

End of the road for Guyra Taxi

The Guyra Taxi Service owned by Arthur and Caroline Atkins will cease to operate from Thursday June 30th. After 20 years, and many thousands of trips, the couple have decided to call it a day.

Arthur said that it was not an easy decision, but rising fuel prices, government red tape and changing demographics have forced their hand. The last few years have been particularly tough with business declining due to the impacts of the COVID lockdowns.

He said that they had hoped to sell the business, which has been on the market for 12 months, but there were no takers.

"Caroline and I are sad to see the taxi service go because it is something we enjoyed doing for the last 20 years," Arthur said. "Over that time things have changed and the clientele is just not there like it used to be.

"Business really dried up due to COVID and we are still feeling the effects. We lost contracts that haven't returned and have been operating on good will for a while now.



"It is disappointing that we couldn't sell the business, but we will hold on to the plates in the hope that someone may come along in the future.

"We will miss our regular clients who have been supportive of our decision to close and we thank them for their support and wish them well."

Over recent months, they have worked together with Guyra Home Support Services (HSS) to ensure the impact of the closure will not disadvantage local residents, particularly the elderly. From next week, HSS will run extra bus services to enable those without transport to access shopping and attend medical appointments. Bus vouchers will replace existing taxi vouchers and bookings can be made by phoning HSS on 6770 7127.

Malpas Dam wall raising project welcomed

A \$27 million funding reservation for the raising of Malpas Dam wall announced in the 2022-23 NSW Budget, has been welcomed by Northern Tablelands MP Adam Marshall and Armidale Regional Council Mayor Sam Coupland.

Mr Marshall said the project would deliver long-term water security to the region.

"Since the end of the drought in 2020, Armidale Regional Council has been investigating ways to protect local communities from future dry periods.

"The beauty of the Malpas

Dam project has always been that it's an expansion of an existing dam, not the building of a new one, meaning reduced planning and approvals are required to get to construction stage.

"The State Government has now provided the funding needed to start preparing the raising of the dam wall by 6.5 metres, which will more than double the existing 13-gigalitre capacity.

"This will transform the dam into a true regional drinking water storage, which could have the potential to service places like Uralla and Invergowrie into the future.

Mr Marshall recognised Mayor Sam Coupland and General Manager James Roncon who have spearheaded the development of detailed plans and costings for the Malpas Dam expansion.

Mayor Coupland said that the funding announcements in the NSW budget are the first significant steps to achieving our vision to grow the population by at least 10,000 people through the creation of an additional 4,000 jobs. "The \$27m to raise Malpas Dam wall has been a priority for the current council and will set our region up for generations to come," Cr Coupland said.

"Secure water supply is the critical piece of infrastructure required to support a population in excess of 55,000 and will give industry the confidence our region can support them.

"This is a very important first step and will need to be closely followed by sourcing additional water as part of the secure yield requirements to drought proof the region."

Don't get caught by shopping scams

What's an online shopping scam?

More than one-third of Australian households shop online. Taking advantage of this trend, scammers are setting up fake websites and deceiving people into buying from them. Once the order is placed and payment made, shoppers might receive a fake, inferior product compared to what was promised, or nothing at all.

Classified scams are a subset of this type of scam, where scammers pose as genuine sellers, posting fake ads on either a classifieds website, newspaper, or via email or social media.

How to avoid being scammed

• Be wary of any offer that seems too good to be true, such as luxury items or popular brands being offered at unusually low prices • Don't rush or be pressured by 'limited offers' or end-of-sale 'countdowns' – scammers always try to create a sense of urgency

• Online stores or classifieds that request you use non-secure payment methods. These include wire or bank transfers, money orders, preloaded gift cards and electronic currencies like Bitcoin. It's rare you'll be able to recover money sent this way.

How to protect yourself

• Navigate directly to an online store using your web browser, rather than by clicking an email or social media link

• Google the merchant, its online store and its products to check their reviews

• Read the comments on a store's social media ads to see what other people have to say about them

• Regularly check your statements.

If you've been shopping online, keep an eye on your transaction history and report anything suspicious as soon as possible. A small, unauthorised charge can be the first sign of credit card theft – scammers often do it to check if your account is active.

• If you're not familiar with the site, be cautious of unbelievably low prices, missing privacy policies, terms and conditions or refund information, or sites that limit your payment options. It should easy enough to contact customer service if you need help – even better if they have a phone number or physical address. A quick web search can surface reviews and other buyer's experiences.


• Think twice before connecting to free public Wi-Fi networks. Cybercriminals like to lurk on public networks and intercept your activities, or even set up rogue hotspots for you to connect to, so never shop or bank online using public Wi-Fi.

• Before you browse or shop online, ensure your computer's anti-virus is up-to-date.

• If you need to create accounts with online stores, make sure you use strong and unique passwords – don't reuse your internet banking, email or social media passwords

• Generally, debit cards don't offer the same level of buyer protection as other payment methods, so it's recommended to pay with a credit card or payment system (e.g. PayPal).

• If shopping for second hand items from social media or another online marketplace, ask as many questions as possible upfront, look at the seller's profile and past feedback; Never share your bank account details or passwords, or transfer a deposit without seeing what you're buying first.



Restore and thrive

Landholders asked to ensure compliance with safe storage of firearms

Police are encouraging landholders to conduct regular property security checks and to ensure compliance with safe storage of firearms. The messaging comes as NSW Police Force conduct Operation Armour which aims to prevent, disrupt and reduce firearms thefts across Western Region.

Western Region Operation Manager, Acting Superintendent Bruce Grassick said they encourage firearm owners to ensure that the correct safe storage compliance is followed.

"Firearms that are not stored securely or stored incorrectly at uninhabited dwellings, make easy opportunities for thieves during break-and-enters," A/Supt Grassick said.

Western Region Firearm Sponsor, Superintendent Bob Noble is urging residents to contact their local licensing Sergeant for assistance to provide you with information to ensure firearm/s are complying with the safe storage requirements.

"Following firearm safe storage procedures is vital in the prevention of theft and keeping our communities safe," Supt. Noble said.

"I also want to emphasise the importance of prompt reporting which can be done through your local police, the Police Assistance Line or Crime Stoppers as soon as possible to allow police to appropriately respond to the incident."

In particular, police encourage firearm owners to regularly check their firearms and ensure compliance with the Firearm Legislation:

• Ensure firearms are kept in safe storage facilities when not in use

• Lock ammunition in a container kept separate to the firearms

trend.

• Ensure safe keeping facilities are locked at all times

• Ensure no unauthorised person knows where the keys to the safe storage facilities are kept, or the safe combination details

• Check your firearms regularly

Securing properties and equipment is also encouraged to reduce the risk of falling victim to theft:

• Prominently display the property's RMB Number

• Conduct regular checks of the property's boundary fences and gates

• Display 'No Trespassing' warning signs on perimeter fence lines and gates

• Install security lighting around the homestead and sheds

• Consider installing an intruder alarm system or surveillance camera

• Where possible, keep valu-

able items and machinery engraved and secure

• Check machinery and tools regularly

• Remove keys from vehicles and machinery

Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale

June 22nd - 6900 yarded 2540 Sheep 4360 Lambs. There was a small increase in lamb numbers with the sheep supply holding steady. It was a mostly good quality, well finished penning of trade and heavy weights, with odd pens of very good extra heavy weights.

Restockers were also well catered for with plainer condition lots. The usual processors were in attendance along with some restocker orders.

An influx of lambs into the system saw processor demand weaker. This carried into the restocker market as well. Cheaper trends resulted through all classes. Plain quality trade lambs and the plainest of the restocker lambs saw the worst of the market, being much cheaper. The better quality restocker lambs were less affected.

Despite being cheaper the good quality trade weight lambs held up better than the heavy and extra heavy weights with those classes showing a much cheaper The quality and condition of the sheep was very mixed. Skin values in the Merino sheep varying greatly. There was reduced processor competition with demand much weaker. As a result market trends were much cheaper. The plainest condition shorn Merino ewes attracted some restocker competition.

Armidale Cattle Sale

June 23rd – Yarding 1355. There was a small increase in the numbers with vealers and cows well supplied. There was a reduced penning of yearlings. The quality and condition of the offering was fair to good. The recent processor orders were in attendance along with extra feedlot and restocker competition.

Restocker demand was much weaker on the vealer steers, despite some very good quality pens available. With the exception of a small number of very light weight steers, market trends were substantially cheaper. Conversely the heavier weight classes of heifer vealers to restock and feed sold to a dearer trend with breed and quality contributing. Medium weight yearling steers in limited supply sold to cheaper trends regardless of the extra competition. The heavy weight feeder steers saw a firm to cheaper trend, with odd pens of highly sought breeds holding their value. Medium and heavy weight yearling heifers to restock and feed sold to significantly cheaper trends with an odd exception.

Heavy grown steers and bullocks to process saw a firm to dearer trend with both weight and quality accounting for some price change. The cow market saw cheaper trends with the medium weight cows showing the greatest falls. Restockers were active on a line of PTIC cows with prices well above those going to processors. Cheaper trends in the bull market.

Weekly Wool Market

June 24th - The Eastern Market Indicator closed the week at its highest level since March 2020 but there were some pronounced differences within the individual micron categories. Like last week it was the medium Merino types that came under the most focus from the trade.

The 20 and 21 micron indicators have surged over 140 cents dearer in the past three weeks, playing catch up to the superfine types. Some weakness was evident in the 18 to 18.5 micron range on the final day of sales with 20 cent falls recorded. With only the Eastern seaboard selling this week just 29,807 bales were sold nationally.

Major buyers included Techwool, Meliwa and Aust Merino Exporters. The rising market has contributed to a much larger than anticipated national offering next week with 45,000 bales expected. This is around 10,000 bales greater than the corresponding sale last season.

Next week's sale is the last of the 2021-22 season. The new season will commence immediately with sales in the first two weeks of July before breaking for a three week recess.


