

Guyra meetings sidelined by ARC

The Guyra council chambers has been sidelined as a meeting venue by Armidale Regional Council's due to lack of space, technical difficulties and COVID-19. Previously, every third meeting has been held in Guyra, however for the foreseeable future all meetings will be held in Armidale.

At the April ordinary meeting of council, councillors unanimously endorsed a motion which leaves Guyra off the list. Cr Dorothy Robinson moved an amendment that will allow for the Guyra chambers to be used as a venue for community members wishing to view the live stream of council meetings and also to take part in the Have Your Say part of meetings.

Cr Robinson said that it is a shame that circumstances such as COVID and technology mean that it is better to have meetings in Armidale, and said that 'we really don't want Guyra to be felt left out'.

Quarterly community meetings are being put forward as way to ensure that Guyra residents are able to interact with councillors. The first of these meetings, which was held in March, was well attended and there are plans for more to be held in the future.

Cr Jon Galletly has previously supported the removal of Guyra from the monthly meeting cycle and said that 'there has been no advantage having meetings up there'. He added that he believes 'that is fairly important that we recognise Guyra with our quarterly meetings with the community to do questions and answers'.

This was a view shared by Deputy Mayor Cr Todd Redwood and Mayor Cr Sam Coupland. Cr Redwood said that he believes that the proposed quarterly meetings with the community 'will be more beneficial and I don't think that Guyra is losing but is gaining', while Cr Coupland said that the quarterly meetings are 'a much better Guyra centric solution which allows genuine engagement'.

The only support for future Guyra council meetings came from Cr Brad Widders who said that he would like to see meetings continue at some point.

"If this is a decision made due to the COVID situation, as we come out of this fogginess we should look at having some meetings back up at the Guyra chambers."

At 1.20am, emergency services were called to a house fire along the New England Highway, Ben Lomond 20km north of Guyra.

Fire and Rescue NSW officers extinguished the fire; however, the home was extensively damaged. Officers from New England Police District secured a crime scene and commenced an investigation into the circumstances of the blaze.

Following an inspection of the property, officers located a body. While the body is yet to be formally identified, it is believed to be that of a man who resided in the home.

The fire is not being treated as suspicious, and a report will be prepared for the information of the Coroner.

Northern Tablelands Wildlife Carers have been rehabilitating and releasing critters from this area for 30 years. We are licensed by National Parks and Wildlife Service and take in injured native animals, birds, reptiles, turtles, etc. or give advice if needed. We have a 24-hour hotline. We will be submitting an article each month which we hope you enjoy.

Release day has arrived for two Tawny Frogmouths

After rescue in November and nearly 3 months 'in care' they are ready. These birds are an absolute favourite of mine and so beautiful to look after. The last month has been interesting work with flight exercise and finding enough insects, grubs, meal worms and beetles to attract them each night in an escape proof metal trav. I have been hiding them under lots of dry leaf litter so they make noises and it encourages them down to look and feed themselves. That's the big worry after release, they have to find their own food full time and won't return to you for handouts again. These birds never beg to be fed although they open beaks up and are so easy to feed. One evening soon with moonlight and calm weather, the door will be propped open with a perch. Being orphaned they have had to mature enough to 'prop up like a branch and stay very still' which is their only daytime secret to remain out of sight.

Apprentice scholarships open

First year apprentices facing financial or personal hardship can now apply for a \$15,000 scholarship to undertake their trade and study. Since 2020, eight apprentices from across the region have shared in \$120,000 from the annual Bert Evans Apprentice Scholarship.

2022 scholarship applications are now open to assist people start, change, or further their career. The scholarship provides \$5,000 over three years to support apprentices who demonstrate a high aptitude for vocational education and training and are committed to their on-the-job and formal training.

Whether you need to purchase new tools, cover fuel or car maintenance, or pay for additional study, these scholarships have helped people overcome personal barriers to finish their apprenticeships and follow their trade calling.

The variety of apprenticeships which have been supported across our region are diverse, with bakers, hairdressers, fencing contractors and security installers just some of the occupations to receive funding.

The Bert Evans Apprentice Scholarships are in addition to the 100,000 fee-free apprenticeships and 70,000 fee-free traineeships and other low-fee courses funded by the NSW Government.

Malpas Dam - Raising the Wall

A \$26.3 million proposal to raise the Malpas Dam wall by 6.5 metres, more than doubling Guyra and Armidale's current potable water supply, has been formally put to the State Government.

Armidale Regional Council Mayor Sam Coupland joined me for a face-toface meeting with Water Minister Kevin Anderson to brief the Minister on the details of the proposal and seek his support for the capital funding to get moving on the water security project.

Armidale Regional Council has been developing detailed plans and costings for the Malpas Dam expansion, as well as other measures to secure water supply for decades to come.

When Malpas Dam was built nearly 60 years ago, it was done so with the view of increasing its capacity in line with the region's population growth.

Now is the time for us to be as bold and as visionary as this region was back in the 1960s and, after the meeting with Minister Anderson, I am confident we are on track to achieving that goal. This ambitious project must be the positive legacy to come from the worst drought in living memory.

The beauty of this project is that it's an expansion of an existing dam, not building a new one.

If we lift the existing dam wall by 6.5 metres, then we can gain an extra 17 gigalitres - more than doubling the existing 13 gigalitre capacity of Malpas Dam and transforming it into a true regional water storage.

New Funding Opportunity to Help Preserve Region's War Memorials

I am encouraging the region's RSL sub-Branches and local councils to assess the condition of local war memorials and consider applying for funding to make improvements from the State Government's Community War Memorials Fund.

On ANZAC Day, locals gather at

cenotaphs, public halls and monuments to pay respect and honour our Diggers. Many of these memorials were built in the years following the First World War and are approaching their centenaries.

In preparation for future commemorative events, grants of up to \$10,000 can be accessed to support costly preservation and maintenance works.

If a project is directly related to a war memorial, chances are this program will fund it including conservation assessments, honour roll repair, war memorial cleaning and conservation work and arborist advice for war memorial trees.

Moray wool wins at Royal Easter Show

A Guyra woolgrower has picked up a swag of awards with his wool at the Sydney Royal Easter Show. James Stewart from Moray Merino Stud hit the jackpot this year picking up a number of accolades.

Among the results was the Cliff Friend Perpetual Award for the Most Successful Exhibitor in the Unhoused and Unrugged Merino Fleece Classes.

Moray wool was awarded CHAMPION MERINO RAM FLEECE IN THE TOPMAKING TYPE WOOL OPEN and CHAMPION MERINO EWE OR WETHER FLEECE IN THE TOPMAKING TYPE WOOL OPEN CLASSES

They also received second place in The NSW Wool Selling Brokers Association Award, for the best collection of three Topmaking type Merino fleeces falling within AWEX Style categories 4 to 6 inclusive and demonstrating a marketable line of wool and second place The Australian Council of Wool Exporters Award for the best collection of three Spinners type Merino ewe or wether fleeces, unhoused and unrugged.

Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale

April 27th - The overall numbers showed a sharp rise, with a yarding of 6720. Lamb quality was very mixed with a good selection suitable to restockers, along with a fair supply for the processors. The usual processors were in attendance with restockers also active.

Market trends varied through the lambs with the increased supply having some impact on quality and therefore price change. The lighter end of the restocker lambs sold to cheaper trends while the better conditioned heavier weights showed improvement. Well finished trade lambs up to 22kg sold to slightly cheaper trends. The heavier weights up to 26kg dressed were a little dearer. The limited supply of heavy weight lambs over 26kg saw a slightly cheaper trend.

Plain condition sheep made up the bulk of the offering being

mostly ewes. Trends were generally cheaper throughout with an odd exception. Restockers were active on some of the Merino ewe lines.

Armidale Cattle Sale

April 28th - There was a small reduction in numbers with 405 head yarded. All categories were represented. The quality of the offering was fair to good as was condition. There was increased domestic processor attendance along with the usual export processor competition. There was increased restocker activity with minimal feedlot competition.

There were varying trends through the young cattle with vealers purchased by restockers selling to cheaper trends. Breed and quality accounted for some of the price change. Medium weight yearling steers to restock sold to cheaper trends. The heavy weights all purchased by restockers sold to dearer trends with breed a factor in some cases. Well finished heavy weight heifer yearlings to the trade sold to a dearer trend under increased competition. The heifers to restockers sold to a slightly cheaper trend.

Heavy grown steers to process sold strongly however no market comparison is available. The well finished grown heifers saw a firm to slightly dearer trend. Strong demand for an improved quality penning of cows resulted in a dearer trend with some classes showing strong gains due to the improvement in quality.

Weekly Wool Market

April 29th - The first sale back after the short one week Easter recess yielded some positive results. The national offering whilst reasonably large fell more than 6000 bales short of the figure that had been predicted prior to Easter. Similar gains were made over both selling days this week with the Merino Carding indicator and Skirtings carrying a higher percentage of vegetable matter the only categories to finish the week on a slightly softer tone. 43,489 bales were sold nationally with 10.8% of the offering passed in.

Major buyers included Techwool, PJ Morris and Tianyu. Since the last wool sale the Aussie dollar has fallen sharply against the US with this weeks 10 cent rise in the Eastern Market Indicator actually translating to a 40 cent fall in US dollars.

The Australian Wool Production Forecasting committee has today released updated production estimates for the 2021/22 season. A 6.5% increase is now expected compared to last season. The first forecast for the 2022/23 season was also released with a further 2.5% increase expected compared to the current season.
