

Guyra tree tops the list

The Guyra saleyards is home to one of the largest Black Cottonwood Poplars (Populus balsamifera) in Australia. The tree, which is believed to be around 110 years old, recently came to the attention of Derek McIntosh who maintains the Australian National Register of Big Trees

The tree was nominated for inclusion on the register by Chris Yorke. The tree is 30 metres (98ft) high, measuring 4.10 metres in circumference around the trunk with a crown of 30 metres. It has now been recognised as the biggest of its type in Australia and listed on the register as a National Champion.

Mr McInitosh is a self-confessed lover of big trees who grew up in South Africa and spent time in America where large trees are celebrated on a national register. When he came to Australia he decided to start something similar.

Mr McIntosh regularly travels around and always keeps an eye out for a new tree to add to the register. It was on one of these trips that he stopped in at the Guyra Saleyards and starting looking around.

"I started chatting to Chris Yorke who took me over to where this amazing tree stands," he said. "We took the measurements and have since found that is in fact the biggest of its type in Australia that we have on the register. It is a worthy champion and for its age is in really good condition."

Mr McIntosh encourages the community to contact him if they know of any other large trees in the area, no matter what type. The register is an integrated list of Australian native trees and naturalised exotic/alien trees.

The register is set up for people to send in a picture of the tree along with the circumference and he will then decide if it's big enough to be listed.

Mr McIntosh encourages anyone to submit large trees via his website to help add to the discovery of the largest ones in NSW or even Australia.

Community organisations urged to apply for volunteer grants

Grants of between \$1000 and \$5000 are up for grabs for eligible volunteers in New England. Up to \$132,450 is available in New England as part of the 2021 Volunteer Grants round.

Member for New England Barnaby Joyce said that volunteers donate countless hours of their time and often pay for their own petrol and vehicle costs travelling to help out in bushfires, deliver Meals on Wheels, provide a cup of tea at Driver Reviver stops, and assist injured wildlife - just to name a few.

"The grants will help volunteers and volunteer groups to buy small equipment for volunteers, by reimbursing volunteer fuel, transport or training costs, or support promotional activities," Mr Joyce said.

Eligible not-for-profit community organisations in New England must submit their Expressions of Interest Form to Mr Joyce's Office before 5pm Wednesday, 28 April, 2021.

Organisations must meet the eligibility criteria and successful applicants will be announced in November.

Men's Shed on the move

The Guyra Men's Shed has finished the move to their new premises and have begun the massive task of setting up so they can reopen. They have relocated to the shed which had previously been used by the Guyra SES at the rear of the old Guyra Courthouse.

While they have moved all of their equipment, they are waiting for an extension to be built which will double the space available and allow them more room and freedom to expand. The courthouse building is being used for storage and for access to toilets and kitchen facilities.

The relocation and expansion is being funded with the help of \$100,000 through the Australian Governments Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program (LRCI) and a \$25,000 Bushfire Recovery Grant.

The existing Men's Shed is being dismantled and some of the materials will be salvaged and used for future projects. John Jackson from the Guyra Men's Shed said the bigger space will mean that they can cater for more members and expand the range of services to include metal work.

"We hope to have the extension finished by the end of June and everything should be ready for operation once that is completed," John said. "The relocation has meant a lot of extra work, but in the end we will have bigger shed which will allow more people to become involved. I would like to thank Armidale Council for lending us four of their workers to assist with moving the larger items which was a great help."

Access to activities at the Men's Shed is available for anyone who is looking for a place to work on projects or simply to enjoy the company of other men. It is a place where you can learn new skills and share your knowledge with others.

While members can work on their own projects, they have previously donated their work to local organisations such as

The Hub and Kolora. They also construct items such as outdoor furniture, dog kennels, and special orders for members of the wider community.

"You only have to ask and if it is possible we will do it," John said. "We have a lot of donated timber and for special items we can purchase timber that best suits the project."

John said that they will be spending the next couple of months getting set up and once they are up and running they hope to see more men making use of the shed.

"I encourage anyone who is interested to come along and see what we do. At the Men's shed you can get your hands dirty, discuss health conditions, enjoy companionship, take some time out to relax, do whatever you want to do or simply get out of the house for a few hours."

The free health check every man needs

More than 41,000 Australian men die each year from preventable disease, and because high blood pressure, diabetes and cholesterol generally have no apparent symptoms until it is too late, it has never been more important for men to get a health check.

Rotary recognises that regional men are busy and often neglect regular doctor visits. The Men's Health Education Rotary Van (MHERV) has been purpose-built to travel NSW regional and rural areas so that men can have a free health check.

The van will be in the NAB car park in Guyra on Friday 16 April from noon to 4pm and on Saturday 17 April from 9am to 4pm.

The FREE health checks only take ten minutes and are conducted by full-time Registered Nurse, Robert Woolley, who provides blood pressure, cholesterol and blood sugar tests.

"I come across guys who

haven't seen a doctor for years" says Rob Woolley." I know that every client I have consulted has left knowing more about their health than before they visited the MHERV Van and I believe many lives have been directly or indirectly saved".

Since 2017, 8214 men have been tested and MHERV

health checks have identified 300 men who were referred for URGENT medical attention – no doubt saving lives.

No appointment is necessary when visiting the MHERV van. Please be aware that MHERV workspace and work practices adhere to COVID -19 requirements.

Save & Grow Guyra forging ahead



The rural communities of Guyra and Armidale vehemently opposed the forced amalgamation of Guyra Shire Council and Armidale Dumaresq Council brought about by the NSW State Governments' Fit for the Future process which was meant to reform Local Government right across the State. This has been a complete and devastating failure. The Guyra district has lost its autonomy and democratic right to control its own destiny and this has affected all rural/regional villages and communities within the whole ARC area.

Bigger is not better in the case of Local Government par-

ticularly in regional NSW. The former Guyra Shire Council was in a far better situation financially and management wise than the protagonists for Fit for the Future and Government officials would have you believe.

The rate-payers and residents of ARC have endured four years of turmoil and total dysfunction and illegal activities at council and administration level. ENOUGH IS ENOUGH and it's time for us to unite and support the proposal to separate the current council area to form a new council area based in Guyra. The Save & Grow Guyra Group are nearing completion of a proposal and submission to the State Government – fully supported by Local Member and Minister for Agriculture Adam Marshall. The proposed new Local Government area is approximately 4960 sq. kmls, with a population of 4563 – both figures being slightly greater than the former Guyra shire without Tingha, creating a much more viable council area.

Our submission must be supported by electorate enrolled rate-payers and residents of ARC via a petition which will be available for signing in coming weeks.

Workshops to help cope with climate risks

Rural lifestyle landholders were among those most affected by the 2017-2021 drought, and it's likely many have already put in place some very clever changes that will help them cope with future climate related events, whether they be droughts, fires or floods.

Peter Metcalfe is a long-term member of Armidale Tree Group and a Board member of Southern New England Landcare Ltd who has been developing a property in the Dumaresq district for the past 50 years.

When asked what he has learnt from the recent drought, Peter notes the changing ecology.

"Adequate tree growth provides benefits such as enhancing biodiversity, providing shade for stock and humans, retaining moisture in the soil and forming a microclimate," he said.

"However, selecting and maintaining the right species is becoming more important these days," he said.

Peter notes that it has become clear that Snow Gums and Black Sally eucalypts at Dumaresq are reaching their ecological limit, while Yellow Box and Stringy Barks - species that would not normally have grown in this region – are becoming more suitable.

With respect to fire hazard, the last drought encouraged Peter to install an additional water tank that is now his property's permanent water supply specifically for fire-fighting, along with a petrol pump in-case the power goes out during a fire event.

It's for these sorts of reasons that Southern New England Landcare is coordinating a series of climate risk workshops tailored especially for peri-urban landholders to address the question "Is your rural lifestyle block ready?"

CEO of Southern New England Landcare, Ms Karen Zirkler said that as a community we are likely to benefit from more resilient food production, homes and natural environments if we have the sometimes difficult conversations about what changes are needed.

"By helping folks share their ideas and experiences, these workshops will highlight what can be done, and help others see what might be possible for them in their particular situation," Karen said. "We also hope to gather information that can be used to facilitate better services in the face of identified climate impacts," she said.

Workshops are being held for the following locations:

* Black Mountain/Guyra: 2pm 17 April, Guyra Bowling and Recreation Club

* Dumaresq/Invergowrie: 2pm 1 May, Armidale City Bowling Club

* Kelly's Plains/Dangarsleigh: 2pm 8 May, Armidale City Bowling Club

*A final presentation and forum will be held 5:30 pm 20 May at Armidale City Bowling Club.

The workshops are being coordinated by Southern New England Landcare Ltd in partnership with Sustainable Living Armidale Inc and are funded by Armidale Regional Council. They are free to attend.

Guyra Sheep & lamb Sale

April 7th - Despite a three week break in sales there was a small number on offer. There was a yarding of 1300 lambs and 500 sheep.

The quality and condition of the lambs was mixed. Restockers were well catered for, while there was a limited supply suitable to processors. Not all processors were in attendance, however restocker demand remained strong.

Comparing market trends to the previous sale, the restocker lambs sold on a firm to slightly dearer market trend. Well finished medium and heavy weight lambs to processors followed a similar trend.

The heavy export weights sold to dearer trends. The quality and condition of the sheep offering was very mixed, with a number of very plain conditioned pens.

Restockers were again active on ewe lines, particularly Merino's carrying longer skins. The restricted processor competition had some effect on the market.

Armidale Cattle Sale

April 8th - There was a yarding of 535 head following a three week break in sales, numbers showed little change. All categories were represented.

The quality of the offering was quite mixed with small lines of good quality cattle along with secondary grades. The condition of the penning was mostly good, a reflection of the very good seasonal conditions. The regular processors were in attendance. Both restock and feedlot activity was high.

Comparing the market to the previous sale vealers returning to the paddock experienced strong gains. There was little change in the market for medium and heavy weight yearling steers to feed, quality accounting for some price change.

Medium weight yearling heifers to feed met with keen demand to show a significantly dearer market trend. Grown steers over 500kg posted strong gains and included some milk tooth lots. The well finished heavy steers to processors also sold on a much dearer market trend.

It was a strong market for well finished grown heifers with both processors and feedlotters competing on suitable lines. The cow market was slightly dearer with some very good cows available along with some showing an excess of condition.
