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CWA State President visits

CWA State President, Stephanie Stanhope toured the Northern Tablelands area last week, stopping off at Guyra on (a very wet) Tuesday afternoon and evening. Stephanie met with the members of CWA Day Branch for afternoon tea and then with members of the Evening Branch for drinks in the evening.

She is in her second year of a three year term and believes that the most valuable way to hear the concerns of CWA members, and learn of the work they've been doing in their communities, is to travel and meet directly with members at their local branches. Stephanie and her family are dairy farmers from the Bega area who were very badly impacted by the bushfires of 2020.

Stephanie was very impressed with the strength of CWA in Guyra, considering that a small town like Guyra has two very active Branches.

The CWA of NSW has distributed just over \$18 million in drought relief, directly to farming families that have needed it the most. CWA is one of the very few organisations that don't take an administration fee out of donated money, meaning that

\$18 million was donated to CWA and \$18 million has been disbursed. CWA is one of the most well recognised and well respected organisations in Australia.

After being postponed last year, the association's annual State conference will be held in May this year at the State President's home town of Bega. Plans are also underway to celebrate the 100 year centenary since the formation of CWA in NSW in 2022.

Flash Flooding at Ben Lomond

Last week's rain event resulted in flash flooding at the War Memorial Hall in Ben Lomond. Don Stride from the Hall committee said that Ben Lomond recorded around 189mm over three days, with water overflowing into the building on Tuesday afternoon, March 23rd.

The extended heavy rain which fell on the already sodden ground overran the culvert opposite the hall, causing water to flow into the building. The main impact was to the recreation room at the side of the building which was flooded.

Mr Stride, who has lived in the village since 1979, said he drove through water around 1ft deep at the front of the hall and has not seen that happen before.

While some water did enter the memorial room at the front of the building, they are hoping there will be no permanent damage. Part of the new car park at the side of the building was also washed away.

Dams full and restrictions lifted

The Armidale region has moved out of water restrictions into permanent conservation after experiencing significant rainfall last week, which has resulted in full and overflowing dams. The upper reaches of the catchment north of Guyra received approximately 149mm of rainfall last week, and with the catchment already saturated the heavy rainfall quickly filled dams. It is the first time since January 2018 that Malpas Dam has reached 100 percent of capacity.

Armidale Regional Council Mayor Ian Tiley said he shares with everyone in the region the sense of relief knowing the water supply is full and overflowing.

"This is a time to celebrate this achievement and reflect on how tough it has been over the last two years battling devastating drought conditions," Cr Tiley said. "Now we can take a breath and congratulate the community on its achievements in water conservation."

Water management, including moving in and out of restrictions, is now reflected in the new Drought Management Plan that was adopted by

Council last month. When not in active water restrictions Council will now be referring to this as Permanent Conservation.

Residents will still be encouraged to practice sensible water conservation and work towards an average per person daily usage of 200 litres per day. The only other permanent change is that sprinklers cannot be used during the heat of the day due to evaporation.

"Permanent conservation is a widely used term across Australia for water utilities when not in active restrictions," said Cr Tiley said. "In the Armidale region we have always been able to use sprinklers and use water without any issues. But since the drought and the effects of climate change we cannot go back to those days and must be very aware of conserving water when we can. Water prices are also higher so increased usage will hit your back pocket as well."

Council's Drought Management Plan is on the Council website and further information on what permanent conservations means is also available.

Construction works notification for Bradley Street

Armidale Regional Council has engaged Stabilcorp to undertake road rehabilitation works on Bradley Street, Guyra.

Proposed works include the excavation and reconstruction of the existing road pavement in Bradley Street, between Mackenzie Street and Nincoola Street.

Works are scheduled to commence after Easter.

Pedestrian and traffic access arrangements along Bradley Street will be temporarily affected to facilitate construction works.

Temporary arrangements will include a 24-hour road closure of Bradley Street between Nincoola Street and Mackenzie Street intersections. Closure details are as follows:

- Traffic control and single lane road closure in place from Tuesday 6 April 2021 to undertake preliminary works.
- Full road closure in place from Monday 19 April 2021.
- Full road closure to be in effect for approximately three weeks, dependent on weather and site conditions
- A temporary 24-hour traffic detour will be in place for the duration of the work.
- Footpaths on both sides of Bradley Streett will remain open to facilitate pedestrian access to businesses at all times
- Pedestrian fencing will prevent pedestrians crossing through the worksite for the duration of the work.



\$10,000 grant to plant Memorial Avenue

The Guyra Garden Club has received a \$10,000 grant from the Fire Fight Australia Fund through the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal — Strengthening Rural Communities grant program.

With these funds the Guyra Garden Club will plant a service men and women's Memorial Avenue along Bradley Street beginning just south of the Soldiers Memorial Hall and extending south to Sandon Street.

The Grant will partly fulfil the goal shared by the Guyra Garden Club with the Rotary Club of Guyra, the Guyra Sub-Branch of the RSL, the Guyra and District Chamber of Commerce and other Clubs. They are planning for a Guyra Spring Flower Festival incorporating the Memorial Avenue and Mandala Garden in the parklands formally reserved in 1951 for a memorial park but now known as Rotary Park and Apex Park. The

first tree plantings will occur as the main feature of a Spring Flower Festival later this year. They are hoping that the Festival will grow over time.

The grant aims to strengthen the Guyra and

district community and local pride by recognising the efforts and, in many cases, ultimate sacrifice, of service men and women who fought in any of the wars Australia has been involved in and particularly those recognised in the Honour Rolls at the Soldiers Memorial Hall.

By planting a Memorial Avenue these local Clubs seek to increase the understanding and shared knowledge of locals and visitors alike of the price paid by so many families and individuals in the time of war. In addition the planting of a Memorial Avenue will finally fulfil the Council resolution of 1951 – even if it has taken 70 years to do so!

President of the Guyra Garden Club, Wendy Mulligan, added that two further applications have been made through the Guyra Garden Club.

"If successful, they will enable the design and construction of a mandala garden as a place of reflection at the Sandon Street end of the Memorial Avenue," Wendy said. "This would include associated seating, picnic tables and BBQ and I am confident that the local community fully support this proposal."

Council to donate hay to flood affected regions

Armidale Regional Council will donate 40 bales of hay to neighbouring regions affected by devastating floods, to help the farming communities suffering the loss and damage of silage and winter stocks.

A motion put forward by Councillor Galletly to provide the goodwill gesture to flood affected communities on the mid-north coast, after a transport company approached him with a willingness to donate haulage of the hay, was unanimously supported at the March Ordinary Council Meeting.

Armidale Regional Council Mayor Ian Tiley said Council is one of few which grows and stores its own hay and is in a fortunate position at present to have 40 large bales of Lucerne to donate to farmers who've lost fodder and are struggling to save their stock

after the recent floods.

"The devastating impacts of flooding can be overwhelming and several natural disaster events have really taken a toll on farming communities over recent years."

"Flooding severely impacts farming production and harvesting, it ruins infrastructure, can submerge and kill crops and pastures, and spoil produce" said Mayor Tiley.

"This small contribution is a gesture by Council on behalf of the local community to flood affected areas and recognises the generosity shown to our community when it was in need," said Mayor Tiley.

Council is working with Local Land Services to manage the distribution of the fodder

Weekly Wool Sales

March 26th - On average the bulk of the market regained around half of last week's losses. A 9 cent rise in the Northern region indicator on the first day of sales was followed up with a further 5 cent gain of the final day.

Last week's dip in the market prompted a 13.2% withdrawal rate prior to the commencement of this week's sale. This resulted in the smallest national weekly offering being presented to the trade since December. 34,956 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 9.4%.

Major buyers included Tianyu, Techwool & Lempriere. Better style, lower vegetable matter types are currently making up a smaller percentage of the weekly national offering with demand for these types driving prices higher.

Offering some assistance to the trade this week, the Aussie dollar fell sharply against the US dollar with the Eastern market indicator falling 23 cents over the course of the two selling days when looked at in US currency.

Next week's national offering is expected to be 10,000 bales greater than the 38,500 bales presented this week. It is the final sale before a brief one week Easter recess.

RFS celebrate new tankers and long serving members

NSW Rural Fire Service (NSW RFS) New England Zone celebrated the official handover of two new fire trucks on Sunday as well as recognising long serving members.

NSW RFS Deputy Commissioner Peter McKechnie joined State member for Northern Tablelands, Adam Marshall MP, Council staff and other guests at the New England Airbase Precinct to officially hand over the keys of the new tanker.

The new tankers, worth nearly \$780,000, will enable brigades to strengthen their firefighting efforts across the community with New England's new Cat 6 water tanker, providing back up water for the airbase and across the region in fire emergencies.

"While the previous tankers have served these brigades well, I am confident these new state-of-the-art vehicles will prove to be invaluable assets to the area," Mr Marshall said.

"The NSW Government's ongoing investment in new vehicles ensures NSW RFS members have access to modern firefighting technology when responding to fires and other incidents."

The event also provided an opportunity to recognise 55

members of the New England Zone who had together amassed 1,350 years of service to the NSW RFS. "Today we awarded long service medals and/or clasps to dedicated volunteers who had given between 10 and 60 years' of service to the community," Deputy Commissioner McKechnie said.

"These men and women remain on-hand 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and we should be extremely proud and grateful for their contribution.

"In particular, considering the magnitude of the 2019/2020 bush fires and the floods we are now experiencing, I would like to congratulate everybody on their ongoing hard work and professionalism.

Among those who were presented with medals was Barry Lockyer who received a Long Service Medal 5th Clasp for 60 years' service as a member of Guyra Brigade.

Barry is currently Deputy Captain with Guyra Brigade from 2018 and previously held this position from 2010 to 2017. Barry was previously with the Ben Lomond Brigade where he held the position of Deputy Captain from 2003 to 2007 and Senior Deputy Captain from 2007 to 2009.

Barry has always been happy to travel to assist in other areas and was out assisting during most of the 2019/20 season, most notably Bees Nest fire and Tenterfield Fires.'

















There are 5 Celebrities in the lead on 34 points: Soley, Harry, Cody, Georgie and the Gazette.
