Women from across regional and rural NSW will convene in Glen Innes for the 29th annual Rural Women's Gathering next month, ahead of the International Day of Rural Women 2022.

The Gathering will be hosted by Glen Innes Natural Resources Advisory Committee (GLENRAC) and Guyra Evening Country Women's Association, with support from the NSW Government and Rural Women's Network.

Minister for Women, Regional Health and Mental Health Bronnie Taylor said the theme for this year's event is 'restoring your colourful self', with a focus on rebuilding connections after COVID lockdowns.

"It's important to remember when COVID-19 reached our shores, many rural communities

were recovering from drought and devastating bushfires. Since then, many of the same communities have sadly also suffered unprecedented floods and even a mouse plague," Mrs Taylor said.

"After all the challenges faced over the past few years, gatherings are even more important for rural women, both personally and professionally. They help women feel connected and supported, inspired and empowered. They provide an opportunity to learn, grow and celebrate the richness of each other's experiences."

Minister for Agriculture and Western NSW Dugald Saunders said the Gathering is a great opportunity for the host region to showcase its talent, produce and environment.



Information supplied by Jeff Martin, Observer for Bureau of Meteorology Creating, talking, learning, and listening with others can be healing. The Arts North West CreativiTEA project is returning for a third round to small New England communities, offering regional women chance all these elements through free workshops.

This project's third round will return to Torrington and Drake, and launch in Bundarra and Ben Lomond over 17-20 October.

The workshops provide women a day of beginning-level drypoint printmaking with Armidale artist Lizzie Horne, and time spent with familiar faces from the HNEH Rural Adversity Mental Health program (RAMHP). Local HealthWISE nurses have volunteered to be available for routine health checks as an added benefit.

CreativiTEA's project officer Michèle Jedlicka has been onboard for all the workshops. She said the results have been delightful and inspiring.

"The drypoint process is so accessible, and provides women who have never tried a printmaking process a really beautiful entry-point. Plus, having the mental and physical health support not only on site, but taking part in the workshop alongside



the participants has been special," Michèle said.

Workshop facilitator Lizzie Horne said the buzz of excitement in the room as people's ideas became images was like magic, and appreciated the energy among the women in the room.

"I just love the gasps of delight when someone pulls that first print off the press and sees the amazing art they have created!" Lizzie said.

"The camaraderie that is shared in the process of creation is like gold...the low ripple of laughter and chatter and satisfaction of making something beautiful."

Lizzie stressed the printmaking project was more about expression than mastering the process. "We aren't looking for perfection, we're looking at something that belongs uniquely to each person. And for that day, they are all artists!" she said.

All CreativiTEA workshops, materials, and catering are provided free, and RAMHP team members will be available for support beyond the workshop sessions for more support.

### **Cars of the Future?**

Another thought comes to mind – how can there be enough power

generated from wind and solar to power these vehicles when there isn't enough power being produced for general use now?

If you owned one, imagine driving to a power point/station, only to find two cars ahead of you. You would have to wait for them, plus almost an hour to recharge your vehicle.

The elected 10 member Committee comprises CWA volunteers from throughout NSW including two from Guyra Evening Branch.



### Ministerial intervention requested to restore obstetric services

I recently requested the urgent intervention of Regional Health Minister Bronnie Taylor to restore obstetrics cover at Armidale Hospital and across the region to ensure expecting mothers can safely give birth in their local communities.

I was alarmed and disturbed to learn that Armidale and the region has had little to no obstetrics cover since mid-September, forcing expecting mothers to trek all the way to Tamworth to give birth.

Not having the coverage is bad enough, but given there has been no warning by the health district and no advice provided to the community that this was going to be the case, it's even more disgraceful.

We all know our health workforce is stretched to its limits at the

moment, but this situation has to be a new low and something that should have been foreseen and measures put in place to ensure at least one location in the region has obstetrics cover.

The birth of a child is one of the most exciting and proud moments for parents and it's a reasonable expectation for mums to be able to give birth at their local hospital as their mothers have before them.

It's extraordinary to think that with around 600 babies born, on average, each year across the Northern Tablelands, that we could see a time where there is no obstetrics cover.

I brought this unacceptable situation to the attention of Minister Taylor and on behalf of the community have sought her urgent intervention to give expecting



mums in our region the comfort and assurance they can bring their newborns into this world safely and close to home.

I'll be sure to keep the community informed as to any updates.

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

# Costa Group CEO stands down

The Costa Group is looking for a new CEO after Sean Hallahan steps down. Hallahan, who relinquished the position in late September, has only occupied the chief executive seat since March last year, when Harry Debney retired and became a non-executive director. Meanwhile, Debney will step in as interim CEO and managing director, another role held by Hallahan, as a search begins for a replacement.

Chairman Neil Chatfield described the last two years as "challenging" for Costa amid the pandemic and "extreme" weather conditions. However, the business swung back to profit in the 2020 fiscal year.

Costa's shares closed more than 14% lower in Sydney on the back of Hallahan's departure from the supplier of berries, mushrooms, glasshouse tomatoes and avocados.

Chatfield said: "We understand that the last two years, particularly in Victoria, have taken a large toll on the business and personal lives of individuals. Under Sean's leadership, Costa has performed extremely well during a challenging period with global Covid-19 disruptions and extreme weather conditions being successfully navigated and is in a strong financial position."

Hallahan said: "I am proud to leave Costa in a strong position financially and operationally. Reaching my decision has been a process and there are several things that have gone into my decision. It has been an intense couple of years in agriculture made even more challenging with the overlay of the Covid-19 pandemic."

### Rural Market Reports

### Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale

September 28th - There was a small reduction in lamb supply to 2,450 with sheep numbers falling to just 500. The quality of the lambs on offer was very mixed with heavy and extra heavyweights well supplied. There was also fair supply of medium weight trade lambs while there were minimal supplies to suit restockers. The usual processors were in attendance.

There were varying trends in the lamb market. The plainer condition lightweights to processors sold to dearer trends. The medium weight trade lambs up to 22kg sold to cheaper trends. Heavier weights to 26 kg also sold to cheaper trends with quality related price variations in those categories. The quality and weight of the heavy and extra heavyweight classes helped to lift averages on a firm to slightly cheaper market trend.

Plain condition sheep made up the largest percentage of the pen-

ning. Competition lifted with the market trend firm to slightly dearer for the most part. Restockers operated on the plain condition lightweight ewes.

### **Armidale Cattle Sale**

September 29th - Numbers remained steady at 333 head. The overall quality of the offering was fair to good with some very good vealers and yearlings. There was a fair supply of grown cattle however bull numbers were well down. There was restricted processor competition on grown cattle, particularly in the bull market. Restocker and feedlot activity was high with a number of extra participants.

There were varying trends through the young cattle where the better quality lightweight vealer and steer yearlings sold to dearer trends. Some of the plainer quality steers struggled to maintain recent levels. The medium and heavy weight yearling steers sold to dearer trends with increased competition, posting strong gains. All the better quality vealer and yearling heifers to restock and feed met strong demand to follow similar trends to those of the steers. Breed did play a part in some price change. A small number of well finished vealer heifers attracted keen trade demand.

There were a couple of pens of heavyweight grown steers suitable to processors, no market comparison available. Well finished grown heifers were keenly sought by both processors and feedlots to sell to dearer trends. The export market was weaker with cows selling to cheaper trends of as much as 10c/kg on the better heavyweights. Reduced competition resulted in the heavy bulls showing a substantially cheaper trend.

### Weekly Wool Sale

September 30th - The downtrend continued for all categories except for the Merino Carding indicator. In the Northern region the indicator fell 9 cents on Wednesday followed by a further 4 cent decline on Thursday.

19 micron and finer types again came under the most pressure however the Northern region offering significantly outperformed when compared to quotes from the Southern region, where losses of between 90 and 100 cents on the finer types were reported. The Eastern market indicator has not managed to report a weekly gain since the 24th of June.

The Aussie dollar was down almost a full 2 cents against the US hitting a 2½ year low. The Eastern market indicator in US dollars fell 4.7% for the week. This week's national offering was the smallest of the season to date and the first weekly offering (size wise) to fall below the corresponding week last season. 23,636 bales were sold nationally with the passed in rate at 16%.

Major buyers included Tianyu, Techwool & Sequoia. In a hopeful sign that a base in prices may be near the Western region recorded gains for some micron categories on the final day of sales.

# Lessons from Optus data breach

By now, most of us will have heard something about the huge data breach at Optus. Many people will be thinking, 'oh I'm not with Optus, this doesn't affect me'. Unfortunately that isn't true.

A major data breach like this is as close to Christmas as it gets for spammers and criminals. While they may not be in the running to pay the millions the criminals are asking for the stolen data, you can be guaranteed that all the spam call centres, both overseas and here in Australia, are scrambling to get on the phones and into your ear.

We should all use this as a wake up call and keep the following in mind.

- No legitimate bank, telco, energy provider or Government department is going to send you a random SMS or email, out of the blue, with a link to click to "get money back from Optus", "secure your account" or any number of other things that are designed to frighten and confuse you into doing something against your better judgement. If you are not actively speaking with a service that you contacted, do not click on these random links.

- If you receive a call, usually from overseas, which will show on your mobile phone as a + symbol followed by a long phone number, but also from PRIVATE NUMBER / WITHHELD NUM-BER, and telling you they are a company like Telstra, a Government department, etc, ask for the callers name, then hang up! Find the listed call centre number and call back so you know who you are speaking to. Many large organisations are putting on extra call centre staff to cope with these call backs.

- if you suddenly find yourself unable to log into your online banking, or into websites you regularly use, contact your bank or the company involved immediately. If you think you have been scammed, DON'T BE ASHAMED! The scammers rely on people being too embarrassed to contact their institutions or the police. Your bank, energy provider, telco, etc all have specialists at their call centres that are trained to help you as quickly as possible.

And most importantly, if you have friends or relatives who are less technically capable, elderly, disabled, etc and who you feel might be vulnerable to being scammed, sit down and talk with them. In extreme cases, it may even be worth setting up a third party contact with their bank or services to allow you or a trusted friend to speak with their banks, etc on their behalf.

Even the most technically competent of us is liable to be scammed. Live by the old saying "if it sounds too good to be true, it's is" and don't be afraid to say no thank you.

An Acknowledgement of Country is usually delivered as part of the opening at meetings and public events. The practice is the same as acknowledging visitors and VIPs at official functions. (As distinct from a Welcome to Country - only Traditional Custodians of the land on which the event takes place can deliver a Welcome to Country.)

Unfortunately, the Acknowledgement of Country has become a fad. It is unnecessary. It is becoming condescending and counterproductive. The push to include some form of Aboriginal acknowledgement into public meetings and events renders these messages routine and meaningless.


At public events and ceremonies, it is now usual for the host to offer an acknowledgement of country. Thinker has no issue with that if that is their desire. But to have every other speaker do the same is just meaningless, paternalistic tokenism. It is not necessary. It becomes repetitive and loses all significance.

These speakers are offering an acknowledgement of country, not because it is heartfelt, but apparently to give themselves a "feel good" sensation - to provide a public show of their own "wokeness". Most of these speakers would not even know whose "country" they are acknowledging. There being some 250 different Aboriginal languages. Therefore, it means nothing. It is just a platitude.

The more woke practice of acknowledging "emerging leaders" or "Elders past, present and emerging", has been added in recent years. It is generally not accepted practice in the Indigenous community and reeks of tokenism and gratuitous condescension. It is not necessary.

Now this woke nonsense has invaded our everyday lives.

It has invaded everyday shopping, with a supermarket giant now adding an acknowledgment of country to the bottom of the shopping receipt as it comes out of the register.



Coles is now adding an inane message to its dockets, paying its respects to the "Traditional Custodians

of Country throughout Australia". This is the peak of virtue signalling. They can't even be bothered to localise the message.

Reality TV shows, The Block on Channel 9 and The Masked Singer on Network Ten, recently began with Acknowledgements of Country. Indigenous leaders have criticised these reality TV shows for this "condescending" move, claiming it is being overused and thereby devalued.

When you take a flight with Virgin or Qantas, you are subjected to an Acknowledgment of Country on arrival.

Big corporations are becoming more and more woke - trying to outdo each other to stay ahead of the corporate virtue game - to the point where their "acknowledgement" has lost all meaning. Even our "beloved" ABC has got in on the act mentioning tribal names for different localities.

Who is listening or frankly cares?

If people are really concerned about Aboriginal people in genuine need they wouldn't require token gestures, empty rhetoric and virtue signalling through meaningless acknowledgments of country.

My country is Australia.

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
