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# Looking at the Big Picture

An education model which turns the traditional curriculum on its head is already proving its value to students at Guyra Central School.

Big Picture Education Australia (BPEA), which has been operating at the school since the start of 2021, puts students at the centre of the decisions around what, how and when they learn.

Guyra was the first school in the New England to implement BPEA and has recently been joined by Tamworth High School as the only two schools north of Newcastle taking part in the program.

The BPEA model is a departure from traditional learning where students go into the classroom and the teacher tells them what they are going to learn. Big Picture starts with the student rather than the curriculum and they pursue their own passions and interests. Instead of teachers, they

have advisors and instead of going from class to class they work on their own projects in groups of around 17 students. Andrew Murray heads up Big Picture at Guyra Central, where there are three advisories currently operating. Mr Murray said that students are exploring a diverse range of interests and they are already seeing positive outcomes for the students involved.

RASF Manager Cecilia Logan said the program provides financial freedom for students in regional areas or those looking to work in a rural community.

"The RASF Rural Scholarship and VET Scholarship programs are vital in assisting students from regional NSW pursue their dream careers," Mrs Logan said.

"For most regional students further study requires them to relocate and move away from their families.

"These scholarships are de-

signed to help make that move or decision a little easier with funding to assist with accommodation, textbooks or income which allows them to focus on their studies."

Since 2007, the Royal Agricultural Society of NSW Foundation (RASF) has invested over \$6.2 million into country NSW through its education and community grant programs. This includes over 600 scholarships to students across NSW, including targeted scholarships for regional journalism and those pursuing careers in the Australian wine industry. Applications for the 2022 RASF Scholarship programs open on July 1.

The RAS Foundation is a charitable foundation that encourages educational opportunities and helps build strong and sustainable rural and regional communities through a range of targeted grants and scholarships.

"Since the start of the year we are seeing that it has already led to a dramatic rise in attendance and previously disengaged students are now engaged and wanting to come to school," he said.

"We are also seeing that families are engaged and some were blown away to see the standard of work that their children are doing."

Guyra Central School Principal Michelle Nicholson said that the Big Picture pathway works alongside the traditional HSC pathway and it is all about getting the best outcome for each child.

"The school has been looking at Big Picture it for a long time and it is not something that we rushed into," Mrs Nicholson said. "It is still in the beginning stages, but I believe it is good fit for the school and may even be more rigorous than the mainstream in terms of meeting learning criteria."

Co-founder and CEO of Big Picture Education Australia (BPEA) Viv White AM recently visited Guyra Central School where she is working with the leadership team to build relationships in the wider community. As part of the visit, she was joined by Adjunct Professor Jim White PSM from the University of New England (UNE) and Savannah White, a Year 11 BPEA student from Morisset High School in Newcastle.

Viv White said that building strong relationships between the students, their teachers and experts in their fields of interest is an important part of BPEA.

"We recognise that a lot of learning will take place outside the classroom," Mrs White said. "What you see with Big Picture is kids on farms, kids in law offices, kids in medical practices, kids in carpentry shops, and kids in supermarkets learning about their passion in their community."

"Adult real world learning is important and our kids are doubly ready for life – we have the eye on the prize for them and they have their eye on the prize as well." An important part of the program is making connections and during their visit to the area, they met with staff from UNE with the view to providing mentors and pathways as students progress.

Adjunct Professor Jim White from UNE runs a program called Schools and Universities Connect. Part of his role is help bring students into university and he said that he supports schools exploring pathways rather than saying there is just one way.

"Some students are happy with traditional HSC and schools will continue to provide that option," he said. "I also know that we need to provide alternatives and I love the concept of portfolio learning that is part of Big Picture and having parents as part of the process."

"Learning is a lifelong process. I see teachers as being mentors and recognise that they are not the font of all knowledge," he said. "We should be taking our students to another level and exploring ways to expand their knowledge outside of the school environment and that is what Big Picture does."

The visit also provided an outlearning experience for Morisset High School Savannah White, who met with Big Picture students and staff at Guyra Central School to share her experiences. Savannah is a Year 11 student who completed Year 7 as a traditional student before transitioning to Big Picture in Year 8.

"I was in the top class and doing well but found school quite repetitive and I wasn't excited by the work," Savannah said. "When I joined Big Picture I was able to choose topics I was interested and I haven't looked back. It is a wonderful experience to be able to choose whatever you are interested in, to delve into it and truly follow your passions."

"It is definitely something that has made a huge difference for me and it is something I would recommend for anyone who wants to be part of Big Picture.

## Draft budget to focus on core values and improved financial management

Armidale Regional Council's Draft Operational Plan and Budget is now on public exhibition. The draft details the proposed activities and budget and supporting rates, charges and fees for the 2021-2022 financial year.

The 2021-2022 financial year will also see the introduction of the harmonisation of rates between the former Armidale Dumaresq and Guyra Shire Councils proposed to be undertaken over four years.

Armidale Regional Council General Manager James Roncon said it is important for residents to have their say on the proposed increases to fees and charges, the budget and financial direction of Council. Community consultation is also being undertaken on the proposed four year rates harmonisation implementation framework.

"This budget is the first step of a long and disciplined road in maintaining levels of service to the community and improving Council's financial position," said Mr Roncon.

"The Council's financial position is dire but this year's budget is about bringing Council to a point where we can deliver basic services and set a foundation that addresses the requirement of the Performance Improvement Order that Council is operating under.

"This also means we need to keep saving money to build up our available funds for at least the next three or four budgets to enable Council to address the condition of some of our assets that are deteriorating.

"At the moment we are predominantly relying on State and Federal grants to address deteriorating assets and fund new ones. This isn't sustainable and Council needs to be able to have cash reserves available to contribute to improving our assets or for any unexpected situation."

Council's financial position has been impacted by the recent drought, bushfires, floods and the COVID-19 pandemic. The 2021-2022 Draft Operational Plan and Budget attempts to mitigate these impacts as far as possible without cuts to services. The budget position will be supported with strategies to ensure costs are tightly controlled and financial management across the business is a key priority.

Council is encouraging the community to have your say on The Draft Operational Plan and Budget 2021-2022 until Thursday 24 June, 2021. The suite of documents on public exhibition include:

• Draft Operational Plan and Budget 2021-2022 (including the operational and capital budget);

• Draft Revenue Policy 2021-2022 (including proposed four year rates harmonisation implementation framework); and

• Draft Fees and Charges 2021-2022

These documents and a number of fact sheets highlighting proposed changes to rates and charges are available to view on Council's your say online engagement hub. Yoursay.armidale.nsw.gov.au

Hard copies will also be available at the Civic Administration Buildings in Armidale and Guyra and at the libraries.

Council will be hosting two information sessions. In Armidale on Tuesday 8 June from 5.30pm at the Council Chambers and in Guyra on Wednesday 9 June from 5.30pm in the Guyra Council Chambers. Staff will present the Draft Operational Plan and Budget 2021-2022 and conduct a Q&A session.

#### Armidale Hospital COVID-19 Vaccination Hub

From Monday, 31st May the Armidale hospital vaccination hub will be open and administering the Pfizer COVID-19.

Those aged 50 years and over who cannot access the AstraZeneca vaccine through their GP are eligible to book into the clinic.

Members of the general public aged 40-49 can also now register their interest in receiving the Pfizer vaccine via the NSW Government website: www.nsw.gov.au.

When availability increases, people aged 40-49 who have registered their interest will be contacted and offered appointments. This ensures as many people as possible have access to the vaccine and NSW Health makes maximum use of its available supply.

NSW Health continues to vaccinate eligible people in the priority groups set out by the Federal Government and appointments can be booked through the eligibility checker on the Commonwealth Department of Health website: https://covidvaccine.healthdirect.gov.au /eligibility.

#### Stronger Country Communities Fund Round 4

Community groups and sporting clubs in the Guyra area are set to benefit from Round 4 of the NSW Stronger Country Communities Fund, with applications now open for programs and infrastructure projects that benefit locals and encourage women's participation in sport.

As with the previous three rounds, funding allocations are made to each local government area, with \$1.68 million available for initiatives in Armidale Regional Council this time.

programs, girls and women will feel more welcome, safe, included and encouraged to regularly participate in sports and recreational activities.

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## Grant for Guyra Men's Shed

The Australian Government is continuing to support the health of men in the New England by providing \$11,680 to four organisations in the latest round of grant funding of the National Shed Development Programme.

Member for New England Barnaby Joyce welcomed the Australian Government funding of \$3,885 to Guyra Men's Shed for a defibrillator, Samsung tablets, tools and equipment. Tenterfield Men's Shed was awarded \$3,000 for a new lathe, Manilla Men's Shed \$2,700 for laptop computers and training on software such as Zoom and Inverell Community Men's Shed a further \$2,095, also for a defibrillator.

"During the COVID-19 pandemic, many Australians, including the many in New England branches of our local men's sheds turned to technology to stay connected with

# Positive milestone for Malpas upgrade

Armidale Regional Council will move forward with planning to raise Malpas Dam's spillway by 6.49 metres after councillors supported a recommendation at the May 26 Ordinary Council meeting.

The decision was based on the findings of reports from the NSW Public Works Advisory, the NSW Urban Water Services Armidale Yield Study and the Malpas Dam Upgrade Assessment undertaken by Council staff.

Armidale Regional Council's General Manager James Roncon said this is a positive milestone for the multimillion dollar project.

"Securing the region's water supply is a major priority for council, so this decision is a welcome step in ensuring the region is prepared for future droughts," said Mr Roncon. "We believe an investment in water security is crucial to protecting the wellbeing of the region for decades to come."

The Malpas Dam Upgrade Options Report analysed three options, including keeping the existing full storage level, raising the spillway by three metres, and raising the spillway by 6.49 metres.

Raising the full storage level by 6.49 metres will increase Malpas Dam's storage from 12.2 gigalitres to 27.6 gigalitres, and while this won't provide the full secure yield required over the 30 year time frame, it will significantly increase the storage volume and will add the capacity to accept pumped inputs from other catchments.

Council will now commence the preparation of a business case for the project to explore the funding source, the impact on Council's financial sustainability, impact on operating costs, and the affordability for residents and businesses.

## Development Application approved for proposed Guyra preschool

The Development Application (DA) for the proposed Guyra Early Childhood Learning Centre was approved at the May 26 Ordinary Council Meeting, subject to conditions.

The DA is for the construction of a proposed centre-based child care facility to be built behind the Guyra Civic Administration Building as well as the construction of a new car park and associated works.

Armidale Regional Council Mayor Ian Tiley said while this does not guarantee the new preschool will be built, it gives Council the green light to do so if funding becomes available in the future.

"This is simply a step we had to go through to ensure the construction process is as streamlined as possible if it is deemed feasible for the Early Childhood Learning Centre project to go ahead," said Mayor Tiley.

"This approval gives us the peace of mind we need while we continue to seek funding options and explore the feasibility of the project."

Council received two submissions from members of the public against the DA, however, both of these have now been addressed through the conditions outlined in the approval.

These conditions include a deferred commencement condition pursuant to section 4.16(3) of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979, requiring that an amended Aboricultural Impact Assessment and Car Parking Access Plan is provided which demonstrates that the largest tree - the English Oak can be successfully retained.

The carpark that is included in the DA was due to be funded by the Australian Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure (LRCI) Phase 1 funding, however Councillors adopted the recommendation to reallocate the money to other projects due to the fact the Guyra Early Childhood Learning Centre project has not yet been fully scoped.

"The conditions of this funding require the money to be spent by the end of this financial year, so council believes the best option is to reallocate the funds to ensure the money is not lost," said Mayor Tiley.

"This money will now be spent on our asset backlog that will greatly benefit the community."

The \$985,000 of LRCI funding to will now go towards the 2021/2022 renewal program for Council assets, including kerb and guttering, footpaths, urban road reseals, gravel road resheeting, stormwater drainage improvements and building renewals. Council has applied for an extension to complete the projects by 31 December 2021.

## Guyra Sheep & lamb Sale

May 26th – Yarding 4605. There was an increased penning of both sheep and lambs. The quality of the lambs was improved with a number of pens showing increased weights. The full field of processors were in attendance, with restockers active through all but the heavier weight classes.

Market trends were firm to dearer for restocker lambs with the plainest condition lightweights showing strong improvement. Some restocker orders were targeting heavier weights and better condition lots. The well-finished lambs to process also sold to dearer trends with the weight increases accounting for strong price gains.

The mixed quality and condition penning of sheep penned sold to dearer trends. There was limited restocker activity with very few sheep carrying any skin value.

## Weekly Wool Sale/ May 28th - Once again it was ing their broader r

May 28th - Once again it was a contrasting week for the market. 19 micron and finer types continued their march upward as buyers chase quality lower vegetable matter types. The broader Merino fleece types gave back some of last week's gains whilst the Merino carding indicator lifted by 2.5%.

At the close of sales The Northern region indicator sat just above 1400 cents for only the second time in the last twelve months. The current price premium for the 18 micron indicator compared to the 21 micron indicator is around 55%. The 10 year average for this premium has only been 16%. So yes whilst the finer types are currently outperforming their broader relatives they are still a far cry from the 300% premium they were receiving 20 years ago.

38,808 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 11.7%. Major buyers included Techwool, Tianyu and Lempriere. Upcoming national weekly offerings are gradually starting to reduce from their unseasonably high levels but look likely to remain well above last season's offerings for the month of June.

Forward market prices remain strong particular for the finer types, trading at and even slightly in advance of the current physical market.

## Armidale Cattle Sale

May 27th – Yarding 910. Numbers remained steady with heavy weight cattle well supplied. Light weight cattle were limited in supply. Quality and condition was mostly good, with very few in the plainer grades. The usual processors were in attendance along with extra feedlot competition.

Trends varied from the sale a fortnight ago. Vealers to restockers sold to cheaper trends for both steers and heifers. Some heavy weights to processors struggled to maintain their recent levels. Medium weight yearling steers to restockers and feeders experienced little but quality related price change.

A good supply of heavy weight yearling steers suitable to feed experienced a significantly dearer market trend with breed and quality variations accounting for a large price range.

Medium and heavy weight yearling heifers attracted strong demand to also sell to a dearer trend, price improvement not as great as the steer portion.

Heavy weight grown steers over 500kg to feed sold to a much dearer trend. An improved quality penning of heavy steers suitable to processors sold to a dearer trend with increased competition.

Well finished heavy grown heifers sold on a firm to dearer trend. Well finished heavy weight cows sold on a firm to slightly cheaper trend with great variation in quality. Restockers were active on plainer condition, and joined cows, with the trend dearer. Heavy weight bulls sold to a slightly dearer trend.
