Sheep Heart tribute goes global

There's a saying that a little bit of love goes a long way and this proved to be the case last week for Guyra's Ben Jackson. Unable to attend the funeral for his beloved aunt Deb Cowdery, he came up with a unique way of saying goodbye in a way that few others could

Ben said that his Aunty Deb had one of the biggest hearts of anyone he knew and had always loved his sheep art. Even though he couldn't be there in person, he still wanted to be part of her farewell.

Working with skills honed during many hours of drought feeding, he laid a trail of grain and filmed his sheep as they joined the line to form the shape of a large white heart.

The video, set to Simon and Garfunkel's "Bridge over Troubled Water", was his contribution to the funeral service. Ben watched the service via a live stream where the video was first played, later sharing it to social media.

Since then it has 'cruised around the world' after being picked up by multiple media outlets.

"I did it for the funeral so it

could be played there as my way of saying goodbye," he said.

"It was pretty darn moving and a bit unreal watching from home and seeing it played for the first time."

"When I posted it online I thought it might get a run on the local news if I was lucky, but last week everywhere you looked it was popping up and people were sharing it.

"I'd like to think that Aunty Deb has been watching and peeking through the clouds. I know she would have loved it and I think she would be amused to see that it has 'gone a bit feral' on the internet as she used to say."

Ben has found himself in demand and has been interviewed by media outlets from all over Australia and worldwide. It started with the Weekly Times and since then he has done around 15 interviews for TV, radio and newspapers. No one was more surprised than Ben to find himself fielding calls from the BBC and the Washington Post.

While he doesn't know the exact number of hits, he estimates it has now been viewed by 10s of millions of people worldwide. It received a kick along when Russell Crowe shared it and was liked by celebrities such as Hugh Jackman and Michelle Pfeiffer.

"The response has been overwhelming really and it is like the whole world is giving me and my family and a big virtual hug," Ben said.

"It got a bit out of control and to be honest it has been very emotionally draining, but it is also very humbling.

"I think it just hit the mark because there are a lot of people out there just like us who have lost someone and are grieving.

"We're not Robinson Crusoe, we are just another family doing it tough and not being able to spend time with the people that we love at the moment."



"Being visible from the road,



New partnership to improve waste disposal and education for social housing tenants

A new partnership between Armidale Regional Council and social housing provider Homes North is set to increase education around waste disposal and provide more opportunities for the region's most vulnerable to properly discard of bulk waste.

The two organisations will collaborate to implement a Regional Social Housing Waste Strategy, which is a move that Mayor Ian Tiley says will maximise the amount of waste diverted from landfill, while greatly assisting the region's low income earners.

"In the areas that have a high volume of social housing, we often find bulky items are illegally dumped or people hold onto rubbish due to not having the means to go to the waste management facility," said Mayor Tiley.

"Through this pilot program, Council and Homes North will work together to rectify these is-



sues and increase education around waste disposal to better equip them for the future."

The program will be trialled for twelve months, and will include regular bulk waste and metal collection days for social housing tenants. Skip bins will be provided in five separate locations, and will give tenants the opportunity to dispose of items such as mattresses and

white goods. These will then be recycled and correctly disposed of by Council.

This will be complemented by education campaigns to teach people about the correct ways to sort rubbish and how to minimise the amount of waste going into landfill.

Homes North is the region's largest social housing provider and manages over 600 tenancies


in Armidale and Guyra. The organisation's CEO Maree McKenzie said this pilot program will help address significant challenges faced by tenants that can often be overlooked.

"Our tenants often don't have suitable vehicles to transport items to waste management facilities, or they don't have the means to pay the disposal fees," said Ms McKenzie.

"Without any options for disposing of waste people have no choice but to store the waste, which can result in vermin and health related issues, or dump it illegally out of desperation which is frustrating for the rest of the community."

"We hope this program will prevent these issues while increasing awareness around correct waste disposal."

The twelve month program will get underway straight away, with the first collection scheduled for October.

Between 9:00am and 3:00pm ANY member of the public over the age of 18 (medical history considered), will be able to walk into the Glen Innes Showground main pavilion, roll up their sleeve and receive their first or second AstraZeneca jab.

It couldn't be easier on Super

Saturday in Glen Innes to get your jab - just pull out your Medicare card, put on your mask, turn up and roll up your sleeve.

No appointment is required.

This is an amazing opportunity for locals to get their first or second COVID jab easily and quickly.

A second clinic will be held on Saturday, 2nd October, from 9:00am-3:00pm, to accommodate those who require their second, follow up jab.

This is all about providing people in the area with even more opportunity to get their vaccination now, supporting the efforts of our local GPs and pharmacists.

Understandably, the demand for vaccinations has sky-rocketed with the events of the last few weeks and

this is a local solution to meet that demand and make it as easy as it can be to get jabbed.

Almost 1,800 people in Armidale, Inverell and Moree have received their jabs through the UNE Mass Vaccination Walk-In hubs during the four clinics offered in the last three weeks.

I also want to recognize the incredible job being done by the Guyra GP and Guyra Pharmacy in making vaccination available to residents.





Restore and thrive



Feedback sought on Waterfall Way upgrades

Work to restore and improve Waterfall Way is continuing with input from the local community and stakeholders now being sought on the next section of this vital transport link.

Deputy Prime Minister and Member for New England Barnaby Joyce said the Commonwealth Government is contributing more than \$37 million from the COVID-19 economic stimulus package, on top of the New South Wales Government's initial \$50 million commitment, to improve Waterfall way.

Mr Joyce, who is also the Minister for Infrastructure, Transport and Regional Development, said the package has brought forward projects to upgrade safety at several locations along the route.

"They include the installation of audio-tactile edge line markings, wide painted centre lines, flexible roadside barriers, shoulder sealing and guardrail installation east of Armidale and at Wollomombi, as well as improvement work on Waterfall Way near Bellingen," Mr Joyce said.

New South Wales Minister for Regional Transport and Roads Paul Toole said this important corridor connects rural Tablelands communities with those on the coast, so ensuring access remains open for those communities is a key objective of the works.

"Local communities are well aware of its importance and this was highlighted again when access was cut at several locations following the severe weather event in March, so it's crucial we get this next stage of work right as well, so we can keep this road open in the future," Mr Toole said.

Planned works at various locations includes widening the road to nine metres, installing or upgrading safety barriers, and improving intersections and road corners. As well as safety upgrades, planned works include slow vehicle passing lanes on Dor-

rigo Mountain to ease congestion.

Work is already complete on some projects, including building a new \$2 million roundabout in Dorrigo and improving stability of two slopes on Dorrigo Mountain.

Northern Tablelands to expand with addition of Walcha

The final determination of the NSW Electoral Districts Redistribution Panel, will see the Northern Tablelands electorate increase in size to incorporate the Walcha Local Government Area (LGA) at the 2023 March State election. The Walcha LGA was formerly part of the Northern Tablelands until it was moved into the Tamworth electorate at the last redistribution in 2015.

The determination will expand the Northern Tablelands seat from an existing area of 53,153 square kilometres, comprising six LGAs, to one of 59,412 square kilometres, comprising seven LGAs, including Armidale Regional, Glen Innes Severn, Gwydir, Moree Plains Shire, Uralla and Walcha.

It is expected the seat, under the new boundaries, will have 58,027 voters. The Panel's final report can be found at www.elections.nsw.gov.au/redistribution

Local company to develop region's Catchment Water Quality Strategic Plan

Armidale Regional Council has awarded the tender to develop the Armidale Regional Council Catchment Water Quality Strategic Plan to local company 2rog Consulting.

2rog Consulting is an environmental consultancy agency based in Armidale, and has a wealth of experience in stakeholder engagement and using science to help solve complex, environmental problems.

The company will work closely with the community and affected landholders to shape and develop strategies that will benefit the health and longevity of the catchments, with these actions to then be implemented by Council over the next ten years.

Council's General Manager James Roncon said the company will develop a ten year strategic plan to elevate water quality in Council's storages and improve catchment health.

"This plan will outline the goals, high priority actions, supporting initiatives and measurement mechanisms to assess and improve water quality outcomes in the greater catchment areas of Council's storage dams," said Mr Roncon.

"This will ensure we are doing everything that can be done to improve the quality of water entering the storage dams while guiding investment and resource allocation across the greater Malpas, Guyra and Puddledock catchments over the next decade."

Mr Roncon said this will complement the work already being done to secure the region's water supply.

"This strategic plan adds to projects such as the upgrade of the Puddledock Dam pipeline and increasing Malpas Dam's spillway," said Mr Roncon.

"An investment in water security and catchment health is a crucial step in future-proofing the region and minimising the detrimental impacts that droughts can have on regional communities."

It's expected the strategic plan will be developed by December 2021.



A report in the Guyra Argus October 1902: "A very nice pavilion has been erected in Guyra park for the convenience of cricketers, and the trustees deserves credit for the way they subscribed to have this long-felt want accomplished. Ladies can now visit the ground and witness a match from the pavilion, which is fitted with seats."

Also in October the North Guyra Cricket Club was reformed and that arrangements had been made with Mr Kearsey to put down a concrete wicket in North Guyra Park.

By 1920 there were 10 or 12 Cricket clubs, Black Mountain had formed 2 clubs G.U.O.O.F (their pitch was a "Parkdale") and Black Mountain.

In 1928 Black Mountain cricketers were at their peak, "Stump" White's bowling was so fast that at a district meeting held at Guyra, business was forgotten and the minutes reads "Stump White's bowling was so terrifically fast and injurious that the discussion was changed to 'How to prevent swelling"

Also in a match at Ollera the report reads: "Cliff Youman demonstrated he struck form. His batting and bowling was all that could be desired and Black Mountain wicket keeper had Ollera players scratching gravel- some thought he had a second Ball."

One ex Black Mountain cricketer stated that they would give any Club a 100 runs start.

The report in February 1931 reads: "that Black Mountain continued on their victorious career by easily accounting for Glenore by 361 runs. Bob Handebo retired 107 again notching a fine century, he was well supported by E. Handebo 66, and the two Youmans, B. Youman 39 and C. Youman 38. Black Mountain is still the old reliable combination which is so hard to defeat."

Rural Market Reports

Weekly Wool Sales

August 28th - Last week's signs that the wool market was stabilising proved to be correct. With the Western region not selling is was a small national offering of just over 28,000 bales.

High withdrawal rates continued with 9.5% of the offering withdrawn prior to sale. On the first day of sales 16.5 to 21 microns gained between 20 and 35 cents. Around half of these gains were lost on the final selling day resulting in a 5 cent weekly gain for the Northern region indicator.

The quality of the offering is impacting on the individual micron quotes particularly in the Northern region with a higher degree of heavier vegetable matter types coming through the system. 24,100 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 14.7%.

Major buyers included Tianyu, Techwool and Fox & Lillie. The Australian Wool Production Forecasting Committee has updated their forecast for the 2021/22 season. 69 million sheep are expected to be shorn around the country with a lift in the average cut per head resulting in a 5.2% increase in production.

Almost 40,000 additional bales have already been offered this season compared to last season.

OUR HISTORY - GUYRA & DISTRICT CRICKET

Cricket was being played in the Guyra District before February 1886 a report in the Armidale Express February 26th 1886 stated;

"-the return match between Guyra and Black Mountain Cricket Club was played at Black Mountain and the home team was again victorious winning by 2 runs and 7 wickets.

The greatest good feeling prevailed throughout partly owning to the very good lunch provided by Host Scott, I should imagine to which great attention was paid, and ample justice done. The wicket was rather bumpy, and the ball hung considerably, but there are worse pitches than Black Mountain.

However, Mr. Scott is clearing the New ground about 50 yards from the railway station, and along the Black Mountain wicket will be a really good one, another match will be played at Black Mountain against Eversleigh."
