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\$234,500 for final stage of Men's Shed

The Guyra Men's Shed has received a further \$234,500 in State Government funding to complete the final stage of the refurbishment and expansion of its new home – the former Guyra SES building behind the old courthouse.

Funding was provided through a \$1.62 million State Government COVID-19 stimulus program, partnering with the Australian Men's Shed Association of Australia. The funding will be used to construct additional storage space and accessible amenities.

Northern Tablelands MP Adam Marshall visited the shed to announce the funding and said the new facilities are outstanding and will do much to support the health and wellbeing of Guyra's 'retired blokes and tinkerers'.

"Twelve months after moving into the former SES footprint, the finishing touches are being put on a new shed which will house the organisation's monster collection of tools and machinery." Mr Marshall said.

"There remains a lack of space to store materials and projects and so an additional shed will be built, along with connecting pathways and disabled compliant railings.

"A fully compliant disabled access amenities block will be built so that members have access to use basic bathroom facilities while attending the shed and participating in activities.

Guyra Adult Learning Association (GALA) oversees the

running of the Men's Shed and GALA President Campbell Wolfenden said the new facilities would make it possible to expand programs offered on site.

"This expansion will create new opportunities to hopefully open up a wider range of activities, including those of interest to local women," Mr Wolfenden said.

"There has been a call for a space for women to meet and do things like painting, pottery and all kinds of other programs.

"More and more Men's Sheds are opening up to this kind of activity, but to do this we really need to develop more acceptable amenities.".

Guyra Men's Shed President John Jackson said the new amenities will be a huge comfort to those who come to the shed for several hours, three days per week.

"It has always been a concern should anyone urgently need the bathroom they would have to dash for home," Mr Jackson said. "Currently there are around a dozen men working regularly on site.

"With excitement building in the community as the current extension nears completion we have had another dozen men drop in over the past two weeks to have a look and express interest in joining the Shed which is great to see - we certainly have plenty of work on the books for them to do."

The initial relocation and expansion was funded by \$100,000 through the Australian Governments Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program (LRCI) and a \$25,000 Bushfire Recovery Grant

Tour de Rocks heads for the hills


Organisers of the Tour De Rocks bike ride have had to come up with an alternate plan for this year's event to ensure the ride goes ahead. After COVID caused the cancellation of the 2020 and 2021 events, this year's obstacle has proven to be the weather.

The 'normal' Tour de Rocks ride route is from Armidale to South West Rocks over three days, but due to the recent heavy rains and flooding, some of the roads to the coast are too damaged to ride on.

To ensure this event goes ahead in 2022, a new route has been set taking in the sights around Armidale, Wollomombi and Guyra. The tour of the high country will be just as challenging for the riders, and means they can fulfil their main aim of raising much needed funds for cancer research.

Since 2012 Tour de Rocks has appropriated over \$1.7 million for the cure, prevention, and awareness of cancer to organisations throughout our community and for cancer research projects.

The new route commences on Thursday 7th April from



the Armidale Ex Services Club and day one will follow the same route as previous years stopping at Chandler Public School for morning tea. Riders will then head off traversing Jeogla station, then on to Wollomombi where they will stop for the night.

Day two sees the riders circle back towards Guyra via Lyndhurst and Glassers Rds and on to the Guyra Showground which will be the base for the night. They will head out the next morning via the Baldersleigh, Old Armidale and Boorolong Rds to the finish line at Sport UNE Armidale.

Among the contingent of around 500 riders and support

crew will be 18 Guyra locals led by team captain Michael Cox. They hope to see the local community come out and support them during their stopover.

Riders are expected to start arriving at the Showground from mid to late afternoon on Friday April 8th and will head out bright and early the next morning. If you want to cheer them as they leave, they will head out from the Showground starting at around 7am, heading via Marne St, on to Urandangie St crossing highway and then through the viaduct into Bradley St, then McKie Parkway and on to the Baldersleigh Rd to the Old Armidale/Boorolong Rd.





Water security key to region's prosperity

The first of Council's region building infrastructure packages was unveiled last week, with Council unanimously supporting a water security package that proposes a 6.5m raising of the Malpas Dam, acquisition and commissioning of Oaky River Dam and the construction of a pipeline from Oaky River Dam to Armidale.

With the eyes of the new Council firmly fixed on growing local jobs by 1000 within five years and 4000 by 2040, Mayor Sam Coupland said the Water Security Package was an important first step in turning an ambitious vision into reality.

"We are now sitting at a crossroads and must do everything we can to secure the water supply of our region. Without it we cannot remain resilient through future droughts nor achieve the growth we need to prosper and increase employment opportunities," said Mayor Coupland.

"Oaky River Dam is an untapped water resource just sitting there idle. I can't think of a more exciting proposition than to secure ownership of Oaky Dam, fix the dam wall and construct a pipeline from

the dam to Armidale to access up to 25 mega litres a day."

Both these projects require significant financial support from state and federal governments, with Mayor Coupland calling on both levels of government to back the aspirations of the region.

"I know that both our state and federal government want to hear from those regions who choose to grow and be more than they are today. Well I can say to our state and federal partners this is Armidale region confidently raising its hand and saying we choose to be a region of significance in the coming decades. It's now over to you to show us that you've got our back."

Underpinning the Water Security Package is a study by Public Works Advisory (PWA) which investigated over 40 different supply options and identified that there is a significant shortfall in secure yield even with the raising of Malpas Dam. Council staff will now work with PWA to

prepare a business case, review financial impacts and operating costs.

Extensive community consultation will also be undertaken on the Water Security Package and include the willingness of residents and businesses to pay for additional operational costs. Although not the preferred option, if Council fail to acquire Oaky River Dam from Essential Energy investigation of a dam on the Styx River will commence.

Guyra teen arrested

A 16 year old teenager from Guyra will face court next month following an investigation into the alleged armed robbery of a service station in Inverell last week.

About 1.30am on Tuesday 22 March 2022, a male – wearing a balaclava – entered a service station on Warialda Road, Inverell, and allegedly threatened an employee with a knife, demanding cigarettes and cash.

The male stole the items before fleeing on foot. He was last seen running towards Warialda Road. The employee was not physically injured during the incident.

Officers attached to New England Police District attended and established a crime scene, which was forensically examined. Following inquiries, detectives from Inverell attended a home in Guyra and arrested a 16-year-old boy.

He was taken to Armidale Police Station and charged with robbery armed with offensive weapon, goods in personal custody suspected being stolen, enter enclosed land without lawful excuse, aggravated break and enter and commit serious indictable offence-armed and larceny.

The boy was refused bail and appeared at a children's court on Saturday 26 March 2022, where he was given conditional bail to re-appear at a children's court on Thursday 7 April 2022.

Rural Market Reports

Weekly **Wool Market**

The market lost ground for the second consecutive week with this week's losses being felt across the entire spectrum. An appreciating Aussie dollar against the US appears to have played a role in this week's market direction.

A 2.4% rise in the Aussie dollar since last week's sales has seen it close the selling week at its highest level since October last year. The 1.7% fall in the Eastern market indicator didn't quite mirror the rise in exchange rates and actually reflects a 7 cent increase in US dollars.

With 16.9% of the national offering passed in and 4.1% withdrawn prior to sale just 37,500 bales were sold out of the anticipated 47,000 bale of-

Major buyers included Techwool, PJ Morris and Tianyu. Like last week heavier losses were inflicted on the higher vegetable matter, strength types with prices falling twice as much for these compared to the better style, lower vegetable matter types.

The Northern region indicator closed the week slightly above the season to date average. Its currently 66 cents below its high point and 69 cents above its low point.

Country press welcomes regional newspaper inquiry recommendations

Local news publishers are welcoming the recommendations from the federal government's inquiry into regional newspapers as a 'significant breakthrough' with potential to underpin the industry's longevity. The report from the Standing Committee on Communications and the Arts released their findings on Friday, March 25, providing a dozen recommendations for consideration.

Andrew Manuel, president of Country Press Australia, which represents more than 180 independent regionallybased news publishers, is now calling for bi-partisan support to make the proposed measures a reality.

"This has been an important and productive inquiry, and the findings can make a real difference to help sustain independent regional news services into the future - if implemented," Mr Manuel said

The recommendations made by the committee include ensuring 20 per cent of government print advertising is placed in regional newspapers, a measure that the committee expects will be cost neutral.

"Regional newspapers are the perfect medium for reaching many regional Australians with important government messages, so it's a wise and welcome recommendation to ensure more government advertising is placed with our local independent publications," Mr Manuel said.

"There were clear and consistent themes presented to the Inquiry and at the very top of that list is how important having a local independent news service is to regional communities."

"Regional newspapers are the perfect medium for reaching many regional Australians with important government messages, so it's a wise and welcome recommendation to ensure more government advertising is placed with our local independent publica-

He said that he expected broad political support for the recommendations due to the wide and diverse range of voices that were heard by the

"There were clear and consistent themes presented to the Inquiry and at the very top of that list is how important having a local independent news service is to regional communities," he said.

Chair of the committee responsible for the inquiry, Dr Anne Webster MP said that regional newspapers in Australia represent a large and diverse industry, which has experienced significant challenges over the past decade.

The committee mended a multi-pronged approach support to long-term viability of the sector, particularly for small and independent newspapers based in regional and remote Australian communities.

They also recommended that the government considers the viability of a tax rebate for regional businesses that support their local newspaper through a minimum advertising spend, and for regional newspapers that produce public interest journalism and employ local journalists.

'For people in regional, rural, or remote communities, regional newspapers are the main source of local information," Dr Webster said. "It also plays an important role in maintaining an interconnected community, and a healthy democracy.

"A diversity of opinion from all sides of the political spectrum and coverage of local, as well as national issues, is essential to public debate. It is important we ensure the sector remains viable in the longterm', said Dr Webster.

Inquiry chair Dr Webster also noted that regional newspapers have been 'challenged' for more than a decade by loss of revenue, loss of talent and rising costs, that have forced many to permanently close their doors.

"As newspapers close, readers are pushed towards social media for their news, which increases Australians' exposure to misinformation and creates a disconnect in communities.'














We welcome a new addition to the Locals Leaderboard with Baydon W. joining in the fun.


