Murals turn drab into fab



In what is hoped will be the beginning of a series of public artworks throughout the Guyra CBD, a ceremony was held last week to unveil murals in Volunteer Park.

The artworks have trans-

formed the amenities block, taking it from 'drab to fab' thanks to the talents of local artists Brian Irving and Kay Smith. They teamed up to complete a series of six murals depicting the Mother of Ducks

Lagoon, which wrap around the building adding colour and

Brian and Kay have previously worked together on two joint exhibitions. Their collaborative works have been extremely popular, combining the characteristics of Brian's Aboriginal Art with Kay's realist style. The murals were completed off site before being mounted on the building.

The inspiration for the works came from designs submitted by students at Guyra Central School. In 2018, Brian and Kay led the students in a series of workshops to come up with designs that depicted the local area.

The student's original designs have also been included in a collage, acknowledging their efforts and talents.

Prior to the unveiling Brian quipped that he thought they would 'knock the socks' off the town and that prediction came true.

The immediate reaction was full of superlatives – 'perfection, 'amazing', 'beautiful', brilliant', 'stunning' and 'fantastic' featured prominently following the big reveal.

The project was not without controversy and there was significant opposition to plans by Armidale Regional Council (ARC) to employ a Melbourne based artist to complete the work.

Feedback showed that a local approach would be more in line with community expec-

tations. ARC Mayor Ian Tiley acknowledged at the unveiling that council was forced to rethink plans in light of the negative feedback.

"Guyra rebelled against an edict from the top, so council agreed you could have the mural that you wanted," Cr Tiley said.

"The Chamber of Commerce came on board and sponsored a fresh application for funding from the Bushfire Community Recovery Resilience Fund, receiving \$11,000 for this project."

"It speaks volumes about the people of Guyra that they didn't want any mural, they wanted their own particular mural.

"Thank you to a whole lot of people involved in making this happen," Cr Tiley concluded.

President of the Guyra and District Chamber of Commerce Steve Mepham said that the murals will be an added attraction for tourists. He also thanked Donna Davidson and her team who worked behind the scenes to bring the project to fruition.

Special thanks goes to tradies Adam Hoffman, Jeremy Cox and their teams who assisted with the preparation of the site and the installation of the murals.



Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale

September 15 - Lamb numbers remained steady at 2100, while sheep supplies halved to 600. There was a single pen of new season lambs and a good supply of well finished heavy and extra heavy weights. Overall the quality was quite mixed. The full compliment of processors operated and there was some local restocker activity on the plainer condition lots.

Market trends varied with the new season lambs, estimated at just over 24kg cwt, well received. The better quality lambs to restockers sold to dearer trends, while the plainest were cheaper. Well finished lambs to the trade sold to dearer trends with those up to 24kg cwt posting moderate gains. The increased competition, combined with much stronger demand resulted in heavy and extra heavy weights selling to a significantly dearer market trend. There was some weight increase in the extra heavy weight

class. The quality of the sheep was fair to good. Again restockers were active on plainer condition Merino ewes. Quality was a contributor to a cheaper market trend. Well finished medium and heavy weight lines sold to dearer trends under increased competition and strong demand.

Armidale Cattle Sale

September 16 – There was a yarding of 546 cattle, up 281 on the previous sale. Lightweight young cattle and well-finished grown cattle were well supplied. Overall the quality and condition of the penning varied, the well-finished lines showing the benefit of crop. Not all the regular processors and feedlotters were in attendance, however there was the return of a Southern processor.

Restocker activity was high. Strong demand from restockers for light-weight young cattle resulted in dearer trends through the vealer and yearling categories. Both steers and heifer classes under 280kg posted strong gains when taking

breed quality into account.

The medium and heavy weight yearling steers also sold to dearer trends with local restockers competing strongly with the feedlotters. Breed was a factor in the fall in price for some of the yearling heifers. Trends firm to dearer for those to feed

Well-finished heavy weight grown steers sold to dearer trends of 4c to 8c/kg under improved quality and increased competition. The well-finished grown heifers to process sold to dearer trends for the most part, with quality and age related price change in places. The quality of the cows was mostly good. Demand was weaker with this resulting in cheaper trends of 14c to 20c/kg. The competition was not as fierce in the bull market with the market trend cheaper by 30c to 40c/kg.

Weekly Wool Sales

The slightly softer close to last week's sales carried over to the opening day of this week's sale. The individual micron price guides finished the first day 15 to 30 cents cheaper. The losses mainly occurred across the Fleece types with little change to skirtings and cardings. The second day of sales managed to reverse most of the falls leaving the Northern Region Indicator down 2 cents for the week. 32,825 bales were sold nationally for the week with 12.7% of the offering passed in.

Major buyers included PJ Morris, Techwool & Tianyu. The increase in the volume of wool sold for the season to date along with vastly improved prices compared to 12 months ago has led to a 53% jump in the total dollar value of sales. AWEX report this figure to be 138 million dollars greater than the corresponding period last season.

Since returning from the mid-year recess the Eastern Market Indicator has traded in a narrow 40 cent band over the past six weeks. Considering the large season on season increase in both the volume and value of wool sold this has been a solid result in what remains to be uncertain times.
