

# Important question to answer on election day How many councillors?

An important constitutional referendum will be held in conjunction with this year's local government election that will require the community to vote whether or not the number of councillors for Armidale Regional Council should be reduced from eleven to nine. Any changes won't come into effect until the 2024 election.

There are a number of important factors to consider when voting for or against this question, so to help you make an informed decision, we have created a list of pros and cons for your consideration.

# Reasons for reducing the number of councillors:

- Savings of \$49,620 per annum (the fee per councillor is \$24,810pa).
- Reduced ongoing costs (minimum \$10,000 per councillor for things such as phones and professional development).
- The current ratio of 1 councillor to 2,792 residents is high compared to other councils.

- Increased efficiency and effectiveness.
  - · Quality over quantity.
- Many regional councils with larger geographical areas only have nine councillors.

# Reasons against reducing the number of councillors:

- Financial savings are a small price to pay to ensure good representation.
- Difficult for a small cohort to understand all of the key issues across such a large geographic area.
- May be difficult for nine councillors to support the current number of community advisory committees.
- Community access to councillors may be reduced.
- A larger number of councillors can provide a broader range of perspectives.
- Smaller numbers may lead to Council being controlled by political or self interest groups.
- May be more difficult for lesser known candidates to get elected.







# Changes to the COVID-19 roadmap

The State Government has updated the roadmap for easing COVID-19 restrictions.

Changes will come into effect after the State reaches the 95 percent double dose vaccination target, or 15 December, whichever comes first.

Adjustments to the roadmap include:

- Masks will only be required on public transport and planes, at airports, and for indoors front-of-house hospitality staff who are not fully vaccinated (previously all indoors front-of-house hospitality staff regardless of vaccination status). Masks will be strongly encouraged in settings where you cannot social distance;
- No density limits (previously one person per 2sqm);
- COVID safety plans will be optional for businesses and will be supported by SafeWork NSW;

- QR check-ins will only be required at high-risk venues including hospitals, aged and disability care facilities, gyms, places of worship, funerals or memorial services, personal services (e.g. hairdressers and beauty salons), limited hospitality settings (including pubs, small bars, registered clubs and nightclubs), and for indoor music festivals with more than 1,000 people; and
- Proof of vaccination will no longer be required by Public Health Order for most activities (businesses can still require proof at their own discretion). Proof of vaccination will still be required for indoor music festivals with more than 1,000 people.

# Local Innovator features in NAB calendar

Once in place, producers can use it to remotely monitor their animals' weight gain for better grazing management and eliminate the need for yard weighing. The result is healthier, more productive, less stressed animals that can be marketed in a more targeted way.

# Rural Market Reports

# **Guyra Sheep** and Lamb Sale

**November 24th** - There was an increase in supply with both lambs and sheep affected. The total yarding was 3530 comprising 2140 lambs and 1390 sheep, up 780 on the previous sale.

The quality of lambs was mixed with a few pens of well finished new season lambs available. There were quite a few Merino lambs penned with quality and condition also varying greatly. All the regular buyers were in attendance.

Demand was strong through most lamb classes. A single large pen of very light weight young lambs attracted strong restocker competition to post significant improvements. All classes of young lambs to processors sold to dearer trends with buyers showing a preference for the young lines.

There was varying trends for old lambs to process, which were firm to dearer for the most part, with some weight related change in the heavier weight classes. There were varying trends through the mixed quality and condition penning of sheep.

Restocker activity on some of the light and medium weight Merino ewes helped lift prices for some categories. The better condition medium and heavy weight sheep to process saw a mostly firm market trend with weight variations contributing to price change.

## **Armidale Cattle Sale**

**November 25th** - There was a reduced penning of 324 head following some large rainfall over the past week and more forecast. All categories were represented in a mixed quality yarding.

The condition of the cattle was fair to good and most of the regular buyers were in attendance. Restockers showed great confidence in the market and with a large body of feed, bid strongly on most of the young cattle. This resulted in dearer trends throughout with

significant improvement through the steers.

There was some breed and quality related price change in light weight yearling heifers, however trends were dearer through all weight classes. Heavy grown steers to process sold to dearer trends of 10c to 15c/kg under strong competition.

Well finished grown heifers to process mostly sold to a slightly cheaper trend, quality was a factor. There was an isolated dearer sale. The cow market was firm to slightly dearer with some variation for quality. The heavy bulls met very strong competition resulting in a significantly dearer market trend

# **Weekly Wool Sales**

**November 26th** - The market managed to string together back to back up weeks for the first time since late June. The first day of sales was not convincing however with up to 25 cent declines registered on some of the individual

micron indicators. This was rapidly reversed on the final day of sales with gains of 25 to 40 cents recorded for most Merino types.

The headline market indicators have closed the week in the mid range of the tight trading band that we have seen over the past four months. 34,203 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 7.5%.

Major buyers included Tianyu, Techwool & PJ Morris. The market closing the week on a high point has led to indications that it may remain solid for the next three weeks before heading into the annual Christmas recess. This is supported by bids in the forward market into the New Year at levels slightly above this week's auction close for 19-21 micron types.

The Superfine types are however being discounted by around 40 cents out as far as May 2022. Total auction turnover of the Australian woolclip for the season to date should surpass 1 Billion dollars next week.

- Roads and their poor condition has been the strongest message from Guyra. How do we fix it? I will be fighting for a significant increase in road funding so our roads don't continue to deteriorate.
- Malpas Dam must be upgraded. Council has been communicating with the Department of Water & Infrastructure and they are close to resolving their concerns.
- Harmony and unity must be a key goal of the new Council.



Issues like local service delivery (roads, drainage, water etc) could go to the GSMC and then straight to ARC Council and General Manager.

# Men's Bowls


