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Vandals target local buildings

The Guyra Lamb and Potato Festival committee has been left feeling deeply disappointed after the new shed constructed for the festival was vandalised with graffiti on the weekend.

The unwanted artwork was discovered on Sunday, and they are calling on anyone with information or dash cam footage of the vandals to contact Guyra Police. Burgess Garage Car Museum was also targeted.

President of the Lamb and Potato Festival Steve Mepham said it is a blow for the committee after all the hard work to get the facility up and running.

"We haven't even got to use it



yet and now it has been abused for one person's entertainment," he said. "The committee has not been able to hold a festival for two years due to Covid and the small reserve

of cash we hold to kick start the festival each year is drying up. We still have to pay insurance and there are other ongoing costs whether we have a festival or not.

"The last thing we needed was any extra expenses and now the repainting of this wall will need to be funded from those dwindling cash reserve."



Claiming fourth spot was The Greens' Carol Sparks, claiming 7.5 per cent overall. Rounding out the count was Pauline Hanson's One Nation's Richard Thomas (4.64 per cent), Liberal Democrats' Pavlo Samios (3.08 per cent), Independent Natasha Ledger (2.70 per cent) and United Australia Party's Cindy Duncan (2.57 per cent).

On a two-party-preferred basis, the Mr Joyce polled

66.43% of the vote to Labor's 33.57% as counting continues.

Of the 966 people who voted at Guyra Central School 66.41% voted for Mr Joyce, which was slightly up on the previous election, 11.86% voted for Labor candidate Laura Hughes with Matt Sharpham third on 6.32% of the vote.

Mr Joyce has thanked the voters of New England for their ongoing support.



"I am deeply humbled by the faith shown in me by the people of New England and will continue to work hard on their behalf as their Federal MP," Mr Joyce said.

"In government, the Coalition poured record funding into the New England electorate through projects already delivered and 'on the table'.

State Government challenged to fund Malpas Dam upgrade in June Budget

Last week I challenged the State Government to turn on the tap and start filling the \$27 million funding bucket required to raise the Malpas Dam wall and deliver decades of water security to the city of Armidale and township of Guyra.

In a speech on the floor of State Parliament, I asked that next month's NSW Budget be a watershed moment for drought-proofing efforts in the New England.

When Malpas Dam was built in 1968, it was done so with population growth in mind – the designs at the time accommodated a future expansion to 26 gigalitres capacity.

Armidale Regional Council has been developing detailed plans and costings for the Malpas Dam expansion.

If we lift the dam wall by 6.5 metres,

at a cost of \$27 million, we can more than double the existing 13-gigalitre capacity and easily fill it, gaining an extra 16 gigalitres of water and transforming it into a true regional drinking water storage.

Recently, Mayor Sam Coupland and I met with the Minister for Water to impress upon him, now that the costings have been done, the critical importance of this project to the community and to request the capital funding right now so that council can get cracking on this important expansion.

This project is too important to sit idle, it is too important to delay and the time to act is now.

Community Building Partnership Program open until June 10

Applications for the State Government's successful Community Building Partnership program are open until 5pm, Friday 10 June 2022.

\$400,000 is available for projects in the Northern Tablelands electorate, and I'm urging local councils and not-for-profit groups to apply for the funds they need to deliver projects with social, environmental and recreational outcomes.

If your organisation or club needs extra funding for infrastructure, such as playgrounds, accessible features, equipment or refurbishment, then I'd strongly encourage you to apply.

Applicants must read the program guidelines to ensure their club or organisation and proposed project are eligible.





Let the money flow for Malpas Dam expansion in budget: Marshall

NORTHERN Tablelands MP Adam Marshall has challenged the State Government to turn on the tap and starting filling the \$27 million funding bucket required to raise the Malpas Dam wall and deliver decades of water security to the city of Armidale and community of Guyra.

In a speech on the floor of State Parliament last week Mr Marshall said next month's NSW Budget must be a watershed moment for drought-proofing efforts in the New England.

"Looking out at the magnificent vista of the rolling green hills, with long grass and full farm dams, it is really hard to fathom that just over 24 months ago the Armidale and Guyra region was in the grip of the worst drought anyone had ever experienced," Mr Marshall said.

"Armidale's water supply, the 13 gigalitre Malpas Dam, was only weeks from being empty



while the two dams which service Guyra were bone dry.

"When Malpas Dam was built in 1968, it was done so with population growth in mind – the designs at the time accommodated a future expansion to 26 gigalitres capacity.

"Since the end of the drought, at least for our area, Armidale Regional Council, with the support of the Government and under the leadership of Mayor Sam Coupland and General Manager James Roncon, have been developing detailed plans and costings for the Malpas Dam expansion.

"If we lift the dam wall by 6.5 metres, at a cost of \$27 million, we can more than double the ex-

isting 13-gigalitre capacity and easily fill it, gaining an extra 17 gigalitres of water and transforming it into a true regional drinking water storage.

"Recently Mayor Coupland and I met with the Minister for Water to impress upon him, now that the costings have been done, the critical importance of this project to the community and to request the capital funding right now so that council can get cracking on this important expansion.

Mr Marshall said the ambitious project must be the positive legacy of the worst drought on record.

"The council is ready, the community is ready and now we need the Government to be ready to act, to show us the money and let us get on with this critical water security project to ensure that our region can thrive and grow and safeguard the future generations of the Armidale and Guyra communities."

Rural Market Reports

Weekly Wool Market

The national offering fell around 4,500 bales short of what was expected to be available this week. Combined with a stable exchange rate the market was able to continue to build on its recent gains. A 9 cent rise in the Northern Region Indicator on the first day of sales was followed by a further 6 cent increase on the final day. Most of the gains were focused on the 18.5 micron and finer types however the Merino Carding Indicator was the biggest mover, gaining 2.6%. 37,461 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 10.3%. Major buyers included Tianyu, Techwool and PJ Morris with competition remaining robust and widespread. The 18 micron indicator closed the week at levels last seen 3 years ago. The average price premium paid for an 18 micron type against a 21 micron type over the past 10 years is 20%. The current price premium sits a level more than three times that average at 65%. The Eastern Market Indicator

closed the week only 15 cents off its seasonal high and sit's at its third highest level since Covid19 was declared a pandemic by the WHO in March 2020.

Funding to protect koala habitat

ELIGIBLE private landholders and farmers in the Armidale Regional and Uralla local government areas will soon have access to funding which supports koala habitat restoration and enhancement, with Northern Tablelands MP Adam Marshall today welcoming the implementation of one of the first actions of the NSW Koala Strategy.

The \$193.3 million NSW Koala Strategy, released last month, is the biggest financial commitment by any government to secure the future of koalas in the wild.

Mr Marshall said the Armidale, Guyra and Uralla district was one of 10 climate resilient koala stronghold locations identified in the strategy, which will receive extensive engagement, funding and support over the lifespan of the strategy.

"Through the NSW Biodiversity Conservation Trust (BCT), the State Government is offering funding to farmers and private landholders in our region to protect important areas of koala habitat and support dozens of

other plant and animal species," Mr Marshall said.

"At least 60 per cent of Australia's land is privately owned or managed and many important ecosystems are found on private land, including precious koala habitat.

"The BCT's Northern Inland Koala conservation tender will open in the second half of this year, with conservation agreements securing moderate to very high quality koala habitat under in-perpetuity conservation agreements.

The NSW Government is delivering \$19 million to the BCT to work in close partnership with landholders to protect 7,000 hectares of priority koala habitat across NSW.

The BCT has now completed 14 conservation tenders in NSW, resulting in 129 funded conservation agreements, protecting more than 81,192 hectares of high-conservation value land and ecological assets across the state.

Life membership for Reg Campbell

Reg Campbell played cricket from his boyhood until he was approximately 60 years of age, a career spanning 47 years. He was a leading cricketer of his era, an extremely good batsman and also a very capable bowler. Reg represented the Guyra district for many years in the NEDCA fixtures from his younger days up until the mid/late 1960s.

He was a prolific scorer, making a good number of centuries in both local and district cricket as advised by his contemporaries, but in his modest ways he had never kept a tally or mentioned his achievements. As a measure of his batting prowess, in 1939 he was posted to Kyogle as a schoolteacher and returned home to Guyra in January 1940. He only played half the 1939/40 season at Kylogle yet he still won the batting aggregate for the season.

He began his cricket career in the Guyra competition with his home team of Llangothlin when he was about 13yrs. He was quickly into the game and became a very good batsman even at a young age. In 1937/38 he played in Armidale as he was at the Armidale Teachers College. He played half a season at Kyogle as mentioned above and then returned to Guyra in January 1940 and remained there for the rest of his career and life.

Reg was a natural leader and was the captain of his club Llangothlin until it folded in the mid 1950s. The bulk of the remaining Llangothlin players then moved to Bald Blair and he remained with that club until he retired. The Bald Blair club had great success over this period, winning its inaugural premiership in 1963/64 with Reg as captain.

The club repeated the form of winning the premiership in 1970/71, 1971/72, 1972/73 and 1973/74, again with Reg as captain. He didn't insist on being captain, rather his teammates wanted him to be so, he was a natural in the role and understood the game in depth.

He continued to play until about 1979 when he retired due to health issues which affected his mobility. Reg was a very well respected member of the Guyra District Cricket Association and he was held in high regard for his contribution to Guyra cricket as a competitor and fellow sportsman.

His most lasting legacy was his role in establishing the new oval and turf wicket on what is now the showpiece of the Recreation Ground in Guyra. Together with Ted Mulligan, whose career incidentally mirrored that of Reg, they lobbied the Guyra Shire Council with a proposal to construct a new oval and turf wicket on the existing Recreation Ground. This was in

1969 and at the time there were two playing fields on the Rec ground with a cement cricket pitch laid between them.

They held regular discussions on the project with Council, which was keen to improve the sporting amenities in Guyra and construction of the new oval took place in 1970/71. Play commenced on the new turf wicket in the 1971/72 season. Council left the maintenance of the turf wicket to the GDCA and Reg stepped up and became the curator, a role he held for the next 10 years plus. All voluntary, he never asked for nor received any recompense for his efforts.

He nurtured the wicket, establishing a strong turf over several seasons, preparing the wicket for each weekend's matches and the ground quickly became a favourite for the local players. Guyra cricket had come of age by being able to play on the most traditional of cricket surfaces. His contribution to Guyra cricket is unsurpassed.


