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Inquiry into dysfunction

Interim Administrator Viv May has submitted a report to the Minister for Local Government Shelley Hancock recommending a Public Inquiry under s438U of the Act into Armidale Regional Council (ARC) be held and a review of the Councillor structure following community consultation.

Mr May announced his recommendations at last week's Council Meeting in Guyra delivering an Interim Administrator Minute outlining his observations as to what led to his appointment as Interim Administrator of ARC.

He said that it is clear that significant work needs to be done to restore the proper and effective functioning of the council which has failed the community it was meant to serve.

Among the observations he outlined was the position of suspended councillors who

believed the result of the widely reported court case had brought dysfunction to an end.

He said that he believed "the court case was simply a further example of how the toxic culture among Councillors of ARC was playing out." Mr May also said that the dysfunction and disarray has not helped with the completion of the merger and that "unfortunately many residents of the former Guyra Shire Council do not understand the poor state of their former Council's finances and are using the suspension to further their desire for demerger".

In accordance with his statutory obligations the Interim Administrator was required to submit a report to the Minister for Local Government no less than 14 days before the end of the initial period of suspension of Coun-


cillors. The Act requires the Interim Administrator include in his report any recommendations in relation to improving or restoring the proper and effective functioning of Council.

"I advised the Minister

that in my view the community has lost trust in their elected representatives and staff are confused and demoralised by a lack of leadership and direction and political infighting," said Mr May


"I have had the opportunity of hearing wide ranging and varied opinions of what led to the suspension of ARC. There was a consistent theme that deep divisions existed and that Council was not providing a proper and safe place of work for its staff.

"ARC in my view has failed its community and needs a fresh start that focuses on the fundamentals of sound local government. This will ensure that ARC will be an effective and well respected Council into the future and take its rightful place as the lead Council in the New England region."

Stepping up to the challenge

Cheryl Garrett and Stella Engel will be hitting the streets during October for a cause that is close to both their hearts. They are taking part in the 'Feel the magic 1 in 20 challenge', supporting a cause that helped Stella through a challenging time in her life.

Feel the Magic is an Australian not for profit organisation whose purpose is to create a world where children who are experiencing grief are supported to reach their full potential. 1in 20 children will experience the loss of a parent before the age of 18, something Stella experienced in her own life. She lost both her parents within a short period of time - firstly her dad to cancer and then her mum in a car accident

Grieving children who have experienced the death of someone they love can feel isolated and alone. The mission of Feel the Magic is to create environments where children who are experiencing grief can be inspired and empowered to succeed in spite of their loss.

Stella said that attending a camp run by Feel the Magic made a big difference in her ability to cope through the

dark times. She remains in touch with the mentor who helped her during that time and along with grandmother Cheryl wanted to do something to help others who were facing a similar situation. The pair will be pulling on their shoes and will walk 120km during October to raise money for the organisation. They hope to raise a combined total of \$5000 to give back to the group so that others can also have the same opportunities.

They will be walking an average of 4kms a day around town and you can support their efforts via the 'Feel the Magic' website and follow the links.

Majority still want rural council

The announcement of an inquiry into the operations of Armidale Regional Council has only cemented views that the Save and Grow Guyra group have had since the amalgamation took place in 2016. Spokesperson for the group Gordon Youman said that he is not surprised at last week's announcement.

"If you look at Armidale's track record this has occurred over and over again," he said.

"Putting a Council that

was functioning with a Council that was not functioning and hasn't functioned properly for years was never going to work.

"Armidale are broke, broke, broke, and they are dragging Guyra down with them."

Administrator Viv May said in his minute to last week's meeting that Guyra Shire Council's finances were in a poor state, however Mr Youman disputed this as well as the inference that his group represented only a few

people in the community.

"We believe that with a proposed 21% rate rise Guyra Shire Council would have been in a substantial position and that by now they could have been in a much better position," he said.

"Our group represents the majority of people from the former council area and we have widespread support."

He said that they will continue to work for a complete separation of Guyra and for its restoration as a rural council for rural people, which he believes is the only way to ensure that Guyra and the surrounding rural areas will be able to survive and thrive into the future.

"The failure of the amalgamation has cemented what we thought would happen," he said.

"Business losses and staff losses have seen money drained out of the community and we believe if we can get back our autonomy things will start to turn around."

Learning centre plans go on public display

A new purpose-built and larger Guyra Early Childhood Learning Centre (ECLC) is now a step closer with the approval of the site for the facility. Last Wednesday's meeting of Armidale Regional Council endorsed the site behind Council's Guyra administration building, clearing the way for a development application for the facility to be publically advertised for a period of 28 days.

The new facility will enable the ECLC to double its maximum number of enrolments, to 58 places in the Long Day Care and Preschool centre and 30 places for before and after school care and vacation care.

Council's Interim Administrator, Viv May, said that will increase the number of local families that can access the centre's services and strengthen its long-term financial viability.

"Locating the ECLC at that

site will be central to creating an educational and community hub in the centre of Guyra, complementing the library, Council's Civic Administration Building and The Hub community centre," Mr May said.

The resolution endorsed a recommendation to locate the ECLC building at the north of the site, to maximise natural light in the building, minimise energy consumption, locate outdoor play areas away from residential dwellings and minimise noise impacts. The decision also endorsed traffic access to and from the facility from Moredun Street.

"After conducting a preliminary traffic study and liaising with neighbouring residents and businesses, access from Moredun Street was recommended as the best option," Mr May said.

"That will enable to centre's drop-off bay to be lo-

cated in the centre of the site, next to the building, to assist with traffic flows and keep children away from the road."

A more detailed traffic study would be undertaken to help finalise the site design and identify recommended road modifications to further assist traffic flows and road safety.

Community input has been instrumental in guiding the centre's design so far, with results from stakeholder engagement and a public survey included in the Council meeting report. The survey, conducted in August, invited residents to provide feedback on the design of the building, its playground and layout of the site. The survey results are available to view on the Guyra Early Childhood Learning Centre page of Council's Your Say Armidale website.



Planning milestone for proposed wind farm

The proposed Rangoon Wind Farm near Ben Lomond and Glencoe has been issued their Secretary's Environmental Assessment Requirements (SEARS). The SEARS outline the matters required by the NSW Department of Planning, Industry and Environment to be assessed in the project Environmental Assessment report.

Meridian Energy Australia (MEA) is behind the \$200 million wind farm. The Rangoon Wind Farm (RWF) project is divided into two locations being RWF North and RWF South. The company is planning to construct 23 to 26 wind turbines, two substations and transmission, a Battery En-

ergy Storage System and associated infrastructure.

Over the next 6 – 8 months the company will work with specialist subconsultants and the community to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the Project, which is expected to be lodged with the NSW Department of Planning, Industry and Environment in 2021.

Head of asset development, Angus Holcombe said that receipt of SEARs is a positive planning milestone for the Project.

"It is exciting to see the project reach the milestone and we would like to thank the community and stakeholders for the valuable feedback that as-

sisted greatly with this phase and refining the proposal," Mr Holcombe said.

Mr Holcombe said that they have undertaken community consultations since early last year to engage with the local community and stakeholders and will be looking to further engage with the community as the project moves forward.

He said that COVID safe face to face meetings have already been held with affected landholders and they have reached out to people within five kilometre radius of the proposed site.

"I recognise that people will have concerns and we are more than happy to take calls and meet with people," Mr Holcombe said. "We have our website up and running and a community newsletter has gone out advising the status and details of proposal."

Foundation for Rural & Regional Renewal

"Consultations are still in the early days and there will be plenty of opportunity for people to engage as the project moves forward. A community consultation committee is being established and members of community will be invited to participate. There will also be drop in centres set up in Glencoe and Ben Lomond."

Construction is expected to start in 2022.





Weekly Wool Sales

September 29th - The rises seen over the previous fortnight were not enough to inflate this week's national offering and with just 23,600 bales on offer the market made it three consecutive weeks of gains for the first time since the December-January period.

From the outset the market was dearer with 59 cents being added to the Northern region indicator on the first day. A further 34 cents was added on the final day of sales resulting in the largest weekly rise in twelve months.

22,641 bales were sold nationally for the week with the rise in

prices resulting in a miserly 2.7% passed in rate (the seasons average is 13.5%). Major buyers included Techwool, Endeavour Wool and Lempriere. A sharp dip in the Aussie dollar against the US this week appears to have somewhat helped proceedings with the Eastern Market Indicator's 99 cent rise in local currency translating to only a 53 cent rise in US dollars.

Next week's expected national offering increases to in excess of 33,000 bales which is 10,000 more than this week. The additional quantity on offer will test the depth of demand in the current environment.
