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Late winter brings first snow

Guyra is no stranger to winter snow, but this year had to wait until the last week of winter for a significant fall. It came on Tuesday night as a fast moving severe cold front passed through the Northern Tablelands bringing strong winds, showers and low temperatures.

Snow began to fall on the higher areas from Black Moun-

tain to Ben Lomond in the evening. In Guyra a ten minute shower of hail at around 6pm was followed by moderate to heavy snow showers from around 7pm to 8pm easing to intermittent light snow showers for the remainder of the evening.

Snow settled on the ground to a depth of 4 to 6 cms, and was

still on the ground the following morning, melting later in the day. Temperatures hovered around zero to -1C from 7pm during the snowfalls.

While winter has come to an end, there is still a chance of more falls. Records show that snow in spring is always a possibility given the right conditions. Between 1982 and 2021 snow has fallen in September and/or October in 20 of those years. One of the biggest snowfalls in recent memory came in October of 2012 with a heavy overnight fall which measured 10cm on the ground.

New hope for council separation

Council demergers are back in the headlines with the Minister for Local Government Wendy Tuckerman last week announcing that Cootamundra-Gundagai Regional Council will be demerged. Cootamundra and Gundagai councils were forced to merge in 2016, at the same time that the Guyra and Armidale Dumaresq councils were joined to create Armidale Regional Council.

The minister said that her decision was based on the merits of the proposal put forward by Cootamundra-Gundagai Regional Council and the subsequent recommendations and examination by the independent Boundaries Commission.

The announcement has given new hope to the Save and Grow Guyra (SAGG) group who are pushing to achieve the same outcome for the local community. The group are in the process of preparing a submission for demerger and launched a petition in June last year to support their case for the establishment of a new rural council based in Guyra.

To date they are still 340 signatures short of achieving the required 2050 signatures of support, which will allow them to present their case to the NSW Parliament. They believe that the former Guyra Shire was viable prior to the NSW Council Amalgamations and are seeking a return of a financially stable, independent, and locally controlled Guyra based Council.

Phil Henry from SAGG said that last weeks' proven success of two NSW Councils being returned as fully independent council's has strengthened the case for Guyra to go it alone.

"Based on recent recognised financial failures and continual blow-out budget costs as previously proven by world-leading economists and consultants, the NSW Minister had no other choice but to sign off the return of the two councils to operate as previous viable independent councils," Mr Henry said.

"Rate rises are not sustainable and are by no means a business model. If you are wondering why your rates are so high with nothing to show, an example found by the chief auditor of one particular council with 40 middle management on \$250k per annum each which led to no increase in productivity," he added. "This was a recipe for disaster with other merged councils facing similar financial failure based on poor management and lack of experience. The precedent has now been set for more demergers as it can no longer be ignored by the fact that it is not working, based on science and mathematics by a world-leading professor on why it was destined to fail.

"If you are not worried about further rate costs and Guyra becoming a ghost town you should be," Mr Henry concluded.

Students were educated by leaders in the industry on fleece judging, wool career options , latest wool innovation technologies, meat production and processing.

Our students were lucky enough to spend an hour chatting with Mr and Mrs Roger Fletcher from Fletcher International providing our students with a wonderful opportunity to gain valuable insights into this very important industry for our area.

10, represented our school and was a "stand out" according to the overjudges Mr Tony Inder, Allendale Merino Stud, Wellington and Mr Cam Munro from Egalabra Merino Stud near Dubbo. Brooke had never judged fleeces before but came 3rd place in the junior judging, demonstrating "Superior" fleece handling skills according to assistant judge Deb Snaith, Inverell. She then went on to achieve first place in the hoof junior judging event, achieving second place overall for her judging abilities. This is an outstanding achievement for a young student competing against much older, experienced students from schools across the state. My appreciation must be expressed for the generosity of our parents, in particular Mara and Anthony Grills for organising donated motel accommodation for our students whilst staying in Dubbo. Many thanks also to Mara Grills and Jo Dullaway for providing food and refreshments for our students whilst we travelled to Dubbo.

Consultation commences for proposed 50% increase to land rates

Armidale Regional Council (ARC) is seeking community input on a proposal to apply to the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) for a permanent Special Rate Variation (SRV) of around 50% over three years, which would take effect from 2023-24.

The new Council, led by mayor Sam Coupland, is determined to drive a jobs and growth strategy to change the fortunes of our region and get on top of the backlog in the maintenance of important community infrastructure.

In three years, the SRV would generate an additional \$10.1M per year over and above the \$1.5M per year that council would gain via the already allowable annual increase. The additional \$10.1M per year income from the SRV in 2026 will enable council to bridge the infrastructure renewal funding gap of an average of \$6.9M per year and invest an additional \$3.2M p.a. in operational service delivery.

This is in contrast to \$2M p.a. in cuts under the 'managed decline' scenario if Council does not pursue an increase to land rates.

Armidale Mayor Sam Coupland said the two options for ARC are clear; an SRV as part of the solution to restore the real cost of maintaining assets and providing services to grow and be sustainable or a managed decline where the state of our assets and infrastructure continue to worsen due to an inability to be able to afford to maintain them.

"Obviously, service cuts will have significant impacts on the community, and this is not Council's preferred option," said Mayor Coupland.

"We want people to understand the issues and to participate in these forums to express their views knowing the full picture. The community engagement process will inform Council in considering whether to proceed with an application for a Special Rate Variation," said Mayor Coupland

At the conclusion of the current period of community engagement Council will consider whether to proceed with an application for a Special Rate Variation. This will likely take place at the Council meeting scheduled for November 2022. Council will then need to notify IPART of its intent to lodge a Special Rate Variation application in February 2023.

"No matter what Council does, an SRV is required to restore the real cost of maintaining assets and providing services to grow and be sustainable. We want to ensure that we can deliver on our vision to grow our region into the future," said mayor Coupland.

CWA calls for improvement in rural maternity services

The Guyra Evening CWA branch is calling for urgent improvements to maternity services and support in rural and regional NSW.

A catalyst for the formation of the Country Women's Association of NSW a century ago was the need for adequate maternal health services in the bush, and 100 years on the Association continues to advocate for expectant mothers and their families, with the critical issue the focus of this year's annual Awareness Week campaign.

Guyra Evening Branch President, Anne Starr said the issue was on the Association's radar at its annual State Conference in Sydney in May, when a number of branch motions were put to members around the need for improved maternity services and care in rural and remote NSW, and for the establishment of a dedicated hotline to support women in rural areas to navigate available maternity support services.

On the final day of the conference, in the wake of the release of findings from a NSW parliamentary inquiry into rural and regional health, a motion of urgency was unanimously endorsed by members, calling for immediate action by state and federal governments to address the current crisis in the provision of primary medical services as a result of the lack of general practitioners and medical staffing in hospitals in rural NSW.

"Just because you choose to live outside our major cities doesn't mean you should have to tolerate a lower standard of medical care and support. Expectant mothers and new mothers should feel safe and supported, but what we heard during and after the inquiry was that this is far from the case for those living in rural and regional areas of our state," said Anne Starr.

"It seems fitting that in the CWA of NSW's centenary year, we're continuing the advocacy around urgent improvements to maternal and antenatal care for country residents. We're simply asking for the same levels of care city-based people expect and we don't think equity is too much to ask. Those living in rural and regional NSW pay the same taxes as everyone else and your postcode shouldn't dictate the standard of basic healthcare requirements."

Introduce fee-free study now for Nurses & Midwives in NSW



I have called on the New South Wales Government to follow the Victorian Government's lead and step in to make university studies for new nurses and midwives fee-free.

The Victorian initiative was announced over the weekend and it is vital the NSW Government also offer the support to ensure the upskilling of the nursing workforce and prevent a 'brain-drain' into the neighbouring state.

I have written to the Minister for Health, Brad Hazzard, and the Minister for Regional Health, Bronnie Taylor, requesting the same offer be put on the table for aspiring nurses and midwives to train in NSW.

This Victorian initiative combines a scholarship payment of up to \$16,500 to cover three years of fulltime study and will be offset by two years of work in the Victorian public health service, so that across the five-year program, training will be free.

This is a practical way to attract more recruits into this profession as well as opening a pathway to those for whom financial restrictions have made a degree and career in nursing unattainable.

Let's not delay - I want to see NSW get this offer on the table

before Victoria starts to recruit from across the border our best and brightest.

The Victorian Government's plan has been costed as a \$270 million program to recruit and train 17,000 nurses and midwives, with 10,000 of those expected to be new students,

Additionally, I am calling on the NSW Government to duplicate other payments to upskill existing nurses and midwives

This includes:

 scholarships of up to \$10,000 for postgraduate nurses to complete specialty studies,

• \$11,000 scholarships for enrolled nurses to become registered nurses,

• \$12,000 scholarships to support training and employment of 100 new Nurse Practitioners.





Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale

August 17 - Total Yarding: 2255 (+305) | Sheep Yarding: 460 (-105) | Lamb Yarding: 1795 (+410). There was an increased penning of lambs, while sheep numbers reduced slightly. The quality of the lambs was fair to very good, with heavy and extra heavy weight lambs well represented. The usual buyers were in attendance.

Strong demand for all classes resulted in dearer trends throughout. The plainer condition trade and restocker lambs experienced moderate gains. The better quality lambs to restockers posting strong improvement. The well finished trade weights also showed substantial improvement. The heavy and extra heavy weight lambs sold to significantly dearer market trends following some weeks of subdued demand.

The limited supply of sheep

attracted increased demand from processors along with some restocker activity on Merino ewes. Market trends dearer throughout.

Weekly Wool Market

August 19th - The national offering fell around 4,500 bales short of what was originally rostered. The consolidation signs that emerged late last week proved correct with the headline Eastern Market Indicator recording zero movement throughoutthe course of this week's sales. In the Northern region the bulk of the individual micron categories witnessed little movement with the exception of a 30 cent gain in the 16.5 micronrange. 40,493 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate on 9.6%

Major buyers included Techwool, Tianyu and Endeavour Wool. After only four weeks into the new selling season almost

20,000 additional bales have been offered compared to the corresponding period last season. With the Western region not selling next week the expected national offering is just over 40,000 bales. Early estimates for the following week remain similar however can change rapidly depending on market conditions. Especially with around 44,000 bales either passed in or withdrawn prior to sale in the first four selling weeks of this new season. These will no doubt come back onto the market if we see some upward momentum.

August 26 - With the Western region scheduled not to be conducting sales the weeks the national offering fell below 40,000 bales for the first time this season. It was another week of price consolidation with very little across all categories.

The Northern region indicator was 1 cent dearer on the first day of sales and added a further 2 cents on the final day. 32,712 bales were sold nationally for the week with a surprisingly high passed in rate of 12.6% considering the stability of the market.

Major buyers included Tianyu, Techwool & Meliwa with the top four buyers accounting for almost 50% of the Merino fleece offering. Average weekly offerings look set to hover around the 40,000 bale mark for the next fortnight but this would be a large increase on the corresponding period last season.

Since April 2021 the Eastern market indicator has been through an extended period of low volatility. This week's closing level of 1342 sits just under 3% lower than the average weekly closing level during the past 16 months.

The forward market is pricing in little change between now and December based on the select few contracts that have changed hands recently.


