## Stay at Home order extended

Guyra has entered its second week of lockdown, following the extension of restrictions for at least another week. A 7day extension to the Armidale Regional LGA lockdown was announced on the weekend. It was later updated to a Statewide lockdown due to concern over the spread of COVID-19 to more rural areas.

The stay-at-home order now applies to all people in NSW. The lockdown is due to end at 12:01am on Sunday, 22 August.

Only a handful of main street businesses have continued to trade, including Kirks IGA and SPAR supermarkets. Other businesses are operating behind closed doors offering take way and home delivery.

Four confirmed cases of COVID-19, all in Armidale and all in the one household, sparked the initial lockdown. While there has been no further community transmission the decision was based on advice provided by a number of our State's top health experts and epidemiologists, including Health advice from Director of Public Health in Hunter New England Local Health District, Professor David Durrheim.

Professor Durrheim said that prematurely lifting the stay at home orders for Armidale could result in a preventable foreseeable outbreak in the town and spread into vulnerable rural communities.

He also said that another week would provide a clearer picture and confidence as to whether the measures should be lifted.

In response to the Statewide lockdown NSW Police are conducting Operation STAY AT HOME across all of New South Wales. They are urging people to stay at home unless you need to leave for an essential reason. If you must leave home, stay within your local area. There are increased fines for Public Health Order breaches: •\$5,000 for breaching self-

isolation rules. •\$5,000 for lying on a permit.

• \$5,000 for lying to a contact tracer.

•\$3,000 for breaching the two-person outdoor exercise/recreation rule.

•\$3,000 for breaching rules around entry into regional NSW.

The reasons you may leave your home include:

•Shopping for food or other essential goods and services.

•Medical care or compassionate need. This includes where two people are in a relationship but do not live together. (people can leave home to have a COVID-19 vaccination unless you have been identified as a close contact)

• Exercise outdoors in groups of 2 or fewer (unless members of the same household).

•Work, where you cannot

work from home

• Schooling will be done from home but schools will be open for the children of essential workers

#### **Other restrictions:**

•Masks must be worn indoors (not including the home) and in outdoor settings where you cannot socially distance from others (e.g. while queuing for takeaway)

•Small funerals and memorial services of 10 persons only (excluding the persons conducting the service) will be permitted

•Get a COVID-19 test if you have symptoms: Testing is available at the Guyra MPS by appointment 6738 4000

• Check exposure sites regularly on the NSW Health website

## Landholders push back

Energy companies proposing renewables in the New England region of NSW are facing push back from landholders and the broader community frustrated at the state government's poor rollout of the energy transition – lack of strategic land use planning, lack of real engagement with impacted landholders, and irresponsible management of environmental protection and community wellbeing.

Responsible Energy Devel-

opment for New England Inc. (ReD4NE) is an umbrella group uniting disaffected landholder groups and communities, raising concerns about project specific renewables proposals, formed to lobby all levels of government and voice marginalised community objections. ReD4NE has now called on the NSW Government for a moratorium on development pending more meaningful engagement on critical issues the community see as eroding social licence.

There are implied potential impacts for renewables investors with the current planning assessment and energy infrastructure struggling to accommodate existing proposals, and communities anxious that they will be left with stranded foreign-owned assets with no accountability.

## Armidale's top recycling program the key to securing partnership with South America

While others are putting recyclables into landfill, Armidale's world-class crate recycling system is again, leading the way and securing international markets for our plastics.

A newly established partnership between South America and Armidale Recycling Services (ARS) saw a semi-trailer sized shipment of mixed plastics exported from Council's waste facilities last week.

ARS is contracted to process recycling materials

from Council's kerbside collection service and the community support in separating recyclables at home is keeping contamination rates low and turning recyclables into sales.

Armidale Recycling Services Manager Mark Low said clean recycling delivers big demand and Council's crate system is the key to successful overseas demand.

"The mixed plastics product that comes out of the recycling centre is of a high quality, which says as much about the community as it does about the facility. Separation at the source by our community members means contamination is kept to a minimum and it's the quality of the final product that has lead the facility to securing this contract.

"T'm very pleased with the outcome and this follows a previous load of mixed plastics that went to Asia."

"Many in the industry are finding it nearly impossible to sell their plastics due to the lack of demand, but product quality and cleanliness is critical to securing deals," said Mr Low.

Mr Low also praised the foresight of Armidale Regional Council who introduced the crate system back in 1996.

"Armidale has an outstanding waste management record. With recently upgraded recycling facilities and a high level of community participation, our recycling figures are exceptional," said Mr Low.

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## Time to get out and clean up the farm

Local Land Services (LLS) is advising landholders August is the perfect time to get in and clean up on-farm ahead of an expected busy Spring.

Cleaning up will help reduce the potential impact of pests, by reducing their possible breeding and nesting locations, as well as reduce the risks for livestock to chemical residues from items such as old batteries.

LLS Agriculture and Plant Biosecurity Business Partner, Andrew Lieschke said a yearly farm clean up in winter was a good idea.

"Farming is busy all year round, but if you can get in and clean up in winter, it should make life easier when you're flat out with sowing or harvesting or shearing," Mr Lieschke said.

"You could target one area a week, maybe the shed first, silos next and then around the house yard to reduce the job into more manageable tasks.

"With mice numbers expected to increase across large parts of the state as we head into spring, one of the best management tips is to minimise feed sources and shelter, which can be as simple as cleaning up residual grain or cleaning out sheds and silos."

Mr Lieschke said cleaning up old lead batteries and building materials was also important to reduce any potential animal health risks.

"Battery cases become brittle with time and cattle with their generally inquisitive nature, especially younger cattle, can easily disturb an old battery to access the lead that they contain," Mr Lieschke said.

"They develop a taste for the salts in the lead and can go back repeatedly to lick and chew at the source."

Other than batteries, sources of lead that may be readily found on farms include lead-based paint on farm buildings or other structures, ash from fires left after burning these products, automotive grease, oil filters, sump oil and linoleum.

Other old chemical drums should also be cleaned and taken to their local drum-MUSTER collection site which can be found on the drum-MUSTER website www.drummuster.org.au/find-a-collection -site.

"It is also a good time to register your ag and vet chemicals with ChemClear (www.chemclear.org.au) to receive storage stickers for chemicals and receive alerts when there are chemical collections happening in the area," Mr Lieschke said.

#### Rural Market Report*s*

#### **Weekly Wool Sales**

**13-8-2021** - Sales resumed after the annual three week recess. Hopes of a fairly stable market rapidly evaporated and for the third year in a row the first sale back from the mid-year break suffered some large losses. It is not always one way traffic when sales recommence in August with the past 10 years registering 5 up weeks averaging a 21 cent increase and 5 down weeks averaging a 68 decrease.

53,000 bales nationally were expected to be offered this week however withdrawals prior to sale reduced this figure. The Northern region indicator fell 46 cents on the first day of sales followed by a further 13 cents on the final day. Most types closed the week around 4% cheaper. Resistance to the falling prices was high with passed in rates above 30% on the first day of sales and climbing closer to 40% on the final day.

32,839 bales were sold nationally for the week. Major buyers included Techwool, PJ Morris & Aust Merino Exporters. Forward market prices for later this year appeared undeterred by this week's auction decline, with buyer interest 30 cents above the physical close for 19 micron. Some signs of the market stabilising appeared during the final day of selling in the Southern region.

## Annual land & stock returns due by end of August

Landholders are being reminded to lodge their Local Land Services (LLS) Annual Land and Stock Returns before the end of August.

The returns, which are a statutory requirement, were posted to thousands of landholders in June. Acting Chair of the LLS statewide board, Allison Harker said by filling in the Annual Land and Stock Return, landholders help build a picture of agricultural land use and livestock numbers across NSW.

"This combined effort assists in monitoring flocks and herds for emergency animal diseases," Ms Harker said.

"Information about livestock, including pigs, horses and poultry helps us assist customers with support such as emergency fodder, yards or shelter when emergencies or disasters strike.

"Annual Land and Stock Returns can be submitted online and should be the number of stock or birds on the property as at 30 June, much like a census captures a moment in time."

Customers are encouraged to lodge online to reduce mail handling during the ongoing COVID-19 restrictions.

Where there are barriers to online lodgement, customers can still mail to the PO Box listed on the return form or phone for further assistance on 1300 795 299.

Ms Harker said given recent emergency responses including bushfires and flooding, it is important to be prepared, not only for these but also disease outbreaks and other biosecurity events.

"Providing accurate information about stock numbers is essential, even if it means lodging a 'nil-return' after difficult decisions around destocking, not running a livestock enterprise, or any other change such as agistment numbers," Ms Harker said.

Landholders are reminded Annual Land and Stock Return numbers do not affect rates as these are calculated on the Notional Carrying Capacity of each property.

Returns are to be lodged no later than Tuesday, 31 August. Landholders can do so through the dedicated online portal at www.lls.nsw.gov.au or can call 1300 795 299 for further support and other options to lodge.

"A club house and green in well-kept surrounding would beautify the southern end of Bradley Street".

On September 28th 1947 the site was selected and, for almost two years thereafter, a small band of voluntary workers toiled practically every weekend preparing the site and laying the foundation for the first green.

## OUR HISTORY - GUYRA BOWLING CLUB

The first records we have of Bowls being played in the Guyra District is a report in 1918 saying, "On Saturday December 29th a team of four Armidale bowlers visited "Ollera". The green was in good order, and a capital game resulted in favour of "Ollera". Messrs Everett Chas: A. and H MacKenzie played for "Ollera", and Messrs Hogarth, Blaxland, Tindal and Hope represented Armidale. "

In 1944 a party consisting of Bert Archibald, Herb Burgess, Jack Rudd, Claude Heagney, Frank Heagney, Bill Culla and Bill Booth plus a few keen fishermen from Armidale, went on a fishing trip to the western rivers. Around a campfire one night Les Burgess, the secretary of the Armidale Bowling Club, conveyed to the other members of the fishing party the important part played by the Bowling Clubs in any community.

The seed had been sown and in 1945 a survey was carried out by the members of the fishing party to find out the extent of interest and what support could be expected from the townspeople of Guyra. The survey was so favourable, that moves were made to find a suitable site, taking into consideration soil type and the availability of water. They then approached the Guyra Rotary Club to lend its weight to the project. The Rotary Club moved through the local Chamber of commerce, which in turn, requested the Guyra Shire Council to call a public meeting for the purpose of discussing the formation of a Bowling Club in Guyra.

From the meeting that was held on 23rd November 1946 a committee of enthusiasts were appointed to investigate the aspects of establishing a club including the most suitable site and financial arrangements. Members of the committee appointed were Messrs. A. Pryor, L.P. Archibald, H.Burgess, T.N Stephens, R.W. Hudson, T.L. Caddy and W.H. Weicks.

The committee moved promptly and by March 1947 it was minuted that the Town Planning Committee had granted authority for the selection of the site for a bowling club. It was to be either on the showground or to the south of the Council Chambers.

Mr. L.P Archibald spoke in favour of the of the site to the south of the Council Chambers saying that:

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
