## Guyra Milling changes hands

Mort & Co, Australia's largest privately owned lot feeder, is set to acquire Guyra Milling following a comprehensive due diligence process. Guyra Milling was established in 2007 by the Vivers family. The mill has a maximum capacity of 20,000 tonnes per annum, and currently supplies pellets in bulk, bulka and 20kg bags.

The agreement will see Mort & Co purchase the site and its physical assets, including the mill, three delivery trucks and some additional equipment. Importantly, the core Guyra Milling team members will continue with Mort & Co, ensuring the mill can remain open for business and provide a smooth transition for customers.

Guyra Milling Operations Manager, David McCathie, said the acquisition was a positive outcome for everyone.

"It's fantastic news for our team and our customers that the mill remains operational. It's also massive for the local area. There is only an upside from this agreement for all parties involved".

Owner Belinda Vivers also touched on her interactions with the Toowoomba based feedlotter.

"To be involved in negotiations with a business such as Mort & Co gives you confidence. They are a strong company who are growing, but more importantly, they have great values, which has been evident in all our dealings with them. They run a highly professional organisation and their team, in conjunction with ours, have been exceptional throughout the process in getting us to this point".

While Guyra Milling customers will be required to open a new trading account with Mort & Co in order to continue trading, there is expected to be little disruption to the business.

"For our existing customers, it's fantastic to know that they will still be able to access all the products currently on offer, whilst Mort & Co explore innovative products and services to continue to support our customer base," Mrs Vivers said.

When discussing the acquisition, Mort & Co CEO, Stephen O'Brien, was excited

about the company's future.

"It's an exciting time ahead for Mort & Co Stockfeeds and we look forward to welcoming David and the Guyra Milling team into the business on the 1st of July. We'd like to thank the Vivers family for working proactively with us throughout this transaction and are grateful to them for entrusting the future of the business (that herself and Jack built over 14 years) to Mort & Co".

The acquisition is due to be finalised on 1st July, 2021.

## Royal Hotel wins energy saving grant

Small and medium hotels and motels across the New England are receiving support from the Coalition Government's \$10.2 million Hotel Energy Uplift Program to cut energy costs so they can invest in their business, employ more Australians and get ahead.

Member for New England Barnaby Joyce said funding included \$22,433 for the Royal Hotel at Guyra to replace and upgrade nine windows.

"Like many hotels in the New England, the Royal has a proud history of keeping travellers and locals happy in Guyra with cold beer and warm meals," Mr Joyce said.

"This grant will help drive down energy costs down through better insulation at the premises to ensure that

patronage continues long into the future."

The Royal Hotel was one of a dozen premises to share in more than \$268,000 in fund-

ing for projects across the New England which included upgrades to more energy efficient air-conditioning, lighting and interior modifications.

"These grants will help local operators to save on energy costs, putting more money back in their pockets and supporting the creation of new jobs, including for local electricians, carpenters, engineers, and plumbers," Mr Joyce added.

The Hotel Energy Uplift Program was announced in the 2020-21 Budget and is part of the Government's \$1.9 billion investment in new energy technologies which will create new jobs now and into the future, reduce emissions and ensure all Australians have access to reliable and affordable energy.

## One-stop-shop to finding grant funding

Accessing grant funding in the Armidale region is now a one-stop-shop for local community groups and businesses with the launch of Grant Finder. Armidale Regional Council has joined forces with one of Australia's most powerful grant search engines, Grant Guru, to deliver a free website for business and community grants.

Community members can simply use the search engine to find available grants and filter grants by specifying location, industry and type of project. The website also assists with advice and top tips for finding and applying for grants to maximise your chances of receiving the funding you need.

Users can also register to re-

ceive alerts about funding programs relevant to them as they become available, allowing businesses and community groups an opportunity to stay in the loop when funding opportunities are available to them.

## \$12 million boost for mums and bubs

New parents will soon have access to increased specialised support with funding announced for a Regional Family Care Centre in Armidale.

NSW Treasurer Dominic Perrottet has announced \$12.2 million in funding to enable Tresillian and Gidget Foundation Australia to collaborate and expand their services into the region.

Mr Perrottet said the support package was included in the NSW 2021- 22 Budget in

recognition of the challenges that can arise during the early years.

Minister for Mental Health Bronnie Taylor said the funding will go towards six new Regional Family Care Centres (FCC) (including one in Armidale), five Tresillian mobile vans (including one in Inverell) and continued funding for staff at the Macksville Residential Unit.

"We know that up to 50 per cent of mums whose babies have sleeping or feeding issues, suffer from post-natal anxiety and depression. These centres have Tresillian nurses and a Gidget Foundation mental health clinician working together to help the baby and parents," Mrs Taylor said.

"I know how difficult it can be adjusting to life with a newborn and having services like this close to home really will be life changing for regional families."

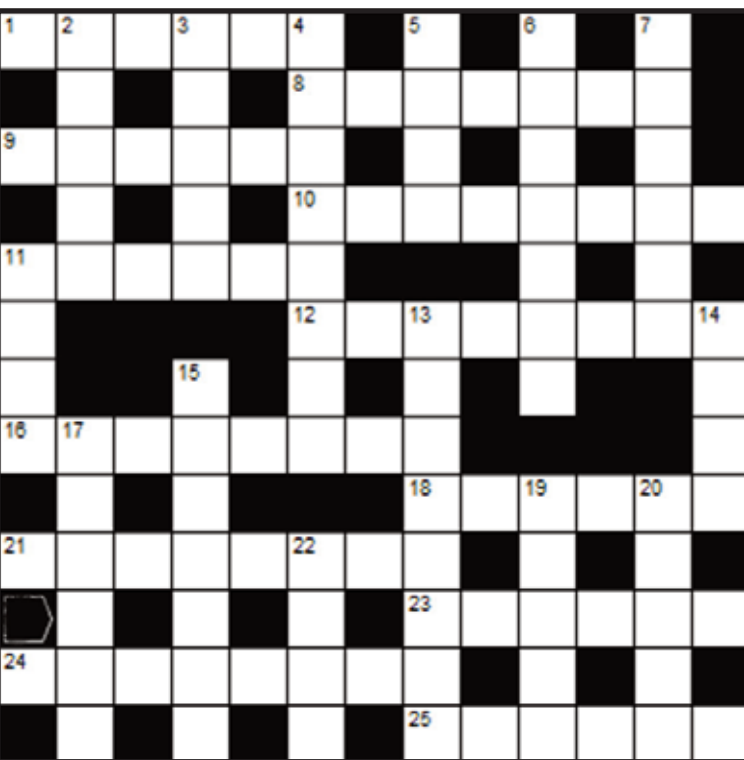

# Street names honour airport champions

Two prominent roads in the new Armidale Airside Business Park called Cameron Drive and Waller Avenue commemorate the tireless work of two local champions that have been instrumental in the development of the airport and aviation in the region.

Donald Cameron was President of Dumaresq Shire from 1957 – 1974. He was a champion of economic development in the region and encouraged business growth opportunities for many years. Dumaresq Shire managed the airport and he was instrumental in the main runway you see today being redeveloped from a grass runway to tarmac.

Clive Edmund Gordon Murray Waller was an engineer that came to Armidale in 1949/50 to manage the Government owned Aerodrome in Armidale. He held the position for a further 10 years. It was a 24 hour a day job, Clive would often have to put flares out in the middle of the night to allow flights to land.

During his time at the aerodrome Clive recorded a wonderful history in a photograph album that has survived to this day. Although in poor condition it is hoped that it can be restored and put on display. In 1937 Clive invented the

C.M.W stall warning indicator, the modern versions of which are still used in aircraft today and saved many lives.

Armidale Regional Councillor Andrew Murat said the contribution by Donald Cameron and Clive Waller and many others has left a lasting legacy on aviation in our region.

“It is fitting that we recog-

nise these individuals at the Airside Business Park for their contribution to the Armidale Regional Airport and to our community,” said Cr Murat

“The airport precinct has undergone significant change over many years, often from ideas and initiatives championed by community members with a passion for aviation,

economic development and just a love of our wonderful region. The state-of-the-art airport we see today is testament to their hard work and passion.”

The remaining roads within the Airside Business Park will also recognise community contribution to the airport and an existing mural in the terminal showcases the airports history.

## Armidale Cattle Sale

**June 17th** - There was a reduced penning of 600 cattle at the Armidale cattle sale, with the quality fair to good. There was variation in condition, with the majority of young cattle suited to restocking and feedlot purposes.

The grown cattle were well finished in the main lines with some cows carrying an excess. There was a similar gallery of processors in attendance along with good support from restocker and feedlot buyers.

Strong restocker demand resulted in substantially dearer market trends for vealer steers. Lighter weight

heifer vealers to restockers also sold to a much dearer trend. The few heavier weights were cheaper with quality contributing.

Yearling steers to restock and feed also sold to dearer trends, however there was a large price range with breed and quality a factor. Yearling heifers also sold to dearer trends with the increased demand. Well finished heavy grown steers to process sold on a firm to slightly dearer market trend. There was little change in the cow market with some classes showing an improvement in quality. Restocker demand was high for a small number of PTIC cows.

## Weekly Wool Sales

**June 18th** - Last week's rise in the market was almost replicated this week. All types were dearer from the outset with similar gains made over both selling days. With two selling weeks to go for the current season the Northern region indicator closed at a seasonal high point and a staggering 68% increase above the early September 2020 low. 40,527 bales were sold nationally for the week with a low passed in rate of just 4.6%.

Major buyers included Techwool, Tianyu and Fox & Lillie with the top 4 accounting for almost 50% of the national Merino fleece offering. AWEX report that the 16.5 micron indi-

cator that was first quoted in 2006 closed at an all time high this week.

Whilst the run up originated with the finer microns and continues, the past fortnight has seen a flow on effect to the medium Merino types with the 21 and 22 micron indicators gaining 106 and 70 cents respectively. The forward market witnessed very little activity this week with the pace of the fortnightly increases causing both buyers and sellers to pause for a rethink on the future direction of the market. With no sales in Fremantle next week the national offering reduces to an expected 34,600 bales.
