Wild night brings taste of winter

The final days of autumn have delivered a taste of what is to come, with a wintry blast arriving across the region on Monday and Tuesday.

Emergency services were kept busy on Monday evening as the cold front passed through bringing with it heavy rain and strong winds.

Wind gusts of up to 90km were recorded, causing power outages as trees were brought down across power lines. The Guyra SES received multiple reports of trees down across the entire district with multiple roads blocked. Trampolines, garbage bins and garden sheds also became airborne.

Crews from Essential Energy, Armidale Regional Council, SES. local RFS brigades and the RMS were kept busy overnight with the clean up.

Up to 350 Guyra homes were still without power on Tuesday morning. Cold weather is expected to continue for the rest of the week with single digit maximums and below zero overnight temperatures forecast.

Feedback needed to make region more inclusive

Armidale Regional Council's draft Disability Inclusion Action Plan (DIAP) 2022-2026 is now on public exhibition for 28 days from Thursday 26 May to Wednesday 22 June for community input.

The draft DIAP was approved for public exhibition at the council meeting held on Wednesday 25 May in Guyra. The plan outlines the way council and other organisations can reduce and remove barriers for people with disability and foster a more accessible and inclusive community.

This is the first review of the DIAP since the plan was created after the merger of Guyra Shire and Armidale Dumaresq Councils. Under the Disability Inclusion Act 2014 all local councils are required to develop a DIAP and they must be reviewed every four years.

The DIAP addresses the key

focus areas outlined in the new guidelines for in the Disability Inclusion Act 2014 and include:

- Positive community attitudes and behaviours
 - Liveable Communities
- Supporting access to meaningful employment
- Accessible systems and processes

To view the Draft DIAP and consider making a submission visit council's Your Say online engagement hub yoursay.armidale.nsw.gov.au or hard copies are available to view at the Armidale and Guyra Civic Administration Buildings. The public exhibition period closes on Wednesday 22 June, 2022.

Free flu jabs for all NSW residents

A free flu jab will be available to all NSW residents in a month-long blitz from June 1 in an effort to combat this year's expected severe influenza season.

With a sharp increase in flu cases already, the NSW Government will fund flu vaccinations at GPs and pharmacies until June 30.

Chief Health Officer Dr Kerry Chant said there were 1,140 cases of respiratory illness notified this week, compared with 766 in the previous week and 150 presentations and admissions to hospitals.

"We strongly urge everyone over six months of age to get a flu shot as soon as possible to protect themselves and their loved ones, as the virus is easily spread and potentially deadly," Dr Chant said.

"This is particularly important for those in high-risk groups, such as the elderly and children aged six months to five years. If you live in an aged or disability care facility, are aged over 65 or are immunocompromised, now is the time to book in.

"We also recommend a COVID-19 winter booster if you are eligible, as both flu and COVID-19 vaccines can be given at the same time."

The Commonwealth Government provides vaccines for vulnerable populations, and funds GPs through the MBS to admin-

ister vaccines. However, as COVID-19 has taught us, the role of pharmacies is crucial and the NSW Government is funding community pharmacies to deliver influenza vaccinations this June.

NSW Health has also permitted pharmacies to administer flu vaccines to children aged five years old, reduced from 10 years, making it easier for families to be vaccinated together. GPs will be reimbursed for any flu stock they have already purchased that is used in the month of June for this vaccination program.

The Commonwealth Government provides free flu vaccine for those considered to be at higher risk of severe illness from the flu, including:

- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people from six months of age
- Children from six months to under five years of age
- People with serious health conditions (including severe asthma, diabetes, cancer, immune disorders, obesity, kidney, heart, lung or liver disease)
 - Pregnant women
 - People aged 65 and over.

Other protective measures individuals can take include staying at home if sick and washing your hands. Find out more about how to protect yourself from the flu at www.nsw.gov.au/flu.





On Tuesday 10th May 2022, Armidale Police Citizens Youth Club began running their outreach program Fit for Life at the Guyra Central School gymnasium.

Keith Robinson and Brad Killen from PCYC Armidale have been making the early morning trek every Tuesday morning to Guyra to deliver the program, which focuses on boxing and fitness, to 20 or so Guyra Central School students.

Sergeant Mark Garvey and Senior Constable Warren Furphy, from Guyra Police Station also attended the Week 1 session to connect with our local students.

Our second week of the program saw upwards of a dozen students successfully engage in the program and with their peers. Through physical fitness, nutrition and social engagement, Fit For

Life aims to improve overall wellbeing as well as prevent and divert youth from offending behaviours.

PCYC's Fit for Life will be running every Tuesday morning in the GCS gym from 7:30-8:30am and is open to Guyra Central School students of all ages.

Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale

May 25th - There was a reduced penning of lambs with the sheep numbers falling sharply. The quality and condition of the lamb offering varied greatly. The regular buyers were in attendance.

Market trends varied throughout the lamb sale being cheaper for the most part. Demand was weaker for lambs to restockers as the lambs get older. The lighter weights carrying less condition were most affected. Those with more condition showing potential to finish faster were less affected. There were odd classes in lambs to process that saw little but quality and weight related price change, while a single pen of extra heavy weights was dearer.

The condition and skin values in the grown sheep varied greatly. Demand from processors was generally weaker resulting in cheaper trends

throughout. Price change was affected in places by the wide range in skin values.

Armidale Cattle Sale

May 26th - There was a small increase in the overall numbers. A large percentage were cows while the other categories had a fair representation. Overall the quality and condition of the offering was good. There was a greater supply of heavy weight cattle. Buyer participation increased in the feeders and cattle to process.

Market trends varied through the young cattle. The vealer steers to restockers showed little but quality and breed related price change. The increased competition impacted on yearling cattle with the medium and heavy weight feeder steers showing a significantly dearer market trend. Those trends followed through to the yearling heifers to feed. Well finished heavy weights to the trade also posted strong gains.

Heavy weight grown steers to feed sold on a firm to slightly cheaper market trend with breed having some impact on price change. A very good quality penning of well finished grown heifers posted strong gains on a dearer market trend with increased competition. Well finished medium and heavy weight cows sold to dearer trends under strong competition. The 5 and 6 score cows attracted weaker demand to sell to a cheaper trend. Restockers were active on plainer condition cows and the PTIC lots. The bull market was cheaper with demand weaker.

Weekly Wool Market

May 27th - After a strong four week run up the market gave back a little ground over both selling days. A larger national offering and the Aussie dollar moving higher against the US at the same time was enough to prevent the market from continuing its uptrend.

A five cent decline in the Northern Region Indicator on the first day of sales was followed by a further 3 cent drop on the final day. Better pasture conditions have caused an increase in vegetable matter with a 7.5% decline in wool testing less than 1%VM for the season to date. This has led to discounts widening for the higher vegetable matter types and strong demand for the lower VM types.

Just over 45,000 bales were offered for sale this week with a passed in rate of 14% resulting in 38,757 bales being sold. Major buyers included Tianyu, PJ Morris and Sequoia.

The national offering declines substantially next week as we head into what is traditionally the low ebb of the season with Fremantle moving to fortnightly sales during June. The forward market was relatively stable for short term deliveries but remains cautious after the midyear recess.

"Wildlife Tails"

Winter has arrived and we need to look out for microbats that may be in your woodpile or seeking shelter around your sheds or homes. Here are some neat facts about our smallest bats.

Bats are mammals and Australia has over 70 species of microbats, some are critically endangered, they roost in tree hollows, under bark, in dead trees and some species roost in caves. Microbats navigate and catch their prey by echolocation although they can see, they eat as much as 3/4 of their body weight a night in insects [especially mozzies], they are only seen at night and are acrobatic flyers.

Without our protected microbats we would have lots more insects. We do not have Vampire bats in Australia. Thanks to Lily who is one of our carers, for the following story.

Frisk, Chester, and Flora



Frisk was a female Broad-nosed bat who was found in the bottom of a bucket at a local Armidale school in early November 2021. She was cold, wet, and underweight, and we don't know how long she'd been stuck in the bucket for. I took her home and did all the caring things for her: weighed and measured her, administered fluids and glucose, warmed her up, fed her.

She was a quiet little bat, but a very messy eater, and each night after dinner she'd lie on her back in my hand while I cleaned her. I'd admire her lovely big belly full of food and tell her what a good girl she was for eating so much. In a little over a week she had put on weight and was looking better so it was decided that she could be released once the weather cleared up (microbats should be released on clear nights with no rain or strong wind). Until then I kept feeding her, thrilled with the weight she continued to put on.



Unfortunately we were in a long rainy patch, and before I got a chance to release her something happened. I got her out to feed one night and noticed something odd near her stomach. Was it...a penis? How had I not noticed that she was a he? No, it was...a tiny leg and foot. How had I not noticed that she had an extra back leg?

Finally I realised that she'd had a baby! This possibility was so far from my mind that it was not the first or even second thought I had when I saw the leg! He was red and furless with closed eyes, and was slightly larger than a baked bean. I couldn't believe something so fragile-looking could exist.

Naturally I panicked! It is not ideal to have a mother and baby microbat in care as mother microbats only carry the babies around with them for a couple of weeks before they become too big, then they stash them in a roost and leave them while they go off to feed at night, returning periodically to nurse the baby, then roost with them during the day. Despite the weather still being questionable, the best thing for Frisk was to get her and her baby released as soon as possible. So the next night and for several nights afterwards I was back at the location she was found, holding her and her baby aloft, trying to get her to fly off.

She refused. Nothing I did would make her fly. And my efforts to do so were beginning to stress her and her baby. She was a stubborn bat. Or maybe she'd just decided that she liked a warm bed, ready meals, and belly rubs after dinner! After five nights I stopped trying and resigned myself to having them both in care until the baby was flying, hunting, and ready to be released.

As anxious as it made me, it was also an exciting and rare opportunity to watch a baby microbat's progression from birth to release, with Frisk there to do all the hard work. I named the baby Chester.



The boys were amongst 23 of 130 who trialled last month at Maitland ahead of the weekend clash against CHS.


All three boys made the run on side and Stirling was made captain in what was a very physical encounter with the final score 19-all.

Stirling Munsie with the ball




