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Wandsworth Hall to get new amenities block

STATE Government COVID-19 support program has seen funds flow for the historic Wandsworth Hall, with Northern Tablelands MP Adam Marshall announcing a \$34,155 grant to install a new toilet block.

"This grant is a huge win for the Wandsworth Hall committee members and the local district, providing the money needed for a long-awaited new toilet block," Mr Marshall said.

"Funds will be spent demolishing the existing amenities, before a new accessible toilet is constructed in its place.

"The new amenities will improve the hall's functionality and make it a more attractive venue for locals to hire out for parties, weddings and rural landholder forums.

Council elections postponed until December due to COVID

The NSW Government last week announced a new date for the Local Government elections which were due to be held in September. The date has been pushed back to Saturday December 4th in response to the COVID-19 situation. The caretaker period for current councils will now commence on November 5th, and the results of the election are expected around the 23rd of December.

The NSW Government has worked with the Electoral Commission and NSW Health to implement a comprehensive plan to allow voters to cast their ballot safely in person, by post or online

iVote (electronic voting) will also be available for the first time in the local council elections and the NSW Government has implemented changes to pre-poll to ensure that voters have 13 days to cast their ballot, reducing congestion on polling day.

The electoral rolls will now close on October 25th. Candidates nominations will open on October 25th and close on November 3rd.

'Tildy's Sausage Sensation' A mother's tribute to her daughter

Peta Kerr was a happy and talented girl with a love for life, for running, gymnastics, riding and for her family, friends and school. Tragically, she was diagnosed with brain cancer just before her 10th birthday, a disease which eventually claimed her life in 2019 aged 11.

While undergoing treatment in hospital Peta spent a lot of time away from home and school and began to write stories about her beloved dog, Tildy.

After Peta's passing her Mum, Kate Kane, decided to work on the stories and publish them in her memory, as well as to raise money for vital research into childhood cancer. The result is a delightful book 'Tildy's Sausage Sensation' which is now available to purchase.

The book is a tribute to Peta and a reminder of the special bond that she had with Tildy. Their shared journey is captured in beatutiful illustrations by local artist Kay Smith

It has been a labour of love for Kate, who still misses her daughter every day. By raising money for more research she hopes that it can stop this happening to another child and another family

"Childhood cancer is devastating and Tildy was such a comfort for Peta. She absolutely adored her and they had some really happy times together," Kate said.

"Peta didn't get the chance to finish her story and this was something I wanted to do for her, and also to help others."

"Throughout her illness Peta kept her beautiful smile, always thinking of others before herself, and never complained.

"Even during her sickest times, she was more worried about the sacrifices the family was making for her than she was for herself." "Now that the book is finished I have mixed emotions because it has been a lot of hard work and a steep learning curve, but also a way of staying close to Peta and keeping her memory alive.

"Through Tidly, her horse and the Willy Wagtails that she loved, I still have a connection to my daughter and it is through them that I get a lot of comfort.

"I hope that others can learn more about her and how they can help fight the disease which took her from us."

The profits from 'Tildy's Sausage Sensation' will be split between the Children's Cancer Institute and the Children's Brain Cancer Centre. Kate said that research into childhood cancer, and specifically childhood brain cancer, is vastly underfunded.

Protocols for some childhood cancers have not changed in 30 years, and in that time the number of drugs developed specifically for children's cancers has been pitifully small compared to the number developed for adults. On average one Australian child dies every nine days from brain cancer and three Australian children die each week from cancer. More research is desperately needed to improve these statistics as well as to improve outcomes for survivors.

Funding for critical Child Care services in New England

The Guyra Preschool and Long Daycare Centre will share in over \$2 million in Federal Government funding allocated to the electorate of New England to help meet the needs of families. They will receive a \$150,000 capital component and \$300,000 sustainability component for Centre-based Day Care activities in Guyra.

Deputy Prime Minister and Member for New England, Barnaby Joyce has welcomed the allocation of an additional \$2.367 million to support vital regional child care services and help meet the needs of local families.

Mr Joyce said 19 services will receive funding through the Federal government's Community Child Care Fund (CCCF) which helps improve access to child care and increase workforce participation in remote, regional and disadvantaged communities.

"The funding will help local child care services improve access to quality care, particularly in more rural parts of the New England electorate," Mr Joyce said.

"It will be good for our kids, good for our hard-working families and ultimately for our community. It will also have a positive economic benefit by allowing more local parents to get back into work or to take on additional hours if they chose," Mr Joyce said.

"The funds will support services in areas such as Guyra, Glen Innes, Tenterfield, Uralla, Kootingal, Nundle and the Upper Hunter that may need support to keep operating, or to fund capital projects to improve services and increase the number of places available.

Minister for Regional Education, Senator Bridget McKenzie said the CCCF would help ensure child care continued to be available for many families in New England.

"These grants will have tangible benefits for child care providers that will flow to local children and their families. It means more New England families can take advantage of our child care subsidy if they choose to work, learn or volunteer." Senator McKenzie said.

Rural suicide is "a thing". It's a sad fact that folk in rural areas die by suicide at a greater rate than their urban counterparts

G'day. I am a rural recovery support worker with the New England Family Support Service.

I was walking down Bradley St. a few weeks ago and within a half hour I had several random conversations with folk about how things are going. The standout about those chats was that three folk mentioned suicide as a matter of concern. These were random "how ya going" type conversations, so the subject is obviously close to the surface and not surprisingly.

There have been several folk take their own lives across the New England region in the last 12 months or so. Statistics show in Australia we lose about 8 men and 2 women daily to suicide and that people in rural areas die by suicide at a greater rate than their urban counterparts.

So last week NEFSS hosted a Community Touchpoints Workshop at The GALA Centre, presented by Donna Boughton from Healthwise.

The interest was so strong we had to book another to cater for numbers, and to keep the meetings well within C-19 guidelines. This will be next week August 5th.

These Free workshops are designed to be useful to the

general community, presented by folk with lived experience in plain English. They are not for medical people only.

Anyone who has connection to their community and deals with people is welcome to come and gain an understanding of how to recognise and respond to suicide.

We can all be informed and all make a difference.



MP furious over NAB branch closures

NORTHERN Tablelands MP Adam Marshall has urged National Australia Bank (NAB) customers in Guyra and Uralla to consider immediately changing who they bank with, as he condemned the financial institution's decision to close branches in both towns.

A disgusted Mr Marshall said just as agriculture, retail and hospitality businesses were finally starting to recover from the drought and bushfires, NAB had decided to turn its back on some of its most loyal customers.

"It's been exactly 12 months since NAB attempted to close its Uralla branch, using COVID-19 restrictions and a decline in over-the-counter-transactions as an excuse," Mr Marshall said.

"In that instance people power saw the decision overturned, however, not happy with that, NAB is now kicking our hard-working small businesses and families in the guts again, with the complete loss of face-to-face services.

"This is a bastard act from a company that no longer deserves country people's support.

"They're walking away from us and I'd urge those who can to walk away from them."

Mr Marshall said NAB was preying on the loyalty of country people, no doubt hoping its customers remain, despite this latest slap in the face.

"Country people traditionally have been loyal in how they shop, bank and insure but loyalty is a two-way street and these NAB shysters haven't shown much loyalty to its customers in the bush and I believe we no longer owe any to them," he said.

"As one of the largest banks in Australia, NAB has a responsibility to ensure equitable access to face-to-face banking services for everyone regardless of changes in banking behaviour.

"Rural and regional NSW is falling victim to the prioritisation of profits, while metropolitan Sydney still has access to over 70 NAB branches.

"When NAB posts a 2021 Half Yearly Result of \$3.34 billion in cash earnings, 94.8 per cent higher than its Half Year Results last year, you really have to question the rationale behind closing services when things are apparently so good.

"I mean, how much money do they really need to make off the backs of country people?

"Instead of paying the wages

of local tellers the bank is going to invest millions of dollars to redevelop its Armidale premises and install self-service digital bars and business change and deposit schemes.

"I'm sure customers in Guyra and Uralla, which are two very independent communities, won't appreciate being told they have to find time to travel to Armidale to deposit takings or make withdrawals, when they have a functional branch on their main street.

"Of course we know a lot of people do online banking, but Guyra and Uralla both have a large population of older people and farmers, who still bank the traditional way, going in face-to-face, making a deposit or a withdrawal.

"My position has always been clear when it comes to the big four banks maintaining a presence in regional communities; if you have paying local customers, you should offer local services.

"Along with deserting Uralla and Guyra, NAB has also turned its back on its motto 'More than Money'. I encourage NAB to reconsider this decision, do the right thing and choose people over profits."

Borders zones back between QLD and NSW

The Queensland Government has formally closed it border to regional NSW and re-established a border zone, in response to the spread of the Delta variant of COVID-

Glen Innes Severn, Gwydir, Inverell and Moree Plains local government areas had been included in the new border zone, allowing residents to still enter Queensland to conduct essential activities.

A Queensland Travel Declaration is required for everyone entering the state. You must complete the form in the three days before you travel to Queensland.

Queensland residents and New South Wales border zone residents can only cross the border for essential reasons.

Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep & Lamb sale

July 21st - Lamb numbers remained steady at 3500 with a small increase in the sheep to 690. The quality of the lambs was generally good, however there was a variation in condition. The usual processors were in attendance and there was increase in restocker activity with a greater selection on offer.

The demand for restocker lambs was strong with buyers showing interest in lambs also good enough for some processors. There were no similar quality lambs from the previous sale to make a market comparison.

Well finished trade weight

lambs up to 24kg dressed sold to a slightly dearer market trend, up \$2 to \$6/head.

The heavier weights also saw a mostly dearer trend with similar improvements. There were odd sales that remained firm. The sheep on offer varied from bare shorn to full wool and showed a variation in condition.

Market trends were generally firm to dearer with skin values providing for a large range in price though classes.

Armidale Cattle Sale

July 22nd - Numbers halved to 400 head with all categories represented. The quality of the offering was fair to good. There were some very well bred cattle penned, with the older cattle showing the higher condition scores. There was a high level of restocker and feedlot activity, however not all processors participated.

Trends varied in the vealer categories to restockers with the light weights selling to a cheaper trend, breed being a factor. The medium and heavy weight steers sold to dearer trends with the medium weights showing strong gains. Those trends followed into the heifer portion.

Medium and heavy weight yearling steers to feed posted strong gains with increased competition and premiums for selected breeds. There were very few heifers suitable to feed, whilst the heavy trade heifers sold to a dearer trend. Heavy grown steers sold to dearer trends with feedlots active on steers over 500kg.

Heavy weights to processors were slightly dearer with some breed related price change. Well finished grown heifers attracted stronger demand to sell to a dearer trend. Demand was again high in the cow market with trends dearer throughout.

There was a small improvement in the higher yielding cows, while the balance showed strong improvement. Restockers were keen to purchase any of the PTIC cows well over prices obtained for cows to process. Heavy bulls sold to a dearer trend.

Good news story from Kolora

The following story was featured recently on the McLean Care (Kolora) Facebook page. It is reprinted in the Gazette, with permission from all involved.

Pat's Story - Pat was born and grew up in East Maitland. She had four sisters and was very close to her whole family. Her childhood is something she cherishes most. Pat went on to study nursing and midwifery along with her sisters. She enjoyed nursing and later nursed her late husband and parents until they passed away.

Pat married and had two children of her own, she helped her husband with their dairy farm for many years as well as working in a nursing home to help with income. Pat says her life was hard but she enjoyed every minute of it.

After a series of events Pat become very unwell. After a few hospital visits her Doctor and family decided Pat needed to be in an aged care facility to have around the clock care. Six months ago, Pat came to Kolora with bad lower body pain and palliating. She refused to eat, walk, take med-



ication and repeatedly expressed she just wanted to die. Everyone at Kolora made Pat as comfortable as possible and worked hard to give her the best quality of life.

Over the time Pat has been at Kolora, staff have worked with her and supported her wishes. She has gradually started eating; reduced most of her medication and is improving every day.

Due to Pat having ongoing leg pain she required physio to help keep her legs moving, after many attempts to stand and walk Pat didn't feel confident enough to walk more then a few steps, often feeling to dizzy to continue.

Jean (our beautiful Physio) worked with Pat daily, building a strong bond with Pat so she would feel safe and confident taking a few extra steps. On Monday the 7th of July, staff overheard Pat talking in the dining room and much to all their surprise Pat had walked from her room to the dining room using her wheelie walker (with Jean's) assistance

What matters? New England

There's a new organisation in the New England electorate with members from across the region. What Matters? New England Electorate (WMNEE) has been formed by a group of community minded locals wanting a more meaningful connection between the people of New England and our political process.

WMNEE has no affiliation with any political party or independent candidate and is keen to hear from everyone, so that all voices are heard and respected.



Most of the first half was an


even contest with Rhylee Adams scoring for Guyra and keeping Armidale on its toes.

This Saturday the Spuds make the long journey to Moree.




