Mural brings walls to life

A collaborative artwork by James Warren and Tony Amaral now graces the walls of the Australian Poetry Hall of Fame. The colourful work encompasses a corner position in the building and James said he hopes that it will provide inspiration for others.

Tony is an artist who is usually based in Dili, Timor-Leste, however is currently living in Guyra with his partner Lizzie.

He studied art in his home country and also won a scholarship to study fine arts in Sydney. Tony has a large body of work in his home country including commissions in a number of government buidings. He has also exhibited his work both in Timor-Leste and in Australia.

James said that he always wanted to have beautiful art work in the building and he was excited to be able to work

with Tony to add this first mural.

He also wants to encourage more colour throughout the town and inspire people in Guyra to do something similar on a spare wall.

The design includes a koala because it is part of the mission statement of the Australian Poetry Hall of Fame to help replant native forests.

Cockatoos are included in the design because they represent Guyra and the blue represents water which is important to life.

James and Tony worked together to bring the vision to life. The work was completed over three days with around 16hrs in total time to complete, and took around \$200 worth of paint.

If anyone has a wall that they want to do something similar on he would be more than happy to discuss the possibilities which he says are 'endless'.

HealthWISE has long supported mental health in the community and offers a

range of services across the region, including mental health clinicians, lived experience, Aboriginal outreach, drought and bushfire relief.

HealthWISE Senior Mental Health Clinician Anne Galloway said that the words 'Are you ok?' were simple, but could have a farreaching effect for those struggling with mental illness, contemplating suicide or working through grief.

She acknowledged that it can be difficult to know how to react when someone tells you that they are not ok, which is why coffee drinkers were offered information on Mind Health.

Funded by the Hunter New England and Central Coast PHN, locals can call 1300 029 131 or visit mindhealth.org.au to access free professional counselling. It allows more focused intervention as participants can access the same counsellor for multiple sessions.







Trampolines added to new playground

Cost-savings during the construction period of the Curtis Park Playground have allowed Armidale Regional Council to incorporate two trampolines in the playground layout, which is steadily taking shape.

Trampolines were one of the items that ranked in the top four when Council conducted a survey in June inviting the community to rank a short-list of play equipment that could be added to the playground if budget allowed.

Two other top-four-ranked items, a Bushwood Balance Trail and Tropicana Bungalow, were previously added to the layout in July, when final stages of planning identified cost-efficiencies in the project.

Council has engaged Moduplay to design, construct and install the new playground, after receiving \$999,700 in State Government funding for the project.

Contractors have finished constructing several items of play equipment and the feature items, including the SkyTower and Skyrider, have finishing touches to add once landscaping and the installation of surfaces have reached a certain stage.

The playground is expected to open in October.




Merino ewes missing

The Rural Crime Prevention Team at Inverell are currently investigating the disappearance of 22 Merino ewes from a paddock on the Baldersleigh Road at Guyra.

The sheep which are missing are described as 22 Merino ewes either 2016 drop or 2017 drop, all in full wool and heavy in lamb. They would be lambing now. The sheep had either white or black coloured ear tags with PIC number NA025488 or NG023969 on them. The sheep have an ear mark of a diagonal slash out of the bottom and top of the near side ear, as per attached photograph.

It is believed the sheep went missing in the weeks leading up to 26 August 2020.

Investigators from the Rural Crime Prevention Team at Inverell are keen to speak with any person who may be able to assist with any information in relation to the missing sheep or



any person who has been sighted acting suspiciously in or around the Baldersleigh Road west of Guyra.

Investigators encourage all persons to report stock theft promptly even small numbers of stock.

Don't let the dogs out

As shelters and pet shops around the state empty with dog sales and adoptions surging in the wake of coronavirus lockdowns, Essential Energy is asking dog owners to help keep workers safe by advising if they have any dogs that might pose a threat to our electricity meter readers.

Analysis by Essential Energy of the past three years has shown an increasing trend of incidents involving a dog, with 63% of dog attacks in the 2019 financial year causing an injury. The data also shows that these attacks tend to be more frequent at the beginning of Spring, with two dog attacks already occurring in September 2020. In one case, the victim required medical treatment for a bite.

If a potentially dangerous dog is on a property and safe unhindered access is not guaranteed, meter reading contractors will avoid entering the property to ensure their own safety and the safety of the home or business owner. As a result, that property will receive a bill based on estimated electricity usage.

Town locations make up nearly half of the potentially dangerous dog locations, however regardless of the location, they ask all dog owners to do the right thing and let them know if it is safer for meter readers to avoid your property.

Dog owners should also not assume that it's only large dogs either, meter readers have experienced attacks by aggressive smaller breeds in the past as well.

Guyra Sheep & lamb Sale

September 16th - There was a small reduction in lamb numbers to 1,700 while sheep supply remained the same at 500.

The quality of the lambs was predominantly good with heavy and extra heavy weights well supplied. There were two pens of lambs possibly the heaviest offered at this centre, estimated

to dress well in excess of 40kg. The regular processors were in attendance with increased demand. Once again ewe lambs attracted premiums of \$10 to \$15 per head as producers work to increase breeding numbers.

Market trends were generally dearer through the lamb market. Trade lambs up to 22kg dressed

improved by \$11 to \$13 per head. Both quality and condition played a role in price variation.

Heavy weight lambs to both the domestic and export markets saw dearer trends of \$5 to \$7 per head on those up to 30kg dressed. The extra heavy weight lams saw improvement of as much \$19 per head, with the heaviest weights showing the bottom end of the carcase price range. There were some well finished sheep penned, along with some plainer condition young Merino sheep. Processor demand increased and there was some restocker competition on those younger sheep. Market trends were firm to dearer.

Armidale Cattle Sale

September 17th - There was an increase in numbers with yearlings well supplied. There were increased supplies of grown cattle.

Rural Market Reports

The quality of the offering was fair to good, with some well-bred young cattle alongside some secondary quality older cattle. The condition of the offering also varied with a good percentage showing a higher level of finish.

The usual buyers were in attendance along with a good restocker presence. Not all export processors operated. There was quality related price change on a firm to dearer market trend for yearling steers in all weight classes.

Light weight yearling heifers to restock and feed sold on a firm to

dearer market trend with breed and quality accounting for a large price change. Limited supplies of heavier weights, with no market comparison. There was good supply of grown steers suitable to feed, again no market comparison from the previous sale.

Well finished grown heifers to process sold to a slightly cheaper trend. There were limited numbers of heavy weight cows penned. Despite limited processor competition, demand was high from those participating. This resulted in dearer trends throughout. With the same processors operating the bull market recovered all of the previous sales losses to record a dearer trend of as much as 50c/kg.

Weekly Wool Sales

September 18th - The market managed to defy the odds this week with most thinking it would open cheaper based on falls during the final selling day of last week. In fact, we were treated to the first consecutive weekly rises since late May and the largest weekly rise percentage wise since September last

Gains were made over both selling days and in a positive sign for next week the Western region selling after the East coast had closed recorded some of the largest increases for the week. 24,702 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 5.9%.

Major buyers included Techwool, Lempriere and PJ Morris. With a designated Superfine sale scheduled for Sydney next week it was also heartening to see some of the better style, higher yielding types back in solid demand. Skirtings and Cardings also followed the Fleece types

Forward market prices have tracked the physical up with some near month contracts changing hands at levels around this week's physical close. It's too early to suggest that this will turn into a sustained recovery but it does present an opportunity for the large volume of wool being held across the country.

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
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Men's Bowls
