The squadron has a special connection with Guyra as the final resting place for two of their flight crew who died in an F-111 crash in 1993. While in the area, they paid their respects by visiting the crash site memorial at 'Neeworra', and were pleased to see that it is well maintained by property owners Bob and Belinda Williamson.

The commemoration address was delivered by Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall, who reflected on the contribution made by service men and women from the Guyra District and across the New England.

Chris Hietbrink from the Guyra RSL sub branch said that community participation is something that is appreciated by their members, particularly the large turn out of

schoolchildren. They are also grateful for the support provided by the VRA, SES, Police and Ambulance service to ensure the day ran smoothly.

Chris made special mention of Guyra's oldest veteran 104 year old Ted Mulligan for a huge effort to attend the service in the true heroic spirit of ANZAC, as well as 94 year old Ron Vickress who participated in the march.

Special thanks also to Keith Robinson, Wayne Mills, Jamie Mills, Bev and Max Handebo and Gary Starr for their assistance to ensure the smooth running of the day. Donations collected on the day will go toward the RSL Sub branch and will be used for care of veter-

ans and their families.

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CBD upgrade enters next stage

The Guyra CBD Upgrade has entered the next stage with work commencing this week on the section between Nincoola and Mackenzie Street. Proposed works involve the excavation and reconstruction of the existing road pavement which is expected to take about four weeks.

Pedestrian and traffic access along Bradley Street will be temporarily affected and will include a 24 hour detour which will be in place for the duration of the work. Footpaths will remain open to facilitate pedestrian access to businesses at all times.

Progress and future plans for the CBD upgrade have been outlined in a report prepared for the the monthly meeting of Armidale Regional Council which is being held in Guyra on Wednesday, April 28th. As well as providing an update on progress, the Project Management Office (PMO)

is seeking Council's endorsement for the replacement of trees in the CBD.


The PMO has recommended to Council that nine existing trees along Bradley Street should be removed and replaced with up to 20 established crepe myrtle trees. The trees would be surrounded by a variety of flowering plants and grasses to add colour, interest and symmetry to the main street year round.

Their justification to council is that the current red maples are an unsuitable species and will outgrow their current location. They say that the root balls of the trees are protruding higher than the new curbing and that without root

protection barriers uncontained root growth poses risk of damage to existing and future infrastructure.

Further works in the planning stages are an upgrade the overhead powerlines along Bradley Street, with Essential Energy currently finalising plans.

Strategies are also in place to deliver water main upgrades, future proofing works for future services upgrades, and footpath replacement.

Polocrosse Club back in the saddle after two years

Northern Tablelands MP Adam Marshall has helped Guyra Polocrosse Club get back in saddle after a two-year forced hiatus, announcing a \$5,000 State Government grant to purchase new equipment and encourage local participation.

Mr Marshall made the announcement at Bald Blair Recreation Reserve, where the committee successfully hosted the club's first carnival since the drought and easing COVID-19 restrictions, over the weekend.

"It's been a tough few years for the equine community, with the drought hardening arena surfaces making them unsafe and drying up the incomes of those who would normally travel to compete," Mr Marshall said.

"With the positive change in the season it's fantastic to see the resumption of the Guyra Polocrosse Club's carnival at Bald Blair, with the grounds looking the best they have in about five years.

"As a way to assist the club during this rebuilding phase,

\$5,000 will be spent buying new equipment including balls, timers, bells, umpire jackets, bibs and the all-important rackets.

"This grant will also help kick-start the club's effort to put money aside for a planned upgrade of its amenities by freeing up funds which would have been spent on the purchase of gear.

"Polocrosse has always played a prominent part in country life and it is really special seeing events back on the calendar and bringing people together."

Guyra Polocrosse Club President Anthony Grills said the grant would provide a muchneeded boost to the club after

two years without play.

"Farmers are the backbone of the Guyra Polocrosse Club, all of whom have been greatly impacted by the worst drought in living memory and COVID-19 restrictions," Mr Grills said.

"The funding is very much appreciated at this time, as we have had large outgoing cost over the previous years to maintain our grounds and club house, but minimal income.

"Any funds left over from the equipment buy-up will be put towards helping club members purchase their own gear and cover their memberships.

"By supporting people with the cost of maintaining membership and establishment fees, our committee hopes to put itself on a positive path to rebuilding player numbers.

"We are a very strong, family orientated club, with three generations of some families involved.

"We want to see that tradition and love for the game continue into the future and thank Adam for his support in helping us do so."

Armidale Regional Council has engaged Stabilcorp to undertake road rehabilitation works on Bradley Street, Guyra. Proposed works involve the excavation and reconstruction of the existing road pavement in Bradley Street between Mackenzie Street and Nincoola Street

Works commenced on Monday 26 April, 2021 and a full road closure will be in place for approximately three weeks, dependent on weather and site conditions. A temporary 24-hour traffic detour will be in place for the duration of the work

Footpaths on both sides of Bradley Street will remain open to facilitate pedestrian access to businesses at all

This \$450,000 project is Stage Two of Guyra's main street upgrade and has been jointly funded by the NSW Roads to Recovery Program and merger funding.

Armidale Cattle Sale

April 22 - Numbers doubled with an influx of heavy weight feeder steers and a good supply of cows. There were limited supplies of vealers and weaners, with yearlings well supplied. The quality of the offering was generally good with condition forward to well finished. There was increased processor competition, with feedlot activity high. Restockers were also active throughout.

Strong restocker competition resulted in the weaners selling to dearer trends. A limited supply of medium weight yearling steers sold to dearer trends also. Heavy weight yearling feeder steers up to 500kg, saw a firm to dearer market trend, where breed and quality had some effect on price change. Yearling heifers to feed sold to cheaper trends with the well finished heavy weights most

affected. Restockers were active on the medium weights as both backgrounders and future breeders

There was an increased supply of heavy steers over 500kg, including some milk teeth lots. The highly sought breeds of good quality sold to dearer trends, while the lessor quality and non specialist breeds saw prices cheaper.

Well finished grown heifers to process saw varying trends with most cheaper. Odd improved quality heifers were dearer. There was a very good quality penning of heavy weight cows. The market showed little change. Restockers were active on the plainer condition cows pushing some prices to levels higher than the finished lots. Little change in the bull market.

Weekly Wool Sales

April 23 - A smaller national offering and a stable exchange rate helped prompt a turnaround in sentiment. Last week's losses in the 19 micron and broader types were recovered by the close of the first day of sales.

Once again the 18 micron and finer types outperformed the rest of the market with the appetite from the trade on the better style lots within the finer micron range appearing large. Whilst the market was relatively unchanged on the final selling day there was some downward movement in the 20-22 micron categories.

The 18 micron indicator closed the week at a 13 month high and

has now gained 65% since last Septembers low. The 20 micron indicator is up a healthy (but not as impressive) 46% over the same period. 36,094 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 10.7%.

Major buyers included Techwool, PJ Morris & Lempriere. The rise in the market has drawn more wool out of holding sales and inflated next week's expected national offering to almost 51,000 bales. This is more than double the corresponding sale last season and continues the trend of higher national weekly offerings for the season to date.

Long-term permits now available for TSRs

Land managers across the Northern Tablelands Local Land Services region have been invited to apply for long-term access to a number of Travelling Stock Reserves (TSRs).

Helen Ward, from the Northern Tablelands Local Land Services TSR team, said producers can now submit an application for a Management Agreement Permit, which will provide them with certainty of TSR access for years to come.

"Everybody benefits from a viable, well-maintained and connected TSR network, and these permits help deliver that," Helen said.

"The permits will give confidence to livestock producers to make long-term business decisions and allow them to also play a key role in securing the future productivity of our local TSRs."

While a number of carefully assessed TSRs in the region will be available for Management Agreement Permits, most TSRs remain available by application for short-term access permits such as walking stock.

Under measures introduced in 2020 by Local Land Services, Management Agreement Permits across NSW are now standardised, and the process of assessing applications is more robust.

Successful applicants are selected using comprehensive criteria, which ensures the region's TSR network is looked after properly.

"TSRs have a storied history in NSW and they are not only important for agricultural productivity, but they also play a crucial role in supporting threatened species and habitats," Helen said.

"Whether it's proposed grazing practices, experience, or how pests and weeds will be managed, we need to make sure applicants can effectively manage a TSR, so our industries, and the communities they support, can prosper."

Anyone considering submitting an application should read and understand the TSR State-wide Plan of Management and the Best Environmental Management Practice Toolkit for TSRs, which are both available on the Local Land Services website: https://www.lls.nsw.gov.au/.





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
