

\$10,000 sends St Mary's to nation's capital

YEARS 5 and 6 students from St Mary's of the Angels Catholic School at Guyra will be treated to the trip-of-a-lifetime when they visit nation's capital next year, with some extra help from a \$10,000 State Government grant to ensure the entire cohort is able to attend the excursion.

Announcing the grant Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall said that it was important for democracy that all school children were given the opportunity to tour Parliament House and sites important to our national identity like the Australian War Memorial.

"To remove any financial barriers which may limit student attendance on next year's excursion, St Mary's will use this grant to subsidise the cost of transport, accommodation and experiences throughout the week," Mr Marshall said.

"For many children their school trip may be the only time they ever visit Canberra and I'm pleased the State Government has been able to help give the children of Guyra this important life experience."

St Mary's of the Angels P&C President Amber McFarlane said the trip would have a particular focus on building student's resilience, relationships, and communication skills.

"As parents, we are excited about what next year's trip to Canberra will mean for the social and emotional development of our children," Mrs McFarlane said.

"The last four years of drought, bushfires and COVID-19 have meant that many children in Guyra have not had an opportunity to travel and experience life outside of their local area

"Alongside visiting the iconic sites, students will participate in a range of workshops aimed at developing their confidence, public speaking skills, social wellbeing and personal relationships.

"This positive change of scenery will be beneficial to our pupils who have missed out on much throughout their schooling. We thank Adam and the State Government for making the trip affordable so that nobody misses out."

Harding Miller Foundation Scholarship Awards Night

The Harding Miller Education Foundation Scholarships are available to female students who are living anywhere in Australia, including regional and remote areas. This can create barriers to pursuing education for Australians living in rural areas. This is especially true for students living in remote and regional areas who need to travel long distances to continue their studies or experiencing socioeconomic disadvantage.

Guyra Central School secondary student Annabelle Collins applied for a Harding Miller Education Foundation Scholarship in 2021. Annabelle was required to submit a detailed application which addressed a selection criteria. Part of the eligibility and selection criteria was Annabelle showing her commitment to continuing her educational journey onto higher education, her educational potential and demonstrate how a

scholarship could help Annabelle gain high academic results in the future. In addition to her application, Annabelle was required to get letters of recommendation from teachers and a supporting letter from our Principal, Mrs Michelle Nicholson, to provide further evidence of her commitment, performance and potential.

Annabelle was successful in receiving a Harding Miller Foundation Scholarship which was announced during Presentation Day in 2021.

Annabelle will receive the following as part of her scholarship; a high-speed laptop, high speed internet, remote IT support, \$2500 worth of online, face to face tutoring, online homework help, prepaid expense cards for items such as uniform, textbooks and school excursions.

Annabelle recently attended the Harding Miller Foundation Awards night.

Memorial Park briefing for Councillors

The Guyra Garden Club last week met with Armidale Regional Council Mayor Sam Coupland and General Manager James Roncon to discuss progress on the Memorial Park Project. Councillors Mepham, Gaddes and Galletly were also in attendance, along with representatives from the Rotary Club of Guyra, the Guyra RSL sub-branch and the proposed Guyra Progress Association.

They discussed the plans at a meeting at the Bowling Club before conducting an onsite walk through the Memorial Park Project along Bradley Street. It brings together five sub-projects to enhance the area and fulfil a 1951 resolution of the former Guyra Shire Council to honour service men and women of the district.

The first part of the project involved the planting of a Memorial Avenue of trees which was completed last summer. The initial plantings, funded through the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal (Strengthening Communities Program), have grown well and established themselves over the past few months. A meandering concrete pedestrian avenue through the Memorial Trees is also proposed if further funding can be obtained.

The Memorial Plaques sub-project (funded by the Federal Governments 'Saluting Their Service (STS) Commemorative Grants Program') will see memorials for WW1 and WW2 service

members erected in the park. Sixty-four veterans from WW1 and over 50 from WW2 have been identified as having paid the ultimate sacrifice. Sharon Bowles from the Guyra Garden Club said that "the park will be a place that honours and respects all those from Guyra and the District who served."

The third sub-project is the Mandala Garden funded through the Foundation for Regional Renewal (Tackling Tough Times Together program). It will see the creation of a mandala garden in the stylised form of a distinguished service medal at the southern end of the park near the Sandon St intersection. David Kanaley from the Garden Club said that this will be a place of reflection and springtime beauty.

"A Spring Flower Festival could then be initiated that will focus on the flowering memorial trees in the park plus the four flower beds in the Mandala Garden," Mr Kanaley said. "This festival, if it took hold in our community, would then grow and change over time and provide and economic stimulus to Guyra."

To complete the project additional signage is proposed explaining the purpose of the park as well as providing details on Council's website with links to the National War Memorial for more details on the service men and women identified on the memorial plaques. A final addition to the project will be the installation of and electric BBQ near the existing shelter and children's playground which is being funded by a Rotary District grant managed by the Rotary Club of Guyra.

Use your dine and discover vouchers before it is too late

Residents are being encouraged to use their free Dine & Discover vouchers before they expire at the end of the month.

The vouchers were announced last year, giving eligible NSW residents six \$25 vouchers to be redeemed at local hospitality and entertainment businesses.

They were first introduced to help the state's economic recovery following COVID-19 restrictions and lockdowns which saw business revenue dramatically decrease.

A month ago, there were 13.7 million unclaimed vouchers state-

wide. Business NSW regional manager, Joe Townsend, said this meant six in 10 vouchers remained unused.

"With half the eligible population residing in regional NSW there is \$170 million in vouchers which can be used to support local businesses," he said.

"Over recent months as restrictions eased, and mandatory 'check-ins' via the Service NSW app were removed, these vouchers were no longer front-ofmind."

Dine vouchers can be used at eligible restaurants and pubs for

dine-in or take-away. While Discover vouchers can be used at eligible cinemas, museums, galleries, zoos, wildlife parks, theatres, amusement parks and indoor entertainment such as bowling, go-karting, indoor climbing and mini-golf.

"With school holidays fast approaching, now is the time to make the best use of these vouchers and contribute to your local community. At some participating venues you can pre-purchase your tickets using the vouchers," Mr Townsend said.

"As well as the Dine and Dis-

cover vouchers, each eligible NSW adult can receive a \$50 Stay NSW voucher which can be redeemed up to October," he added.

"With interest rates and inflation hitting every resident and business, now is the time to use your Dine, Discover and Stay vouchers - supporting your business community and enjoying a discounted meal, show or holiday on behalf of the NSW Government."

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Country Press NSW meets with State Government over advertising situation

Country Press NSW has met with NSW Government representatives to address the challenge caused by diminished official advertising, which is adversely affecting the regional independent newspaper industry.

A delegation of Country Press NSW executives met with Deputy Premier Paul Toole MP and numerous Government Ministers in Sydney on Wednesday, June 8th, to discuss ways of reversing what member newspapers have identified as a long-term contraction in advertising by government departments.

Country Press NSW, which represents the largest group of independent NSW newspapers still in print (including the Guyra Gazette), is looking to ensure the future viability of the industry after years of Covid-19 related turmoil.

CP NSW President Lucie Peart said the meetings with the NSW Government were constructive and

very positive.

"The talks were frank and honest, we were able to discuss our concerns with different levels of the NSW Government and there is a mutual commitment there to work on building a relationship," Mrs Peart said.



"But this issue is not just about regular advertising dropping off," Mrs Peart stressed.

"We believe that some government departments are not getting their information through to local areas in the country, so people are not being adequately informed. By working together there can be a much better outcome for important government messaging," she said.

Going forward, more meetings and negotiations between Country Press NSW and the NSW Government are expected.

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From Our History - Guyra Memorial Park

On Saturday 25 August 1951 Guyra celebrated a special Jubilee Arbor Day. Trees were planted throughout the town including:

• The President, Mr T.A. Everett who planted a tree at the showground;

• In Dutton Parade Mesdames T.S. Eggleston, P.R. Stevenson, B. Smith and F.H.R. Curtis, members of the Horticultural Society who each planted a tree;

• In Lackey Street members of the horticultural society who planted a further four trees;

• President of the Bowling Club, Mr. L.P. Archibald planted a tree at the club.

From there, the proceedings moved to the Memorial Park located opposite the Guyra Shire Chambers where the Guyra Brass Band made a reappearance after several months of inactivity and played several items.

At 3.15 pm the dedication service attended by members of the public and Guyra soldiers attended the park service. In his address, Revered C.G. Mathieson said:

Today, we dedicate this park to the memory of those who gave their lives in the service of their country. We will also plant trees in their memory. These are memorials – symbols of our gratitude and they will stand as a reminder of our promise to remember them until 'The going down of the sun'. At the service, the following planted trees: Mr W, Brodie (R.S.L.), Mr R. Hudson (Chamber of Commerce), Mr. B. Smith (Rotary), Mrs B. Smith (Hospital), Mrs F.H.B. Curtis (Horticultural Society) and Mrs Parsons (C.W.A.)

It was in July 1951 that several meetings were held in Guyra to consider tree plantings a*nd the most suitable trees for Guyra. Mrs F.H.B. Curtis, president of the Horticultural Society chaired a meeting held in the Shire council Chambers. Organisations who expressed support for the project included the Guyra Shire Council, the showground Committee, the Board, Hospital C.W.A. Younger Set, Rotary and the R.S.L. Reverend Mathieson suggested that the Shire Council be asked to dedicate land in Bradley Street, near the Bowling Club and opposite the Bowling Club as a memorial park.

A month later the Guyra Argus, 23 August 1951 reported that the Shire Council, owner of the land in Bradley Street decided to dedicate the land as the Guyra Memorial Park in memory of Guyra's War dead. It was planned to plant a tree in the park for every fallen soldier from Guyra.

Did anyone attend the service as a child? Is anyone aware of photographs taken on the occasion?

Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale

June 8th – A total yarding of 6375 head, 2615 sheep and 3760 lambs. There were increased supplies in both the sheep and lamb offerings. Lamb quality was very mixed ranging from very plain bare shorn Merino's through to some well finished extra heavy weight Crossbreds. The usual processors were in attendance and there was some restocker competition.

With the cold weather on display the plain condition, very light weight lambs attracted little interest from restockers with this resulting in substantially cheaper trends. The guality of those lambs also contributing. Restockers were active on Crossbred lambs in fair to good condition and weighing up to 22kg estimated dressed. The market trend was dearer. Strong processor demand resulted in the well finished heavy and extra heavy weight lambs selling on a firm to dearer market trend.

Merino ewes carrying plenty of

wool were well represented in the sheep market. Strong processor competition along with some restocker activity resulted in dearer market trends throughout. Significantly so for the most part. The value of the wool on their backs also contributed to the improvement.

Armidale Cattle Sale

June 9th - There was a small increase in the overall numbers with 1180 head yarded. Young cattle were well supplied. There were some outstanding heavy weight grown steers along with a fair supply of grown heifers. Cows were also well supplied. The quality and condition of the offering was generally good with very few plain cattle penned. There was increased restocker and feedlot competition however not all the export processors returned this sale.

Restocker demand was strong on vealer steers with market trends dearer. There was some negative price change brought about by the increased supply impacting average quality. The heifer portion sold to a cheaper trend. Again quality and breed vareiation impacted price change in the medium and heavy weight yearling steers to restock and feed. Market trends, however were firm to dearer. There were strong gains in the medium and heavy weight yearling heifers to restock and feed with the increased competition.

Heavy grown steers to feed sold to dearer trends. The well finished heavy steers and bullocks saw little but quality and weight related price change. The reduced processor competition impacted the grown heifer and cow markets. Restocker cows experienced little change however the well finished cows to process saw trends much cheaper. That trend carried into the bull market with heavy weights to process significantly cheaper.

Weekly Wool Market

June 10th - The smaller national offering of just over 31,000 bales has no doubt helped in sending the market back on an upward trajectory. Gains were made over both selling days but were largely confined to the Merino sector.

The Northern Region Indicator lifted 7 cents on the first day of sales and in a positive sign lifted a further 16 cents on the final day, resulting in a 1.5% increase for the week. The closing level of 1540 is only 3 cents off the season high point. The higher, yielding lower vegetable matter types remain the focus of the trade however increases were also recorded in most types as weekly rostered quantities remain at what is traditionally the low point of the season. 28,118 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 9.6%.

Major buyers included Techwool, Tianyu and Fox & Lillie. This is the third time in the past 12 months that the Eastern Market Indicator has moved towards the 1450-60 level only to be pegged back on the previous 2 occasions. A move above the 1460 level could help break the sideways pattern that has dominated for the past 12 months.

Rebates to help with electricity costs

With winter well and truly upon us, and electricity prices on the rise, the NSW Government has a range of rebates available to assist with the cost of electricity bills. Applications for the 2021/22 rebates expire at 11pm on 30 June 2022. Applications forms are available on the Service NSW website, and online applications are also available on the site.

Seniors Energy Rebate

The NSW Seniors Energy Rebate is available for eligible independent self-funded retirees to help cover the cost of their electricity. To be eligible you need to hold a Commonwealth Seniors Health Card (CSHC). The rebate is \$200 per household, per financial year, and if your application is successful it will be paid directly into your nominated bank or credit union account.

Family Energy Rebate

The Family Energy Rebate helps NSW family households with dependent children cover the costs of their energy bills. To be eligible for the NSW Family Energy Rebate in a given financial year, you must: • be a NSW resident

• be the account holder of an

energy retailer

• have been the recipient of the Family Tax Benefit (FTB) for the previous financial year

Low Income

Household Rebate

The Low Income Household Rebate helps low income NSW households cover the costs of their energy bills. It is paid once each financial year. You can apply for the Low Income Household Energy Rebate if:

• you're a NSW resident

• you're an account holder of an energy retailer

• you hold one of the following:

• Pensioner Concession Card issued by the Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA) or Services Australia

• Health Care Card issued by Services Australia, or

• DVA Gold Card marked with either 'War Widow' or 'War Widower Pension', or 'Totally and Permanently Incapacitated' (TPI) or 'Disability Pension' (EDA)

Winter fishing closure in trout streams begins June 14

Anglers looking to catch a trout are reminded that the June long weekend was their last opportunity to fish in trout streams and rivers across NSW, as the fishing season closes in these waters over winter.

NSW Department of Primary Industries (DPI) Deputy Director General Fisheries, Sean Sloan said that fishing is prohibited in trout rivers and streams after the June long weekend until the start of the October long weekend.

"The annual closure starts Tuesday 14 June and will reopen in time for the October long weekend on Saturday 1 October 2022," Mr Sloan said.

"This closure allows salmonid species to breed uninterrupted during their annual spawning run ensuring we protect our fishing assets for future seasons.

"The good news for fishers is they can continue fishing during the annual closure, without breaking the rules, at any of the trout dams across the state.

"Popular winter trout fishing spots include lakes Jindabyne and Eucumbene in the Snowy Mountains, Oberon Dam near



Bathurst, Tantangara and Talbingo Dams near Tumut, Malpas Dam near Armidale and Lake Wallace and Thompsons Creek Dam at Lithgow."

Fisheries Officers will be out and about patrolling the state's waterways to ensure that fishers are doing the right thing.

Mr Sloan said it is an offence to fish in trout streams during the closed season.

"Fishers heading to one of the trout dams this winter are reminded that they are required to have a current NSW recreational fishing fee receipt (fishing licence) on them at all times while fishing," Mr Sloan said. "A combined bag limit of five and a size limit of 25cm applies for trout or salmon in all trout dams except Thompsons Creek Dam and Black Lake where the bag limit is two."

Detailed information on the fishing rules can be found on the DPI website or in the NSW Freshwater Fishing Guide which is available from DPI Fisheries offices and most bait and tackle stores.

Any suspected illegal fishing activity can be reported through the FishSmart app or to the Fishers Watch phone line on 1800 043 536.
