Now is the time to act on separation

A push for the formation of a new council area, based in Guyra, is a now a distinct possibility according to the Rural Council for Rural People group.

Spokesperson Rob Lenehan said this week that MP Adam Marshall is now publicly backing a move from the group to apply for a separation of the Armidale Regional Council area.

"The mainly Guyra region group has been working on the preparation of a Submission to State Government for many months and has attracted huge support from rate payers and communities right across the whole Armidale Regional Council area," Mr Lenehan said.

"There is no doubt the forced amalgamation of Guyra and Armidale/Dumaresq Councils some four years ago has been a complete and absolute failure.

"Despite having been placed in administration three times in this period, nothing has been achieved with devastating effects on regional ratepayers and communities - we have lost our democratic right to

control our own destiny."

The group recently met with Adam Marshall MP to show him the new proposed Local Government area.

"He decided it had enough area and population with existing infrastructure, such as chambers and depot, to be a viable proposition," Mr Lenehan said.

"He has made a commitment to assist in the preparation of a Submission to the Office of Local Government, including recommending for the Minister for Local Government Shelley Hancock to hand it on

to the State Government Boundaries Commission for their determination."

A Petition is required to begin the process of separation and subsequent presentation of a Submission.

More details will be available to residents for signing in the coming weeks. Signatories must be on the electoral roll.

"Now is the time to act decisively and stridently to reverse the undemocratic process of forced amalgamations," Mr Lenehan concluded.

Come along and support the cause, have a great meal - or at least a drink, and hopefully take home a meat tray.



'Stock Dog Challenge' coming to Guyra

Cattle and sheep are the backbone of the New England farming enterprises, however, where would they be without working stock dogs?

Stock handlers, who depend on dogs for their livelihood, face the constant challenge of finding pups that will grow and develop into natural, all-round working dogs. A new trial format is making the job easier, by identifying the potential of parents for future pups.

Outstanding dogs will have the chance to prove themselves in the 'Stock Dog Challenge', run by the Australian Utility Stock Dog Society Inc. (AUSDS Inc.) on Saturday 10th and Sunday 11th April.

This unique trial tests the skills of 'utility' dogs – the all-round dogs that so many farmers really want – with a long searching cast, paddock obstacles and yard work with sheep, as well as obstacle work with cattle.

Mitch Bennett, and Lock Rogers, from 'Stratton', northwest of Guyra, are hosting the event. Mitch said he became interested in these trials because they test the value of what he expects his dogs to do on the property throughout the year.

"It's more about the dog's natural ability than the handler," Mitch said. "These events also give me, and others, the chance to see which dogs, both locally and from around the country, are going to be a good choice for breeding the dogs we want."

Rod Cavanagh, President of AUSDS Inc. said the Society's main aim is to improve the breeding of practical utility stock dogs, for working sheep and cattle.

"Our trial and judging process identifies the strengths and weaknesses in the dogs across the various sheep and cattle jobs," Mr Cavanagh said.

"We judge using a fair and transparent system for competitors with built-in feedback, including individual scores for every section of the trial, which is weighted towards the most important aspects of the high-class, utility working dogs.

"This gives people looking to breed with, or buy pups from those dogs, a clearer picture of the dog's skills so they can choose the dog that best suits their situation".

"Those who don't normally go in dog trials, but have these great all-rounders out on farms, are encouraged to enter. It's a genuine test for the dog, but we also make it easier than other trials with minimum disqualifications."

The Society ran two 'Stock Dog Challenges' in southern NSW and one in Victoria before the drought and COVID-19 pulled them up. The aim is to run these events regularly across Australia where suitable host properties are found. New England working dog handlers should not miss this opportunity to enter, or at least attend and watch what's involved.

Local Government elections to be held this September

Residents of the Armidale region are being reminded to save the date for the 2021 Local Government elections. On Saturday September 4, 2021, the community will be required to vote for eleven new Councillors to represent the region over a three year term. The Mayor and Deputy Mayor will then be elected by Council.

Armidale Regional Council's General Manager James Roncon is reminding everyone of the importance of taking part in the elections.

"Voting in the Local Government elections is compulsory for everyone living in the Armidale LGA," said Mr Roncon. "This is an opportunity for everyone to take action and have their say on important issues facing our community."

This year's election will be held in conjunction with an important constitutional referendum to determine whether the number of Councillors should be reduced.

"Council will be asking for every voter's say in whether there should be a reduction in the number of Councillors from eleven to nine in the future," said Mr Roncon. "The result of this won't take effect until 2024."

Mr Roncon is also reminding those who are passionate about making positive change in our community to consider nominating as a Councillor. "These elections are an opportunity to revitalise our region, and we are seeking a diverse range of dedicated and passionate residents to take action and represent our wonderful community," said Mr Roncon.

Nominations for candidates commence on 26 July 2021 and close at 12 noon on 4 August 2021.

Postal voting applications commence on 27 July 2021 and close at 5.00pm on 30 August 2021.

Pre-poll voting commences on 23 August 2021 and closes 3 September 2021.

Guyra Sheep & lamb Sale

March 10th - There was a yarding of 1258 lambs and 624 sheep, with numbers reduced by well over half from last sale.

There was a shortfall of well finished lambs and a good supply of new season store lambs. Trends through the lamb sale were mostly dearer, with a varied sheep market .All the regular buyers attended.

Light lambs to the restockers sold to firm trends for the most part, with the odd sale slightly cheaper. Restockers also showing a strong demand for plain conditioned young Merino lambs. Trade new season lambs sold to firm trends with the heavy drafts seeing a significant rise in values. Heavy weight trade old lambs rose \$12p/h, with extra heavy drafts up \$2p/h.

Less weight and quality saw heavy hoggets selling to a cheaper trend. Medium weight ewes crossbred ewes to restock sold to dearer trend, up \$30p/h.

xLimited numbers of heavy trade sheep sold to cheaper trends. Heavy crossbred wethers made \$170p/h, young wethers to \$147 and the ewe portion to restockers to \$142p/h.

Weekly Wool Sales

March 12th - It was this week 12 months ago that the early signs of a global pandemic translated to fear and panic for commodity prices.

Rural Market Reports

The Eastern market indicator slumped from 1562 to 858 over the following six months. Thoughts of a vaccine were "pie in the sky" and it was any ones guess of what the potential fallout would involve.

Fast forward 12 months and a recovery in wool prices is well under way. Leading the charge has been the better style finer types as the overall market has transitioned into a period of stability despite an additional 94,000 bales being offered compared to last season.

A 4 cent gain in the Northern region on the first day of sales was followed by a 7 cent fall in the Indicator with AWEX reporting a drop in the overall quality of this week's national offering.

42,155 bales were sold for the week with a passed in rate of 9.3%. Major buyers included

Techwool, Tianyu & Lempriere. In a positive sign for next week the Fremantle market closed the week on a strong note.

Next week's expected national offering has grown to over 53,000 bales and will be the largest for the season to date if they all materialise.

Under 14s go undefeated at Gala Day

Last Tuesday, GCS sent across 22 boys to partake in an under 14s and under 16s boys rugby league 9s Gala Day organised by the NRL in Inverell. The Under 16s Boys also played exceptionally well. In their first game they made at least ten unforced errors handing O'Connor Catholic College undeserved field positon. As a result they suffered one try to three defeat. The boys dusted themselves off and in the next game shocked Armidale Secondary College taking a two try to nil lead at half time. Unfortunately, the larger interchange rotation of the 'Super School' saw them grind a three tries to two lead late in the second half. However, Guyra's never say die attitude saw them score a near length of the field try with the ball going through at least ten sets of hands for Guyra to snatch a draw against heir much more fancied opposition. In the next two games, Guyra

got everything together and defeated McIntyre High and Inverell High. Archie Dowden and Brodie Campbell were outstanding for Guyra in all matches. Coach Jason Walker was full of praise for both teams.

"I wanted to see how the boys played together before I tried to mould them into any particular playing style," he said. "I am super impressed by the levels of skill and heart and am truly excited for the future of some of these boys."

"I would like to commend the work that obviously their club coaches have put in with these boys in the past and I look forward to forming a partnership with the Spuds so we can get these boys as far as possible in their football careers.

"I was also impressed with the boys who do not play club football at the moment and I hope that hey join a club for this upcoming season."

There is plenty of football coming up for the boys and Guyra should gain several representatives in the New England teams in the upcoming trials. The under 14s also play in a Buckley Shield Round 1 match vs Glen Innes High School which has to be played before the end of the term.
