Fresh faces and old standing for council

Fourteen individual and 18 grouped candidates will vie for one of eleven positions on Armidale Regional Council when the local government elections are held on December 4th.

Voters will also be asked to vote in a referendum to reduce the number of councillors from eleven to nine at future elections.

Five of the seven current councillors have thrown their hat in for another term. They are Peter Bailey, Jon Galletly, Dorothy Robinson, Debra Obrien, and Margaret O'Conner. Cr Andrew Murat will not contest the election and Cr Ian Tiley has chosen to stand for election in Clarence Valley Council.

Brad Widders is the only one of four councillors who resigned last year who will stand again, while former Armidale Dumaresq councillor Rob Richardson is also standing.

Two well-known Guyra district locals will be standing for the first time. They are Cham-

ber of Commerce President Steve Mepham and NSW Farmers Branch President Callan Schaefer.

Other first time candidates are Sam Coupland, who drew the number one spot on the ballot paper, Phillip Blackmore, Paul Gaddes, Todd Redwood, Craig Pevitt, Paul Packham, Kathleen Clare, and Margaret Sims.

Three groups of six candidates will be listed on the ballot paper.

The groups are The Greens (led by Dorothy Robinson), Labor (led by Debra O'Brien) and the Margaret O'Connor group. The O'Connor group drew first position, followed by The Greens then Labor.

Two Guyra candidates are listed as part of the O'Conner group — Janet Edmonds and Trevor Esplin.

The Guyra & District Chamber of Commerce is hosting a 'meet the candidates' forum at

the Guyra Bowling and Recreation Club on Wednesday, November 10 where voters will get the opportunity to hear from those standing in the election.

Due to COVID-19 restrictions currently in places numbers are limited to 100 participants only.

Community radio station 2ARM-FM will be broadcasting live from the event and it will also be livestreamed via the Chamber's facebook page.

A rifle and ammunition are believed to have been stolen. A crime scene was established and an investigation into the incident is underway.



Make an informed choice

People are asking about the voting process for local government elections.

In Local Government elections, if you vote "above the line" for a political party or other Group you are voting for all the candidates in that group even though you may only know or prefer one or two of those candidates.

At the last local government election in our region, a number of candidates who received quite strong personal support lost out to candidates who had little personal support but were elected only because they were part of a group.

If you want to make an informed choice from amongst all the candidates, the only effective way to do that is to vote for your preferred candidates, in order of your preference, "below the line".

Current and former councillors are known by their past performance and reputation and will be voted for accordingly. To achieve a re-invigorated, forward looking and cohesive council there's always a need for new talent and enthusiasm.

That will best be achieved by voting for at least six of those candidates who are offering their skills and commitment to the region for the first time. They will be in the ungrouped list below the line on the right of the ballot paper.

Putting a spotlight on Chilean Needle Grass

More than 60 landholders from around the New England region attended an event at the Guyra Bowling Club last Thursday November 4th to learn more about the invasive plant, Chilean Needle Grass (CNG).

Professor Lewis Khan has been the project facilitator for a locally based Meat and Livestock Australia Producer Demonstration Site (MLA PDS) project run over 2016-2017 looking at four different control or management strategies.

"Understanding palatability was a key learning from this project," said Lewis.

Lewis made the point that Chilean Needle Grass does have some positive characteristics for those landholders who have plant populations too high to control and must actively manage the plants to maintain farm productivity.

Chilean Needle Grass is a useful feed source over the growing season with a crude protein of up to 22% before seeding.

However, after seed set, animals will actively avoid grazing plants as digestibility plummets and feed value is low.

"You need to be clear about

your primary purpose with your strategies to control or manage Chilean Needle Grass," he said.

"Maximise your groundcover, and if you don't have Chilean Needle Grass, do everything you can to keep it out - be vigilant and treat isolated patches," he said.

Carol Harris is a Research Scientist at the Glen Innes Research and Advisory Station and has been involved in a number of CNG research projects on the Northern Tablelands. Carol shared findings from studies on the impact management on seed bank production.

"With proactive management and high intensity rotational grazing, the number of seeds produced per square metre can be reduced," said Carol.

Carol also shared plans for a new research project to start near Glen Innes in 2022 and the findings from a recent proof of concept study using essential oils for control.

Of key importance is the abil-

ity to identify the Chilean Needle Grass plants.

Guest speaker Trent McIntyre from New England Weeds Authority shared his experiences and practical information for identification and control.

The key identification characteristic is the corona or little 'teeth' where the awn joins the seed, making it very hard to identify prior to seed set.

If you need a hand to identify plants, staff from New England Weeds Authority or Local Land Services can visit your farm to assist in identification and provide advice on control or management strategies.

As co-hosts of the event, GLENRAC and Southern New England Landcare were very pleased with attendance and response, and offer landholders printed resources covering control and management strategies available at their offices in Glen Innes and Armidale respectively.

This event was supported by Nutrien Ag Solutions Guyra and Northern Tablelands Local Land Services through funding from the Australian Governments' National Landcare Program and the NSW Government.

Voters urged to study the form

The upcoming LGA elections are an important opportunity for the community to elect candidates to govern the Armidale Regional Council. And I mean to actually govern – have a vision for the whole region, lead when there are hard decisions to be made and do the right thing for the whole region. It is not to vote how your political party tells you, indulge in petty factional politics or to feed the egos of councillors to make themselves seem important.

Like you would when you go to the horse races, studying the form guide is a key step to select the winning horse. So too is it important to study the form of the candidates running for Council. Give some thoughts as to:

a) Which candidates will best represent your community's interests

b) Which candidates are capable of seeing the big picture, as local government is in the intergenerational business, not the business of the next election.

c) Which candidates have a

broad knowledge and understanding of issues in the whole of the ARC LGA.

d) Which candidates are community focussed and who have a desire to get onto Council for the community, not to satisfy their own self-interest and importance.

e) Which candidates are very Armidale focussed and have little view of the remainder of the region.

f) Candidates promoting that they will achieve a lot of outcomes in their term on Council need to be considered carefully, as Council is highly constrained financially and has a large backlog of infrastructure maintenance which has been put off for Council term after Council term.

g) Carefully consider any advantages that may come from voting above the line for political parties and groups in local government elections. Do they really represent your community in decision making[SL1]?

These points may be difficult to determine now as some of the candidates are new, so carefully read their promotional material, attend any forums, or watch live streamed forums where the candidates can answer community questions.

Some points are:

1. Nearly all candidates will suggest the order of voting of other candidates they would like you to follow, like the 'How to Vote' cards. When you vote, it is up to you on how you select the candidates and in what order.

You do not need to follow the suggestions promoted by the candidates. Like selecting winners at the horse races, have a list of candidates you want to get on Council and determine how you will select their order on the ballot paper.

2. Above the line voting where candidates have a group (minimum of 6) or are members of political parties should be considered carefully.

You can vote for these individual candidates without voting above the line, making you in control where and to whom your preferences will be distributed. Otherwise voting above the line will have your vote going to the person nominated by that particular group/party. This may NOT be where you want them to go, and the result may be Councillors you do not want to see on Council.

3. In the last election for Armidale Regional Council in 2017, some statistics were:

- Total enrolment was 20.376.
- Total Turnout (Ballots Counted) 16,431
- Formal votes were 15,460,
- 971 were informal votes.
- Just over 75% of the eligible voters voted formally.
- The quota, or number of votes required by each candidate was 1,289. (https://pastvtr.elections.nsw.gov.au/LGE2017/armidale-regional/councillor/general_statistics.htm).
- This year the current enrolment figure is 20,070 and with eleven councillors, the quota will be approximately 1,269.

Early voting options expanded for local government elections

Voters are encouraged to check their voting options for the NSW Local Government elections with all voters now eligible to vote before election day and expanded eligibility for postal voting.

John Schmidt, NSW Electoral Commissioner said that in response to COVID-19 all voters are able to vote early in person, postal voting eligibility has been expanded and for voters meeting strict eligibility criteria, iVote, the Commission's technology-assisted online and telephone voting platform will be available at local council elections for the

first time.

Postal vote applications are now open and postal votes must be received by 6pm, December 17th.

Pre-poll voting will be available from November 22nd to December 3rd at Guyra Council Offices, the Armidale Town Hall and Armidale Region Returning Officer's Office in 106-108 Jessie Street, Armidale.

On December 4th polling places will be located at Guyra Central School, Black Mountain Public School, Ebor Public School and Dangersleigh School of Arts Hall. In Armidale voters will be able to vote

at Newling, Ben Venue, Armidale City Public and Drummond schools

All polling places will be run in line with COVID-safe election guidelines including physical distancing, mask wearing, single-use pens and queue management. Signage and staff will direct voters to check in and comply with NSW Health advice.

Voters are encouraged to visit elections.nsw.gov.au for the most up-to-date information and keep up to date with the latest NSW Health advice.





Community to benefit from Tilbuster Solar Farm

Armidale Regional Council has agreed to enter into a planning agreement with Enerparc, the developer of the proposed Tilbuster Solar Farm.

Council endorsed the general terms of the planning agreement at the Ordinary Council Meeting held on Wednesday 27 October in Guyra. The agreement will deliver around \$1.5 million for community projects and initiatives in the Armidale region.

Whilst the Tilbuster Solar Farm is still in the final stages of the State Significant Development assessment process, Enerparc hope to commence construction in quarter 3 of 2023 if they receive a positive determination from the NSW Government.

Council's Chief Officer Sustainable Development Daniel Boyce said projects like this provide a once in a generation opportunity for the local community to share in the benefits of the huge investment in renewable energy.

"The Tilbuster agreement will be used to establish a community benefit fund governed by a Committee made up of community and council representatives," said Mr Boyce.

"The details of that process are yet to be determined but represent a wonderful opportunity to fund worthwhile community projects that improve the social and economic vitality, and sustainability of our region."

The 152 Megawatt (MW) Tilbuster Solar Farm is one of a number of renewable energy projects proposed in the Armidale Region totalling around 750MW. The NSW Government's Electricity Strategy and Electricity Infrastructure Roadmap sets out a plan to deliver five Renewable Energy Zones (REZs) including one in the New England.

Rural Market Reports

Weekly Wool Market

Although this week's gain was only small it did continue the now well entrenched pattern of 1 week up, 1 week down. It was however a role reversal for the individual micron categories. The finer types gave up a similar amount of ground as last week with combined fortnightly losses as high as 100 cents.

It was the broader Merino and Crossbred types that helped stabilise the headline market indicators. The 21 and 22 micron indicators closed the week at their highest levels in three months whilst the Crossbred sector awoke from a slumber and surged between 10 to 15% higher. 34,594 bales were sold nationally with a passed in rate of 9.7%.

Major buyers included Techwool, PJ Morris and Endeavour Wool. AWTA test data for the first four months of the season is showing a 23.9% increase in the number of bales tested. All of the mainland states have recorded a significant increase whilst Tasmania is showing a 20% decline. AWEX auction figures mirror the testing data with a 25% increase in the volume of wool sold for the season to date. This equates to around an additional 88,000




