NAB to shut up shop in October

Guvra will be reduced to just one banking service in October, with the National Australia Bank preparing to close its doors for good. It follows the closure of Westpac in 2015 and the Commonwealth Bank in 2018. Customers were informed of the decision by letter which informed them that the branch will close on October 7th.

The bank has gradually reduced services in the community over recent years. In 2016 they went from a five day service to opening only three days a week. Their hours were further reduced last year to half days. NAB is also closing its branch in Uralla.

NAB Retail Customer Executive, Wesley Tronson has attributed the closure to a move by customers to online banking.

"Increasingly customers are banking digitally, with more than 93% of customer

interactions now taking place over the phone, by video or online," Mr Tronson said. "As more and more customers are choosing to bank online, we're investing in improving our digital platform to make it easier and faster.

"While our physical branch presence in Guyra and Uralla will no longer be there, we will still be there for our customers - just in different ways."

"Over the past few years,

fewer customers are coming into branches to do their banking and foot traffic has lessened, which has been accelerated by COVID. More than 50% of our customers in Guyra and Uralla have only visited these branches once in the last year and 70% of customers are also using other branches in the region such as Armidale.

NAIDOC Week celebrations took place across the nation from July 4th to July 11th. The NAIDOC 2021 theme was 'Heal Country!' – calling for all of us to continue to seek greater protections for our lands, our waters, our sacred sites and our cultural heritage from exploitation, desecration, and destruction.

It was a chance to embrace First Nations' cultural knowledge and understanding of Country as part of Australia's national heritage and equally respect the culture and values of Aboriginal peoples and Torres Strait Islanders as they do the cultures and values of all Australians.

Children and staff at the Guyra Preschool and Long Day Care Centre embraced the theme, with a scaled down celebration due to COVID 19. Abiding by the current rules and regulations in place did not stop them delving local Aboriginal history and culture with Mrs Nellie Blair.

During circle time, Mrs Blair talked to the children about what tools they used in past times to hunt and gather food and discussed comparisons about how people in the past didn't have access to the shops and supplies we have today. Mrs Blair also spoke to the children about the topic "Heal Country".

The children also engaged in listening to a story by Gregg Dreise who spoke about the importance of country and how grateful we are for what it provides us.

"In support of this, last week we confirmed that as part of a \$100 million investment this year in our branch network, the nearby Armidale branch will be undergoing a refurbishment. Once completed, this multi-million dollar Regional Banking Hub will provide an enhanced level of service for our Retail, Business and Agri Business customers, all in the one centralised location."

Mr Tronson said that the branch team will be working with customers over the coming months until they close, talking with them about the various banking alternatives available. These include the recently renewed 10-year partnership with Australia Post and the Bank@post service as well as connecting with mobile bankers, home lending specialists or business bankers in person or for phone or video appointments.

"Our Agri and regional customers will continue to be supported by our specialist bankers, who visit customers on their farms and at businesses to support with their banking needs. Customers can also continue to make deposits and withdrawals at the local Australia Post in Guyra or Uralla."

"Importantly, there will be no job losses. Over the coming weeks we will be working with our colleagues from this branch on opportunities for them to continue to support customers either through other branches or across phone and digital channels."

Disappointed, sad and angry

President of the Guyra and District Chamber of Commerce Steve Mepham said that it is disappointing for any small town to lose services.

"This will impact not only businesses in town, but will also have an impact for pensioners and older people in our community," Steve said.

"Business owners will struggle because there are some things you can't do online and it means they may have to travel to Armidale to pick up cash and do their banking. The closure adds another level of inconvenience for everyone."

Tania Lennon from Dasha's Hardware said that it she is disappointed to lose another thing in our town. As a business customer, she uses the branch every day they are open to deposit takings and to get change.

"Small business and small towns shouldn't have to bear the brunt of big business closures," Tania said. "I will be sad to see them leave because it will impact our business. I am also sad for the oldies who can't use online banking and I will be sad to see another empty building in our main street.

Tania also said that she is considering her options for future banking services and is not sure what they will do. Whatever the future holds she believes it will not be the same.

"You can't replace the ser-

vice you get from your local branch and being able to talk face to face with someone you know and who knows your business."

Another NAB customer who is not happy with the decision is Anne Thrift from CT Electric. She said that she is angry at the decision, and will be moving all their accounts to Regional Australia Bank.

"It would be too hard for us to operate without having a local branch because we go in most days to do our banking," Anne said. "I am sad for the girls who work there because they are always so helpful and I am really angry to see another big business close its doors in our town."

Leatherman. Led Lenser, Profishent tackle, Rapala, Oliver and Mongrel work boots, and Jewellerv from Meelah Collections. Plus, many more. There is something for everyone!

We have now started selling ammunition and powder, Weatherby, Sako, Hornady, Federal, Remington, Fiocchi – so have a great range available now. Whether you need reloading or factory ammo, we have you covered. If we don't have it, we will source it for you.

How long have you operated this business?

Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale

July 7th - There was a total yarding of 4010. Numbers were reduced with a very small penning of 470 sheep and 3540 lambs.

The quality of the lambs was very good, carrying plenty of weight and condition. There were a few plainer quality lots and light weight Merinos. All the regular buyers were in attendance.

Market trends were generally dearer than the previous sale, the exception being a few plainer quality crossbreds to restockers. There was limited competition on those lambs with a limited supply available.

Well finished trade weights up to 24kg were \$4 to \$10/head dearer. The heavy and extra heavy weight lambs saw trends from \$4 to \$11/head dearer with the extra heavy weights improving in quality and carrying more weight. It was a very mixed quality penning of sheep, all in small lots. Competition was strong with market trends dearer for the most part and there was some skin related price change.

Armidale Cattle Sale

July 8th - Numbers increased sharply to 800 head with the commencement of a new financial year. Tradition continued with an influx of vealers, held over to July. Cows were well supplied and there was representation in most other categories.

The quality and condition of the offering was mixed. Some of the young cattle showing the effects of Winter. The same processors operated and there was very strong restocker activity. Demand was very high through the young cattle resulting in dearer trends. Vealer steers to restock experienced significant improvement in all weight classes. That trend carried into the heifer portion also. Strong feedlot demand saw heavy weight yearling steers sell very well, however there was nothing from the previous sale to make a market comparison. Heavy heifer yearlings followed a similar trend. High processor demand for well finished heavy cattle saw grown steers post strong gains.

Well finished grown heifers attracted both feedlot and processor competition to sell much dearer. A very good quality penning of heavy weight cows met keen demand to sell to a dearer trend of as much as 14c/kg. Heavy weight bulls were up to 10c/kg dearer.

Weekly Wool Sales

July 10th - The first sale of the new season got off to a nervous start with a continuation of last week's losses occurring. The Northern region indicator fell 15 cents with the 18 micron indicator recording the largest fall.

By the second day of sales the three day drop in the market was

enough to spark buyer interest with prices finishing the day slightly dearer. This trend continued on Thursday in the Southern region with the market gaining further ground leaving the Eastern market indicator down 3 cents for the week.

44,819 bales were sold nationally with a passed in rate of 12.6%. Major buyers included Techwool, Tianyu and PJ Morris. The first two weeks of the new seasons offering is far greater in size than last season, continuing the trend seen over the past 4-5 months.

Another 50,000 plus bale national offering is expected next week before auctions head into the annual three week recess. Interestingly and in a positive sign for the broader Merino types forward market prices focused on the 21 micron indicator this week. Contracts changed hands at a premium to this week's physical close as far out as January 2022
