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Costa deploys robotic pollination

In a world first, Costa is working with Israeli company Arugga AI Farming to deploy robotic pollination for truss tomato plants at its tomato glasshouse operation in Guyra.

Pollination in glasshouses around the world is generally done using bumblebees, however their use is banned in Australia. That means the pollination process is done by hand.

In this commercial deployment, robotic pollinators drive along the rows, find flowers that are ready for pollination using artificial intelligence and send air pulses to vibrate the flowers in a specific manner which imitates buzz pollination as performed by bumblebees.



Bush fire danger period delayed

The Bush Fire Danger Period (BFDP) for the New England/Northern Tablelands Districts will now commence on the 1st September 2022 and cover the Local Government Areas (LGA's) of Armidale, Uralla, Walcha, Glen Inness Severn, Inverell and Tenterfield.

NSW RFS Superintendent Paul Metcalfe said that due to significant rainfall and ongoing wet conditions over most of region this year the NSW RFS, in consultation with other agencies, has announced a delay to the start of the Bush Fire Danger Period, now to begin on 1st September 2022.

Superintendent Metcalfe stated now is the time for residents to take action and prepare their property for the bush fire season by removing flammable materials from their yards.

"Clearing gutters of leaves, checking the condition of their hoses and that they reach right around their house, and where appropriate, conducting burning activities," Supt Metcalfe said.

"These preparation tips, as well as helpful information about what to do in the event of a fire, are contained in the Bush Fire Survival Plan guide, which can be downloaded from the NSW RFS website."

Property owners are not required to obtain a permit until the 1st September 2022 BFDP start date but are still required to notify adjoining neighbours and the RFS at least 24 hrs prior to lighting up. Property owners can notify the RFS via the online notification portal at: https://www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify

Information about hazard reduction burning and required notifications is available on the NSW RFS website at www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/fire-information/BFDP.

Gazebo planned for CWA's 90th

A new gazebo will be built in McKIe Park as a lasting memorial marking 90 years of service to the Guyra community by the Country Women's Association.

Members of the Guyra CWA last week met with Wendy Mulligan and David Kanaley from the Guyra Garden Club to discuss the location for a proposed gazebo.

Petition launched demanding immediate Rural Health changes



In the largest combined effort yet to demand drastic change and improvements in health services and staffing levels across the region, last week I was joined by local Mayors, nurses and midwives and community advocates to launch an electoratewide community petition.

This petition calls for three main actions -

1. Split the Hunter New England Health District and re-instate the

former New England Area Health Service, which included the North West region;

2. Directly employ doctors in emergency departments in rural and regional district hospitals, with the capacity to provide outpatient services; and

3. Dramatically increase the number of nurses employed in rural and regional hospitals with appropriate nurse to patient ratios.

We need 10,000 signatures to trigger a debate on the floor of State Parliament and force immediate action. This petition is borne out of sheer frustration; frustration that our concerns and requests have either been ignored or dismissed by health officials.

We are getting a raw deal and we're all sick to the back teeth of seeing our hard-working nurses get worked to the bone, no doctors in our hospitals and local lives put at risk, on a weekly basis.

It is time to combine forces across the New England and North West, speak with one tremendously loud voice through this petition and demand that our health services are directed by local voices responding to local needs.

The petition highlights the widespread deterioration of our primary and acute medical services since the merger of local area health services into Hunter New England Area Health.

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

Thanks to Lily who is one of our carers, for the following update on three microbats who came into care. Part 1 of this story was printed in the Guyra Gazette in May if you would like to refer to it.

Frisk, Chester, and Flora (Part 2)

Things were going well with Frisk and Chester until a couple of weeks later when Frisk showed her stubborn streak once more and stopped eating. She started losing weight, then her milk dried up.

I panicked again, and rang Jackie, the Northern Tablelands Wildlife Cares flying fox and microbat coordinator. It was decided that she would take Frisk and get her eating again, and I would keep Chester and feed him. At that point I had another baby microbat in care, a Lesser Long-eared female named Flora who was a week or two older than Chester. I could slot him in with her feed and care regime, and they could keep each other company.

But, Chester had apparently inherited his Mum's stubborn streak, and getting him to take enough milk at each feed was a challenge. Where Flora would only take a few minutes to feed and clean, Chester would take me well over an hour to get a less than satisfactory amount into him. I had to resort to giving him subcutaneous fluid injections several times as he was dehydrating and losing weight.

I went online to get suggestions from other microbat carers on how to get him eating. I could try holding him in different orientations: horizontally, vertically, head down at an angle, on his back. I could try having him all wrapped up in a tissue with only his muzzle poking out, or partially unwrapped with his head more exposed. I could try making clicky noises at him like his mum would, feed him from a tiny canula tip, feed him with a small foam teat for him to suck on. Nothing

worked and I was fighting him to get only a few drops at a time into him.

Flora, on the other hand, was a breeze to feed and a delight to have in care. Lesser Long-eared bats are one of my favourite species of microbat. They are so adorable with their little snouty noses and their long, expressive ears. Plus they tend to have a very friendly and calm nature. After feeding, Flora liked to be held in my hand while she had a nap. Then she would wake in her own time and enjoy a stretch and a grooming session in or on my hand.

I was feeding these two babies every three hours around the clock, and grabbing quick naps between each feed. Lack of sleep was not helping my anxiety and frustration with Chester. Then one day, for no apparent reason, he started drinking. With gusto! It was such a relief, and certainly made my life much easier and his life more of a guaranteed thing!

From this point on, he grew well. He and Flora were going for longer between feeds: 4 hours, then five, then six, so I was able to sleep more. And Frisk came back to me in a better mood and with a repaired appetite. Life was good for me and the three microbats in my care.

How would a Foot and Mouth Disease outbreak affect Australia?

Two UNE academics unpack what a Foot and Mouth Disease outbreak would mean for animal and human welfare, the environment, and the economy.

As our Indonesian neighbours face a Foot and Mouth Disease (FMD) outbreak, Australia is gearing up for the possibility of the viral disease reaching our shores for the first time in over a century.

While FMD doesn't affect humans, it causes painful blisters on the mouth and feet of cloven-hoofed livestock such as cattle, sheep and pigs, and can be lethal for young animals.

With past overseas outbreaks having led to the mass culling of infected in affected zones and non-infected animals in buffer zones, UNE Professor of Animal Behaviour and Welfare, Dr Paul McGreevy, says if it were to come to Australia, there would be devastating impacts.

The environmental, human and animal welfare toll

"There will be significant animal welfare implications if FMD arrives; a prospect that is truly terrifying," he says.

"There will also be profound implications for veterinary and biosecurity personnel, and, with large numbers of carcasses to dispose of, there would be environmental impacts.

"This is the so-called 'triple bottom line' that underpins UNE's interest in the novel One Welfare framework, which is a concept highlighting the interconnections between animal welfare, human wellbeing and the environment."

What would it mean for the economy?

In addition to the welfare and envi-

ronmental impacts, economists predict an outbreak would have long-lasting consequences on the economy and the country's ability to export meat products to certain areas around the globe.

"ABARES modelling from several years ago suggests that a large, multistate outbreak of FMD outbreak in Australia would have an estimated direct economic impact of around \$50 billion over 10 years. With rising prices of meat, this has become around \$80 million," says UNE Associate Professor in Biosecurity Economics, Dr Susan Hester.

"This is estimated to be mainly due to the cost of lost trade, although it does include some costs of responding."

A/Prof Hester, who works in the UNE Business School and the Centre of Excellence for Biosecurity Risk Analysis at the University of Melbourne, has spent the past two decades researching how to reduce the impacts of biosecurity threats, and says an outbreak would be felt widely.

Trade bans and tourism

Reduced tourism, mental health impacts for those who administer and witness stock culls, and a change in what we pay at the grocery store, are all things to look out for if FMD were to spread.

"We would likely lose our access to premium meat export markets, and our products would be banned from those countries until FMD can be proven to have been eradicated from Australia," she says.

"Given we export much more meat than we consume, if all the meat that we currently export was to be consumed in the domestic market, then prices would fall, although, if large quantities of animals had to be destroyed and did not become part of the supply chain, then prices could eventually rise.

"It really does depend on where the outbreak occurs, its size and how quickly it can be contained and eradicated."

The road to recovery

As for how long it could take for Australia to recover from an FMD outbreak, A/Prof Hester says there are many factors at play.

"To regain FMD-free status for trade, a country must wait three to six months after eradication, depending on the eradication strategy used. This comes on top of the time it takes to eradicate, which could be over a year.

"It depends on the size of the outbreak when it is first detected, and how many different outbreaks occur. Recovery would likely take a long time where there are many outbreaks and they are not discovered until they have spread widely."

Australia's biosecurity measures -our saving grace?

While the prospect of an outbreak is troubling, A/Prof Hester says Australia is well-equipped to keep a disease like this off our shores if biosecurity measures are adhered to.

"Australia has invested heavily for many decades in activities aimed at preventing FMD from entering and in planning and preparedness activities in the event FMD were detected here.

"We assist our near neighbours in the South-East Asian region to manage FMD, we have strong border risk-mitigation measures, and post-border, we have the ability to respond quickly to control and eradicate the disease. We have livestock tracing systems that would be used in the event of an outbreak, and there have also been various 'practices' at responding to an outbreak."


At the Australian Schoolboy Rugby Championships Eu-
