## Community groups benefit



Representatives of Guyra Community Organisations attended a function at Guyra Bowling & Recreation Club to receive their presentation certificates from Regional Australia Bank

Sporting clubs, environmental groups and health services were among organisations recognised and presented with cheques at special events across the state as part of Regional Australia Bank's Community Partnership Program.

# What do you think?

The Federal Government, in conjunction with the States, has raised the emissions reduction targets from 36% to 43% by 2030.

To achieve this, Australia is seeking to increase its dependence on renewables. To meet the 43% carbon reduction target, the Government plans to close six large coal-fired power stations by 2030. This will reduce Australia's energy generation capability by 20%.

At present, depending on the levels of wind and solar energy available in the eastern seaboard States, renewable energy accounts for between 20% and 40% of generated power.

Yet the world is building 195 coal fired power stations with 95 being in China, 28 India and 23 Indonesia. In June 2022 there were a total of between 1,100 and up to 3,000 operating coal-fired power plant units in China. (Google has both figures.)

These policies will worsen our energy supply crisis and put further upward pressure on power prices for households and industry.

Without reliable baseload power generation capability, Australia will have little capacity to manufacture the goods we need and we will be forced to import more from China along with most of our wind turbines and solar cells.

And the irony of it all? Australia has an abundance of natural resources. We have many, many decades worth of coal and we have about 30% of the world's uranium deposits.

We have more than enough to power our industries for many generations to come and to further develop our manufacturing capabilities.

Intermittent renewable energy from wind and solar, even when supplemented by battery storage, is incapable of replacing the base-load power that can be generated by reliable and efficient coal fired

power stations.

We have governments here that do not want to use coal or gas but are allowing the export of millions of tonnes of both to other countries every year for them to burn to produce their power and steel.

This year these sales are forecast to generate for Australia \$110 billion. This, along with iron ore, is keeping this country afloat within the order of \$40 billion per annum in taxes and royalties [2019/20]. It is much more today with the higher prices.


Australia needs to recognise that it is more important to produce reliable baseload power than it is to meet some arbitrary green emissions target. We need to keep our coal fired power stations.

Also, we need to consider the use of emissions free uranium to produce electricity. France generates 73% of its power from nuclear. We have plenty of uranium. Why do we not use nuclear power to generate electricity?

Do we need to suffer widespread blackouts, cuts in use of air conditioning (as in Spain and now Germany), closures of our aluminium plants and other heavy industry users?

All the while suffering the explosion of wind turbines in regional Australia, the crossing of the land with multiple transmission lines and yet no visual impact on our city cousins who are clamouring for more renewables. It is understood that in order to meet Government targets there are estimates that we will need upwards of an additional 7,000 wind turbines.

Is this madness?

### The Voice Referendum

If you are trying to decide how you will vote in the forthcoming Referendum the points made by last week's anonymous contributor will only muddy the already murky waters.

This should not and need not become as that writer has forecast, a "race based" Referendum. What Australian would not wish to do something that would make our Indigenous compatriots feel respected, valued, listened to and their lives made healthy, financially independent, safe?

But as last week's contributor has correctly pointed out, it is uncertain if an Indigenous voice to Parliament will do any of those things.

Leaving all else aside, let us keep in mind one question only in deciding how to cast our vote:

What will the consequences be for the practical operation of the Constitution and the legislative process and subsequently all citizens?

The answer is: We don't know, nobody does.

Given that we have no knowledge of how the alteration to the Constitution will play out in years or even decades to come, we must resort to speculation and hypothetical scenarios, (which will by the way be called scaremongering).

It will be impossible to predict what will eventuate should we vote 'Yes'.

Nevertheless, someone has commendably tried to do just that.

In her article The Albanese Amendment (Weekend Australian, 13-14 Aug 2022, pp.18-19) Janet Albrechtsen, with the aid of senior legal advisors, has done some projections of possible eventualities. I recommend her article to you...the Guyra Library will have a copy. Also same newspaper, same date, a column by Senator Jacinta Nampijinpa Price, an Indigenous woman living on the frontline of Indigenous disadvantage.

Here is just one of many possible scenarios:

According to Albrechtsen a role for the High Court is guaranteed in deciding the legality of any laws passed by parliament relating to the voice.

So if, for example, the parliament wished to pass legislation that would limit the scope or power of the voice in areas such as defence, banking, foreign affairs etc, the High Court could rule that legislation invalid. In short, the voice would not be restricted to exercising its powers (whatever they might be) in exclusively Indigenous matters, (if there is such a

thing).

If this is correct, there are implications for (among other things) the Constitutional Separation of Powers and our democratic system of government, not to mention the unavoidable and ongoing legal argy-bargy.

Given that decisions such as these should be made based on correct information and rational analysis (not emotion) it is apparent that we do not have the information to proceed responsibly.

This is something very different to the 1967 Referendum when we were asked to do the decent thing and authorise the government to include our Indigenous sisters and brothers in population counts. Now we are being asked to walk blindfold, on a dark night into a minefield. We must be very very careful. Or not go there at all.

### Rail Trails

I read with interest in your article "Rail Trail Bill Passes" in the last Gazette and I would like to respond to three sections of that article.

The change in the Transport Act to provide a streamline process that may enable regional rail trails "where and when the community wants them". As both councils know plus two National Party members, the Ben Lomond community do not want a rail trail through our village. All the above mentioned have received our petition not wanting this project. Our wish is for our village to retain our history and heritage which is railway.

On the part of the article that states, "Projects that are consistent with the rail trail framework and have broad community support will be able to proceed," 95 percent of our broader community do not want this proposal. "Where is the social licence".

I also note with interest that Minister Faraway has said that this is not a "Green Light" for all disused rail corridors to become a rail trail. This is one corridor that should be left alone trains are better than bikes.

It will be very interesting to see what it will cost the councils for a 30 year lease when there is a lot more important issues that need to be addressed. I ask that both councils start listening and start asking a lot more questions about this doomed project.

Once you have some clear idea on what you would like to build or do, we suggest you request a pre-application meeting where you and development staff can discuss your proposal. You will need to

include preliminary plans and some basic information with your application - **this is a fee for service** and whilst not mandatory, it is highly recommended as this can streamline your approval process saving on revisions.

Following the meeting our staff will provide written advice, addressing relevant issues which are to be addressed in your application (as a non-compliance with Council Policy) when you lodge it on the NSW Planning Portal.
