



Stories of drought brought together in new book

Thirteen farm wives and daughters from across NSW and SA have put pen to paper to tell their story of living through drought years.

The stories have been collated into a book titled 'Dusty Boots, Faithful Hearts'. Described as a biography of sorts, the book includes a chapter written by Ruth Stace from her farm west of Guyra. Ruth's chapter is written from the perspective of the drought, bushfires and the emotional impact that it had on her family.

The idea for the book came in January 2020 with the dream to tell a story of drought from a female perspective. Two years later, the heart-felt, real life stories have been collated into a book which is available now for preorder.

Toni Clark from Tomingly near Dubbo is also one of the authors and said that it became obvious to her that stories about the drought needed to be told and couldn't be forgotten.

"The book is unique in that each person has written of their own experiences and in their own style," Toni said.

"We were all so busy helping out in the drought, that it was only when it was over that we had the time to sit back and reflect on what had happened.

"To make things more interesting it was put together virtually due to distance and also because COVID kept us all close to home."

While the authors shared the experience of living through drought, they also shared their Christian faith, which they believe helped them survive the tough times.

"It is a way of letting others know that you are not alone when you are experiencing hardship, and also a way to empower women and thank the communities that supported us."

Team Guyra will take part in the ride, which starts on September 9th covering the distance of more than 500km over 6 days.

They had initially planned to do the ride last year, however it was cancelled due to COVID.

The WHRS is on call for our community 24/7, 365 days a year. It costs approximately \$40 million per year to keep the helicopters and crews ready to respond

Debate about the Bill to Facilitate Rail Trails and Roads in Unused Regional Rail Corridors

The Bill to amend NSW Transport Administration Act 1988 in order to give the minister more powers to make decisions and facilitate the building of rail trails and roads on unused regional rail lines -up to 30 years - will be debated in the current session of NSW parliament. The bill will forever destroy our chance of restoring a rail link from Queensland to properly develop our visitor economy and education sector placed so close to a state boundary. If approved, we will see massive roundabouts, cross roads, and many other permanent pieces of road infrastructure carve up the Great North (rail) Line, our one and only hope for public

transport into Queensland. Many of us have families, business, health and education connections over there. Critical pieces of rail infrastructure with future promise would be destroyed for rail trail or roads projects that are not sustainable due to extra cost transfers to the Councils for maintenance.

Poor regional transport inhibits growth to regional areas. Growth in tourism opportunities for this region are possible if we can enhance the number of travellers south. People also need to travel north for medical appointments. Poor public transport affects the less wealthy in our community. Tourist Rail and rail in general is more accessible to all age groups and physical abilities than rail trails. Particularly in an ageing population, tourist rail and rail transport favour the elderly.

In forcing all regional transport onto roads, and very bad roads at that, the NSW Government papers to be creating 'a de facto trade barrier' between the Northern Tablelands in NSW and Queensland. It is also at odds with the carbon emission reductions benefits of converting regional passenger and freight to rail could achieve. Transport via roads is proving to have maintenance issues with the current weather pattern. Increase fuel costs on road also have inflationary pressure as costs get passed onto consumers in the price of goods they carry.

Potential rate rises that will be an impose on the regional communities will be the unintended consequence.





RURAL HEALTH PETITION SMASHES PAST 5,000 SIGNATURES

AMOST two weeks since the launch of the electorate-wide community petition calling on the NSW Parliament to split the Hunter New England Health District, directly employ doctors in rural hospitals and dramatically increase nursing numbers – the half-way milestone of more than 5,000 signatures has already been reached.

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall said the response to the petition had been overwhelming and is calling on the community to keep up momentum so the required 10,000 signature threshold is reached.

The 10,000 signatures are need to trigger a debate on the floor of State Parliament and force immediate action The MP said that since the launch of the petition, he had heard directly from scores of residents keen to share their own experiences of disappointment and frustration when seeking treatment at our local hospitals.

The petition will be available in all local council administration centres and local businesses in every town across the region. It can also be signed in the MP's office at Moree and Armidale. Copies of the petition can also be posted or emailed, and you can request that by calling the Electorate office on 6772 5552.

People have until 30 September to sign the petition, before Mr Marshall tables it in State Parliament.

Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale

August 3rd - Lamb supply decreased to 1,385 and 565 sheep at Guyra. Quality was mixed for the small yarding but it did contain some very good heavy lambs, a mixed selection of trade weight lambs and lighter pens suiting both processors and restockers. The usual buying group attended and operated with much weaker competition and demand compared to a fortnight ago. Light lambs were mainly from \$10 to \$15 easier and in some places back further, medium and heavy lambs sold from \$20 to \$30/head cheaper. Restockers purchased lambs from \$52 to \$100 and light Merino lambs from \$28 to \$69/head.

Light lambs to the processors sold from \$70 to \$75 and the light trade weights sold from \$75 to \$107/head as they averaged 500c/kg cwt. Medium trade weight lamb pens made from \$110 to \$132/head and averaged in costs from 570c to 590c/kg cwt. Heavy trade weights sold from \$140 to \$150, heavier 25kg to 26kg cwt lambs were from \$150 to \$170/head and they averaged from 600c to 650c/kg cwt. The heavy to extra heavy lambs made from \$168 to the market top of \$200/head and averaged from 580c to 600c/kg cwt. Hoggets sold to \$130 and the Merino lambs with cover made from \$108 to \$135/head.

A mixed quality penning of sheep with prices also of a much easier trend for mutton. Light sheep were \$9 to \$25 easier, the medium mutton came back \$20 to \$30 and the heavy weights on average were less affected selling \$3/head cheaper on last sale. Very light sheep sold from \$37 to \$65/head. Light weight mutton made from \$51 to \$85, medium weights sold from \$110 to \$139/head with costs for sheep with cover selling from 410c to 500c/kg cwt. Crossbred wethers reached \$130 and the heavy crossbred ewes sold from \$141 to \$171/head. Merino rams of mixed quality made from \$20 to \$75/head.

Armidale Cattle Sale

August 4th – A mixed quality much smaller offering of 140 cattle sold to less buyers present but there was spirited competition at times helped by feeders and local restockers. The majority of the yarding consisted of cows from average to very good and a mixed but mostly good selection of bulls. There was also a limited supply of young and grown cattle compared to a fortnight ago.

A couple of vealer pens sold stronger with the light weight vealer heifers selling to 522c and the steer vealers to 574c/kg. The yearling steers sold dearer, yearling heifers and grown cattle sold to equal, heavy cows fluctuated slightly and averaged unchanged to 10c dearer reaching a top of 298c/kg. Leaner and plain lighter cows to restockers were slightly easier although selling mainly from 268c to 346c and up to 370c/kg. Bulls sold to steady competition selling from 5c to 20c/kg dearer.

Yearling steers sold from 424c to 531c, good quality yearling heifers made from 400c to 460c and heifers suiting feeders made from 360c to 464c/kg. The few grown steers made from 320c to 380c with a restocker paying to 400c/kg. Two pens of dairy cross manufacturing steers sold from 294c to 302c/kg. Grown heifers mostly went to restockers and made from 250c to 422c with processors paying to 347c/kg. Heavy cows sold from 249c to 298c and the heavy bulls made from 250c to 300c/kg.

Don't get caught by 'Hi mum' phone scam

Cybercrime Squad detectives are reminding mobile phone users to remain vigilant, after a spike in reports by victims of an emerging scam dubbed the 'Hi Mum' scam.

The scam involves the offender sending a text message from an unknown mobile phone number to a person on a messaging application claiming to be their son or daughter.

The message will state they've lost their phone, telling the victim they're sending from their new number and to delete the old number.

Once the victim engages in conversation, the offender will ask to borrow money or have a payment made on their behalf. This will generally include an excuse as to why they need it – for example, unavailability of online banking on the new device – and an offer to pay it back.

The offender will usually state it's a matter of urgency before providing details for the payment.

Cybercrime Squad Commander, Detective Superintendent Matthew Craft, said the scam is becoming increasingly costly for parents around the world, including Australia.

"Victims of the 'Hi Mum' scam date back to at least October last year overseas, but since May, we've seen a significant increase in reports not just here in NSW, but jurisdictions across Australia," Det Supt Craft said.

"We encourage people to look out for suspicious behaviours demonstrated by these scammers; including their failure to personalise any communication and excuses as to why they can't speak on the phone.

"If you receive a suspicious message on your mobile, particularly through social media or encrypted messaging, reach out to your relative by an alternative method of communication or call to confirm it is in fact them. "In just a matter of months, the losses accumulated by Australian victims of this scam easily surpasses \$2 million when you consider the significant underreporting by victims of cybercrime generally.

"The demographic of victims is predominately aged over 55, and sadly, many parents are falling victim because they're simply nice people who are concerned for their child's welfare," Det Supt Craft said.

The Australian Cyber Security Centre has recorded a steep increase in the amount of cash and personal identity documents fraudulently obtained by the scam since May, most notably on those aged 65 and above.

Victims in NSW and Victoria account for just over half of all 'Hi Mum' scam reports made to Australian law enforcement bodies, followed by Western Australia and Queensland.

Fraudulently obtained funds are usually quickly moved from bank accounts into cryptocurrency and victims are unlikely to get their money back.

People who have lost money to a scam should contact their bank or financial institution as soon as possible and report the matter to police.
