Guyra locked down as COVID spreads

The first confirmed coronavirus cases in the New England since 2020 has seen Guyra enter a snap lockdown as part of the Armidale Regional LGA.

The news was announced by Health Minister Brad Hazzard on Saturday morning and as a result the community began a seven day COVID-19 lockdown at 5pm on Saturday.

The stay-at-home order also applies to people who have been to the community since July 29.

There have now been three confirmed cases of community transmission in Armidale, all from the same household. Only three exposure sites have been listed - Armidale Secondary College, Domino's Pizza and the Explorer service from Broadmeadow to Armidale on 29 July.

On Monday, Tamworth also went into lockdown for 7 days. While there is no confirmed case of community transmission in Tamworth a woman from Newcastle with COVID had visited a number of loca-

tions.

The Public Health Order for the Armidale local government area will remain in place until August 15th.

Armidale Regional Council Mayor Ian Tiley said that it is disappointing but not surprising that COVID has reached our region.

"Over the last few years we have dealt with drought, bushfires and COVID and I am in no doubt that if we stick together, do the right thing and look-out for each other we will get past this current outbreak of community transmission," Mayor Tiley said.

"It is extremely important to not be complacent. Get tested if you have even the mildest of symptoms and always act as if COVID is present.

"Be considerate and kind to each other. Reach out to your friends and family to ask if they are OK. Doing the simple things will make a big difference."

Council has enacted its Business Continuity Plan and all non-essential council facilities will be temporarily closed. All hands will still be on deck behind the scenes to ensure essential services are delivered as normal.

LOCKDOWN RULES

During the lockdown you may only leave your home within a 10km limit if you have a reasonable excuse.

These include:

· buying groceries or medication - one person per household per day

- work or study that cannot be done at home
- exercise

• healthcare - including to get a COVID-19 vaccination, or to provide help, care or support

You may travel further than 10km if you are located in an area where groceries or medical services are further away, or if you are caring for someone outside the 10km limit. Other restrictions

- No visitors allowed in your home
- Carry a face mask and proof of residence at all time
- Outdoor public gatherings restricted to two people
- No community sport (training or matches) is allowed

Shoppers urged to comply with health orders

Kirks IGA is asking customers to help them comply with health directives following the lockdown announced by the NSW government. Following a confirmed cases of COVID-19 in Armidale. Guyra, along with the whole of the Armidale Regional LGA, entered a snap lockdown at 5pm on Saturday. The lockdown is scheduled to last until 12.01am on Sunday August 15th.

Kirks IGA manager Harry Kirk said that when news of the lockdown came through, there was a massive surge of customers looking to stock up before the 5pm deadline. This meant that some staff came in on short notice to serve and restock the shelves.

"I want to thank my staff who came and helped us meet the demand from our customers at a very trying time," Harry said.

"They did a fantastic job under difficult circumstances. Our staff are at the frontline and with the lockdown now in place they have

Covid-19 testing now available Guyra

In order to ease pressure and reduce waiting times at COVID-19 testing clinics in Armidale, screening is now available at the Guyra Multi-Purpose Service (MPS). Testing facilities have also been made available in Uralla.

Following the announcement of the Armidale Regional LGA lockdown on Saturday well over 1,000 residents were tested across the city's three clinics each day.

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall said that the trade-off for that huge volume of people has been extensive waiting times.

In order to reduce the number of people travelling to Armidale for testing, Guyra residents can now be tested at the new MPS drivethrough service, which is open from Monday to Friday 8.30am to 11.30am. You need to book an appointment by calling 6738 4000.

"Waiting is inconvenient but necessary if we are to successfully identify and monitor any new infections," Mr Marshall said. "Due to the number of tests being done across the State, it can take up to 48 hours for results to come back. In that time, those who have been tested should be adhering to the stay-at-home-order," Mr Marshall said.

"A big thank you to everyone in the region, you are all doing an amazing job adhering to the lockdown requirements.

"I know this is difficult and frustrating, but if we all do our part, we can come out of this next weekend." now be restricted to one door with a staff member on duty to ensure that everyone entering is complying with the health orders, including wearing masks, sanitising and to assist with the check in process.

Customers are also reminded that only one member from each household should enter the store to purchase essential items and that they should plan ahead so that they can get in and out of the store as quickly as possible.

"We understand this is an uncertain time for our community, but we want to reassure customers our store will remain open throughout the lockdown," Harry said.

"There is plenty of stock coming and our staff are working hard to make sure the shelves are kept stocked and everyone can get their fair share.

Customers are also reminded that home delivery is available by phoning 6779 1555, with morning and afternoon delivery available.

Record breaking sale for Glenavon

Glenavon Angus held their 37th Annual Bull Sale on Monday 2nd August, which resulted in a full clearance of all 103 bulls offered. The 2021 sale saw Glenavon break several of their own stud records, including the top price 2yo bull selling for \$40,000, a yearling Bull lot 51 selling to \$26,000, and unjoined 12mo old heifers topping at \$3,500.

Overall the 2yo bulls averaged \$15,273 and Yearling bulls averaged \$12,166 which were also new records for the stud. The top priced bull Glenavon Enhance Q042, who was used in the stud as a yearling, is from an outstanding female longevity pedigree, and sold locally to the Lindeman Family, Wollomombi. Whilst many bulls sold locally, good drafts were sold to Northern Queensland and as far south as the western districts of Victoria. The line of 94 top of the drop EU heifers were purchased by a Wagyu operation in southern Queensland.

In his opening remarks prior to the sale, Richard Post reinforced the stud's key focus on females, longevity, structure and fertility. The 2yo bulls offered were just weeks old when Richard took them away with their mothers on agistment to western NSW in the depth of the drought in 2019. All that time away from his wife Prue and three young children in an attempt to keep the Glenavon

stud and commercial herd together, was rewarded with the result of this year's sale.

Attendees at the sale were treated to a slow smoked brisket lunch and a remarkably mid August day. Richard and Prue Post would like to thank the local community for their ongoing support of their breeding program, Elders Guyra for managing the sale and key members of the Glenavon team Dan & Emma McLennan and Cody Clarke.

Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep and Lamb Sale

August 4 - There was an overall reduction in lamb numbers with 2350 yarded down 1150 on the previous sale. Sheep supplies were up 100 to 790.

The quality and condition of the lamb offering was very mixed. There was an increase in numbers of light-weight Merinos and a fair supply of well-finished medium and heavy weight crossbred lambs. The usual processors were in attendance, while local restockers were active on the light weight Merino lambs and processors active on the heavier weights.

Market trends varied through the lambs. Crossbreds to restock-

ers sold to cheaper trends with quality contributing and the market lacked light-weight Merino lambs from the previous sale to make a market comparison. Wellfinished trade lambs up to 22kg dressed sold to a slightly cheaper trend. The heavier weight classes mostly sold to dearer trends. There was some weight related price improvement with more lambs in the extra heavy weight class. There was also some negative price change where breeding and quality were factors.

It was a mixed quality and conditioned penning of sheep. There were a number of bare shorn Merino sheep, alongside a few lots of longer wool sheep. Demand was weaker from processors with market trends mostly a little cheaper.

Armidale Cattle Sale

August 11 - A yarding of 290 down 110 on previous sale. With the district very wet, numbers reduced to their lowest winter offering. All categories were represented with low numbers in all.

The quality and condition of the offering was very mixed, with a few plainer conditioned cattle showing the effects of the cold and wet weather. There was restricted processor competition, however local restockers and some feedlots active.

Market trends varied through the young cattle. Vealer steers to restockers sold to a significantly cheaper trend while light weight heifer vealers remained firm with some quality related price change. A very mixed quality penning of yearling steers also sold to a cheaper trend with quality affecting price change. Yearling heifers followed a similar trend with the same factors in play. All the heavy grown steers went to restockers and feedlots, the majority carrying 4 and 6 teeth, while those with 2 teeth attracted strong premiums.

There was a fair supply of plain conditioned manufacturing steers penned that sold to a slightly cheaper trend. There was little change in the market for well-finished cows with reduced processor competition. Restockers were active on plainer condition cows

Five Bulls were sold into Queensland, which is a first for us and one heading to Victoria. Thank you once again to all our local buyers.

Kranga Cattle Co bought three bulls, two Dusty sons

and a Booragul General. HM Grazing Bendemeer first time customers also bought three bulls, two Rennylea sons and a Booragul General. Thank you to the Davidson Cameron team on a very successful sale especially Nick Rogers who has done a great job for us over the past two years. Special thanks to all our dear friends and family who helped on the day in the yards, on the BBQ and in the kitchen, we could not do this without your help. We look forward to welcoming you all back next August for our 2022 sale.
