the weight of wool tested nationally. The National Wool Production Forecasting Committee meets next week to update the 2020-21 season estimate.














The Terrible Twosome have extended their command of the Locals Leaderboard with a lead of 4 points over From the Desk and Bulldog, 147-143.

Water is life!

Hi Guyra, it's Rattling Owl I endeavour to alleviate our regions water concerns over the coming weeks with information and diagrams that are easy to implement on any scale. I have training in the following areas:

*Rehydrating the Australian landscape (Peter and Stuart Andrews)

*Permaculture Design (Geoff Lawton)

*Organic farming

*Soil food web- Soil Organisms and Compost (Elaine Ingham)

*Biodynamics and Bio-fertilisers

My education over the last 20 years has taught me how we absolutely can say goodbye to soil compaction, repair our soil naturally to make it fertile and friable without expensive inputs, save a load of money, improve our pastures and crops, improve our livestock health, build community resilience, grow a garden easily, rehydrate our landscape, hold water in our soil, have clean perpetually flowing creeks and recharge our aquifers.

Over the coming weeks I will share information and diagrams with you that can be easily understood and easily implemented whilst working towards a drought proofed community with an abundance of water for all.

Soil food web

As the first topic in this column let me introduce vou to the Soil Food Web. The soil food web is the number one. most crucial thing to understand for future water security. A vast diversity of organisms in the soil make up the soil food web. Organisms eat and excrete nutrition for plants in a plant available form. Bacteria and fungi create the glues and slime layers that form soil aggregates and are what naturally keeps soil open and friable. When the soil food web is functioning with bacteria, fungi, protozoa and

beneficial nematodes which are all required for nutrient cycling, we don't need to spend money on artificial fertiliser. A healthy soil food web feeds your plants for free and absorbs, holds and sinks water which mitigates flooding, mitigates drought, reduces fire risks, recharges our aquifers, sequesters carbon and guarantees clear flowing perpetual creeks. Organisms decompose plant and tree litter, manure and pesticides preventing them from leaching into our waterways and becoming pollutants. Soil organisms fix and store nitrogen and other nutrients that your plants require. Organisms prey upon crop pests and are food for above ground animals. All plants, shrubs, grasses and trees rely upon a healthy diverse and active soil food web to thrive.

Have you ever tested your soil for organisms? If not you are really missing out!

If your soil is hard and compacted there is no doubt you have important nutrient cycling organisms missing and the good news is you can put them back into the soil yourself. When you put the missing organisms back into your soil you will be rewarded with water infiltration, friable soil, healthy plants, no soil erosion, money in your pocket normally spent on fertilizer, up to 200% increase in crop growth, less vet bills, drought resilience and pest and disease resilience. If we focus on the soil as a gardener, a farmer, a region, a nation we also halt climate change. How great is that!

You can test the soil yourself to see if you are missing vital organisms. This is a way to do that.

Grab a straight stick, a piece of wire, a metal rod or a soil penetrometer. Push it into the soil as far as you can.

When it will go no further measure the length that went into the ground and write it down. That is where your compaction layer is and where disease-causing organisms live, the water cannot penetrate below that point to recharge aquifers.

Next week I will give information on how to return the crucial soil organisms back into the Earth and open the compaction layer to let the earth breathe and rehydrate.

Enjoy your week and give a bit of thought to the soil beneath your feet.
