Last Tuesday the Tour de Cure Signature Tour passed through the Guyra area, enroute from Armidale to Glen Innes on day five of the event. The Tour de Cure ride took place from March 26th to April 1st 2021, bringing together people from all corners of Australia who are searching for a cure for cancer.

One of the Tour De Cure pelotons visited Guyra Central School, where students are engaged in the 'Be Fit, Be Healthy, Be Happy' program. The riders said that there's a reason the tours only run during term time, and that is because they want to reach to as many school children as possible through the 'Be Fit, Be Healthy, Be Happy' program.

"Riding into the school, meeting the kids and giving a short, fun-filled presentation is a highlight of every tour," they said. "Together, we help to demystify cancer and encourage the kids and their school community to make healthy lifestyle choices for their future."

The school featured in a highlight reel on the Sunrise television program the following day. Following their visit to Guyra Central School they passed through Ben Lomond, also visiting the Ben Lomond school.

Ben Lomond resident June Walker stopped the riders to hand over a donation and also featured on the 'Sunrise' program, earning special praise from the show's sports presenter and Tour De Cure rider Mark Beretta who posted the following tribute on Instagram:

Main street upgrade reaches next stage

Work on the upgrade of Guyra's Bradley Street is progressing, with the Stage 2 roadworks set to get underway this month.

The road rehabilitation works will involve the excavation and reconstruction of the existing road pavement in Bradley Street between Mackenzie Street and Nincoola Street.

Armidale Regional Council General Manager James Roncon said it's an exciting

step in the Guyra main street upgrade.

"Stage 2 will see huge improvements to the quality of the road which will increase the overall quality of the street," said Mr Roncon.

"This project has taken longer than anticipated due to the discovery of underground fuel tanks, however Council is powering on and making sure this project is delivered."

Pedestrian and traffic ac-

cess along Bradley Street will be temporarily affected to facilitate the works, with a full road closure between Nincoola Street and Mackenzie Street scheduled from Monday 19 April. The full road closure is expected to be in place for three weeks, dependant on weather and site conditions.

A 24 hour detour will be in place during the full road closure and will divert road users to the nearby Booro-

long Street. Pedestrians will still be able to use the footpaths on either side of Bradley Street to minimise impact on businesses in the street. Pedestrian fencing will prevent pedestrians crossing through the work-site for the duration of the work.

The \$450,000 project has been jointly funded by the NSW Roads to Recovery Program and merger funding.

Council fined for unlawfully taking water

Armidale Regional Council has been issued two penalty notices by the Natural Resources Access Regulator (NRAR) for unlawfully taking water between December 2019 and February 2020. The fines totalling \$3000 were issued to the council on March 10.

The regulator alleged the council allowed a business in Guyra to take water from two of its test bores without the required Water Access Licence (WAL) or Special Purpose Access Licence (SPAL).

Armidale Regional Council received approval in 2019 to do a test drilling program for groundwater at three sites in Guyra as part of a groundwater supply system to back-up its town water supply.

They carried out investigations and yield testing at the end of which they allowed the tomato farm to take 13 megalitres of water in total from bores at Izzard Park and Guyra Showground.

NRAR commenced a thorough investigation in July 2020 following a public tip-

off. They undertook an investigation into the allegation and later took action to protect the environment and uphold water laws. Water users are required to hold a WAL or a SPAL must do so before they take water.

Armidale Regional Council applied for and was granted an exemption under c39A of the Water Management (General) Regulation 2018 to construct a bore without having to apply for or hold a water supply work approval in January 2020.

When granting the exemption, NRAR informed the council that a WAL or SPAL was required for water taken through the bores. These exemptions only apply to critical water use situations during drought conditions and only to construct test bores.

NRAR said the council breached s60A of the Water Management Act 2000 when it unlawfully took water from bores without holding a WAL or SPAL during the time of the offending.

Need a room? The Hub can help

The Hub at Guyra has a number of rooms available for use by the wider community following their recent renovations. Centre Manager Sarah Hunt said that they have already welcomed new users at the centre and believe the facilities would benefit many more.

They have one larger consult room which is suitable for meetings that need the extra space, or for a large group. This has a verandah room attached with self-contained kitchenette.

Two smaller consult rooms are also available which are suitable for private meetings, service meetings and for outreach activities. The Boardroom is suitable for functions and comes with full WI-FI and large screen access.

Community groups looking to

conduct cooking classes or lifeskills education are able to make use of the fully equipped Kitchen. It is suitable for functions, with dining for up to 8-10 people. The kitchen has a state of the art large cook top and oven, dishwasher, filtered water and large fridge. You only need to supply the food.

The Computer Room can also be hired for use by individuals or by groups that are fully supervised. It is equipped with computers, large monitors, high-speed internet, Microsoft Office Suite, printer connection, photocopy papers.

All rooms come with full access to the modern well-equipped kitchen and refreshments are provided for each booking including tea, coffee, biscuits, sugar, milk and

bottled water. Toilets (including an accessible toilet with shower, auto adult change table and baby change table) are available.

Consult rooms can be hired for \$40 full day (or part thereof), the kitchen is available for \$50 full day (or part thereof), the boardroom with internet access will cost \$50 full day (or part thereof) and Computer room hire is \$50 for a full day or \$20 per hour.

The market provides an outlet for local producers and creators to sell and market their goods. The Easter Saturday on April 3rd, was an extra big market with many more stall holders.

The Guyra Film Society began and shows regular monthly films with 20 plus members and anyone is welcome to come to their

first screening for a donation, new members are always welcome.

Every Wednesday evening there are open mic poetry nights from 6:30pm and recently Steve Wordsmith was inducted as the 2021 Living Legend of Australian Poetry and local ambassador Gladys Wilson was awarded an up and coming post award for the preservation of Australian history in poetry.

There are Healthy Him men's circuit training every Monday night from 6pm as well as Tibetan Yoga and Breathing classes incorporating Tsalung and the 5 Tibetan Rites of Rejuvenation on Sunday 9:30am and Tuesday 9:30pm and 6pm.

There is also the Red Door Gallery in the side room which is a space for local artists who want to hold an exhibition or sell their art on commission. The Hall of Poets is coming along and currently features the poetry of 25+ Famous Australian Poets.

Come and check out the



Search on for local artist to create mural

Armidale Regional Council is seeking Expressions of Interest (EOIs) from groups or individuals living in the Guyra area who would be interested in assisting a local artist in developing a mural design for the toilet block in Bradley Street. At last month's Council meeting it was resolved the original artist would not paint the mural due to strong community backlash.

Armidale Regional Council General Manager James Roncon said Council is ensuring the Guyra community are given a piece of public art they can enjoy and appreciate.

"We have listened to the concerns the Guyra community had, so we are going back to the drawing board to make sure we deliver residents with a mural they

want to see in their main street," said Mr Roncon.

"By including residents in the process, we are ensuring a mural will be delivered that suits the tastes and needs of the Guyra community."

Community groups or individuals are required to collaborate with a local artist when submitting their EOI, and ideas must reflect the

local themes and identity of the Guyra community and is designed to enhance the ambience of the main street.

"Through engaging a local artist, the artwork will capture the true essence of the community and will cement Guyra's identity," said Mr Roncon.

The new artist and community group or individual must be prepared to have the

project fully completed before June 30 in order to meet the funding requirement. If the project is not complete by that date, the funding will be returned.

Council secures funding to improve local facilities

Armidale Regional Council (ARC) has received \$500,000 from the Australian Government Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program (LRCI Program). This program supports local councils to deliver priority local road and community infrastructure projects across

Australia, supporting jobs and the resilience of local economies to help communities bounce back from the COVID-19 pandemic.

Council has received \$100,000 of LRCI funding which will go towards upgrading the Guyra Men's Shed, \$350,000 for the Mon-

ckton Aquatic Centre in Armidale to receive new heat pumps, and \$50,000 which will go towards an emergency meeting place for the Lower Creek Community.

Work to upgrade the pumps at the Monckton centre will be carried out during the pool's closure over Winter.

Support flows for upgrading water storages following recent rain

With water flowing over the causeway at Malpas Dam and Guyra Dam full, the rain in March has set many on the land up for a positive winter.

Early last month, Water Minister Melinda Pavey came to the region and met with myself, Armidale Regional Council Mayor Ian Tiley and council's water engineers, to receive a progress update on the feasibility study being undertaken on the raising of Malpas Dam wall.

By lifting the wall 6.5 metres the storage capacity will more than double to 27 gegalites, transforming it into a regional water storage.

This project will provide peace of mind to Guyra's businesses and households that during an extreme dry time, as experienced in 2019, they will have a back-up water supply to rely on should Guyra Dam run dry.

Pleasingly at that meeting Mayor Tiley committed to increasing the number of staff council has working on the project, in order to get its plans to Government as soon as possible.

The recent spilling at Malpas Dam really highlights the need to continue pursuing this important infrastructure upgrade at all levels of Government, and I look forward to seeing ARC's preliminary designs and costings by the end of this month.

Time to Dine and Discover in Guyra

With COVID-19 restrictions now considerably eased in NSW, it's time for us to get out and enjoy the sights and sounds of this great region.

A cost effective way to do that is to utilise the State Government's Dine & Discover NSW program, with locals now able to apply for their \$100 worth of vouchers.

This program is aimed at reinvigorating the hospitality and tourism sectors following COVID-19 and it is important for the local economy that local businesses cashed in.

At this stage, according to the Service NSW website, two eateries in Guyra, the Royal Hotel and Guyra Bowling and Recreation Club, have signed up to accept Dine and Discover NSW vouchers.

Every NSW resident aged 18 years and over is eligible for four \$25 vouchers, worth \$100 in total, to spend in participating businesses.

Residents can easily apply online on the Service NSW app and at www.service.nsw.gov.au and a non-digital solution will be made available to customers who don't have a smartphone or compatible device.

Dine & Discover NSW vouchers will be divided into two categories:

- Two \$25 vouchers to be used for eating in at restaurants, cafes, bars, pubs and clubs 7 days a week, excluding public holidays; and
- Two \$25 vouchers to be used for entertainment and recreation, including cultural institutions, live music, and arts venues, available 7 days a week, excluding public holidays.

Drawing the line on rural crime

“Draw the line on regional crime” is the central message to the new Regional Crime Campaign which was launched this week. In NSW, more than 80% of farmers have reported being a victim of crime according to new research by the Centre for Rural Criminology, University of New England. Even more critical is the high levels of repeat victimisation, with more than 76% of farmers being a victim of crime on more than two occasions, and more than 23% experiencing crime more than seven times*.

Crime Stoppers and the NSW Police Force are launching a state-wide crime campaign to address awareness of regional crimes, prevention measures and to increase reporting to Crime Stoppers and the police.

Regional crime can affect individual’s finances and safety directly but can also have a more widespread impact on the prosperity of the town and its people. In regional areas, the perception of a community, its safety, its people, and its economic situ-

ation can affect tourism, impact on its attraction of high-quality health professionals or teachers and other essential service providers. But it doesn’t stop there. Crimes in regional areas have a flow-on effect, impacting pricing, distribution, and availability of produce everywhere.

The campaign will provide information on how regional communities can deter or prevent crime in their area while encouraging everyone to report crime. The message to the NSW community is: Any information on any crime anytime. The Crime Stoppers contact centre operates 24/7, 365 days a year and all information captured is in complete confidence.

Crime Stoppers is working with the NSW Police Force Rural Crime Prevention Team and the Police Transport and Public Safety Command across a range of major crime areas including stock theft, marine theft and poaching.

Stock theft, as one example, has a significant financial impact on our farmers. Between 2015 and 2020, there has

been a conservative estimated value of \$22.5m worth of sheep and cattle reported stolen within NSW. If we consider the value of stud stock, loss of animal by-products and loss of future breeding potential, the financial impact on primary producers within NSW could realistically be over \$60m*.

NSW Police Force’s Corporate Sponsor for Rural Crime, Acting Assistant Commissioner Brett Greentree, says it is important to work together to protect farmers.

“Rural crime has no borders and police across Australia are working together to protect the livelihood of our farmers against offenders who target them,” Acting Assistant Commissioner Greentree said.

“Our farmers have already suffered natural disasters such as drought, bushfires and floods and we will not accept people stealing from them or making them feel vulnerable in their own home. We urge you to call Crime Stoppers or your local police with any information.”

The newly-launched com-

munity awareness campaign will run state-wide for a 12-month period. Crime Stoppers will be visiting regional communities to engage with communities in an effort to help reduce crime and increase reporting.

Crime in regional areas is not new; however, it continues to be a growing area of concern for the whole of NSW, not just the farming community and therefore it needs a whole of community approach.

Bush Fire Danger Period Ends

The NSW Rural Fire Service (RFS) is advising landowners of the end to the Bush Fire Danger Period in the New England and Northern Tablelands areas.

This means that from the 1st April 2021 fire permits will no longer be required for burning on properties located within the Walcha, Uralla, Armidale-Regional, Glen Innes, Tenterfield and Inverell Local Government Areas.

A/Zone Manager Mark Denton of the New England RFS said that the message to landholders is to take the opportunity throughout the coming winter months to try and get any necessary burn-

ing completed on your property.

“With the recent trend in fire seasons beginning earlier in the year and summer fire weather conditions becoming more unpredictable landowners should not rely on being able to burn in summer,” Mr Denton said. “Ensure all your pile burning and hazard reduction activities are scheduled into the winter land management activities for your property.”

“The cooler months are where all the preparation work should occur to ensure you are in the best possible position for the next fire season. The RFS is able to carry out property assessments, as-

sist you with your Bushfire Survival Plan, prepare burns plans and arrange for qualified fire crew to undertake the burn on your property.”

Although fire permits are no longer required anyone intending to light a fire must notify neighbouring landowners and their local fire authority at least 24 hours before burning. This requirement exists throughout the entire year. The preferred method for notifying the RFS is via our new online portal which is accessible via the NSW Rural Fire Service website.

Before lighting any fires this coming autumn and winter please ensure you have

completed the following:

- Give fire authorities and neighbours 24 hours notice.

- Delay the burn if concerning winds are forecast.

- Create proper fire breaks and clear around the perimeter of piles of timber.

- Have adequate water resources and firefighting equipment on hand.

- Supervise the fire at all times.

- Call Triple Zero (000) immediately if your fire escapes.

Weekly Wool Sales

April 2nd - Once again gains were made over both selling days this week with the combined fortnights rises almost eradicating the losses registered from two weeks ago. The finer types continue to be well supported highlighted by up to 20% gains on the corresponding period last season. This is unsurprising when looking at the seasonal testing data.

AWTA's testing data is showing a 9.6% decline in the volume of wool testing 19.5 micron and finer for the season to date and this escalates to a 19.6% decline in wool testing between 16.6 to 17.5 micron.

AWEX report that the volume of wool offered for the month of March was the largest in 10 years with testing data showing a 25% increase on the previous season. This had led to a recovery in the volume of wool tested nationally for the season to date which is now just 0.9% lower than the previous season. 40,035 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 9.5%.

Major buyers included Techwool, PJ Morris and Lempriere. Sales are now in a week Easter recess and resume the week commencing the 12th of April. Have a safe and happy Easter break. This report will resume on the 16th of April.


