# New amenities block for Tenterden Hall

TENTERDEN Hall is the latest community facility to receive State Government COVID-19 support to improve its facilities and stimulate the local economy, with Northern Tablelands MP Adam Marshall today announcing a \$40,830 grant to install a new toilet block.

"This grant is a huge win for the Tenterden Hall committee members and the local district, providing the money for a much-needed new toilet block," Mr Marshall said. "Funds will be spent installing a new accessible toilet block, with men's and women's amenities, attached to the rear of the hall.

"The prefabricated building will be delivered to the hall, before being plumbed into the septic system.

"The new amenities will improve the hall's functionality and make it a more attractive venue for locals to hire out for parties, weddings and rural landholder forums.

"While the old tennis courts

and outbuildings have seen better days, you can really tell the love and hard work the committee continues to put in to keep the hall functional and accessible to users.

"There is so much to celebrate at the moment with the district around Tenterden and Guyra experiencing a bumper agricultural season.

"These improvements will ensure Tenterden continues to have a local space where the community can safely and comfortably congregate to-

gether.

"Constructed in 1925, the hall committee is keen to see some major improvements undertaken before the centenary celebrations and this is a great way to kick off those works."

The Crown Land Manager COVID-19 Recovery Support Program is providing \$4.1 million in grants statewide to help Crown land managers recover from the pandemic by funding asset improvements and work, health and safety plans on reserves.

## **Check your letterbox for Census instructions**

The Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) has started sending instructions on how to complete the Census to more than 10 million Australian households ahead of the Census on Tuesday August 10.

Around 85 per cent of all households in Australia will receive a letter that explains how to complete online or how to order a paper form.

Some households will receive a paper form and a reply-paid

envelope for its return. There are instructions on the paper form if they prefer to complete it online.

Andrew Henderson, Census Executive Director and National Spokesperson said to check your letterbox.

"We're encouraging people to complete their Census, as soon as they receive their instructions, if they know where they will be on Tuesday August 10.

"This means you don't have

to wait and complete on a single night. We know this flexibility will make it more convenient for people to complete.

"People will be able to complete the Census online, on their mobile device or on paper. We're also making it as easy as possible for everyone to participate in the Census with a range of support and assistance available."

ABS expects around 75 per

cent of forms to be completed online this year, compared to 63 per cent in 2016. It will take the average household 30 minutes to complete the Census.

The 2021 Census campaign message is that 'Every stat tells a story' highlighting how Census data is used to guide services for individuals, families and communities.


## Bush Fire Danger Period starts early across region

Six Local Government Areas (LGAs) in the New England and Northern Tablelands areas will commence the Bush Fire Danger Period (BFDP) early, due to prevailing local conditions.

NSW Rural Fire Service (NSW RFS) Superintendent Chris Wallbridge said the six LGAs that will enter the BFDP from 1 August 2021 are Armidale Regional, Walcha, Uralla, Glen Innes Severn, Inverell and Tenterfield.

"During the Bush Fire Danger Period, landowners and managers are required to obtain a Fire Permit from their local Fire Control Centre before lighting any fires, including hazard reduction burns," Supt Wallbridge said.

"I strongly urge people to exercise extreme caution when carrying out these activities as



we have all seen the devastation that bush fires can inflict on a community.

"Never leave a fire unattended and if a fire does escape, it is essential to call Triple Zero (000) immediately so that emergency services can respond and minimise the damage."

Fire Permit holders are required to let fire authorities and their neighbours know at least 24 hours before lighting up. You can notify your intention to burn by visiting www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify or for Northern Tablelands residents phoning 1300 141 119.

## Science in the classroom

In Science, Guyra Central School's Stage 1 students have been looking at different materials, and how they change. They made playdough in all different colours and then wrote a procedure on 'How to make playdough'. ## Free calls from public payphones

Australians will be able to make free calls from public payphones across the country under a new Telstra initiative.

Standard national calls and SMS from Telstra's network of more than 15,000 payphones will be made free from Tuesday August 3, while payphones will become completely coinless from October 1.

Consumers will still have to pay for overseas calls. About 11 million calls were made across Telstra payphones in the past year, including 230,000 calls to critical services such as triple zero and Lifeline.

Telstra has previously made national calls on its payphones free over the Christmas and New Year period, making it easier for the homeless to contact others.

## Odd fleeces wanted by local spinner

#### New Amenities for Wandsworth and Tenterden Halls

Tenterden and Wandsworth halls are the latest community facilities in the Guyra area to receive State Government COVID-19 support to install new amenities.

At Tenterden, \$40,830 will be spent installing a new prefab toilet block with men's and women's toilets, at the rear of the hall.

Constructed in 1925, the hall committee is keen to see some major improvements undertaken before the centenary celebrations and this is a great way to kick off those works.

Just up the road at Wandsworth Hall, a \$34,155 grant will also install a new toilet block.

Funds will be spent demolishing the existing amenities, before a new accessible toilet is constructed in its place.

In 2019, the Wandsworth and Llangothlin bushfire burnt out more than 7,000 hectares.

Events like that highlight the need for the

area to have a safe and accessible public space where locals, of all level of mobility, can gather in the event of a disaster.

The new amenities will improve both hall's functionality and make them a more attractive venue for locals to hire out for parties, weddings and rural landholder forums.

These improvements will ensure Tenterden and Wandsworth residents continue to have a local space where the community can safely and comfortably congregate together.

## Guyra Historical Society technology grant

Hundreds of priceless historical items from Guyra's past are being preserved in the newly upgraded museum, and I was pleased to announce last month a \$5,636 State Government grant to purchase a new computer and remote close-circuittelevision (CCTV) equipment to complete that project.

Since 2018, \$120,346 in NSW Government funding has been provided to

upgrade the 113 year old original council chambers building on Bradley Street.

These works have included internal and external painting, installation of new flooring, side and back doors, display cases, security system, ultraviolet protection film on all windows, and hanging tracks.

In order to maximise use of this technology a new monitor will be installed in the office and research room, along with an internet connection to allow remote viewing of the network when the alarm is triggered.

This will remove the need for volunteers to attend the museum at night when the system is activated by movement.

I was very pleased to be able to help secure this extra money at the request of the society members, and hope the new technology assists with the preservation of Guyra's heritage.




