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Ribbon cut on \$80 million investment

Costa's \$80 million expansion of its tomato glasshouse operation at Guyra was formally opened on Friday by The Honourable Adam Marshall, Member for Northern Tablelands and Minister for Agriculture and Western New South Wales.

The expansion includes two new five-hectare glasshouses and a 2.5-hectare propagation nursery at the New England Highway site, and brings the total Costa glasshouse footprint to more than 40 hectares in the Guyra region.

The first of the new glasshouses is now in full production, and the second will come online in the new year. It will bring the total production across the 40 hectares to more than 18 million kilos of tomatoes per annum.

Mr Marshall congratulated Costa Group on the completion of the project despite challenging conditions.

"I thank Costa Group for its commitment to seeing the project through and I look forward to seeing the economic benefits of the Guyra Tomato Exchange continue to flow into the households of our region."

"This level of private business investment is not often

seen anywhere in rural and regional NSW, let alone the creation of another 160 jobs in one single project.

"I am proud the State Government has been able to offer various assistance over the past decade to facilitate different stages of the site's growth.

"Through financial assistance for preliminary road infrastructure, grant application support and payroll tax relief the State Government has facilitated this major employer's long term presence at Guyra." Costa employs more than 650 workers across the two glasshouse sites, spending approximately \$31 million annually on wages and salaries. Once both new glasshouses are fully operational an additional 160 jobs will be created.

Jose Cambon, Costa's Vertical Farming General Manager, said the New England Highway site was fully water selfsufficient. It includes an innovative microturbine power generation system, one of the first of its kind in the world to be used in a glasshouse environment, which will result in significantly reduced C02 emissions.

"Our people have showed outstanding character and skill in planning, designing and building this facility, which also includes a state-ofthe-art nursery to develop and propagate new varieties and will create 160 new jobs for the local region," Mr Cambon said.

"At times it was not an easy process, with the project having been paused due to the drought and then once recommenced having to navigate through the significant challenges of COIVD. To this end, everyone can feel rightly proud of the role they've played in the completion of the project and the operation of the site.

"I also want to recognise the contribution of the many local businesses who worked on the construction of the glasshouse. Their involvement was crucial to the project's successful completion."

Mr Cambon said Costa was proud of its connection with the Guyra and surrounding community and the opportunities this project provided, ensuring people could pursue jobs and careers while remain-

Counting continues following council election

The count for new councillors to lead the region is underway following the local government elections which took place on Saturday. Of the 19,214 residential and nonresidential electors who were enrolled to vote 13,628 votes had been counted by midday on Tuesday.

First preference vote counting is still being finalised, however there are currently four candidates who look certain to make the cut.

Ahead in the counting so far is the Labour Party group led by current Deputy Mayor Debra O'Brien who have received 1828 votes. The Independent group led by Margaret O'Connor and Gordon Cope also polled well receiving 1593 votes. Currently sitting at number three is independent candidate Sam Coupland on 1574 first preference votes, with the Greens group sitting next on 1272 votes.

Other candidates vying for a spot are Jon Galletly (966 votes), Steve Mepham (791), Todd Redwood (735), Paul Packham (667), Paul Gaddes (536), Rob Richardson (528), Brad Widders (516), Callan Schaefer (392), Kathleen Clare (347), Peter Bailey (215), Margaret Sims (201), Phillip Blackmore (126), and Craig Pevitt (97).

The level of informal voting was around 9%, meaning 1244 votes will not count towards the make up of the new council. Guyra voters showed a preference for early voting

with around two thirds choosing to vote prior to December 4th. Predictably local support was strongest for the two local candidates. Steve Mepham polled well receiving a total of 564 votes at the Guyra booth and pre poll, while Callan Schaefer received 270 of the Guyra votes.

Votes are also being tallied on the referendum question: Do you support a reduction in the number of councillors for Armidale Regional Council from eleven to nine? A majority of voters were in favour of the reduction with 71.32% voting yes.

Counting is continuing with I-Votes yet to be included. The return of completed postal vote certificates closes on December 17, and the distribution of preferences takes place on December 21.

The final makeup of council is expected to be declared on December 23rd.

Challenge for new councillors

Seems it doesn't matter if it is the 1873 site selection of the route for the railway line north from Tamworth via Inverell or Armidale? A local decision to grade, tar or patch your local road? A state decision to sell the poles and wires, to a company who will site, build, charge and pay for electricity for their profit? Or a Federal decision to endorse commitments in response to Glasgow?

The decisions are all political. It never seems to be about "You, Me, We, Us & Co". It is never anything other than actions for political manipulation and manoeuvring to put a stamp on the physical, political, environmental and financial landscape.

The challenge for newly elected councillors is to step out remembering the plight of the mere mortals who did (or didn't) cast a vote their way. The greatest objective is to find a pathway around 'other government' regulatory impositions'i.e.to challenge the NSW government regulations that cast 'regulatory nets' including but confined to, cost shifting, regulation of council finances and federal government grant schemes.

Their challenge is to be visionary beyond their immediate term, to be representative, independent of political will, to become the organisation that directs 'The Management Team' to work with the 'on ground workforce' to achieve objectives and outcomes supportive service delivery that allows investment to grow appropriately rather than being the "corporation" that grows the LGA.

Katrina Humphries had it worked out; that her profile, her voice and her effort would be for the Moree the community wanted. She found the level ground of 'community will' to succeed. I congratulate her and challenge incoming councillors. In thanking those that put their hand up, I congratulate the elected that they achieved voter support. It is their turn to develop "grass roots" communication with ears that hear, so they "kick their goals" at the end of the field that scores for the team (no own goals this time please.)

Councils Keeping of Animals Policy (Schedule 2 Local Government Regulations 2005)

Conditions apply for the keeping of poultry in a residential area, subject to the following conditions:

- 1. The area is kept free of offensive odour/flies and rodents.
- 2. The poultry yard is fenced to ensure the poultry do not escape.
- 3. Cages/Hen houses must have a concrete floor and comply with the Building Code of Australia.
- 4. The following Distances for the location of the poultry house from a dwelling are considered adequate.

Housing of chickens 4.5 Metres Other Housing (Duck/Geese) 30 Metres

- 5. Allowable amount of hens/chickens 20 Fowls
- 6. Roosters are not permitted

Wet weather poses challenges for maintenance schedules

Staff at Armidale Regional Council have been busy trying to keep up with regular maintenance schedules and delivering on capital works projects, but with La Nina fuelled rains impacting roads, drainage and open spaces the community may experience some delays to our normal service delivery as they endeavour to keep up.

Chief Officer Assets and Services Alex Manners says staff are working extremely hard to keep up with the high levels of additional maintenance work required at the moment.

"Wet weather speeds up the deterioration to council's road network and potholes grow overnight," Alex said. "Wet weather also brings to light drainage issues that aren't evident during dry weather and our mowing schedule is impacted heavily." "The weather is impacting the delivery of projects, and roads across the region have been heavily impacted, particularly on the unsealed road network.

"Council crews have been addressing roads washed away around causeways and grids and the unsealed roads grading schedule and re-sheeting program has been impacted. Heavy patching is occurring across the network due to damage from the heavy rainfall."

Council is asking residents to report any dangerous pot holes, washed away roads or damage to infrastructure that needs to be addressed. The community can log a service request through the self-service section on the council website or contact our customer service team on 1300 136 833.

Rural Market Reports

Weekly Wool Market

December 3rd - The market consolidated and managed to make further small gains to finish in positive territory for the third consecutive week. It also registered the longest up trend since June.

In US dollars the market has moved a mere 10 cents over the past month creating an extended period of stability in prices. 35,616 bales were sold nationally for the week with the passed in rate of 10% being heavily dominated by the Crossbred and Oddment sectors.

Major buyers included PJ Morris, Techwool & Tianyu with the top four accounting for almost 50% of the Merino fleece offering. AWTA test data for the first five months of the season is showing a 20.4% increase in the number of bales tested.

All mainland states are registering between a 15% and 39% increase whilst Tasmania is showing a decrease of 21%. This has led to 142,000 additional bales being offered for the season to date, an increase of 24.5%.

The most recent AWI production forecast for the 2021/22 season was for a 5.2% increase. This will be revisited over the next fortnight as the various state and national committees meet. Two selling weeks remain until the three week recess with in excess of 40,000 bales expected to be on offer each week.
