No Lamb & Potato Festival

A week after declaring they were 'back in business' (Guyra Gazette Dec. 15th), the Guyra Lamb & Potato Festival committee were forced to make a difficult decision to cancel the festival for the second year in a row.

As news of the rapid rise in the spread of the omicron COVID-19 variant of emerged in the lead up to Christmas, they made the tough call to cancel. Their decision came after over half of the stallholders pulled out within days of the Omicron variant rearing its head in NSW. Combined with the changing rules around entry via the Queensland border and reduced traffic volumes as the Tamworth Country Music festival was being scaled back, they felt it would be difficult to proceed.

They took the view that the escalation in COVID cases posed too much of a risk to the community, the dedicated

volunteers, and the committee's bottom line. Committee President Steve Mepham said that the last thing they wanted to do was host a super-spreader event in Guvra.

Their decision to cancel early has proved to be the right call, especially following last week's decision to postpone the Tamworth Festival until April. Instead, they will focus their energy on ensuring the festival's future and begin planning for 2023.

They had been hoping to use their newly-completed entertainment and dining shed for the first time this The building was vear. erected thanks to a \$130,000 State Government Community Partnership Program grant. Instead they will have to be content with a ceremony to officially open the building which will take place on Wednesday January 19th.

First COVID cases for Guyra

The first COVID-19 cases since the pandemic began, have been recorded in Guyra. The first case for the 2365 postcode area was notified by NSW Health on December 23rd.

Since then a total of 32 cases have been officially recorded, 24 of which remain active.

Cases in the Armidale LGA currently stand at 487 of which 356 are considered active.

There are 24,146 active cases in the HNEH District. 106 active cases are being cared for in hospitals, 9 are in ICU.

Have you tested positive for COVID-19 on a rapid antigen or PCR test?

You must:

• Self-isolate at home for 7 days from the date you got tested, even if you are fully vaccinated

• Tell the people you live with, any social contacts, and your workplace or school that you have tested positive

Your household contacts must also self-isolate for 7 days and have a rapid antigen test as soon as possible and again on day 6.

If you are under 65 years of age, have had two doses of COVID-19 vaccine, do not suffer from any chronic health conditions and are not pregnant, you can safely manage COVID-19 at home.

If you develop severe symptoms call Triple Zero (000) and tell the ambulance staff that you have been diagnosed with COVID-19.

You can only leave self-isolation after 7 days if you do not have a sore throat, runny nose, cough or shortness of breath. You do not need to have a negative test to exit isolation.

You will receive an SMS from NSW Health after 7 days, but you do not have to wait for this SMS to leave self-isolation if it has been 7 days since you were tested.

Australia Day Ambassador

A station leader in the remote Australian Antarctic Territory and former marketing guru will be the guest speaker and Australia Day Ambassador for Armidale Regional Council this year. Narelle Campbell will be special guest at the Guyra Australia Day Awards ceremony which will be held on January 25th, and at the flag raising ceremony which will be held at the Council chambers on January 26th.

Narelle Campbell has led four over-winter teams in some of the world's most isolated and hostile conditions. Living and working in temperatures reaching below minus 40 degrees, Narelle was the Station Leader at Mawson in 2008, Casey in 2010, Macquarie Island in 2012 and Davis Station in 2014.

With no fly-in fly-out luxuries, Narelle has worked alongside biologists on the Emperor penguin project, faced blizzards, supported medical evacuations and aircraft recovery incidents, gazed at stunning auroras, boated alongside orcas and minke whales and contributed to the protection of a pristine and fragile wilderness.

Narelle says her 23 years' experience in print media, covering logistics, sales and marketing in senior management roles and degrees in social science and counselling has honed her skills in communication, team building and tenacity to foster a positive and productive environment that contributes to Australian conservation and research

He was a hardworking man who worked at the Guyra truck stop, Guyra Shire and was foreman at the abattoirs where I was lucky enough to spend a couple of years working with him until it closed down. He then spent time doing handyman work like fencing, slashing on his tractor, shed building and many more odd jobs. Dad didn't have to look for work, as work came to him. He was a hard working man, sure he liked a drink but work always came first.

My dad was not only my father he was my best mate and it didn't matter what wrong I did he never once turned his back on me. If I can turn into half the man and father that my dad was I will be proud.

I am missing you dad and will always love and cherish you.

Graziers Focus on Chilean Needle Grass

Friday 10th December saw 66 community attend the Guyra Bowling Club for a second workshop in a month focused on Chilean Needle Grass. The workshops have been instigated by a group of landholders in the Black Mountain area, led by local landholder Kristy Youman.

"We received an offer of funding from Northern Tablelands Local Land Services to run the project, and we've onboarded both Southern New England Landcare and GLENRAC to assist us in managing it," said Kristy. "And it's a good thing, because I'm really surprised at how much interest we've got in these two events."

Several speakers addressed participants at the event, including New England Weeds Authority's Trent McIntyre; Vice President of Southern New England Landcare and local landholders Bill Perrottet; and Dan McKemey; Karl Andersson & Max Newsome from Northern Tablelands Local Land Services; and agronomists Paul Harris from Elders and Craig Chapman & Matt Foster from Grazag,.

"If you have small patches of Chilean Needle Grass, mark them on your map or GPS the location," was the advice given by Trent McIntyre, Senior Biosecurity Officer.



"Removing the seed head will help remove 85-90% of the seed in the plant, and then spray the plant according to the label rate.

"Remember to return to the area again in September or October every year to monitor and treat that patch again," he said.

Participants were advised to hit small areas hard, maintaining a 10-metre clean buffer around all boundaries to prevent spread into neighboring properties. Chilean Needle Grass, having so much that it has to be managed rather than eliminated or controlled.

"Ensure you have a good biosecurity plan, target small patches hard, and for large areas, set stocking just before seed set can help retain feed value," said Bill.

Dan McKemey compared Chilean Needle Grass to a virus we've all heard so much about in recent times.

"Chilean Needle Grass is like the coronavirus – it's spread by us," said Dan.

Grower's passion for plants, people and the environment

Bill Perrottet has a lived experience with

Kerrie Galley, Grower Manager at the Costa Tomato glasshouses in Guyra has a passion for plants, people and the environment.

Growing up in country Victoria, Kerrie began working in produce as a 14-year-old – thinning carrots and picking potatoes at a neighbour's farm in West Gippsland.

"Like many country kids I didn't watch television and was always outside. After school and on the weekends, I was working on the farm, riding my pony to work. From then on, I have always been very connected with growing fresh produce and working outside," she said.

After finishing school Kerrie spent two years working in Canada and the United States, as a green grocer in Vancouver, Canada, and then as an intern on an organic farm in the US. On her return to Australia, she started working with tomato grower Flavorite in Warragul, Victoria.

"I started with them before they built any glasshouses. When I started we were growing in sawdust bags under plastic. The business kept growing and I was given more challenges and opportunities," Kerrie said.

"I travelled overseas three times with the company looking at new innovation and technology and absorbing that back into the business."

She also completed a Master of Business



Administration, helping her become more focused on training and development of teams.

After 18 years with Flavorite, Kerrie was looking for a new challenge and moved to South Australia, growing tomatoes, mini cucumbers, and capsicums.

"It was really good to learn about working in a new climate, where the growing conditions were up to 45 degrees outside."

Kerrie then took a year off to write a book, which is still in progress, before moving to Guyra to take up a position as Grower Manager.

Passionate about the environment and the wilderness, Kerrie said her novel was a literary adventure about protecting endangered species.

"I wanted to be back in the country and coming to Guyra it really feels like home. The Northern Tablelands is a beautiful region with lots of National Parks.

"I am so happy to be back growing. There are lots of challenges, but I feel really proud of what we do. We are feeding the population, but we are doing it smarter using less water and less resources.

"Across the company we are facing the challenges together. Our farming future is going to be different and you need a good team behind you."

As for what makes tomato growing special Kerrie said it was the combination of working with plants and people.

"Everyday is different, it's very dynamic and rewarding. I have 350,000 plants in my care and my team's care. We are kind of the coach, and the plants are the athletes, and we are trying to keep them fit and strong.

"It's rewarding because we are doing something that is so essential. It's intellectual, it's physical (walking up to 10 kilometres a day), it's very social and then you get the nature. I love all of that and feel very fortunate."

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Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep and Lamb Sale

December 15th - The last sale for the year saw numbers greatly reduced with 1350 lambs and 340 sheep yarded. Lamb quality was fair to good, with a few pens of well finished new seasons.

Restockers were well catered for with Merino lambs and a number of pens of light weight young lambs. There was reduced processor competition, while competition from restockers was below the previous sale.

Market trends varied through the young lambs with breed a factor in the cheaper prices for those to restockers. The lightest of those lambs were saw a dearer trend. There was little change in the medium weight young lambs to processors. The heavy weight young lambs to process remained firm with some quality related price change only.

With buyers showing a prefer-

ence for new season lambs the old lambs sold to cheaper trends. There were insufficient grown sheep for a market quote, however the low numbers brought about quality variations with most classes showing an improvement in averages.

Armidale Cattle Sale

December 16th - It was a very small offering to finalise sales for the year with a yarding of 289, down 328 on the previous sale. The quality of the penning was quite mixed with a good supply of well finished grown heifers a feature. Light weight young cattle also well represented.

Restricted processor and feedlot participation, however restockers were active on the light weight cattle. Market trends were significantly dearer through the young cattle. Restockers looking to fill paddocks in front of a 3 week break.

Medium and heavy weight yearlings to restock and feed also posted strong gains. A small number of heavy grown steers to process sold substantially cheaper under restricted competition. Well finished grown heifers to process were also cheaper.

Weekly Wool sales

December 17th - The last sale before the annual three week recess managed to hold onto most of the gains seen over the previous four selling weeks. The Eastern Market Indicator has averaged 1333 cents for the 2021 calendar year, recording a 296 cent spread between the top and bottom

weekly closing levels and only 109 cents difference in prices over the past six months.

This compares to a whopping 751 cent difference between the high and low point for the 2020 calendar year. This week's closing level is 25 cents above the average for the year with the market seemingly having found a short term happy medium. 35,265 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 13.7%.

Major buyers included Techwool, PJ Morris and Endeavour Wool. Current AWTA test data is showing a 9.7% increase in the number of bales tested nationally for the season to date. This increase appears to be artificially held back by rain delays in shearings in November and December. AWEX auction data over the same period is showing a near 22% increase in the number of bales offered for sale. Sales recommence the week of the 10th of January.
