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Community brainstorms 62 ideas and creates Mother of Ducks Landcare Group

Twenty-eight community members gathered in Guyra on a very wet afternoon on Wednesday 1st December, to focus on a special place in our Northern Tablelands landscape.

Southern New England Landcare's Executive Officer and the event organiser, Karen Zirkler said, "Mother of Ducks Lagoon is special because she is an upland wetland, underlain by peat, and depended upon by a myriad of native plants and animals – a rare kind of ecosystem indeed."

Deb Bower is a Senior Lecturer in Ecology and Zoology at UNE and Chief Investigator for the environmental trust funded Dynamic Lagoons Project led by UNE. .

Deb explained the reasons why Mother of Ducks Lagoon, and others like it in our region, are so special ecologically.

"These upland wetlands are important because of the unique habitat they form, supporting all kinds of plants and animals that rely on shallow wetland habitat," said Deb.

Mother of Ducks is a threatened ecological community, like a threatened species but with protection for the whole habitat.

Deb noted that Mother of Ducks Lagoon is not listed as a RAMSAR site because representatives of each wetland type are listed, and Little Llangothlin Lagoon was cho-

sen for upland wetlands.

Participants at the event were welcomed to country by Darrell Ahoy from NSW National Parks & Wildlife Service (NPWS), who noted that the lagoon sits on the border of both Banbai and Anaiwan traditional lands, an area of great significance to both communities.

Darrell also talked about some of the history of the area from an indigenous perspective, sparking a significant number of interesting questions from participants.

Various modifications to the

lagoon began in the 1960s and have included drains, levees and overflow pipes, which have significantly altered the natural values of the lagoon.

Douglas Smith (aka Smurf) from NSW NPWS presented some of this history in his presentation.

The final part of the event saw participants get involved in an interactive brainstorm led by Karen Zirkler around the focus question: 'How can we help Mother of Ducks Lagoon to Flourish into the future?'

"We wanted the community

to suggest what kinds of activities might attract participation in a new Landcare group if one were to form," said Karen.

"We also wanted to know what community members would like to see such a group doing or achieving in relation to the Lagoon," she said.

In a matter of just 15 minutes, 62 ideas were generated in an enthusiastic response.

"We were very pleasantly surprised by the number of ideas – clearly participants were motivated by our presenters and the information they shared," said Karen.

When asked if formation of a group around caring for Mother of Ducks Lagoon is something the community would like to see happen, the overwhelming positive response was 'yes'.

World Wetland Day on Wednesday 2nd February 2022 has been flagged as the date for a second community gathering lagoon-side to hear from another guest and to take next steps in forming the group.

Restrictions ease in time for Christmas

COVID-19 restrictions in NSW are set to ease further from Wednesday, December 15th. From that date, the same rules will apply to all people, regardless of whether they are vaccinated against COVID or not, in most settings.

Density limits will no longer apply and COVID-safe plans will be optional for businesses. Masks will no longer be required in all public indoor settings; instead, people will only need them on public transport and planes, and at airports.

Front-of-house hospitality staff who are not fully vaccinated will also need to wear a mask while working.

However, masks are still strongly encouraged where people cannot maintain social distancing.

People will have to check-in at Hospitals, Aged and disability care facilities, Gyms, Places of worship, Funerals or memorial services, Personal services (including sex services), Pubs, small bars and registered clubs, nightclubs, and strip clubs and Indoor music festivals with over 1000 people

Non-critical retail will open to everyone and there will be no person limit applied to personal services, such as hairdressers, beauty salons, tattoo parlours and spas.

Singing and dancing indoors and outdoors at pubs and clubs, will be allowed. There will be no limit to the number of people allowed in hospitality venues, and patrons can drink standing or sitting, indoors and outdoors.

There will be no limit to the number of visitors allowed in homes. All visitors are allowed at aged and disability care facilities, in line with their policies.

No limits will apply in gyms, indoor recreation and sporting

facilities. Community sports will open to everyone and indoor swimming pools will reopen. There will be no limits on outdoor gatherings.

Travel between Greater Sydney and regional NSW reopens for everyone on Wednesday.

There will be no limit on the number of people allowed at entertainment and major recreation facilities - such as cinemas, racecourses and stadiums - subject to 100 per cent of their fixed seat capacity.

There will also be no limit to patrons allowed into libraries, museums and art galleries, nor attendees at outdoor events. However, music festivals will remain capped at 20,000 people. Amusement and play centres will reopen to everyone.

But indoor music festivals with over 1000 attendees and cruises with more than 100 passengers will require proof of vaccination.

Weddings and funerals will have no limits on the number of people allowed to attend. Eating and drinking will be allowed while standing and seating, and singing and dancing will also be permitted.

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall said that Legal Aid NSW produces this informative and easy-to-read diary each year to help demystify legal issues that are of special interest to older people.

"This handy diary brings together important phone numbers and information about everything from helping your family financially, to updating a will and understanding your rights when moving into a retirement village," Mr Marshall

"The diary is well known for covering the tough topics and 2022 is no exception, addressing the issue of elder abuse and how victims and families can identify and report physical, financial or emotional abuse so it is dealt with immediately.

"You'll also find tips to help you get the most from life, with information about Seniors Cards and allowances for which you may be eligible."

Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale

December 8th - Lamb numbers remained steady at 2150 with sheep supplies increasing to 2270 up 880 on the previous sale. The quality of the lambs was quite mixed with light weight young lambs well supplied and there were limited supplies of well finished young lambs suitable to processors. Merino lambs were in fair supply with condition and weight varying considerably. There was a limited supply of heavy and extra heavy weight old lambs. The usual processors were in attendance.

Light weight young lambs attracted keen demand from restockers with strong competition to see dearer trends in all weight classes. Medium weight trade lambs sold to a slightly cheaper trend. The few heavy weight young lambs were dearer under strong processor competition.

Merino lambs to restockers sold to a slightly dearer trend. The plainer condition lots to process saw demand weaker. The well finished heavier weight Merino lambs to process sold to a dearer trend. Medium and heavy weight old lambs sold to a dearer trend for the most part.

Merino wethers were well supplied with most carrying an early spring shorn skin. There was restocker competition on the plainer condition wethers, while the usual processors competed strongly on the well finished lines. Market trends were dearer through all classes with skin values contributing to some of the improvement.

Armidale Cattle Sale

December 9th - There was an increase penning with all categories represented. The overall quality of the offering was quite mixed. The condition of the cattlewas fair to very good. The usual processors were in attendance with one showing an increased participation. There was reduced feedlotcompetition, while restocker demand was again high.

Market trends were generally cheaper through the young cattle with

both breed and quality having a major impact on price change. Lightweight vealers steers remained firm for the few available. The yearling steers saw a large correction with breed a strong reason. The mediumand heavy weight feeder steers saw breed and the reduced competition impact prices. There was an isolated dearer sale in steers torestockers. A very mixed quality penning of yearling heifers followed similar trends.

There were a few well finished heavy weight grown steers penned. Increased processor competition saw them sell to a dearer trend. The well finished grown heifers followed a similar trend with improvements in the older lines. There was little change in the cow market. Demand high and processor competition strong in the heavy weight bull market. This resulted in a dearer trend.

Weekly Wool Market

The market gained ground for the fourth consecutive week. A 7 cent rise in the Northern Region Indicator on

the first day of sales was followed by a further 7 cent rise on the final day. 18.5 micron and finer types gained around 25-30 cents for the week whilst the rest of the market added between 5 -15 cents.

This week's national offering fell 4,000 bales short of what was expected. 33,649 bales were sold for the week with the passed in rate of 6.7% falling well below the current seasonal average.

Major buyers included Tianyu, Techwool and PJ Morris. The 46 cent rise in the Northern Region Indicator over the past 4 weeks still leaves the market range bound since returning from the July recess. The trading range has been so tight during this period that this week's closing level is only 11 cents above the average and yet just 23 cents away from its high point.

Next week's sale is the last before the annual three week Christmas recess and with the market performing solidly it has pushed the expected national offering above 42,000 bales. Sales will resume the week commencing the 10th of January.


Last week was another wet week with very little golf able to be played. Nevertheless seven Vets attempted to get a game in.

New lawnmower keeps fairways looking good
