Day out for green thumbs

The Guyra Community Gardens will play host to local green thumbs seeking answers to problems in their patch at a free horticulture community day on Friday November 19th.

Locals are encouraged to come along and test the knowledge of students from the Costa Tomatoes Horticulture Traineeship Program asking questions about soil, plants and pests.

Australian Training Plus is working with Costa Tomatoes and the New England Community College to grow the next crop of green thumbs and upskill the local workforce through the traineeship program.

Belinda Milgate, trainer with Australian Training Plus, said trainees have been working hard to build their knowledge base as well as develop their work skills.

"We're asking gardeners to come along and bring their questions to the trainees," Belinda said. "They've been learning a lot and it's time to put their knowledge to the test in the field.

"Throughout the traineeship program with Costas, trainees have covered soil testing, plant

and weed identification, as well as learning about pests and diseases that can cause problems in the garden, whether you're working in a large operation like Costas, or are a backyard veggie enthusiast" she said.

Trainees will be standing by to answer questions and identify potential problems, as well as learn more about the Guyra Community Gardens.

Plant, soil and pest samples

from green and brown thumbs alike are welcome, although gardeners are reminded to use clean tools and to 'quarantine' any cuttings, soil or pests in a paper or zip lock bag to ensure good biosecurity practice.

Students and their trainer, along with Garden and Costa representatives will be on-site at the Guyra Community Gardens from 11am to 2pm on Friday November 19th.



Remembrance Day

Remembrance Day is next Thursday, 11th November

The Guyra RSL sub-Branch will hold a Remembrance Day ceremony at the Soldiers Memorial Hall in Bradley Street, commencing at 10.55am on Thursday, 11th November.

Everyone is welcome to attend to show respect for all our servicemen and women who have served in all conflicts. Each year on this day, Australians everywhere observe one minute's silence at 11.00am in memory of those who died or suffered in all wars and armed conflicts.


At 11.00am on 11th November 1918 the guns of the Western Front of World War I fell silent after more than four years of continuous warfare. Germany called for an armistice (suspension of fighting) in order to secure a peace settlement. They accepted Allied terms that amounted to unconditional

surrender.

The 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month attained a special significance in the post-war years. The moment when hostilities ceased on the Western Front became universally associated with the remembrance of those who had died in the war

During the First World War, red poppies were among the first plants to spring up in the devastated battlefields of northern France and Belgium. For this reason, the red poppy is worn as a symbol of remembrance on 11th November.

COVID-19 booster shots now available

Hunter New England Health is now offering a third COVID-19 vaccination, to people aged 12 years and older, who are severely immunocompromised and who have received their last dose at least two months ago.

This is in line with advice from the Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation (ATAGI) which has recommended a third dose of a COVID-19 vaccine (preferably a mRNA such as Pfizer or Moderna) to further increase an individual's protection against the virus.

Severely immunocompromised people (as defined by ATAGI) are those receiving active treatment for cancer (chemotherapy, radiotherapy, and/or hormonal therapy), malignant blood cancers, organ

failure, advanced or untreated HIV, or those on immunosuppressive or biologic therapies.

At this stage, ATAGI has not announced a third dose for the wider population generally.

Third doses for severely immunocompromised people are also available at local general practitioners and pharmacies.

Sporting Groups COVID-19 Recovery Program

Local sporting clubs that have struggled financially due to the COVID-19 pandemic are now able to apply for a share of the State Government's Sport and Recreation Recovery and Community Rebuild Package.

In order to get these organisations financially fit ahead of their 2022 seasons, grants of up to \$1000 are available through the \$12.5 million Grassroots Sport Fund.

Eligible clubs and associations will be able to use the cash injection to purchase new equipment and cover costs associated with promoting and running a competition.



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Consultation begins on 10 year strategic plan

Armidale Regional Council is embarking on a month long consultation with the community to ask residents for their strategic aspirations and vision for the next 10 years.

All Councils in NSW are governed by a suite of strategic documents. At the very top of these sits the Community Strategic Plan (CSP). The CSP is placed at the centre of a suite of integrated plans known as the Integrated Planning and Report Framework that sets out visions, goals and strategic actions to achieve them. It involves a reporting struccommunicate to ture progress to council and the community as well as a structured timeline for re-

Armidale Regional Council General Manager James Roncon said the Community Plan is the peoples' plan and guides everything we do at Council.

"It lets us know what the community wants for the region now and in 10 years' time," said Mr Roncon.

"We often hear that Coun-

cil doesn't listen, Council doesn't engage and doesn't take on-board ideas. What we want to do through this consultation, is to shatter that myth."

The Shape Your Region Community Plan consultation commenced on Monday and concludes on 14 November. It involves a month long schedule of engagement opportunities across the region and online activities for residents to complete.

A new website called www.shapeyourregion.com.a u has been established and provides further information, schedule of Listening Post dates and locations as well as online surveys and a \$100 budget challenge. Packs have also been mailed to all residents that includes a postcard that you can fill-in and return to Council. A phone survey will also be conducted with a random selection of the community.

"We want to reach every corner of our region to ensure everyone has the opportunity to be part of the discussion to shape our region now and into the future," said James Roncon

"The website is a great starting point and provides a number of activities that will allow you to get your ideas to us and share your vision for our region. Particularly if you cannot make one of our face-to-face listening posts."

Once the consultation is complete all feedback will be reviewed and refined to establish consistent themes. Council will have a custodial role in preparing the plan for the community. In early 2022 the new Council will review and the draft community plan will be presented back to the community for feedback.



Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale

October 27th - There was a small reduction in lamb numbers to 1550, however sheep supplies increased with 550 yarded. Merino lambs made up a good percentage of the offering, mostly plain condition light weights. There were a few pens of new season crossbred lambs and some well finished old lambs. There was reduced processor competition in both the lamb and sheep markets. Restockers were active throughout the market, particularly on Merino lambs. The light weights sold to a slightly dearer trend, while the heavier weights sold to cheaper trends. The reduced processor competition resulted in cheaper market trends, leading to most vendors passing their new season lambs in. The well finished old lambs saw trends significantly cheaper through all grades, while in the extra heavy weight class there was a large reduction in weight. It was a very mixed quality penning of sheep. Again there was reduced processor competition, however restockers were active on Merino

ewes. There was a good selection of short wool Merino rams. Market trends were cheaper throughout with substantial corrections in some classes.

Lambs topped at \$240, Hoggetts made to \$188.20, Ewes topped at \$141.30 and Wethers made to \$144.

Armidale Cattle Sale

October 28th - The numbers more than doubled with 765 yarded, including an influx of young cattle. Vealers and yearlings were well supplied. There was also a good number of grown cattle. The quality of the offering was fair to very good, condition plain to very good, some of the heavy cows carrying an excess. There was a much larger gallery of buyers in attendance, increasing competition across all classes. The state of the market, combined with paddocks of fresh green feed saw restocker activity very high. Lightweight vealer steers under 280kg sold to a significantly dearer market trend. The heifer portion following suit. Lightweight yearling steers also sold to dearer trends posting strong gains. There was some

breed and weight related price change. Medium and heavy weight yearling feeder steers sold well, however there was no market comparison available due to a lack of supply at the previous market. A large variation in breed and quality accounted for a big range of prices in the lighter weight yearling heifers. A line of very well bred heifers attracted strong restocker competition. Medium and heavy weights sold to a dearer trend with heavy trade posting significant improvement. Grown steers to feed over 500kg attracted good competition, however there was nothing from the previous sale to compare the market to. Heavy weights to processors sold strongly under increased competition. Well finished grown heifers sold to dearer trends, both to feed and process. Increased competition in the cow market resulted in little change in trends. That increased competition saw the bull market improve.

Weekly Wool Market

October 29th - Once again the market failed to string together consecutive up weeks with the last time it managed this seemingly difficult task being back in June. The market opened the week cheaper from the outset with most micron indicators giving up 30-40 cents by the close of the first day. It was a more positive tone on the final day of selling with only small changes being recorded, with the 21 micron indicator managing a slight gain. The headline market indicators closed the week inside the tight 55 cent trading band that we have now seen for three months. The expected 45,000 plus bale weekly offering did not eventuate with 5.6% withdrawn prior to sale. 33,259 bales were sold nationally for the week with the passed in rate at 20.9% climbing above the seasonal average. Major buyers included. PJ Morris, Techwool and Endeavour. Nationally sales move to a Wednesday, Thursday format next week with a similar volume to this week expected to be on offer. Forward market prices followed the physical down between now and Christmas but remain surprisingly resilient in the New Year, especially for the finer microns.


