Home Support Services bus to provide regular access to shopping precinct

A bus to take Guyra residents into the shopping precinct on Bradley Street in Guyra is now available through the Guyra Home Support Services.

The new bus service is replacing the existing taxi service which is no longer available. The shopping bus will run Monday 12-3pm, Tuesday 9am – 4pm and Thursday 9am – 4pm each week.

Guyra Home Support Services Coordinator Toni Kirkman said the bus would be a valuable resource for community members unable to access a vehicle or who can no longer drive.

"The existing taxi service concluded in June and Guyra residents have been without an affordable and regular transport option to complete essential shopping and errands in town," said Toni

"This will be a very affordable option for the Guyra community and will fill a big whole that the taxi service left. It also provides



much needed social opportunities for some of our more isolated residents who live alone to access other members of the community and services including the library, the Neighbourhood Centre and other community services being offered." Home Support Services on 6770 7127 and ask to receive bus vouchers and a book a time and seat on the bus for their preferred shopping day. The service is subsidised and the most residents will pay from anywhere within the Guyra town boundary is \$7.20 return.

Vale William 'Bill' Wicks

The Guyra community lost one of its most respected citizens earlier this month with the passing of William 'Bill' Wicks at the age of 90. He passed away peacefully at the Guyra MPS on September 5 with family in attendance.

Bill will always be remembered for his 18 years as principal at Guyra Central School.

Students and staff alike benefited from his leadership, commitment to the learning of young people and his strong values of equality, empathy and integrity.

The school's gymnasium is named in his honour.

Bill was a long-serving member of Guyra Rotary Club, filling all major roles for many years, and working tirelessly on club activities. He was also president of the Guyra branch of the Jean Colvin Hospital and CanAssist for many years, assisting local people needing cancer treatment in Sydney.

He is survived by his wife of 69 years, Judy. They were named



joint Guyra citizens of the year in 2003 for their contribution to the town.

Bill and Judy had six children – Sue (dec), Ron, Sally, Wendy, Kath and Jim, 17 grandchildren and currently 16 great-grandchildren.

A private family funeral was held on Monday for Bill, in-keeping with Judy's wishes. She said he was a selfless and modest man who would not have wanted a large public service, despite his many achievements and the great respect in which the Guyra community held him.

While his passing is a great loss to Guyra and his family, Judy said he will always be with her.

Free health checks for men this week

"Saving men's lives" is the catch cry of the Rotary Men's Health Education Rural Van (MHERV) which will be in our local area Friday September 16th and Saturday September 17th from 9.30 to 3.30pm in the NAB car park..

MHERV is an initiative of the Rotary Club of Warners Bay in collaboration with local Rotary clubs or other community groups. The Rotary Club of Guyra will be hosting MHERV in our area.

With the support of the Royal Freemasons Benevolent Institution (RFBI) a Registered Nurse undertakes free basic check-ups for "blokes". Ladies are also welcome to come in and have a free health check.

The purpose-built MHERV van is staffed by a male Nurse, Bill Power. It offers free of charge health screening services for Blood Pressure, Cholesterol, and Diabetes. The consultation takes about 10 minutes and provides immediate results, helping to improve health outcomes for men.

Bill has the knack of being able to

relax even the most stressed clients. During the confidential consultation, Bill takes the opportunity to also chat about other health related concerns, including state of mind. This service is offered in a relaxed, confidential and informal setting under Covid safe Guidelines.

The Nurse submits a daily report to the Program Management team at Rotary Club of Warners Bay from which statistics are gathered. Over the last 4 years the results have averaged approximately 4% who have required urgent attention, around 40% are advised to follow up on something with their GP in the next week and 56% are encouraged to keep up the good work.

Over the past four years the van has seen nearly 11,000 people so it has potentially saved over four hundred people from a severe health event. So don't walk past, come in and meet our Registered nurse, Bill for your free health check at:

The Federal Climate Change and Energy Minister would like to see more people driving electric vehicles (EVs). NSW has a goal to have 50% of all new cars being EVs by 2030.

The Committee for Sydney proposes that the sale of petrol and diesel cars be banned in five years' time and that all new cars need to be electric by 2027. That's great – for wealthy city people who drive relatively short distances. But for most people in rural areas who are on average incomes and who travel longer distances, EVs leave a lot to be desired.

Most low cost EVs (small four seaters) are at least \$20,000 dearer than petrol engine cars, and the added cost of a bigger battery (for extended range) and the cost of a wall box charger for the home (typically more than \$950) means that most people in rural areas on average income cannot afford to buy an EV.

One of the biggest concerns for rural people has to do with the EV's range and the problem of recharging the battery while on a trip. Some of the more expensive EVs claim ranges in excess of 400km – with only one person in the car. The lower priced EVs generally have a range between 200km and 330km. What if the family is going on a holiday or you are pulling a small trailer. What would the range be then?

Currently the recharging infrastructure is not adequate in rural and regional Australia. If you are on a long trip and you're lucky enough to find a vacant charging station in a town, it may take you up to an hour to reach 80% capacity. The NSW Government is establishing a road user system in which all drivers pay for their "fair share" for road use. A road user charge of 2.5 cents per km (indexed to CPI) will apply to eligible EVs from 1 July 2027 or when EVs make

up 30 per cent of all new vehicle sales, whichever comes first.

Until then EV owners do not contribute. So, who pays for the roads over the next five years? Those who cannot afford an expensive EV – the average income earner who drives a petrol or diesel car.

Currently, the average petrol and diesel passenger vehicle owner pays approximately \$622 a year in fuel excise. Under NSW's new road user system, EV drivers will pay on average only \$315 annually.

Who benefits? Those who can afford an EV.

Who pays more? People in rural areas who are on average incomes and who travel longer distances in petrol or diesel cars.

The whole EV agenda is skewed against rural and regional people who drive petrol or diesel vehicles.

Feral animals and exotic diseases Forum

A massive pest animal forum is coming to the Glen Innes Showgrounds this September featuring an impressive line-up of industry speakers.

The event will focus on the latest research into pest animal control in the New England, the threat of exotic diseases to Australia and how to prevent their spread on farms.

Headlining the event Dr Andrew Bengsen from NSW Department of Primary Industries who will discuss the latest findings around predator research and control in the region present including an update on the fallow deer collaring results from the Grahams Valley collaring site in Glen Innes.

Darren Marshall from Southern Queensland Landscapes will present his latest research into feral pig collaring and Perry Newman from Northern Tablelands Local Land Services will provide a feral pig trapping demonstration.

Dan Matthews will talk about training working dogs for feral animal detection and trap setting for wild dogs.

Dr Jonathan Lee from the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries QLD and Dr Andrew Biddle from Northern Tablelands Local Land Services will discuss the current exotic disease threats to farmers in the New England and what landholders can do to minimise the risks associated with their spread, including Foot and Mouth Disease.

Event organiser Stuart Boyd-Law emphasised the importance of local landholders attending the Pest Animal Forum and the critically important information that will be shared on the day.

'People in the region need to attend this event to keep abreast of the current pest animal issues and the latest research,' said Mr Boyd-Law.

'The exotic disease update is probably one of the most important

topics given the high numbers of feral pigs landholders are currently experiencing. It's also important landholders are aware of the exotic disease risks Australia is facing, and are educated about how to prevent the risks of their spread.'

This project is supported by the Department of Agriculture, Water and the Environment through funding from the Australian Government's National Landcare Program, Smart Farm Small Grants.

The event is free to attend, with morning tea and lunch provided.

Rural Market Reports

Weekly Wool Market

September 9th - Coming off the back of last week's designated Superfine sale in Sydney the less stylish offering came under pressure when the market opened.

The fall was largely confined to the 18.5 micron and finer types with the bulk of the losses occurring on the first day of sales. Focus appeared to shift towards the mid micron Merino fleece types with prices closing equivalent to and in some cases better than last week's market close.

34,925 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 10%. Major buyers included Tianyu, Techwool and Endeavour Wool. This week's closing market level is nearing the bottom of a fairly narrow channel that it has traded in over the past two years with little change compared to the corresponding week last season.

Currency movements when looked at in US dollars left the Eastern Market Indicator at its lowest weekly closing level since December 2020.

The 19 micron indicator was traded on the forward market this week for October delivery at 10 cents under the auction close. Forecast national weekly auction offerings look set to remain at around 40,000 bales for the rest of the month.

350 rainbow & brown trout dive into Malpas Dam restocking

MALPAS Dam has just 'landed' a number of new tenants the release of 350 mature Rainbow Trout in the water supply as part of the State Government's annual fish restocking program.

The release, and another one shortly in nearby Dumaresq Dam, will provide greater recreational fishing opportunities for the region's anglers.

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall said that now is the perfect time to introduce these fish, which were broodstock from the Dutton Trout Hatchery at Ebor, into their new home.

"The State's fisheries experts have chosen to stock Malpas Dam because it offers the best environment for these fish to grow; they are already too big for predators like Redfin to prey on, so this is an ideal location, right in our own backyard.

"For keen anglers this release offers a golden opportunity to make a trophy catch, with a number of the fish around 70 centime-

tres in length.

"Throughout the year fishing groups like the Guyra Angler's Club hold competitions on the banks of Malpas Dam, drawing visitors to the area and providing a financial boost to the Black Mountain and Guyra economies.

"This release will hopefully encourage more of those events and is a huge boost to the region's anglers.

"This program is all about ensuring local fish populations not only regenerate but flourish."

The Dutton Trout Hatchery produces more than 1.6 million trout each year – around 1.3 million Rainbow Trout and 300,000 Brown Trout fry and fingerlings.
