First Tree Planted in Memorial Avenue

At 11.00am on 11 November 2021, silence fell across Guyra as it does across each State, Territory, city, town and village for one minute as Australia commemorates those who have died in wars, conflicts and peacekeeping operations. Guyra's Remembrance Day Service was hosted by the Guyra Sub-Branch of the RSL lead by its President, Hans Hietbrink at the Soldiers' Memorial Hall in Bradley Street.

Following the service attendees and guests were invited to take a short walk to APEX Park where a tree planting ceremony took place to mark the beginning of the Memorial Park project. This project, as previously reported in the Guyra Gazette, is designed to implement a 1951 resolution of the then Guyra Shire Council for a Memorial Avenue/Park to be located in what are now APEX Park and Rotary Park.

Treasurer of the Guyra Garden Club David Kanaley, in addressing those present gave an overview of the project.

"Council's intention in 1951 was to honour those men and women from Guyra and District who died in World Wars 1 and 2," David said.

"The reinterpretation of that resolution by the Guyra Garden Club and Guyra Rotary Club, working in partnership with the Guyra Sub Branch of the RSL, is to honour all those local people who served in all conflicts and peacekeeping operations as a service and sacrifice to their country and local

community."

The memorial tree, a Tilia Green Spire, was planted by Mr. James Roncon, General Manager, Armidale Regional Council. Mr. Roncon was accompanied and helped by members of the Guyra Sub Branch of the RSL, Guyra Garden Club, and Guyra Ro-

tary Club and friends.

"This first tree planting will soon be followed by 29 more trees to create a truly special and attractive Memorial Avenue, especially in spring and autumn," David said.

Community encouraged to recycle household goods

With the warmer weather now upon us, it's the time of year that many people begin to undertake some spring cleaning to freshen up after winter. The community is being reminded of the importance of correctly disposing of household and electronic waste during this time in order to maximise the amount of waste being diverted from landfill.

Armidale Regional Council Mayor Ian Tiley said it's the perfect opportunity for people to get familiar with the wide range of services available at the region's Waste Management Facilities and Community Recycling Centres.

"Correct waste disposal is so important in protecting our environment and local ecosystems, so I would strongly encourage everyone to think twice about throwing something into the red-lid bin if there is any chance it could be recycled," said Mayor Tiley.

"Our Waste Management Facilities accept a huge range of items that can't be collected kerbside, but can be recycled, for example an old mattress or a

broken electrical appliance. There are so many ways to ensure your household waste is given a second life."

Even if old appliances are broken and can't be reused, their parts can be used to make new items, which is why it's important not to put them in general waste. For example, the springs in an old mattress can be melted down and used to build new infrastructure, such as train tracks.

Mixing electrical waste with general waste can also be dangerous, as these items can contain toxic materials such as lead and mercury that have detrimental effects on the environment.

To help you decide what to do with your household waste, here is a helpful list of things you are able to drop off at Council's Waste Management Facilities and Community Recycling Centres.

Community Recycling Centres (located at Armidale and Guyra Waste Transfer Facilities)

- Batteries (including car batteries)
- E-waste - Broken electrical appli-

ances including computers, televisions, lighting, power tools.

- Household chemicals
- Motor oil and containers
- Light bulbs and fluorescent tubes

Mini CRC Drop off Stations (located at Council's Customer Service areas in Armidale and Guyra)

- Household batteries
- Fluorescent globes
- Smoke detectors
- Ink cartridges
- Mobile phones

Waste Management Facility:

- Empty paint tin
- Steel
- Wood (including treated and with nails and fittings)
- Tyres
- Mattresses

There will be a charge for depositing items marked with an asterisk.

The trees are all advanced and have been purchased from grant funding from the Strengthening Rural Communities program.”

ARC General Manager James Roncon said that he was deeply honoured to be part of the Guyra Remembrance Day ceremony and the Memorial Ave tree planting project.

“Events such as this demonstrate that Guyra is a very nice and proud community,” Mr Roncon said. “I know that there has been some angst around the merger of our communities and there is little doubt in my mind that the bringing together of the

two council areas could have been better managed.

“We cannot go back in time though and I am committed to ensuring that we strongly focus on that challenge and from this point in time, moving forward, we get it right.

“It is my hope that the first tree planting of the memorial avenue can be a symbolic gesture and commitment to making Armidale Regional Council a strong representative body that works hard for all of the communities it is responsible for and at the same time, acknowledge the unique characteristics of each of the communities and play to those strengths.

OPINION: Vote carefully and choose wisely

Candidates in the upcoming local government elections will need to achieve the required quota to be elected. The current enrolment figure in the Armidale Regional Council area is 20,070 and with eleven councillors, the quota to be elected will be approximately 1,269.

This time around there will be less votes coming from within the old Guyra Shire area. Since Tingha has become part of Inverell Shire, roughly eight hundred residents have moved, so the remaining population in the old Guyra LGA is roughly 3,700 which equates to around 1,850 voters. With only 1,850 potential votes in total within the old Guyra LGA, we will be struggling to get one locally elected candidate, so choose carefully if you want someone local to represent you.

Currently there are two candidates from the old Guyra LGA. If the Guyra community want one, or more locals to represent them on the ARC Council, then how you vote becomes very important. If you vote first for one of these candidates and then the remainder of your votes goes towards other candidates, neither of the two candidates may get sufficient votes to get across

the line. A possible way forward is for voters in the old Guyra LGA to vote the two Guyra candidates as 1, 2 before any other candidates. Then vote for a minimum of four other candidates of your choice. This way the preferences will be distributed among these two before going to other candidates.

Hopefully we will get at least one of these two on Armidale Regional Council, but remember, once they are elected, they must represent and make balanced decisions for the whole

LGA, not just the Guyra area. If they are from the Guyra area at least they can voice your issues in debate and decision making.

Remember:

- It is your right and choice who you vote for. You do not have to follow the candidates 'How to Vote' suggestions.

- Vote carefully and please vote for at least six candidates, preferably all 11.

- While it takes time, VOTE BELOW THE LINE and select candidates from the RIGHT HAND COLUMN to ensure

you get the candidates you want on Council, not someone selected by a political party, or group.

- If you support the 'Save and Grow Guyra', it is important that you vote and make your vote count, as for the near future, it will be one council and representation is important. If you do not vote formally, then you have no right to complain about lack of representation.

Good luck and may we get a good group of councillors.

How to make your vote count

When completing your ballot paper, you must choose between voting above the line or below the line.

Above the line

You must place a number '1' in one of the group voting squares above the thick horizontal line on the ballot paper. By doing this you are voting for that whole group of candidates in the order they are listed below that square, starting from the top. This is all you need to do.

You can show more choices if you want, starting with the number 2 above the line.

If you vote above the line, do not put numbers in any squares below the line as this may invalidate your vote.

Below the line

You can vote below the line if:

- you want to vote for candidates within a group in the order of your choice

- you want to vote for candidates from different groups in the order of your choice

- you only want to vote for ungrouped candidates

- you want to vote for a mixture of grouped and ungrouped candidates.

To vote, you must place at least the number of preferences indicated in the 'Directions for Voting' on the ballot paper. This will be at least half the number to be elected (rounded up).

For the Armidale Regional you will need to vote for at least six candidates.

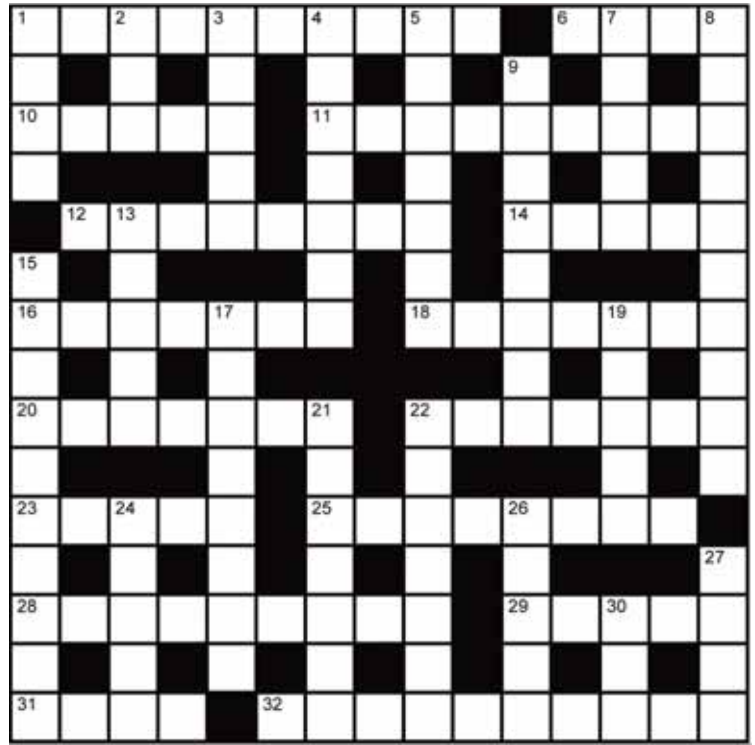

Madan from Care Agents will be in attendance at the Coffee Cake and Chat which is being held at The Hub on Thursday, November 17th. Madan is a NDIS provider and is able to answer any questions in relation to initial access to NDIS, access to a support coordinator and general NDIS questions.

Madan runs Care Agents which is an Independent NDIS service provider with six years of experience in community development and NDIS support. Care Agents provides support with daily home activities, support coordination and Advocacy support for NDIS participants around Tamworth, Armidale and Guyra.

They can help with NDIS preparation and readiness, assessing eligibility and assisting with NDIS application. They can provide assistance with daily living by offering support or supervision with personal tasks of daily life to enable you to develop life skills and live as autonomously as possible. These

supports can be provided in a range of environments, including your own home, assistance Personal Domestic Activities.

Assistance with social, economic, community participation is also available and the options are endless - join a sporting group or maybe a gym, learn a new skill or try a new hobby, painting, musical instrument, art class. They provide information, referrals or individual advocacy support to people with disability who are experiencing issues with support services, discrimination and unfair treatment.

Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep and Lamb Sale

November 10 - There was an increased penning of 780 sheep and 1970 lambs. The quality of the lambs was very mixed with a few pens of well finished new seasons and quite a few plainer conditioned Merino's.

Well finished heavy and extra heavy weight old lambs were limited in supply. The return of a processor after a short absence saw the full field in attendance. Market trends through the well finished young lambs were significantly dearer, resulting in vendors meeting the market this week. All of the previous sales losses were recovered.

Restockers were active on the plainer condition Merino lambs with prices varying with quality. The well finished old lambs also sold to dearer trends, again showing strong gains and recovering last sales losses. It was a very mixed penning of sheep, made up mostly of small lots. Processors were selective in their

purchases. Restockers were active on some of the lighter Merino ewes. Market trends were firm to cheaper throughout.

Young lambs topped at \$235, Older lambs topped at \$280, Hoggets made to \$232, Ewes topped at \$168 and wethers made to \$176

Armidale Cattle Sale

November 11 - The numbers fell by half to 400 head in the face of good rain and a promising forecast. The quality of the offering was fair to good with all categories represented. There was a good supply of well finished cattle, reflecting the quality of seasonal conditions. Not all of the regular processors were represented.

Restocker activity was good. There were varying trends through the young cattle with the light weight yearling steers under 280kg selling on a firm to slightly dearer trend. The heavier weight classes saw mostly quality related price change with an odd dearer sale to restock-

ers. There were similar trends in the yearling heifers, however quality variations did account for some substantial price change in some classes. Heavy weight grown steers to feed sold to cheaper trends with reduced competition. The well finished lines to processors sold to a dearer trend of as much as 10c/kg with some improvement in quality.

Well finished grown heifers also sold to a dearer trend. A good quality penning of heavy weight cows sold to a dearer trend of as much as 12c/kg. A breed specific restocker order created the high price for cows. Strong processor competition on some very good quality bulls resulted in significantly dearer market trends.

Weekly Wool Sales

The Superfine types came under further downward pressure this week and the medium micron indicators gave back most of last week's gains. Losses were recorded over both selling days with the Northern

region Indicator dipping 17 cents on Tuesday and a further 5 cents on Wednesday.

The net result left the headline market indicators at their lowest closing levels for the season to date and their lowest levels since May. 5.3% of the offering was withdrawn prior to sale and 14.2% was passed in resulting in 32,268 bales being sold nationally.

Whilst the Eastern Market Indicator did close at a seasonal low it sits only 39 cents below the average for the season to date due to its tight trading pattern. The swings in the individual micron indicators are very different with the 18 micron indicator currently 92 cents below the seasonal average and the 21 micron indicator 6 cents above.

The price premium for the 18 micron indicator over and above the 21 micron indicator has reduced from 820 cents to 680 cents in the space of a few weeks. The 10 and 20 year average of this premium is only 260 and 310 cents.

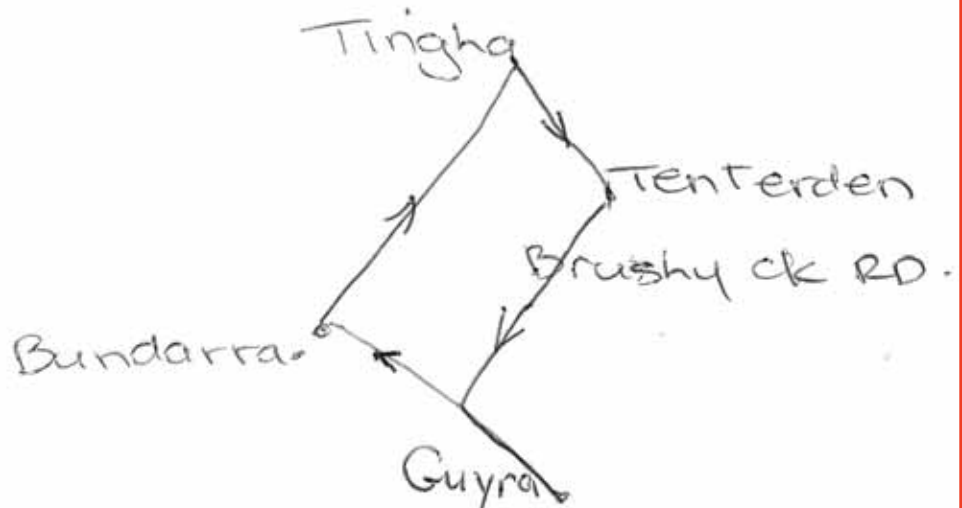

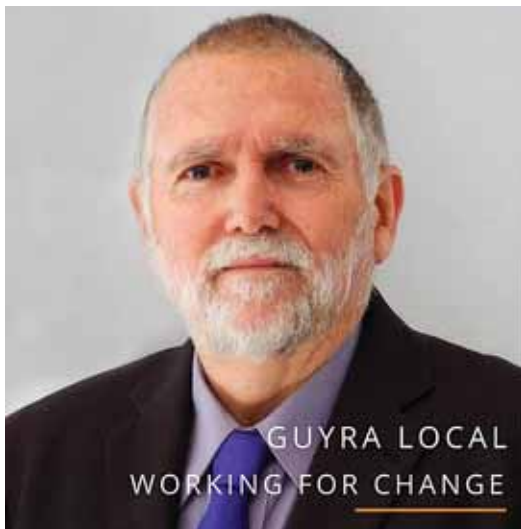
